EYFS News



Welcome to the first EYFS newsletter of 2019-2020.

Firstly, we would like to express how well the children have settled into school life. We hope that you have enjoyed sharing the pictures of your child's first few weeks (sent to you via Tapestry). If you have not yet activated your Tapestry account please click on the 'activate' link sent to you via email, (if you have not received this please check your 'junk' folder). You are also able to upload your own photos and messages as well as comment on your child's learning journey.

Our Topic for this half-term is 'All About Me'. We will be focusing on getting to know the children and we will use their interests to facilitate learning. This week in Literacy we have been sorting different pictures into initial sound circles. Next week, we will be labelling different body parts with the initial sounds that we have learnt in Phonics e.g. _ose (nose), _tomach (stomach). Please play I spy throughout the week and encourage your child to tell you which sound different items begin with. Thank you!

During maths, we have introduced the concept of 'number of the week', this week we looked at zero and what this means. Can they tell you that it means 'none' or 'nothing'? Show you zero fingers? Can they form the number or tell you the rhyme - 'around you go, that's the way you make a zero'. Each week we will focus on a number and develop the children's understanding of this. Next week, we will explore 1. Encourage your child to represent the 'number of the week' at home. For example, can they write the digit 1, draw one person, find one apple, clap or stomp just once. Encourage your child to go on a number hunt - where can they find 0 and 1 in the home or out and about (look on remote controls, leaflets with telephone numbers, speed limit signs, door numbers, on toys etc.). Please feel free to upload pictures of your number hunt to Tapestry, we would love to see what you find.



Year One News



Over the last few weeks in Year 1, we have been very busy. We have been learning so many exciting skills.

In English we have read the book *Stuck*, which we then used to create our own story boards to help us re-tell the story using interesting adjectives.

In Maths we have been focusing on adding and subtracting one, we have done this practically as well as trying to create our own number sentences.

Our topic has so far focussed on the world around us. This has meant we have used the outdoor environment to take photos using the I-pads. We have used globes and maps to find where we live, and then we consolidated our learning on this by creating layered picture maps to show which parts of the world we live in.

We have also been practicing our spellings for the Jeround's spelling bee, please continue to support your child with this at home too!



Year Two News



This week the children had an opportunity to take part in a range of sports activities, which were run by an Olympic Champion called Gianni Frankis. He showed the children how to hurdle and instilled in them the mindset of 'not giving up' and 'always trying your best'. Following on from this, the children then practiced hurdling in their PE lesson.

During PE we have also been looking at life cycles and using dance to show the different stages of a life cycle of a butterfly and frog. The children had to work in groups and think of creative ways to move their bodies to show each stage. They then performed their dance to their peers.

This week in computing we have been looking at keyboard control. The children have been practicing typing on the keyboard and finding each letter. Throughout the lesson, their pace improved and they became more confident when typing.



Year Three News



Year 3 enjoyed a super healthy start to week on Monday, as part of their Science topic we organised for the children to take part in a carousel of activities.

During our Science lesson, we learnt about the different food groups and had to sort pictures of food into these different groups. It wasn't as easy as we thought. We had a long discussion around where crisps should go! Are they a vegetable or do they belong in the fats group? What do you think?

The children enjoyed preparing and tasting a rainbow of fruit, ran the daily mail, enjoyed yoga, meditation and relaxations techniques as part of our well-being curriculum as well as circuit training with a British athlete.

Gianni Frankis, a Great Britain 110 metre hurdler, put the children through their paces completing sit-ups, burpees, press-ups and lots more cardio exercise. We were all exhausted by the end of the day, but thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.



Year Four News



Year 4 have had a fantastic start to the new year. It has been wonderful to see the children settled back into class and looking forward to the term ahead.

In Literacy lessons, they are enjoying the new set text, 'The Three Fishing Brothers Gruff,' and have already written some superb character descriptions.

In maths we have been concentrating on Roman numerals and Place Value. Topic has been very exciting and the children have loved discovering new facts about Mexico and building 3D paper Mache Mountains!



Year Five News



In Ravens we have taken our study of *Night of the Gargoyles* to a more creative level and made our own. We designed them on paper before moulding them out of clay and then finally we painted them! Don't they look terrifying?

In History, both classes have been looking at the Victorians. We spent one lesson piecing together photographs and then discussing how different their lives would have been to ours. In another lesson we researched Queen Victoria's reign on the computers. We found some incredible facts - ask the children to share some with you!

In English, we have been learning to combine together speech, relative clauses, conjunctions, similes and metaphors to describe a new scene in English. The level of work being produced is amazing! Some very gifted and talented writers ready for year 6...

Whilst in Maths, both classes have been learning to add and subtract mentally, while also trying to reason and justify! Presentation in books is also as important as you can see!



Year Six News



This week year 6 have been learning about the circulatory system in science. We have studied the parts of the heart and their functions and then acted this out. In ICT we were then able to use a green screen application to show the flow of oxygenated and de-oxygenated blood around the body, which was amazing!

Year 6 pupils have also been lucky enough to have weekly PE lessons with Saracens. We have been working on our rugby skills and really enjoying the sessions. Some of us have even joined the Tag Rugby after-school club run by Saracens. It is helping us build our confidence in sports, our teamwork skills and sportsmanship.



