



Attendance Ladder





Our Topic for this half-term is, "Adventure and Mystery". We will be focusing on the book "Here Come the Aliens" and our learning will be linked to Space theme.

Last week we used adjectives to describe different aliens and we recreated the picture of the human's reaction to the landing.

We then discussed how we would feel if aliens landed in our school.
This week we have been writing a shopping list for an alien feast.

We have also been learning about Easter and the different symbols that represent this celebration. Children have enjoyed cutting, sticking and assembling a chick hatching craft. After the craft had been made children were able to use paint to decorate the egg.

We have been using Easter eggs to develop our understanding of takeaway, this has been very practical and we are now encouraging the children to write simple subtraction number sentences.







Year Two News

In Wagtails we've had an exciting week learning about Judaism in RE. We explored objects which are important to the faith, and even made our own Torahs. 
Year Six News





