

Class work & homework...

- Reading Children to read daily at home. Children are rewarded with Golden Ticket for reading 3 times a week at home. The children are responsible for changing their books. The children have access to online library at home. Children have also access to class and whole school library.
- ▶ Reading Records Please ensure all reading is recorded in Reading Records, which are collected and checked each morning. See reading section and class page on the website for suggested reads.
- ► Homework weekly spellings

Below is a table demonstrating the cumulative impact regular reading can have on your child's learning.

20 minutes additional reading at home everyday	5 minutes additional reading at home per day	1 minute additional reading at home per day

Assessment and keeping in touch.....

- Assessment in school is continuous within normal learning and class practice. We undertake most assessment now with on the spot marking and feedback. This means that in lessons we mark work as we move round the classroom. This helps us to address misconceptions and move children on quicker than traditionally marking a set of books.
- ▶ We undertake assessments as the end of units of work. We also check to see if children have remembered key learning from previous weeks, terms and years as part of our work. We do undertake some formal testing at the end of each term. This is in Reading, Writing and Mathematics.
- ▶ You are welcome make contact at any point however we will catch up with you three times over the year.
 - ▶ October 1:1 in person meetings, settling in and advice on helping at home.
 - ▶ January over the phone / in person meeting reviewing Autumn Assessments and setting targets for the Spring Term.
 - ▶ April over the phone / in person meeting reviewing Spring Assessments and setting targets for the Summer Term.
 - ▶ July Final written report for the year.
 - ▶ If your child has an IEP for a special educational need / disability, we will meet with you separately for a longer appointment. We will share your child's individual plan and set them more detailed goals to work towards.

Roles and responsibilities...

- Year 6 enjoy the opportunity to take on these roles and understand that they need to ensure they are setting a super example to the rest of school within them.




Y6 Transition to Y7



- ▶ A big part of Year 6 is getting the children ready to make the transition to secondary school; the next part of their learning adventure. We will aim to do this through...
 - Transition days, joint projects and events, which involve working closely with our feeder schools;
 - ▶ Preparing the children for the changes ahead, through PSHE curriculum, targeted interventions, targeted transition work and visitors;
 - Making sure that any communication from secondary schools has been shared with you as parents/carers, and answering any questions you may have about the application process.
