Dear Parents/Carers,

Unsurprisingly, we have now had two extremely successful weeks with EYFS, Year 1 and Year 6 children settling well, back into the rigours of school life and the ingrained high expectations we have at Jerounds for teaching and learning. Likewise, it has been most humbling and a constant source of joy to see our teachers and support staff taking such immense pleasure in nurturing and inspiring the next generation of curious and eager minds. #JeroundsCommunity. Equally, a sincere thank you to those parents who have written in to the school office offering gratitude for the staff's conscious efforts to reduce risk and implement such a positive impact upon a return to formal learning at school.

Other news this week, centres around closing the literacy gap during such challenging times. Moreover, I wanted to explicitly share with you some important messages that Mrs Bell, our English Lead and I, learnt during a webinar, that we attended on Saturday 6th June, regarding the 'Literacy Gap' and how we need to address this growing concern.

Initially, the session started with such a stark array of statistics, that the 'virtual' mood and marked silence of every attendee was palpable: Only 31% of young children are read to daily at home; 1 in 8 from disadvantaged homes do not possess any books whatsoever; 25% of 15-year old pupils have a reading age of 12; 53% of children said they enjoyed reading; just a quarter of under-18s read each day. The list continued. Yet, grimmest statistic of all was that the fact still remains, there is a significant correlation between a pupil's reading ability and GCSE results across all subjects (The New Group reading Test). Notably, as the session continued, there was a distinct note of hope and 'we can fix this' attitude, that left every teacher feeling rightly positive and able to make a marked difference over the coming months. Some of which I would like to share with you now.

We all acknowledge that there are severe literacy challenges facing both teachers and parents during lock-down:

- developing reading for pleasure
- ensuring pupils can access reading/vocabulary
- ensuring pupils access literacy instruction
- developing reading for pleasure and increase reading practice supporting the most vulnerable pupils to not fall behind

'We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act, but a habit'

Understandably, the most useful way of tackling the literacy gap is to simply read and read some more. It is alleged by scientist that an act maintained for a three week period, will become habit-forming and should thus, in this instance, make the initial onerous and laborious task of learning synthetic sounds and decoding text less daunting. In fact, daily practice will very quickly give children access to a whole new way of communicating and accessing the curious world around them. **Perfect practice** however, is even more beneficial and will guarantee that children acquire a way to read strategically - comprehending what is written and how the language features and structure of a text also add meaning and purpose. Skills such as: skimming, scanning, rereading, checking the index, glossary or scaffolds, asking questions, summarising, noticing patterns and text structures and of course, reading related texts. These skills all add a deeper meaning to a reader's understanding of a text. That said, there is still an even greater need for children to engage with **vocabulary**, since this will be a precursor for increasing their knowledge of the world and ably prepare them for more technical language associated with all secondary school syllabuses.

KNOWLEDGE + STRATEGY = SKILLED READING

If we have learnt one essential quality from the COVID-19 pandemic it is that parents have now learnt about the language of learning. I have heard parents talking about 'pedagogy' and 'meta-cognition' - all technical terms associated with education and teaching. Moreover, parents have discovered that learning is hard work and it takes the expertise of teachers, who have after all trained between 3-4 years to acquire these skills - in order to impart knowledge effectively to children. Unquestionably, our parents have been fantastic and immensely supportive throughout this entire experience and we have been overwhelmed by the commitment shown by parents to facilitate learning for their children. Bravo parents/carers! -

Both of these websites, coupled with lots of talking with your children, will assist with vocabulary knowledge and comprehension: talk, find, define, use (verbally and written), compare and remember! Remember, reading with your child daily, will be the most valuable resource that you can give your child and prepare them for accessing the school curriculum.

Year 6


We have had a really busy week both in school and online. This week we have not only completed our arithmetic and problem solving but we have also been competing in our inter-house





We are so proud of how well you have all adapted to this new way of learning and are excited to see more of you in school next week.

Free School Meals

Is your child in Year 2 and starting Year 3 in September 2020?

Do you receive one of the following?

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (not Working Tax Credit), with an annual income below £16,190
- Pension Guarantee Credit
- Employment and Support Allowance, income related
- Support under part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act, 1999
- Working Tax Credit run-on, paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit, with a household income of £7,400 or less (after tax and not including any benefits you get).


If so, please apply between 25 July and 10 August to ensure that your application can be considered before the start of term
