





Y4 Ancient Civilisations

Curriculum Unit Overview Summer Term

This project teaches children about the history of three of the world's first ancient civilisations: ancient Sumer, ancient Egypt and the Indus Valley civilisation.

Gym – children will develop their fitness levels using their bodies and gym equipment.

Dance - children will learn a range of dance movements from different cultures and to different styles of music. Influences on our health and wellbeing, including friends, family and media, and awareness of how these can affect personal health choices.

Coping with change

How our bodies change as we enter puberty, including hygiene needs and menstruation.

This project teaches children about solids, liquids and gases and their characteristic properties. They observe how materials change state as they are heated and cooled, and learn key terminology associated with these processes.

Sound

This project teaches children about sound, how sound is made and how sound travels as vibrations through a medium to the ear. They learn about pitch and volume and find out how both can be changed.

Art & Design Technology

Animal

In this project children will be finding out how animals inspired artwork in the past, both culturally and historically. Children will then use a range of materials to create artwork based on animal shapes and prints.

Children will also improve their mastery of art and design techniques including: drawing, painting and sculpture with a range of matierals – eg.

Pencil, charcoal, paint and clay.

Music

Blackbird

All the learning in this unit is focused around one song: Blackbird by The Beatles - a song about civil rights.

Reflect, rewind and replay

This unit of Work consolidates the learning that has occurred during the year.
All the learning is focused around revisiting songs and musical activities, a context for the History of Music and the beginnings of the Language of Music.

Religious Education

Buddhist festivals

Children will explore 'why is Buddhism special?' and gather, select and organise ideas about Buddhism.

Identity and belonging

Children to understand how drama is used to reinforce important teachings and stories in religions and consider the ways in which we express our identity.













Home Learning Projects – these are some project ideas for you to enjoy at home with your child. All projects will be displayed in class.

ART:

Select an animal depicted in historical art (e.g., the lions in the Lascaux caves or the Egyptian cat goddess Bastet). Sketch the animal, focusing on understanding why the animal was important in historical contexts.

RE:

Design a poster that answers the question "Why is Buddhism Special?" incorporating key beliefs, symbols, and practices of Buddhism.

Writing:

Use information books and the internet to find out about archaeology, archaeologists, archaeological sites and artefacts. Create an information poster or non-chronological report to record your findings. Include images if you can. Once complete, share it with a family member.

History:

Archaeologists have recovered over 3500 seals from the Indus Valley civilisation. Use the images and your research skills to find the answers to these questions.

- · What are these seals?
- · What were they used for?
- · Why are they important artefacts today?

PSHE:

Create a poster on activities that contribute to positive physical health and mental health.

Reading:

Read a book containing ancient Egyptian myths. Choose your favourite myth and retell the story to a family member.
Afterwards, illustrate your favourite scene from the story. Write a description beneath your picture to explain what is happening.
