Attendance:

Attendance at school is statutory. Being in school is important to your child's achievement, wellbeing and wider development. Being around teachers and friends in a school is the best way for pupils to learn and reach their potential. Time in school also keeps children safe and provides extra-curricular opportunities and pastoral care. You might have noticed that there is currently a big push by the Government, with support from the NHS, to decrease avoidable absence in schools. With Covid guidelines still fresh in some parents' and carers' memories, many children are having frequent days off school when they could, and should, attend. The NHS has a useful page that helps parents and schools decide whether a child is well enough to attend school. Along with the Chief Medical Officer, they say it is usually appropriate for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses, including general cold symptoms like a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. Without an accompanying high temperature, a child would be expected to attend school. Have a look at the website for more information using this link: Is my child too ill for school?

Facebook:

Many of you have now joined our new Facebook group and I hope you are finding the updates useful. If you still haven't joined the group, please be mindful that you have to answer the questions asked before being admitted to the group.

Online safety:

You must be over 13 years of age to use TikTok:

TikTok is a social media platform for sharing and watching short video clips. Some of the videos may not be appropriate for your child to view and there is also the risk of strangers contacting your child. If your child is using TikTok then make sure appropriate security/privacy settings are applied.

Account set up:

As always, it is important that when setting up an account, your child enters their real date of birth as accounts are tailored by age e.g., direct Messaging is disabled for accounts aged 13-15. In addition, advertisements are tailored to their age. By default, accounts for people under 16 are set to private and we would recommend keeping it as this. This means your child must approve follower requests. You can read more about the other settings available, such as switching off comments and switching on restricted mode here: https://support.tiktok.com/en/account-and-privacy/account-privacy-settings.

Family Pairing:

This allows you to link your own account to your child's account. You can then set controls such as restricted mode. You can find out more here: https://www.tiktok.com/safety/en/guardians-guide/ Whilst against TikTok's guidelines, explicit and inappropriate content can be found on this platform, for example nudity/sexual content and hate speech. We often see viral challenges on social media, some of which can be dangerous. If your child is using TikTok, chat to them regularly about what they are viewing.
