





Magnificent Monarchs

Curriculum Unit Overview

This project teaches children about the English and British monarchy from AD 871 to the present day. Using timelines, information about royal palaces, portraits and other historical sources, they build up an understanding of the monarchs and then research six of the most significant sovereigns.

IDENTITY - understanding what it means to be human and how human behaviour has shaped the world (looking at hierarchy and power) INNOVATION- understanding the creative process and how everyday and exceptional creativity can shape the world (the impact of monarchs on the country) NATURAL WORLD- understanding the properties of all matter, living and non-living (the importance of artefacts and what they tell us about the past). CIVILISATION - understanding why significant people, places, events and inventions matter and how they have shaped the world (the impact that significant monarchs have had on the country)

Purple mash provides our Computing curriculum this year. Making music Children learn to edit and refine composed music and create their own tunes. Presenting ideas Children explore how a story can be presented in different ways and make a presentation to their class. -	<u>Read Write Inc Phonics.</u> Throughout a half term children explore fiction, non-fiction and poetry texts. We use Reading VIPERS to structure and focus the skills being taught. Our weekly whole class reading lesson structure is as follows:	Fractions Finding parts and wholes. Telling the time to 5 minutes. Knowing how many minutes are in an hour and how many hours are in a day. Position and Direction Describing movement and turns using positional language. Statistics Making tally charts, tables, block charts and pictograms. Interpreting these.
