



Robins and Wrens have been loving all of the Christmas themed activities. This week we have learnt all about Christmas around the world and read 'The Nativity' story. We then used stick puppets to act out the story and we even took to the stage ourselves during our 'helicopter stories' session to re-enact this traditional text. We have had the opportunity to write to Father Christmas during Literacy and eagerly await a response from the North Pole.

During maths this week we looked at the number eight and what this means. Can they show you what it means? For example, eight fingers, eight blocks? Can they form the number or tell you the rhyme - 'make an s and close the gate, now you've made a number eight'. Next week, we will explore 9. Encourage your child to represent the 'number of the week' at home. For example, can they write the digit 9, draw nine people, find nine raisins, clap or stomp nine times. Encourage your child to go on a number hunt - write numbers on bits of paper and hide them around your home.


Year Two News



This term in History, we have been learning about Guy Fawkes. This week, we were learning specifically about Thomas Percy and the children created a wanted poster. They also included a detailed description, using adjectives and noun phrases to describe what he looks like.

We have also been rehearsing for our Christmas Production which is next week! This week we rehearsed with all of KS1 and Early Years. The children are very excited to perform to their friends and family next week. They have really enjoyed practicing the songs and we have found some budding actors!

This week we also took part in a Christmas art workshop where the children created snowflakes using different materials. They really enjoyed spending time with family and friends to create a glittery masterpiece!



Year Three News



In Merlins class, we have continued to investigate teeth as part of our Science work. Following on from our fantastic visit from Mrs Woolams, we conducted an experiment linked with the knowledge we had gained from her presentation. First we asked a question which we wanted to try to answer as scientists: What is the effect of cola on our teeth? We planned our experiment carefully thinking about different variables and learning how to conduct a fair test which is an important part of working scientifically. We placed a control egg in water to compare against and left an egg (acting as our teeth) in cola overnight. What do you think happened? Ask your children and they will tell you the outcome and what they found out from the experiment!

This week Puffins took part in a fabulous Art workshop. Puffins class designed their own snow diamonds with the use of straws and glitter. They all had a fabulous time with their parents, who helped with the decorating, and were really proud of the work they produced. Puffins class loved every minute of decorating their snow diamonds just in time for the festive period.



Year Four News



Another busy week in Year 4. The classes were able to develop their understanding of teeth and think scientifically using their knowledge gained so far. We tested the effect that different juices had on an egg to represent the damage which could happen to our teeth. A fantastic life lesson explored in an exciting and stimulating way. We are also continuing to read daily, during whole class reading we have been deepening our understanding whilst focusing on different aspects of the text. This alongside sustained reading sessions and our class story each day help to develop year 4's love of reading.



Year Five News



On Monday, Year 5 were transported back to the Victorian era - 1895 to be precise. The costumes across the year group were fabulous! We had a wide range of costumes, from housemaids and butlers, to orphans and chimney sweepers.

The children began the day with hand and nail inspections, meaning some of our chimney sweeps had to sink their hands straight into the sink with a bar of soap! The children quickly had to get used to the strict nature of the Victorian classroom by copying down the school rules in perfect handwriting and only using their right hand - something that proved quite a challenge! They had to stand whenever an adult entered the room and only sit when given permission to. All adults had to be greeted appropriately and referred to as Sir or Madam. The behaviour expectations were made clear and those that were not toeing the line over the course of the day had to suffer the embarrassment of the dunce hat and some even received a "thrashing".

The afternoon was filled with traditional art activities and Victorian parlor games including Grandmas footsteps.

The children were also treated to a talk from Barnardo's - the children's charity which our class novel in English is based on. The charity was set up to help protect vulnerable children during the Victorian era. It was very informative and the children asked some very insightful questions.




Year Six News



