

PRIVACY STATEMENT - NHS TEST & TRACE

Schools have a responsibility/obligation to adhere to the Government's advice and guidance re Coronavirus, as part of their public duty.

- The development of the NHS 'Track and Trace' scheme is a key part of the government plan to manage Coronavirus.
- It is likely that we will be asked to provide contact details if a case of Coronavirus or a suspected case arises in our school.
- There is an obligation to support the government planning. We will provide details as requested to do this.

Details provided will be:

- The names of all pupils and visitors.
- A contact phone number for each pupil and visitor.
- Date of visit and arrival and departure time.

The Data Retention period will be 21 days

Your data that is collected for NHS Test and Trace will be retained locally by school for 21 days
after your visit, at which point it will be deleted or destroyed, unless school usually collects the
data for other legitimate business purposes in accordance with the GDPR.

The Data Storage of data collected as part of this contact-tracing initiative will be stored securely and lawfully by the school and by NHS Test and Trace (if passed to them), in line with the requirements of the GDPR and Data Protection Act 2018.

The law on protecting personally identifiable information, known as the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), allows Public Health England to use the personal information collected by NHS Test and Trace. The section of the GDPR that applies is:

- Article 6(1)(e) 'processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller'
- As information about health is a special category of personal information, a further section of the GDPR applies:
- Article 9(2)(i) 'processing is necessary for reasons of public interest in the area of public health, such as protecting against serious cross-border threats to health or ensuring high standards of quality and safety of healthcare'

Public Health England also has special permission from the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care to use personally identifiable information without people's consent where this is in the public interest. This is known as 'Section 251' approval and includes the use of the information collected by NHS Test and Trace to help protect the public from coronavirus. The part of the law that applies here is Section 251 of the National Health Service Act 2006 and the associated Health Service (Control of Patient Information) Regulations 2002.
