Autumn Term 1

School Development Plan

As many of you will know, I always try to speak to parents and carers when they come into school about how we are continually improving as a school.

I thought it may be useful to summarise here what our development priorities are for the coming year.

We are pleased to see the improvements we are making in our Year 6 outcomes every year – this year our progress measures increased by a huge amount (measure of progress form Year 2 to Year 6) so we are thrilled about this. Our attainment has improved on last year and has improved at a faster rate than national. We are not yet at the national average in all subjects and this remains our number one priority at all times – to ensure that at the end of Year 6 all of our children have been supported to reach their full potential and that our averages for reading, writing, maths, science, GPaS (Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling) and Combined attainment (children achieving the national standard in reading, writing AND maths) are all in-line with national averages.

Our other areas to develop this year are:

- To develop PE, PSHE, Music and ICT so that they are as embedded as all other subjects
- To celebrate the wide range of cultures in our school
- To improve the early identification of SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) and ensure the best provision for these children
- To continue to ensure that safeguarding is effective
- To provide staff training to better understand and meet the needs of the children with significant social, emotional and mental health needs
- Improve our outdoor environment







I will keep you updated on our progress towards these in these newsletters.



ROAD SAFETY UPDATE

Thank you to all of the parents and carers who have reported their concerns to us regarding road safety around the academy. We take this extremely seriously.

Some of you will know that we have been working with the council for many years to ask them to take measures to address the road safety around Grove Academy. Despite many meetings, progress on this has been incredibly slow. It has not been easy to arrange meetings to chase this up. However, we now have a meeting booked in the near future to request an update on the proposed measures (which were consulted on with parents and the community earlier this year). I wish to reassure you that we are constantly lobbying them to speed up the action on this.

You will know that we use our 'Little People' when we can to try to deter motorists from parking on the pavement on Turner Street, however they can't be put out in windy weather. We are also experiencing some difficulties with managing the putting out and collection of these.

Did you know there is a 'park and walk' scheme that runs from Forest Park? You can ask the school office for a car parking permit to park there for free whilst you walk to collect or drop off your child at Grove.



Parent guide to great reading

- 1. During reading, we use 'in the moment of reading' skills to help ensure a thorough understanding of the text. Use:
 - Predictions
 - Background knowledge
 - Asking questions
 - Inference
 - 2. Let the child read a page aloud
- Ensure they stop at the punctuation (short pause at a comma, longer pause at a full stop)
 - Ensure they read each word correctly
 - Ensure they self-correct if a word is read incorrectly
 - 3. Use repair strategies to help break down the meaning of unfamiliar words
 - Phonics
 - Syllables
 - Using the pictures for clues
 - Re-read the sentence and put the word in context
 - 4. Ask the child to retell the main events from what they have just read


New to Year 3-Open Evening




Multi-Cultural Day






Class Assemblies Year 6

Y6CB class assembly was the first of this academic year and gave parents and carers an insight into all the amazing things we've done so far this half term.


These include: pig's heart dissection, penalty shoot out with Stoke City, circulation experiments and creative writing based on our class novel: 'Pig Heart Boy'.






We are continuing to use them across all curriculum areas to support lessons and outcomes for children. They are loving having their own

device in lessons.

















