Pupil Premium Report for the Academic Year 2018/19

Funding

In 2018/19 Guiseley School received a Pupil Premium grant of £211,672

Purpose of Funding (DFE, 2014)

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England and is paid under Section 14 of the Education Act 2002 and, in accordance with Section 16 of that Act. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding for two policies:

- **raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their potential**
- **supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces**

Basis of Funding

In the 2018/19 academic year, Guiseley School received the following funding for:

Pupils in years 7 to 11 recorded as Ever 6 Free School Meals. This includes pupils recorded in the January 2018 school census who are known to have been eligible for FSM since May 2012, as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2018.	£935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11
Looked-after children (LAC) defined in the Children Act 1989 as one who is in the care of, or provided with accommodation by, an English local authority	£2,300
Children who have ceased to be looked after by a local authority in England and Wales because of adoption, a special guardianship order, a child arrangements order or a residence order	£2,300
Pupils in year groups reception to year 11 recorded as Ever 6 service child or in receipt of a child pension from the Ministry of Defence	£300

Use of Pupil Premium Funding during 2018/19 at Guiseley School

- 1) Percentage of salary for an Assistant Headteacher to lead Pupil Premium strategies across the school
- 2) Dedicated attendance officer
- 3) Percentage of salaries for Key stage co-ordinators, Assistant Key stage co-ordinators and Behaviour support workers to support pupils in improving attendance and behaviour
- 4) Percentage of salaries of English, Maths and Science teachers to support PP pupils in lessons and undertake small group interventions
- 5) Cost of Barrington Stokes reading books for use in 1:1 reading mentoring
- 6) Offsite provision costs per student
- 7) Subsidised music lessons
- 8) Subsidised trips/visits
- 9) 1:1 tuition
- 10) To support the provision of materials and stationery for use at home, including specific art materials for those students studying this subject at GCSE level
- 11) Revision guides and set texts
- 12) Uniform
- 13) Transport

Review of the Pupil Premium Strategy

Impact:

- PP cohort making significantly more rapid progress than non-PP cohort in 2019
- P8 improvement of +0.30 on last year
- Highest P8 outcomes for PP students in 3 years
- P8 improved in every group for disadvantage students
- Gap with non-PP has reduced in every group
- English: increased P8 of +0.47 from 2018; gap with non-disadvantaged has been reduced by +0.41 from 2018
- Maths: increased P8 of +0.25 from 2018 gap with non-disadvantaged has been reduced by +0.34 from 2018
- Ebacc: increased P8 of +0.13 from 2018; gap with non-disadvantaged has been reduced by +0.18 from 2018
- Open: increased P8 of +0.32 from 2018; gap with non-disadvantaged has been reduced by +0.19 from 2018
- PP attendance improved by 0.2% from 2018
- PP Persistent Absenteeism reduced by 5.1% from 2018
