Year 1/2 : Copyright and Ownership

How does this link to my previous learning?

I understand that work created by others does not belong to

me even if I save a copy

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Digital content - Any content that exists in the form of digital data

Copyright - Gives the copyright holder exclusive rights to publish, copy, distribute and sell their creation.

Ownership - The state of owning something.



National Curriculum Links:

How does this link to my future learning?

Use technology safely, respectfully and responsibly; recognise acceptable/unacceptable behaviour, identify a range of ways to report concerns about content and contact.

Year 3: Online Relationship

How does this link to my previous learning?

I can give examples of how someone might use technology to communicate with others they don't also know offline and explain why this might be risky. (e.g. email, online gaming, a pen-pal in another school / country).

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Trust - The belief in the reliability of another person or thing.

Share - To let someone else have or use a part of (something that belongs to you)

Trusted adult - A trusted adult is chosen by the young person as a safe figure that listens without judgment, agenda or expectation

How does this link to my future learning?

- I can give examples of what 'liking' someone online means and how it can be done
- I understand and can explain the difference between trusting and liking someone
 online.
- I can describe how it might feel if I/someone else has their feelings hurt by something someone says online
- I understand that when people talk online, it is different to communicating face to face and that sometimes people act differently online
- I understand that sometimes people say or write things online which are not meant as it seems



Year 4: Copyright and Ownership

How does this link to my previous learning?

I can explain why copying someone else's work from the internet without permission isn't fair and can explain what problems this might cause.

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Online content - Any material available on the Web. Online content includes text, images, animations, music and videos.

Reuse - Using items more than once.

Permissions - The act of allowing someone to do something,

How does this link to my future learning?

- Demonstrate ways of recognising who might own online content. Explain what reuse is.
- Give examples of when they are/are not permitted to reuse online content.





Year 4: Self Image and Identity

I can explain what is meant by the term 'identity'.

How does this link to my previous learning?

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Impersonation - To copy the appearance and actions of; pretend to be.

Self-image - The idea one has of one's abilities, appearance, and personality.

Identity - How you define who you are and how you fit into the world

How does this link to my future learning?

- Describe some of the motives behind online impersonation.





Year 5: Online Bullying

How does this link to my previous learning?

I can recognise when someone is upset, hurt or angry online.

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Bullying - Intentional behaviour that hurts someone else

Upstander - Kids who do something that prevents or reduces the bullying they see, or comes to the aid of another child who is being bullied by showing them kindness

Banter - Speak to or address in a witty and teasing manner

Online Bullying - the use of technology to harass, threaten, embarrass

How does this link to my future learning?

Understand a range of ways to use technology safely, respectfully, responsibly and securely, including protecting their online identity and privacy; recognise inappropriate content, contact and conduct and know how to report concerns. (KS3)

- I can explain some differences between online and offline bullying
- I know some of the different ways people can be hurtful to others online
- I know how to be an 'upstander' online
- I can describe what 'banter' is.
- I can describe how I would know if something was banter.
- I know that bullying is different from banter.





Year 6: Copyright and Ownership

How does this link to my previous learning?

I can explain why copying someone else's work from the internet without permission isn't fair and can explain what problems this might cause.

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Public Domain (PD/CC0) - can be used by anyone in any way.

Attribution (BY) - use/edit however you wish but credit the original creator.

Non-commercial (NC) - use/edit however you wish but cannot be used to make money.

ShareAlike (SA) - use/edit however you wish but your work must also have the same CC licence as the source.

NoDerivs (ND) - reuse the original work but you can't adapt it in any way.

Year 6: Managing Information Online

How does this link to my previous learning?

I can identify ways the internet can draw us to information for different agendas, e.g. website notifications, pop-ups, targeted ads

What key vocabulary will I learn:

Fact - a thing that is known or proved to be true.

Fiction - something that is invented or untrue.

Verifying - make sure or demonstrate that (something) is true, accurate, or justified.

How does this link to my future learning?

- I can demonstrate how to analyse and evaluate the validity
 of 'facts' and information and I can explain why using
 these strategies are important.
- I can explain how companies and news providers target people with online news stories they are more likely to engage with and how to recognise this.
