
























Vocabu-Library

The **Vocabu-Library** resource from Vocabulary Ninja is a comprehensive vocabulary resource designed to unpick and explain the vocabulary found within classic and modern children's literature. Each pack carefully analyses the vocabulary used by authors, chapter by chapter, then provides an explanation of these unfamiliar or meaning-rich words in context. By providing a contextual explanation rather than just a standard definition, we can better help children understand the stories we are sharing with them and widen their vocabulary.

The pack even goes a step further by offering a selection of resources and activities at the end of the pack to support teachers in the classroom. These resources will encourage and support pupils to explore unknown vocabulary, classify tiered vocabulary independently, explore the wider application of newly acquired vocabulary and enhance classroom vocabulary display which ultimately leads to improved retention.


Tiered Vocabulary

The Vocabu-Library resource also identifies examples of tier I, tier 2 and tier 3 vocabulary found within each chapter of a book. For teachers this can be especially important as it offers an opportunity to assess and discuss the understanding of the tier 2 words in particular. These words are crucial in developing crosscurricular understanding and in promoting pupil independence.

Tier 3 words are subject specific words that will only appear in that context. These would be considered low frequency. For example: photosynthesis, cardiovascular, isotope, pumice, bubonic etc.

Tier 2 words are found in many content area, are high frequency but often require an element of teaching. Cross-curricular and crucial for widening understanding. For example: hilarious, endure, arrange, exclude, react, concentrate, secure etc.

Tier I words are everyday words that we use in speech and communication. These words rarely need any teaching and are learned through conversation. For example: happy, sad, hungry, scared, run, play etc.



Tiered Vocabulary Pyramid


Use the Tiered Vocabulary Pyramid to classify words from a specific part of a text.

Zone of Relevance

Use the zone of relevance to encourage pupils to prioritise vocabulary.

Set a question specific question about a character or an event in the book or a specific chapter.

Essential vocabulary to this question or statement should be written in the smallest central circle. Relevant vocabulary in the middle circle. Irrelevant or unimportant vocabulary should be written in the outer circle.

Giving your pupils a bank of vocabulary to sort could also prove extremely useful as well as the subsequent discussions that will ensue.

Or, use the version with four circles. In this activity, only one word can be placed in the center.
