<p>The Geography Curriculum encourages children to learn about the ways in which different communities around the world make decisions and participate in society. For example, when studying the Amazon rainforest, children may learn about the ways in which indigenous communities have developed their own systems of governance and decision-making. Teachers can facilitate this by encouraging children to consider the views and opinions of others, and to engage in respectful debate and discussion.</p>	<p>The Geography Curriculum teaches children about the importance of laws and regulations in shaping society and protecting the environment. For example, when studying the impact of climate change, children may learn about the ways in which international agreements and regulations aim to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Teachers can reinforce this value by helping children to understand the importance of following rules and regulations, and encouraging them to consider the consequences of their actions.</p>	<p>The Geography Curriculum encourages children to develop their own interests and passions, and to explore the world around them in their own way. For example, when studying different environments, children may be encouraged to express themselves creatively through art, music, or creative writing. Teachers can promote this value by giving children the freedom to express themselves in different ways, and by encouraging them to pursue their own interests and passions.</p>	<p>The Geography Curriculum teaches children about the diverse cultures, languages, and beliefs that make up the world's population. For example, when studying different regions of the world, children may learn about the customs, traditions, and beliefs of different communities. Teachers can encourage this value by promoting understanding and empathy for different cultures and beliefs, and by challenging stereotypes and prejudices.</p> <p>The Geography Curriculum also provides opportunities for children to learn about different religions and belief systems around the world. For example, when studying the impact of human activity on the environment, children may learn about the ways in which different community's traditions view the natural world. Teachers can promote this value by providing opportunities for children to learn about different religions and beliefs, and by encouraging respect and tolerance for diversity. They can also ensure that their teaching is inclusive and respectful of all students, regardless of their backgrounds or beliefs.</p>
