Dear Parents and Carers,

In an open letter in the Guardian this week, Jess Gillam wrote explicitly requesting that EVERY child is given the opportunity during the primary years to experience the 'magic of music'. It seemed apt, therefore, as staff discussed the successes of the past half term in a recent staff meeting to share this article directly with our community; especially since this half term featured so many examples of outstanding music practice across all year groups.

Every child deserves the magic of music...

'Music is part of the fabric of our society; it sits at the heart of human experience and enriches so many lives. Why, then, is it not central to our educational system? This is a question I recently posed to an all-party parliamentary group on music education.

I am 20 years old and began playing saxophone, aged seven, at Barracudas Carnival Band in Barrow-in-Furness. The funding for the centre has now been cut. I took part in the primary tuition scheme, aged 11. The funding for the scheme has now been cut. It is a running theme across the country.

Music is not an add-on, a 'soft' subject or a luxury – it is essential to our existence. Every child deserves the opportunity to experience its benefits.

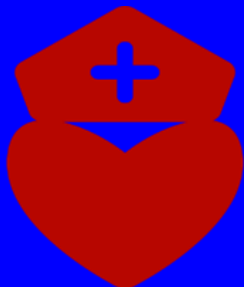
Until music is held in the same regard as the 'core' subjects of our curriculum, our society will be worse off. We need joy, empathy and hope on this planet more now than ever, and depriving children of the opportunity to develop musical skills is to set ourselves up for a fall.

Despite the many brilliant schemes and initiatives to encourage young musicians (Every Child a Musician, Awards for Young Musicians and Sistema, to name but a few), we are reaching a crisis point. We are in danger of crushing creativity, innovation and expression.

Learning an instrument can teach and develop so many fundamental life skills. It promotes discipline, empathy, determination and cooperation as well as providing a sense of community and worth.

Music has changed my life. It is a huge part of who I am. I have learned so much about the world through music and the inspiring figures I have met through it. I feel I have a duty to help ensure that others can benefit from its magic. Let us make it available to every single child'.

I read this letter with a contrasting flood of emotions: saddened by the obvious financial cuts to the music curriculum on the one hand yet filled with an immense sense of pride for all that we have achieved with music at Jerounds, on the other. In direct contrast to Jess Gillam's letter, we **have** placed an emphasis on music and specialist teaching. In fact, the ARTS, in general, is championed at Jerounds. This has undoubtedly enriched the lives of **all** our children, beyond brilliant academics. Similarly, this term alone has created life-long memories for our Years 4 & 5 – who partook in the Young Voices Concert at the O2. Dear Parents/Carers,

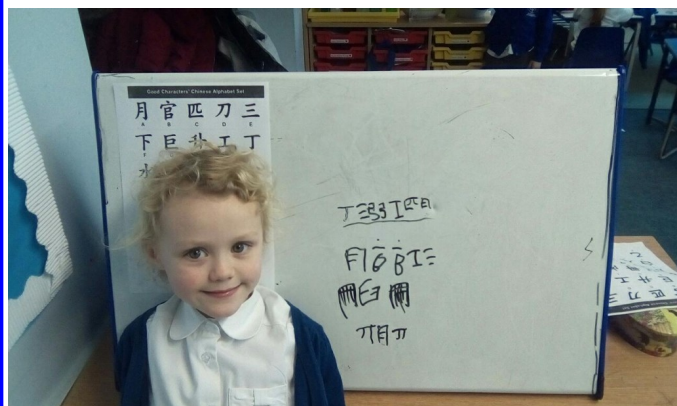
We are continuing with our topic, "All Creatures great and small". We are now focusing on the book "The Gruffalo" and our learning has been linked to this theme.

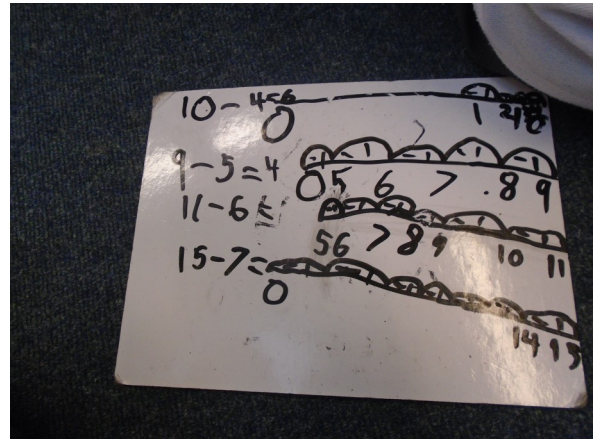
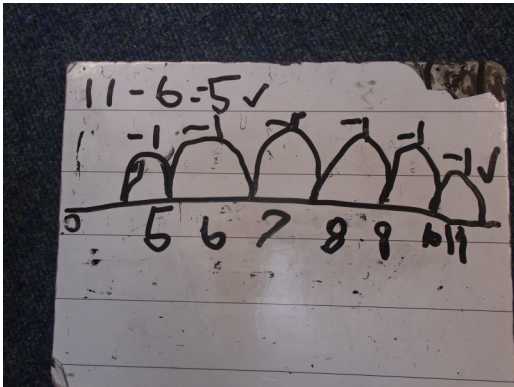

Year One News



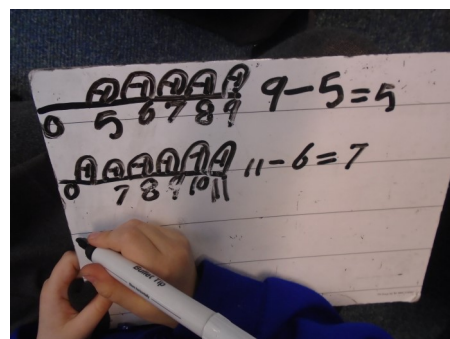
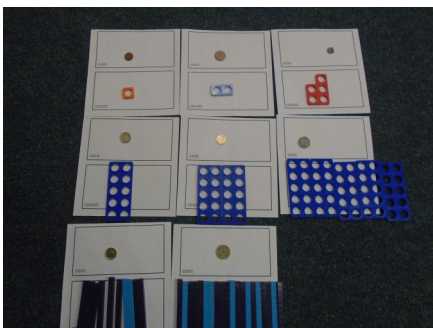

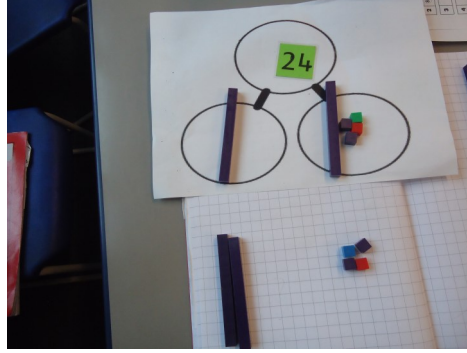

Year Two News

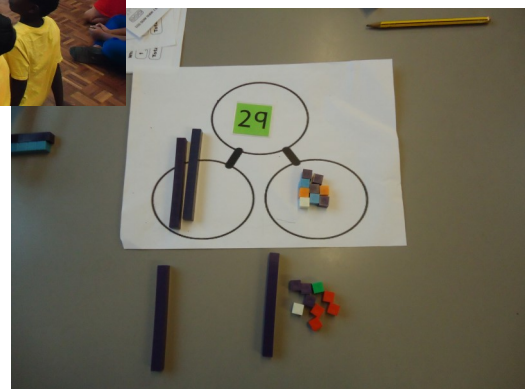


What a busy end to the first half of the spring term.

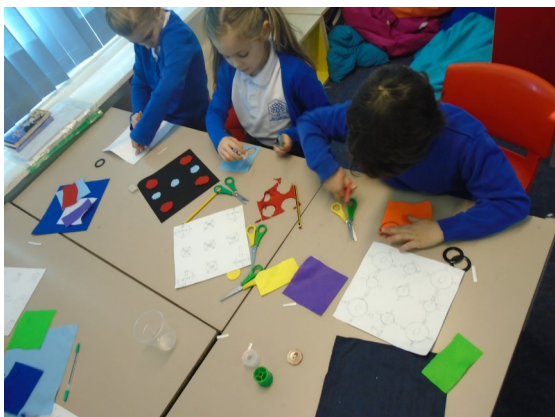


Year Three News



Last week in Merlins class, we continued to have fun exploring States of Matter. This week we were investigating dissolving. We had to create a fair test to discover which materials dissolved in water and which do not. Our results were surprising and fascinating as we discovered that some materials did not react in the way in which we expected! We had to work co-operatively and scientifically in our teams and then in true scientific style analyse and explain our results using the correct scientific vocabulary. We have enjoyed exploring States of Matter this term and we have enjoyed conducting experiments just like real scientists.

In Puffins we have linked our Art work to the work that we have been doing in Science. We have learnt about particles in States of Matter and have created our own particle pictures from this stimulus. We have concentrated on using a limited shape and colour palette of circles and lines and just 2 colours. The outcomes have been striking and effective.

Year Six News



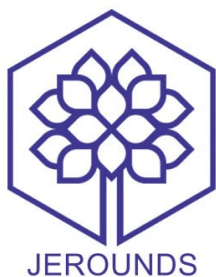

We learned how to accurately use a compass to draw circles of different sizes. We decided where to position our planets on the black card. Then, we experimented with blending the colours to create the illusion of a sphere.
