Dear Families,

Here we are at the end of our second week back at school and it has been a busy one!

With a change in government guidance we are now 'Living with Covid'. It is expected that Covid-19 is now managed in a similar way to other respiratory illness. There has been some confusion as to what actions to take if you suspect a Covid infection. Children and young people who are unwell with the new list of symptoms and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people, where they can. They can return to school and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature and are well enough to attend. If you are able to access a Covid-19 test (any left over from issue or those purchased from pharmacies), anyone with a positive test should stay at home and avoid contact with others for 3 days. They can return to school after 3 days provided they have no high temperature and feel well enough to do so. We need to note there is no requirement to test now.

This week a group of our students went on their first residential trip to Kingswood. Thank you to Maria for organising and leading the trip. The students had a great time and did lots of activities from low ropes to archery. I hope the students have been worn out enough for parents to get a bit of a lie in at the weekend. There was a lot of great team work and everyone enjoyed! Also a big thank you to the staff for giving up their own time to support the residential. Without them this is not possible.

Here at Highfield Schools (Littleport and Ely) we have an exciting opportunity for parents and carers. Are you analytical and have attention to detail? If so we could use your skills! Parent Views Survey 2021 – 2022 Summary

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The parent views survey was shared with parents and carers for a period of 3 weeks. This was via a link on Microsoft Forms which was shared on Class Dojo and via our school newsletter. For parents who do not have access to this forum paper copies were printed and sent home. There were 22 responses in total. In between this time the school was subject to its first Ofsted inspection so parents were also required to complete surveys for this purpose. This could be a reason why there was a lower number of respondents in this time.

There were responses from primary and secondary departments which was relatively an equal spread across the school.

In general there was a fantastic response to the survey with very minimal responses that disagreed and none that strongly disagreed to the questions. Questions are highlighted below in further detail.

All but a few respondents were overwhelmingly positive (agree or strongly agree) to the questions: staff know my child's potential, they feel safe at school, the parents are kept regularly informed in learning, the school promotes independence, there are high expectations around behaviour, the school is approachable and parents are involved in setting targets for their child.

Areas where there were more neutral responses were around parents having a clear idea about student's next steps. For a lot of parents it was too early to make this judgement.

Within the free text response there were some very positive comments about our school.

Overall all parents either agreed or strongly agreed that Highfield Littleport is a good school.

In response to these results the following action points are being (or are already incorporated) into our school development plan:

Open parent sessions supported by our Family and Student Support Worker which helps them be more informed about facilities available and the next steps for their child.

There was a free text box to reflect some great things about the school and some areas to develop. A selection of these comments can be found below:

We would like to see more on the portal of that they do and would love for there to be after school clubs and holiday clubs they could attend'.

'Read Write Inc has made a big difference to my child's reading'.

'We would like to thank you all for the help and support that you give us'.

'The school is a great school and my child has made progress. You are all fantastic.'

Thank you for your positive feedback and we are working hard to continue to develop our school.
