Dear Parents/Carers,

demonstrating our core values in so many ways.

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

Quality of Education Update

* Quality of Education: What Learning Looks Like at Our School At Kidsgrove Secondary School, we believe great learning doesn't happen by accident—it's carefully designed. Every lesson follows a consistent structure called our Learning Steps. These steps help all students know more, remember more, and feel confident in their learning. This short guide explains what your child experiences in lessons and how it supports long-term progress.

🧠 1. Engage – Getting brains switched on

Lessons begin by activating prior knowledge—things pupils have learned before. Teachers use quick activities like quizzes or short questions to help pupils remember and retrieve key information.

This is based on strong evidence from cognitive science: revisiting learning regularly helps it stick in the long-term memory.

Try this at home: Ask your child, "What do you remember from your last lesson on this topic?" or "Can you explain three key facts from today?"

2. Vocabulary Builder & Master Question – Language for learning Every lesson introduces key subject-specific vocabulary, helping pupils build the academic language they need to talk and write about their learning confidently.

Alongside this, each lesson is framed by a Master Question—a big, high-challenge question that the lesson is designed to answer. By the end of the session, pupils should be able to answer it in detail.

Try this at home: Ask your child, "What new words did you learn today?" or "How would you answer your lesson's big question?"





Quality of Education Update

3. Explore – Thinking hard and investigating

In the Explore phase, students begin grappling with ideas. They might discuss examples, analyse information, or attempt a task with support. This is where teachers ask lots of questions to deepen thinking and encourage curiosity. It's also where misconceptions are spotted and tackled.

Try this at home: "What was the most challenging part of today's lesson?" or "What did you notice or discover during the task?"

🙀 4. Model – Teaching clearly and explicitly

Here, teachers use the "I do, We do, You do" approach to break learning into clear steps:

I do – the teacher shows how to do it

We do - pupils practise together

You do - pupils try independently

This helps students feel secure before trying new tasks and builds confidence.

Try this at home: If your child is stuck on homework, use the same approach—model one example together before they try it alone.

🔗 5. Secure – Strengthening understanding

This stage helps students build resilience and independence. They practise and apply what they've learned in more challenging or varied ways, often with scaffolding to support them.

Teachers adapt the teaching as needed so all pupils can make progress—whether they need extra help or stretch.

Try this at home: Ask, "How did you improve in today's lesson?" or "Did anything finally 'click' today?"





Quality of Education Update

6. Evaluate – Reflecting on learning In the final stage, pupils evaluate what they've learned—returning to the Master Question to assess how well they've understood the lesson. They also respond to feedback and consider next steps. This builds metacognition (learning about learning) and helps students become thoughtful, independent learners.

Try this at home: "How would you answer the Master Question now?" or "What feedback did you get, and what will you do next time?"










Technology



Well done to all of our amazing staff for leading exciting sessions and for the students who embraced a growth mindset.














































Over the previous two half terms, KSS have introduced a brand-new Literacy initiative into the school day: Word of the Week!

Developing a diverse Vocabulary helps our children out in so many ways. It's a bit like collecting a range of tools to make jobs around the house easier – but in school, the more words we know, the more words we can use in lessons, in assessments, and even in real-life conversations.

Plus, it helps us get better at spelling, reading, and thinking deeply about things.

Word of the Week is designed to help our children grow their vocabulary – that means learning new words so they can speak, write, and understand things better. Each new word gives them more power to explain our ideas, ask better questions, and understand what others are saying or writing.


The words that you will look at are all subject specific and you will use them in your lessons. Above, you can see an example provided by Mrs Mason from Art. Each week, Form teachers will share the Word of the Week with their form, before students record it onto their special Word of the Week Glossaries on their iPads. Throughout the week, students will be awarded achievement points for using the Word of the Week in their lessons or in their social times.

By the end of the year, we hope that our children will have built a dictionary to be used across all lessons and outside of school too!

So why don't you ask your children what the Word of the Week is this week and help them to develop their academic language!

Here's how the totals are shaping up:



As part of the unit on 'Movement', 10K learned about the stopping distances of vehicles and investigated the effect of a distraction on their reaction time and subsequent stopping distance! Unsurprisingly, everyone agreed that trying to type a message on their Ipad slowed their reactions!









Science

The Y7 unit on 'Mixtures' focused on the separation of mixtures and solutions. Year 7s safely and accurately performed separation techniques that increased in complexity, starting with decanting and evaporation, and concluding with chromatography (shown above). Students progressed really well and demonstrated that they were able to choose the best and most appropriate technique to separate a variety of mixtures- great skills shown Year7!

Science

As part of our unit on 'Genetics', 9K students learned how to recognise the type of cell division that occurs at different stages of an organism's life, from gamete production to grown adult. Students then explored how gene theory has developed, learning about the different scientists that contributed to our current understanding of genetics and how to use punnet squares to predict the probability of an individual inheriting a certain trait from its parents. Students were brilliant at extracting DNA from onions-well done 9K!



















Science

Year 7s extended their primary knowledge on 'Space and our Solar System' by learning about how gravity keeps objects in orbit as well as natural and artificial satellites. We finished off the unit by making and painting Papier-mâché planetsvery messy fun!
















Science







Maths




