


Year 4 - Spring 1 - Roman Britain









Key Figures

Julius Caesar (100BC-44BC): a general who declared himself dictator of Rome.

Emperor Claudius (10BC-54AD): conquered Britain after a century of trying by Rome.

Boudicca (30AD-61AD): Queen of the Iceni people who revolted against the Romans.

Emperor Constantine (272AD-337AD): a Roman emperor famous for his acceptance of Christianity.

Emperor Honorius (384AD-423AD): he ruled when much of the Roman empire was being invaded frequently.

Key Vocabulary			
BC	Stands for 'Before Christ' and is used to count the years before the estimated birth of Jesus Christ.	Settlements	A place where people have established a community.
AD	Stands for 'Anno Domini' and is used to count the years after the estimated birth of Jesus Christ.	Empire	An extensive group of countries ruled by a single monarch or state.
Myth	A traditional or legendary story which is usually related to a religious belief.	Rome	An ancient civilisation that started in the city of Rome in Italy.
Invasion	The act of travelling and entering a place in attempt to take control of it.	Britain	Known as Britannia to the Romans, it consisted of all the countries in Britain apart from Scotland.
Conquer	Overcome and take control of a place by military force.	Emperor	The person who rules an empire.
Expansion	The action of becoming larger or more extensive.	Celts	Groups of tribes living in Britain when the Romans came.
