



Pupil Premium Report for the Academic Year 2017/18

Funding

In 2017/18 Guiseley School received a Pupil Premium grant of £194,770.

Purpose of Funding (DFE, 2014)

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England and is paid under Section 14 of the Education Act 2002 and, in accordance with Section 16 of that Act. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding for two policies:

- **raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their potential**
- **supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces**

Basis of Funding

In the 2017/18 academic year, Guiseley School received the following funding for:

Each pupil registered as eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years	£935 for pupils in year 7 to year 11
Any pupil identified in the January 2018 school census or the alternative provision census as having left local authority care as a result of: adoption; a special guardianship order; a child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order)	£1,900
Any pupil who has been in local authority care for 1 day or more	£1,900 ¹
Any pupil recorded as both eligible for FSM in the last 6 years and as being looked after (or as having left local authority care)	£1,900
Pupils who have had a parent in the regular armed forces at any point since January 2012	£300

Use of Pupil Premium Funding during 2017/18 at Guiseley School

- 1) Salary for a PP coordinator to provide mentoring and academic support for PP students
- 2) Dedicated attendance officer
- 3) 2 PALs to work with PP students on attendance
- 4) IDL during registrations
- 5) Kangaroo Maths programme
- 6) Accelerated Reader
- 7) SAM learning piloted for identified intervention groups
- 8) HLTA for PP HAP students supporting literacy
- 9) Offsite provision costs per student
- 10) Subsidised music lessons
- 11) Subsidised trips/visits
- 12) To support the provision of materials and stationery for use at home, including specific art materials for those students studying this subject at GCSE level
- 13) Revision guides and set texts
- 14) Transport

Review of the Pupil Premium Strategy

Impact:

- In English there has been a consistent P8 score for disadvantaged students between 2017 and 2018
- In Maths the P8 score for disadvantaged students increased by a score of 0.21 between 2017 and 2018
- In the eBacc element, the P8 score for disadvantaged children increased by 0.62 between 2017 and 2018
