#### Overall our pupils have continued to perform well

Attendance at schools continues to be good with an average of 96% attendance across the Cluster, comparing favourably with Lambeth and National averages

#### **Networks**

Colleagues from the Cluster continued to work closely together throughout 2018/19 across all phases and a range of professional networks

#### **Mathematics Forum**

The Cluster Maths forum met throughout 2018/19 and focused on developing Cluster Maths language and a monitoring checklist for schools lesson observations. They shared tips and strategies around teaching at Greater Depth.



#### The Steering Group of Head teachers met regularly throughout the year to ensure the Action Plan objectives were being met. During summer term Heads and Deputies from all schools came together for a day to review the progress of the Cluster and to plan the priorities for the year.



## Early Years & Foundation Stage Forum (EYFS)

It has been another successful year for the Cluster EYFS forum, bringing together colleagues from all partnership Early Years settings. This year the forum focused on moderation, Literacy & Boys and sharing skills,strategies and resources. The group also shared training opportunities this year with EY colleagues from Brixton Learning Collaborative schools, with a workshop visit to Work & Play Scrapstore and fantastic Messy Play training led by artist, Liz Atkin.







## CLUSTER PRIORITIES 2018/2019

#### **Governors Learning Walks**

Governors from across the Cluster had the opportunity to take part in a Learning Walk again this year, hosted at St Luke's. The aim of the Walk is for Governors to have the chance to find out more about the partnership in action in different school settings

#### Literacy Forum

The group met regularly throughout the year and looked at ways that ambitious vocabulary could be best developed across the Cluster. They carried out a Language audit and baseline assessment and planned a number of enrichment activities – Cluster Creative Writing Day, Spelling Bee and Poetry Slam





#### Year 2 & Yr 6 Forums Year 2 & Year 6 Forums met regularly

throughout the year. Teachers were able to:

- Moderate and assess pupils' work
- Achieve consistency & comparability across the Cluster
- Share strategies, best practice, lesson plans and ideas

#### **SLT Forum**

The SLT Forum of Deputy and Assistant Headteachers met regularly throughout they year to plan and oversee the implementation of the Cluster Action Plan. The group is instrumental to driving projects forward, ensuring continuity and focus in delivery. SLT Forum has close input into all partnership projects and report progress back to the Steering Group of Headteachers.



## SHARED CLUSTER INSET

Trinity Academy hosted the Cluster shared INSET in January 2019 on a theme of 'The Enrichment of Language'. Approx 350 classroom based colleagues, Early Years to secondary, attended the day, which began with keynote speech from award-winning author Alex Wheatle a.k.a. Brixton Bard, followed by workshop activity ranging from storytelling, book making, language of maths, Early Years language, public speaking, EAL learners. Feedback from the day was extremely positive; colleagues once again valued the opportunity to learn and share with each other.

During 2018/19, the Cluster has once again benefitted from shared CPD as an effective and cost effective way to improve standards and promote good practice. This has included wider shared CPD opportunities with schools from the Brixton Learning Collaborative. Cluster colleagues have participated in the following training this year:

- Growth Mindset
- Incorporating drama, music, art into curriculum
- Arts Coordinators training
- Early Years Messy Play
- Work & Play Scrapstore workshop training



Guys and St Thomas' Charity are funding a childhood obesity programme to improve the health of children in Lambeth and Southwark and have been working with Oval Learning Cluster, Brixton Learning Collaborative and Windmill Cluster to co-develop a physical activity programme across identified areas.

## SHARED CPD & PARTNERSHIP INITIATIVES



Throughout the year, 20 teachers from across the Windmill Cluster and Brixton Learning Collaborative have participated in a programme funded through Paul Hamlyn Foundation Teacher Development Fund, 'Confident Creators'. This project focuses on developing Growth Mindset through arts based learning and has involved teachers participating in training throughout the year to raise skills and confidence in incorporating drama, music and art into the curriculum. The programme is funded until July 2020.

## SHARED CPD & LEARNING



These activities have helped my children to problem solve and work with people they don't usually work with. It has definitely given them the confidence and skills needed for them to progress in other learning areas *I have more creative ideas for planning lessons and to make time for creative lessons* 

#### CONFIDENT CREATORS

Confident Creators project, funded through Paul Hamlyn Foundation, investigates the Giving the children the freedom to express themselves and not modelling so much – letting them lead the way

impact of using music, drama and visual arts to develop a Growth Mindset amongst pupils. The approach explores how arts-based learning can encourage higher-order guestioning, risk-taking and problem-solving skills to raise attainment for pupils experiencing disadvantage. Working with Pegasus Opera and artist Liz Atkin, teachers are encouraged to experiment and take risks alongside their pupils. This approach embeds a cycle of analysis, experimentation, reflection, refinement and application. In summer 2019, as culmination of Year 1 of the programme, teachers participated in a celebration and conference event hosted at Southbank Centre where they shared their learning from the year and also had the chance to get creative!





#### SCHOOL COUNCIL CONFERENCE

School councils from all primary schools participated in a conference day hosted at Trinity Academy on a theme of The Environment. The day was led by WE organisation and Yr 8 students from Trinity supported the primary pupils discussions and the development of a 'Cluster Environmental Charter' - a schools commitment to make change to support the environment.

## SHARED PUPIL WORKSHOPS & INTERVENTIONS

#### Yr 3 MATHS OLYMPIAD

The annual Cluster Maths Olympiad for Yr 3 pupils took place in May 2019, hosted at Richard Atkins Primary. Talented mathematicians from all Cluster primary schools took part in the event led by maths consultant Nikki Aduba, and it was another close fought competition that was eventually won by pupils from St Jude's Primary. Congratulations St Jude's!









#### **CREATIVE WRITERS DAY**

January saw Yr 5/6 pupils from all partnership primary schools come together for Creative Writers Day. Pupils worked with exciting children's author and Moon Lane bookshop owner, Tamara Mcfarlane who shared some top tips on writing and supported the children in writing their own original stories during the day.

#### FORENSIC SCIENCE DAY

Yr 3/4 pupils came together for a day of Forensic Science in February 2019. The workshop was a crime mystery and children from all primary schools took part, working in groups to follow the clues and use forensic science techniques to eliminate suspects and solve the crime.

#### SCIENCE EXPLOSION

The annual science extravaganza at Richard Atkins took place in February 2019. Schools from the cluster participated in presenting a fantastic array of science demonstration to visitors throughout the day, with Trinity Academy students winning the prize for best science presentation of the day!

#### **BELIEVE IN TOMORROW PROJECT**

Five schools in the Cluster had a wonderful opportunity to take part in the Believe in Tomorrow project during summer term, in partnership with Sprout Up -Brixton based garden designers. The aim of the project was to connect children with nature, through gardening workshops and culminating in the creation of a show garden for the RHS Hampton Court Flower Show. Children made visits to Brockwell Greenhouses to plant seeds and plants and also created little boats to float on a miniature pond in the RHS show garden. All groups had the chance to visit the RHS show to see the garden that was awarded the Silver – Gilt Medal.

# SHARED PUPIL WORKSHOPS & INTERVENTIONS

#### **Outdoor Learning**

The Cluster Outdoor Learning programme, funded through W alcot Foundation, has gone from strength to strength this year. Primary schools have participated in a KS1 & KS2 activities through autumn spring and summer term, led by Sankofa to Nature organisation. Children participated in a wonderful programme of discovering and exploring nature – with leaf printing, whittling, clay & den making and fire building.
