KS1 SATS

- Standard assessment tests
- Statutory for all Year 2 children across the country
- Assessing Maths, Reading, Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling



Maths

Children will sit two tests: Paper 1 and Paper 2:

Paper 1 is for **Arithmetic**, lasting approximately 25 minutes and worth 25 marks. It covers calculation methods for all four operations.

Paper 2 covers Problem solving and Reasoning lasting approximately 35 minutes and is worth 35 marks. This paper includes some (5) mental maths questions.

Reading

Children will sit two tests: Paper 1 and Paper 2:

Paper 1 contains a selection of texts totalling between 400 and 700 words with questions about the text. The questions are interspersed between the text.

Paper 2 contains a reading booklet of a selection of passages totalling 800 to 1100 words. Children will write their answers to questions about the passage in a separate booklet.



Reading

The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.

Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.

Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.

Paper 2: Sample Questions...

Plastics can be useful for people but bad for the planet. Here are some of the reasons.

The problem with plastics

GPS

Children will sit two tests: Paper 1 and Paper 2:

Paper 1 is a Spelling test. The children will hear 20 words read aloud by the teacher. Children will write the word into the missing space in a sentence.

Paper 2 is a Grammar and Punctuation test. Questions are designed to assess the child's understanding of a range of grammar and punctuation devices taught across Key Stage One.

Thursday 19 th	GPS Paper 1 (Spelling) GPS Paper 2 (Grammar/Punctuation)



Where will the SATS take place?

- All of the tests will be administered in Beech Classroom, with the exception of a few children who will be given additional support for reading
- Children will be sat apart, working independently



How will the tests be marked?

- They are marked by teachers within the school.
- Children are given a scaled score. Their raw score the actual number of marks they get – is translated into a scaled score, where a score of 100 means the child is working at the expected standard.
- A score below 100 indicates that the child needs more support, whereas a score of above 100 suggests the child is working at a higher level than expected for their age. The maximum score possible is 115, and the minimum is 85.
- Teacher assessments are also used to build up a picture of your child's learning and achievements. At the end of Year 2, your child will receive an overall result saying whether they have achieved the required standard (your child's actual results won't be communicated to you unless you ask for them).



How can you support your child?

- Support and reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about and that they should always just try their best.
- Ensure your child has the best possible attendance at school and is on time!
- Reading and basic arithmetic (e.g. times tables or adding and subtracting) are always good to practise.
- Make sure your child has a good sleep and healthy breakfast every morning!



Writing

- There is no formal assessment of writing.
- Teachers will form judgements about your child's writing, using evidence gathered over the whole year
- In order to achieve the expected standard for KS1, children are expected to meet all the standards from the Teacher Assessment Framework
