Where can I find help?



It can be a very worrying time if you begin to see differences in your child and you are concerned they may have special educational needs. At Heyhouses we have an 'open door policy' and we would encourage you to talk to your child's class teacher as soon as possible. Our Key Stage SENCOs work closely with all staff and are on hand to offer advice to parents.

Early identification of any issues surrounding how a young child learns is of paramount importance and teachers will build relationships with parents in order to be able to address any such issues as soon as possible.
