
Welcome to our newsletter, we hope you find everything you need. If there is anything else you would like to see in here, please let us know.

School Uniform

We are proud of our uniform at Grove Road. We encourage the children to look smart as we believe that it gives them a sense of belonging and pride in our school. ask for your co-operation in supporting the uniform policy at Grove Road.

We expect all children to wear our school uniform every day:

- Maroon jumper or cardigan
- White shirt, blouse or polo shirt
- Dark grey trousers/shorts or skirt
- Grove Road School tie (optional)
- White, black, grey socks
- Checked or striped red dresses for summer wear
- Sensible black school shoes (not trainers.)

Please note that trainers are not allowed as general school footwear.

P.E. clothing is essential. Plimsolls are only appropriate for outdoor PE for Early Years pupils. Children come to school in their PE kit on the days when they have PE your child's class teacher will tell you what day this is. They will need to wear:

- A plain T-Shirt
- A pair of shorts or joggers/leggings
- Pair of plimsolls or trainers
- School jumper or cardigan

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

ENCOURAGING CHILDREN TO CHOOSE RESPECT

Sometimes, differences between children can escalate into bullying, potentially impacting their mental health in a way that can persist into adulthood. While it's natural to disagree sometimes, teaching children the importance of respect is essential – especially in difficult situations. This guide provides strategies for encouraging considerate behaviour, even during a dispute, to faster a kinder, more inclusive environment for everyone.

1 LEAD BY EXAMPLE

As adults, we play a crucial rale in modelling respectful behaviour for children; they observe and learn from our actions every day. Se mindful of the way our interact with others in front of children. Neep in mind that you should always approach others with an actitude of mutual respect, even if you disagree with them. Demonstrating this behaviour can influence young people and help them to handle that own conflicts in a healthy well.

2 AGREE TO DISAGREE

Make sure children know that it's fine to have differ opinions – and that disagreeing with someone deem't mean you can't get along or respect each other's point of view. Help them understand that sometimes we can 'agree to disagree'. Using active listoring skills when doing this can also help to buil empathy and understanding of others.

3 PROMOTE ACTIVE

Teach children about the importance of active listening: that is, making a genuine effort to listen to the other person's perspective without interrupting, before respecting in a way that shows you understand that viewpoint, even (or participle especially) if you disagree with it. This makes people feel respected and diseast for a better comprehension of their point of view, which in own can make it each of their point of view, which in own can make it each

ENCOURAGE THE USE OF "I" STATEMENTS

If a child finds themselves in a disagreement with someone, it can be useful to encourage them to use "I" statements during the discussion. Framing their thoughts and feelings using elements like 1 feel ..." or "Ithin.", can help them avoid on occuratory tone and encourages them to take responsibility for their even emetions.

FOCUS ON BEHAVIOUR, NOT CHARACTER

When disagreements beginn, a necuring a hidden to book on critiquing and addressing the specific actions or behavious that caused this upset, rather than attacking the person's character, for exemple, "didn't like how you interrupted me" is better than "four's so must. 6 STAY CALM AND TAKE BREAKS

It's perivotity normal to feel upset during a disagreement – especially if it's getting heated. Record children that if they feel owner hetmed, they should try to take deep breaths or even go for a short break to help them stay composed. If a convensation becomes too intense, remind them it's Ox to suggest continuing it inter or in a different setting. This can prevent things getting out of hand, allowing cooler heads to prevail.

START CONVERSATIONS ABOUT RESPECT

Talk openly to children about what respect means to you and to them. Discuss how they might show respect to each other, to friends, to strangers and even to people we might disagree with. You could use examples of considerate or inconsiderate behandour in books, films or TV to open discussions about the importance of disiles afters due regard.
