General information & dates for the diary...

- The school website is, as always, a fantastic resource for checking dates for the diary, event details or general information specific to our class. We will endeavour to keep it as up to date as possible.
- We will use Parentmail for arranging meetings for parents' evenings or IPP clinics only – please do use the school office to communicate with us at all times to ensure we do not miss important emails.
- Walking to and from school: you will have received the forms to complete – it is really important that you inform us when any specific arrangements change – please do not just send a message in with your child – either speak to us directly at the classroom door or speak/email the office to let us know, particularly if you are changing pick up arrangements for the end of a day.

Class work & homework...

- Curriculum Our curriculum maps are on the school website. These set out in more detail the content of the curriculum over the year. All our curriculum subjects have been planned so term by term, year by year, children build their knowledge sequentially. We will also send a termly newsletter to you with curriculum updates.
- Reading Children to read daily at home. Children are rewarded with Golden Ticket for reading 4 times a week at home. The children are responsible for changing their books. The children have access to online library at home. Children have also access to class and whole school library. Children should not bring books from home.
- Reading Records Please ensure these reads are recorded in their Reading Records which are collected and checked each morning. See reading section and class page on the website for suggested reads.
- Homework following on from their previous homework routines, the children will have spelling, reading and arithmetic. The homework will be set weekly and is due to be completed by **Tuesday** each week (In January, homework will reflect SATS revision that is taking place in school). Homework is sent via Seesaw. The seesaw QR code is stuck into your child's reading record. Homework should be completed in their English and Maths Homework books and then a photo of this completed work should be uploaded onto Seesaw. Homework will be checked Wednesday morning.
- Intervention as in previous years, your child may attend some smaller group sessions in particular subject areas in order to help their confidence with certain tasks or give them the opportunity to ask questions and address misconceptions in a smaller group or 1 to 1 environment. These will be fluid and change according to all pupils' needs as the year progresses.



KEEP CALM AND DO YOUR HOMEWORK Below is a table demonstrating the cumulative impact regular reading can have on your child's learning.

Assessment and keeping in touch.....

- Assessment in school is continuous within normal learning and class practice. We undertake most assessment now with on the spot marking and feedback. This means that in lessons we mark work as move round the classroom. This helps us to address misconceptions and move children on quicker than traditionally marking a set of books.
- We undertake assessments as the end of units of work. We also check to see if children have remembered key learning from previous weeks, terms and years as part of our work. We do undertake some formal testing at the end of each term. This is in Reading, Writing and Mathematics.
- You are welcome make contact at any point however we will catch up with you three times over the year.
