Quality of Education Update

Quality of Education Spotlight on Learning – Retrieval Practice

At Kidsgrove Secondary School, we are proud of our focus on evidence-informed teaching strategies that help pupils learn more and remember more over time. One of the key areas we're developing as part of our Learning Steps approach, and Engage Task, is retrieval practice – and with the long summer holidays approaching, it's the perfect time to explore how this can support



your child's learning now and in the future.

What is retrieval practice?

Retrieval practice is the process of actively recalling information from memory – like answering a quiz question or explaining something learned in class. Rather than simply re-reading notes or highlighting textbooks, retrieval strengthens the brain's ability to retain and apply knowledge over time.

In other words, the more we try to remember something, the better we remember it. It's like exercising a muscle – the more you use it, the stronger it becomes.

Why does this matter – especially over the summer holidays? Research shows that long breaks from school can lead to what's known as "learning loss", particularly when knowledge hasn't yet been secured in long-term memory. Retrieval practice helps prevent this by keeping learning "alive" in the brain.

By encouraging small, simple retrieval activities during the summer, you can support your child in maintaining what they've worked so hard to learn this year – and give them a head start for



September.

How can you help at home?

You don't need to be an expert in the curriculum to support retrieval. Here are some easy, effective strategies you can use at home:

Use flashcards – Ask your child to make question-and-answer flashcards on key topics from this year. Test them for five minutes a day.

Encourage 'brain dumps' – Ask them to write down everything they can remember about a topic without looking at notes, then check and add what they missed.

Quiz casually – Turn mealtimes or car journeys into quick-fire quiz sessions. "Can you name three things you learned in science this year?"

Teach to learn – Ask your child to teach you something they've studied. Explaining ideas aloud strengthens understanding. Use retrieval apps – Tools like Seneca Learning, Quizlet or BBC Bitesize include ready-made quizzes for KS3 and KS4 topics. Even short, regular practice (10–15 minutes a few times a week) can make a real difference.



Looking ahead to September

When pupils return in September, those who've kept their memory active will feel more confident and less overwhelmed as they build on what they already know. Retrieval will continue to play a key role in lessons, with frequent low-stakes quizzing, knowledge recall and spaced practice built into our curriculum. Thank you for your continued support. We wish you a restful and enjoyable summer, and we look forward to welcoming pupils back in September, ready to retrieve, recall and thrive!
