#### 1. Curriculum Music – our core offer to all

The Model Music Curriculum was used as a starting point has for the HGPS Music Curriculum. The HGPS Music Curriculum embeds the four key features of Singing, Listening, Composing and Performing. Specific musical elements are a key focus throughout the music programme, with a range of genres built in to provide children with a broad musical experience.

HGPS Music curriculum is based on a progression plan – **Progression Through Percussion**.

**Musical elements** are introduced and embedded through the development of percussion, utilising a range of tuned and untuned percussion instruments: Djembe Drums, Boom Whackers, Chime Bars, Triangles, Xylophones.

Basic skills and knowledge are developed through a consistent focus on '**Create, Collaborate, Compose**' which begins with the individual, (Create) builds up to pairs and small groups (Collaborate) to creating whole composition with others. (Compose)

As skills and knowledge develops, notes, scores, and chords, including the Pentatonic Scale are introduced.

**Progression Through Percussion** is delivered by class teachers each week for approximately one hour in total.

Progression in music is supported by whole class teaching, delivered by specialist music teachers. Instruments are loaned out to deepen skills and allow practice time at home.

This is delivered through partnerships with the Sheffield Music Hub and a private Music Teacher – Doubleday Music.

To deepen listening skills and broaden experiences in Music, each class, each term focus on a **Listening and Appreciation Study.** This is carefully planned across the year groups and utilises the BBC Ten Pieces for children website.

Progression in music is supported by **weekly singing lessons** and music in **assemblies** for each key stage.

Across the whole of our music curriculum, SEND children are given full and equal access, with support appropriate to their needs.

To facilitate our ambition of all children having equal access, whole class lessons are funded fully by the school, so no child is disadvantage.

The range of musical experiences and progression in learning is celebrated with each class creating their own music journal. This is passed on to each year group to showcase the music offer over time for each class.

#### 2. Co-Curricular Music – additional opportunities outside of the core offer

Children are offered additional individual and/or small group lessons outside of the allotted curriculum time. This helps support individual talents and allows some pupils to take exams with certain instruments: **brass**, **violin**, **keyboard**. Whilst this involves an additional contribution from parents, it is subsidised by school to allow more children who are keen, to be involved.

As children progress, they are able to access qualifications and awards appropriate to their level.

HGPS has an award-winning choir at the heart of our music offer. Children from all year groups are very welcome to join. Regular practices take place, with a range of public performances across the school year.

Each year, the choir take part in Young Voices and Fox Valley Music Festival, as part of a celebration of singing and music.

HGPS annual Music Festival showcases a range of talents, with performances from individuals, small ensembles, and whole class pieces. To offer a broad experience of music, a number of professional musicians also perform for the community.

Once every week, Rock Steady introduces music skills through playing and performing with a band. The children have the opportunity to be on vocal, keyboards, guitar and drums. This is an additional contribution from parents; however, bursaries are utilised to support disadvantaged pupils who want to be involved.

#### 3. Musical Experiences – additional opportunities for all pupils to enjoy music in the wider curriculum.

Through the year, a planned programme of performances, involving all children supports and embeds a range of musical experiences.

- F2/KS1 perform a nativity musical during the autumn term
- Lower KS2 perform an Easter musical during the spring term
- Y5 perform a musical during summer term 1. •
- Y6 perform an end of year musical during summer term 2. •

All these events are free for families to enjoy, with opportunities for individuals to showcase singing and/or musical talents.

F2 and Y1 attend a local Pantomime performance during January every year.

For this, there is a voluntary contribution requested from parents, in line with other class visits. Support is offered in line with our Charging and Remissions Policy.

#### 4. Future Development
