
and in groups.

The Music Curriculum This Term Year 6 – Samba – An Introduction

Pupils took part in both vocal and instrumental performances. We identified musical features by listening and modelled a class performance of a vocal samba by chanting 5 different word phrases together demonstrating ways in which the performance can be organised. As a class we created a variety of short and/or extended words phrases which have different rhythms, to organise and present a performance. We



used untuned Percussion instruments to replicate an Instrumental Samba performance using the rhythmic patterns from the class vocal samba chants and features of the genre. We evaluated performances suggesting successes and improvements.



Year 7 – Performing a Marching Song

We identified features of different versions of 'O When the Saints' when listening. We recognised signs and symbols with an additional focus on notes names, shapes and rests and staff notation. We performed the marching song on the Keyboard, giving opportunity for solo presentations, reviewing keyboard geography, using 5 finger technique and adding challenge by combining melody with chords.

Year 8 – The Percussion Party

We performed a musical score called 'The Percussion Party'. We modelled the score as a class performance, rehearsing and presenting, developing and practising performance skills. We reviewed notes names, shapes, values and rests, signs and symbols, key words, score reading and analysis. We also reviewed reading rhythmic patterns from notation, some of which include challenge with the use of syncopation.
