Duke of Edinburgh



Ten students in years 9 and 10 have begun their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award this half term.

They must volunteer for 3 months, learn a skill for 3 months and take part in a physical activity for 3 months. Their favourite section is then continued for a further 3 months. They will also be completing an overnight expedition next year. We are having training sessions after-school to prepare them for this adventure.

Through the DofE programme young people have fun, make friends, improve their self-esteem and build confidence. They gain essential skills and attributes for work and life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working, communication and drive, enhancing CVs and university and job applications.



Standards of work in year 9 and 10 Spanish are exceptional this year. Students are being especially focused and diligent.


The year 10s have started a new specification.


Their first topic was relationships and identity, and they are currently learning about living a healthy life.

I have been particularly impressed with their speaking, which will be tested in the upcoming assessments. Skills examined are their pronunciation in a "reading aloud" task, their ability to describe pictures in the "photo card" task, and their ability to answer questions in the "role play" task.

Year 9 have got this to look forward to next year if they choose Spanish as an option. If the standard of this year's work is anything to go by, they are going to be incredible.

Year 11 Spanish students took a day trip to Manchester this term. We travelled by train to Piccadilly and took a scenic walk to the Art Gallery, looking at some of the different areas of a big city.

Once inside, they did a Scavenger Hunt in small groups, searching for specific pieces of Art which had been described for them in Spanish. Students had some time to practice answering Spanish questions relevant to the day, as preparing for their Speaking Mock exam.

We then went to a Spanish restaurant for lunch. Students ordered their food in Spanish and tasted traditional dishes such as tortilla. For some, it was their first time in a restaurant, so we discussed the norms and expectations.

As we continue this unit, we'll be calculating volume which I'm sure will be put to good use over the festive period when working out how many sweets fill a
















Computing


We are thrilled to announce that our KS3 pupils have successfully completed the UK-wide Bebras Challenge in their computing lessons this half term!


