## Good Morning,

We are now seven weeks into our new Early Reading Programme, 'Little Wandle'. All children from F2 and Year 1 and many from Year 2 are accessing daily phonic sessions and three reading sessions per week. Some children in Year 3 and 4 have also been taking part.

As I wander around school there is a wonderful atmosphere and real buzz about the place. I can really sense an enjoyment and love of reading. The children are really proud and have been excited to show me their work and listen to them read. They are engaged and are making good progress, which is a pleasure to see! Next half term we will continue to embed our new programme and send Little Wandle books home for children to show you what they have achieved. We hope you are enjoying listening to your child read and finding out about what they have been learning. If you are unsure about the types of questions to ask about the books your child reads, please refer to the back of the book, where you will find support and the types of questions to ask. We ask that you support us in celebrating your child's success as this is a vital part in their learning and commitment to reading and ensure your child's books are returned on the day specified by their class teacher. Please encourage your child to take care of books they bring home as we have invested a huge amount of money and will struggle to replace them so soon! Thank you.

- understand words and sentences
- use a wide range of vocabulary
- develop listening comprehension skills.

The amount of books children were exposed to by age 6 was a positive predictor of their reading ability two years later.
