




Lunch Choices

'forgiveness'

Here's a way of exploring this theme at home



Crosses across the world

The cross is a very special symbol for Christians it reminds them of Jesus' death on the cross whch brought **forgiveness** for the world.

Different shapes and designs of crosses reflect different traditions and communities across the world.

Maria Gomez was a Christian Primary School teacher in El Salvador. She angered the authorities in her country because she campaigned for the rights of poor people. Eventually she was murdered. Later a local artist was commissioned to paint a wooden cross with scenes showing her life and her work among the poor women in the rural villages of El Salvador.





The Celtic cross originates from Ireland. St Patrick described the circle on the cross as symbolising the endless love shown by Jesus. The cross is decorated with natural shapes and animals to remind us of God's creation.

The Black and White cross comes from South Africa and was designed during the time of apartheid. The Bible teaches that people are equal in God's eyes, no matter what their background or the colour of their skin.

School Fundraiser



As the New Year has now started you may find yourselves ready to do a "good clear out" at home of all those unwanted items. To help both you and the school we have organised with Bag2School to collect your unwanted items from school on **Wednesday 5th February**.

Your collecting and donating will allow the school to raise funds. The whole collection will be weighed and the school be paid per kilo. Bag2School also help the environment by helping to divert unwanted textiles away from land-

fill. A recent DEFRA report has shown that textile collection schemes are helping to reduce the volume of textiles discarded as municipal solid waste. However it is a fact that as a nation we still send 350,000 tonnes of textiles to landfill every year.

By getting involved in our **Bag2School** collection, you can have a sort through your cupboards and wardrobes to donate towards our school. It will also raise awareness amongst the children of the benefits of recycling and reuse.

Bags will be sent home with pupils next week and will also be posting to the residents of Inskip village. If you do not reside in the village please call the school office for your bags on the number below.

If you fill the donation bag and still have more then you can use any other bag to donate your items and don't forget to ask family, friends and neighbours if they would like to have a sort out as well!

Bag2School will be collecting from school on Wednesday 5th February. Please drop your bag (or bags!) at school on Tuesday 4th or before 9am on the collection day.

If you require assistance to collect bags from your home please call our school office on 01772 690438 and we will happily organise someone from our school community to pick it up from you.

School uniforms with and without logo, Corporate clothing and workwear


