





Welcome to the latest edition of The Kirkhamian. It seems to be the perfect opportunity to look forward as the darkness of winter ends and spring arrives. We really do have so much to be grateful for and a great deal to look forward to. It will eventually end and normality will resume.

The feeling of being a pioneer and leading the way in all we have achieved has been a journey over four years. Many schools try to bring success and change in short periods of time which can look wonderful on the surface but is often poorly planned and burns out rather quickly. Having been a Headmaster for ten years and experienced (especially now) most things Headship can throw at you, I am fully aware that change needs to be embedded systematically and for the long term, working with the people who know the place best. I have seen many schools claiming to have turned things around; demanding overnight success; replacing large numbers of staff at the expense of short term solutions and no long term vision. The journey we have undertaken has been in the making for 470 years, since 1549. Most recently the past four years have witnessed the following: The best ever set of combined A Level and GCSE results in the modern history of the school. Since 2016 the school has witnessed improved GCSE and A Level results across nearly all headline figures. The A\*/A or 9/8/7 at both GCSE and A Level has risen to over 50% in both. This is a leap of more than four times the figure achieved in 2016 at A Level. The number of pupils gaining A\*/A/B at A Level has increased to 78% and

A\*/A/B at GCSE to 89%. This is an incredible achievement when considering the reliance on historical data, large cohorts and shifting assessment sands.

The class of 2020 have taken the school to the point of success we had predicted achieving four years ago. Pupil numbers have witnessed the school becoming full to capacity in the Senior School and similar levels in the Junior School. We currently have nearly 900 pupils on roll across the foundation which is the most pupils on roll since 2012. Waiting lists are now being created. We have started to invest significantly in time, training and money in ensuring the school continues to be at the forefront of technology. This has included the rapid and increased use of Google Classrooms and other remote platforms to ensure we compliment the family ethos alongside new technologies. The work being undertaken now is a true testament of the high quality staff we have in school. In a very short space of time we have transformed the technology we use and the quality of teaching and learning with the best practitioners.

We will begin a programme of continued investment and refurbishment of the site as outlined previously. This will include new gym areas, sports facilities, Boarding House extension, and Foundation indoor area for performance and refurbished Senior School teaching blocks. We have already added two new Junior School outdoor play areas and a new Pre-School in the past twelve months.

The continued sporting success of the school and our ongoing reputation as the best for all areas of co-curricular opportunities remains strong. We will continue to build on the large numbers of pupils participating at sport across all year groups. The school retains an envious position as a centre of excellence for both sport and academics in the north. This was endorsed by retaining a second excellent inspection report since 2016 (ISI February 2020). We have continued to welcome many new staff and retain the stability of staff who have served the school well for many years. This creates a culture and ethos that is impossible to replicate in many schools when retention is volatile and staff remain discontent. Here at KGS it is the people who make it such a wonderful school.

We have learned not to take anything for granted and would like to express our sincerest gratitude to all the Governors, staff, parents and pupils who have remained loyal throughout. Now it is time to look forward to the future and all the success this will bring.

#### SPORT Girls' Sports

The school sporting year kick started with the first ever residential Hockey Camp led by International Hockey player and Olympic gold medallist, Susannah Townsend. The camp was made up of 30 KGS hockey players ranging from age 11 all the way up to 18.

The camp certainly set the season up well leading to much success in various fixtures and competitions.



#### 1st XI Hockey

Our annual trip to Millfield, Somerset was the start and whilst the 1st XI put up a gritty performance they suffered a 2-1 defeat, more devastatingly, the loss of their captain for the rest of the season through injury. In the first round of the England Hockey National Competition, KGS were drawn against St Peters, York at home. In an end to end game against top opposition the game went to the wire resulting in a 1-1 draw leading to series of 6 strokes to determine the winner. The second round involved a short trip to Rossall School were the squad sealed a comfortable 4-2 victory leading them to the quarter finals against RGS Newcastle away. The girls fought hard against a great team, absorbing a great deal of pressure. Great goal keeping kept the score line low and the final result stood at 2-0.

The 7's season saw a 1st VII travel to

Austin Friars to compete in their invitational tournament. They experienced much success with victories against Austin Friars, RGS Newcastle, Rydal and Withington to name just a few. The season was topped off with a return trip to Millfield. Once again, the squad battled hard but struggled to create chances up front due to such an impressive Millfield defence. The final score was 0-2 and although not the score we were hoping for, a fantastic way to finish the season.

#### 2nd XI Hockey

The 2nd XI enjoyed a successful season against local opposition, the squad was large in size which was positive but came with its challenges.

The squad competed against various 1st XI opponents experiencing success against Westholme, Ripley, Stockport, Cheadle Hulme, GSAL and RGS Newcastle.

#### **Swimming**

The senior swim team certainly meant business in the Stanley Cook Trophy held at QEGS Blackburn. The same senior team continued to impress against St Edwards College, Merchant Taylors, Hutton Grammar and Rossall School.

#### **Boys' Sport**

The 1st XV recorded an unbeaten season with many highlights: the away wins at Harrow School, Denstone College and Ballymena Academy stand out. As well as having an unbeaten fifteen-a-side season they also reached the finals the National St Joseph's Ipswich Tournament and the final of the North Of England Sevens.

The 2nd XV won all fixtures bar two games and had excellent victories over tourists Ignatius Park, Townsville, Lancaster GS, Denstone and Manchester GS. The most eye catching game was a 24 all draw against Sedbergh, where the lead changed hands on six occasions, Kirkham unlucky not to win after scoring four tries. Many young players put their hand up for future 1st XV selection.The truncated Sevens season saw the boys take part in two tournaments, winning the long established Austin Friars tournament, beating Barnard Castle in the final and representing Kirkham as the 1st VII at the prestigious Surrey Sevens tournament in Richmond, acquitting themselves superbly with two wins and a defeat against the mighty Hampton in the group stage.



The U16s won ten of their twelve fixtures with notable victories over Llandovery College, Ballymena Academy and Lancaster Royal Grammar School. The boys had made it to the county cup final, but this was cancelled due to the pandemic. The most improved player award went to Gregor Anderson and the player of the season was Rhys Fray. The U16 sevens squad was in fine form before the season was

brought to a premature end, winning the RGS Newcastle, Merchant Taylors and Sedbergh School invitational tournaments. This team were really looking forward to the challenge of the National School Sevens, however once again this event was also cancelled.

#### Music

All year groups have taken part in coffee concerts and evening recitals during the course of the year.

The annual Carol Service at St. Michael's Church was a chance for the Senior Choir to impress, and this they did in some style, with music from Elder and Adam. The autumn term was rounded off by the Christmas Concert that produced a dazzling array of individual solos, combined with contributions from the Orchestra, String Group, Concert Band, Swing Band, Flute Group, Soprano Group and Choir. The spring term saw the return of the annual Music House Festival. Miss Crook and Mr Dalton again had the enjoyable experience of listening to a bumper crop of over four hundred students.

As individuals and in groups they sought to secure points for their house, or maybe even progress to the final. Every year so many of the student body choose to give of their time and participate in this annual music making festival. Once the initial auditions were over, it all came down to a Friday in early March in what was to be a thrilling final. The finals began with the House Choir Final and the entire school took part, Preston being crowned the winners. Mr Andrew Barratt was the adjudicator for the day and he had the daunting task of selecting a winner. The Gala Concert in late March gave an invited audience the opportunity to hear the winners and items from the final. It was a truly wonderful evening with outstanding contributions from all performers in the rather more relaxed environment of a concert. With talent like this, KGS music is clearly producing some of the highest standards of music making in the northwest and it continues to be a beacon of excellence in traditional instrumental and vocal performance



The Rotary Club of Great Britain held its annual Young Musician competition again this year. The local round was held in November at Kirkham Grammar and youngsters from numerous local schools participated. However, by far the largest number of entrants came from KGS. It is clear to see that music at Kirkham Grammar continues to go from strength to strength as our musicians continue to impress both at home, and nationally!

#### **Combined Cadet Force**

September witnessed the start of a new year for the CCF with a brand new intake of cadets from the Fourth Year. The training programme kicked off with the year groups being divided up onto different activities, the cadets from the Fifth Year went into a round robin of Shooting, Fieldcraft, First Aid, Leadership, Paintball, Archery, Climbing and PT. The new cadets started with six weeks of drill which culminated in the passing out parade. The new cadets rose to the challenge and provided a great spectacle for the parents and family members who attended the parade.

In November there was the first Field Day of the year, this was held at Weeton Barracks Training Area. The year groups were once again split and the Fifth Year enjoyed a day of weapon handling, attacking an enemy position and storming buildings. The Fourth Year stands consisted of introducing them to Cooking in the Field, Patrolling Skills, Camouflage and Concealment, Building Shelters, Military Skills and First Aid. From the feedback on the Field Day, a thoroughly great day was had by all.

At the back end of September the CCF took two teams to the Cadet Skill at Arms Meeting (CSAAM) held at Altcar. This is a shooting competition for all the cadets in the North West of England. Despite the British weathers attempts to put the cadets off we managed some highly competitive results overall and with a bit more consolidation and a little bit of luck could have finished in the medal positions. The programme from October to December consisted of Weapon Handling, Fieldcraft, Paintball and Navigation Training for the Fourth Year while the Fifth Year moved onto more in-depth military tactics. At Christmas we said goodbye to those in the Fifth Year that didn't want to continue with cadets and we wish them all the very best for the future.

In January the training programme was running at full speed and the Fourth Year were fully immersed in all the activities. The Fifth Year had moved onto subjects such as NCO training and Advanced Fieldcraft and Tactics, this was to prepare the Fifth Years for promotion to LCpl.



Another Field Day loomed in March and again everyone went to Weeton Barracks Training Area. The Fourth Year programme was all about consolidating the skills they had learnt so far with First Aid and Weapon Handling. They got the opportunity to fire live rounds on the range and go over a military assault course. The Fifth Years went on the Dismounted Close Combat Trainer which is the military training aid for shooting. This day proved extremely popular with the cadets.

This year we have been successful, again, with the prestigious Lord Lieutenant of Lancashires

Cadet Awards. One pupil has also been successful in his application for an Army Scholarship Bursary, one of only 42 students in the country, which helps with school/university fees and guarantees him a place at Sandhurst at the end of his university course. The CCF continues to go from strength to strength and is an integral part of the school curriculum.



#### **Duke of Edinburgh**

This past academic year has seen the completion of 105 DofE Awards, 49 Bronze, 40 Silver and 16 Gold. The DofE Award scheme recognizes the dedication, resilience and accomplishments of young people and we are delighted that so many of our students achieve their Awards.

Our students have been working hard all year to complete their Skills, Volunteering and Physical sections. Since the Covid-19 outbreak our participants have had to adapt rapidly, taking the initiative, changing their activities and keeping going with their programmes despite the challenges of staying at home and social distancing.

They have not disappointed.... We are so proud of our students who have continued with their DofE Awards under lockdown. Using their spare time to help others, raising money for charity, looking after their local environment, carrying out small acts of kindness for our many key workers are just some of the inspiring ways that out participants have completed their volunteering sections during lockdown.

Our KGS DofE staff team are very keen to get back out running expeditions and as restrictions are lifted, we hope many more of our students will complete their full DofE Awards. For now, our students can receive a 2020 DofE Certificate of Achievement Award if they complete the other three sections of the award. We are delighted to announce that twelve students in the Fourth Year and five students in the Upper Sixth have already received theirs!

#### Drama

The Drama Department began the academic year full of the joys and magic of Lewis Carroll's Alice in Wonderland. The production, which sees Alice on the transition between childhood and adulthood, involved pupils across all year groups. Their dedication and commitment to a text that is set in a series of imaginary settings was superb and the ability to suspend disbelief allowed the audience to be transported into the surreal setting of Wonderland. The production received several NODA nominations and particular credit should go to Olivia Coupe, who played Alice, Joe Ingham as the Mad Hatter, Ria

Sharma as The Queen of Hearts and Maddie Chaya as The White Rabbit.

As usual the department arranged many theatre visits over the year and highlights include: An Inspector Calls at the Lowry, The Girl on the Train at Blackpool Grand, Peter Pan Goes Wrong at the Lowry, A Monster Calls at the Lowry and Treasure Island at the Octagon. Pupils of all years had the opportunity to watch a live performance.

As the year was unfortunately cut short we are now pleased to be able to say that work is in progress for future productions we will continue with celebrating the talent that exists in KGS. There are many projects planned as we continue to give those who perform the opportunity to flourish.

The situation we have faced has led us all to react quickly and take a very different approach to what we thought was the normal procedure. Every school is different and will approach a global crisis in a manner that is best for their organisation. That is what we did and we have learned so much along the way. Now we have placed the school in such an envious position across many areas and remain the most popular and successful school on the Fylde coast. We are best placed for the next four years and beyond.

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












# KGJS Head Boy & Head Girl

Whether it is tackling a new topic in the classroom, learning a new skill during a co-curricular activity or taking on board constructive feedback during a sporting event... interwoven throughout the daily experiences that occur here at KGJS is our emphasis on never giving up and on working hard.

Our pupils are taught that - from time to time failure happens, no matter how hard you work, but it is what you learn from these experiences and how you adapt that is important; we impress upon them not to flounder when things don't go to plan, but to learn, adapt and grow. At the start of their journey with us, our Early Years Foundation Stage pupils work hard to adapt to school life; they learn to read, write and become motivated and engaged in the process of learning. In addition to acknowledging endeavour and progress, we naturally reward all of our pupils' attainment through our daily written and verbal feedback, credits and House Points. In this next section we formally acknowledge and reward those pupils' that have excelled in Reading, in each individual Core Subject and then those that have achieved at the highest level across the curriculum. Beyond the core curriculum, the study of the foundation subjects offers our pupils' the opportunity to be introduced to a wide variety of skills and knowledge. Analytical skills and the ability to understand and communicate abstract concepts are all enhanced. Their interest and fascination for the world around them is sparked, and the study of these subjects enables our pupils to find out what they enjoy and excel at. Even at this stage in their education many of our pupils will know now the subjects that they want to pursue as they move through to Senior School. I have been astounded by the pupils' many and varied accomplishments in these subjects; the culmination of their studies within a unit adorning display tables and classroom walls in abundance.

As we are all acutely aware at present, the world around us is increasingly influenced and shaped by technology; within each subject we equip our pupils with the foundational skills, knowledge and understanding of computing to engage with ever-evolving technology; programming, algorithms and sequencing and selection are all familiar skills that our pupils learn and excel at.

The following section of prizes acknowledges those pupils that have excelled in the foundation subjects of Humanities, Computing and French...

#### Humanities, Computing and French Winners (see Prizegiving programme)

We are fortunate here at KGJS that we can offer our pupils a broad education that gives them the opportunity to be creative. The value of art, design and music in a school's curriculum should not be underestimated. We are acutely aware that these subjects offer a valuable platform for our pupils to express themselves. Their confidence and self-esteem develops throughout their immersion in these areas of learning. During the creative process, their observational skills become sharper as they observe the finer details of the world

around them. They problem solve, test out ideas, analysing and adapting their creations, indirectly developing vital skills such as concentration and persistence.

In addition to working independently, our pupils love to collaborate, exploring techniques, learning new skills and enhancing previously acquired knowledge. The DT and artwork around the school, the outstanding school musical performances and instrumental and vocal accomplishments are all testament to our pupils' ability to be creative at the highest level. Autumn Term 2020 began with celebrations as we were reunited with our pupils once again in the classroom. When our pupils returned on Monday 17 August, we anticipated that they may take a little time to acclimatise; it was in fact only a matter of days before we felt that they were back into the swing of things once again, clearly with some adaptations to their daily routine. I watched with genuine amazement as our youngest pupils in Pre-School and Infants returned as if they had simply been away on their annual summer holiday. All of our pupils met with their new teachers, pupils old and new and embraced the term ahead with positivity and eager anticipation. It was particularly delightful to watch them play on the new Trim Trail generously donated by the Friends of Kirkham Grammar School. Each week brought about new discussions with staff about how to operate as close to normal as possible, whilst ensuring every member of our KGS family remained safe. Most heartening was the welcome we received from our wider KGS community including parents, grandparents, aunties and uncles, who I enjoyed time chatting with at the start and end of the school day, whilst getting used to the 2 metre social distancing rules and the wearing of masks!

Our J4 Celebration Party began the Autumn Term. We were delighted to be able to organise a small, socially-distanced gathering; we couldn't have been more proud of the way they managed the transition from Junior School to Senior School. The Virtual Prize Giving for our Infant and Junior pupils, that we were able to watch via our Smart TVs for the first time, also began the academic year on a high, with every pupil commended for their commitment to remote learning and impact on the school's progress, in addition to over fifty new prizes being awarded to our pupils for a variety of different disciplines. Our Parents' Social and Information Evening and Parents' Evening saw us continue to offer effective communication with our parents, albeit remotely, offering video meetings to parents for the first time. It wasn't quite the same as our usual social gatherings; however, it was wonderful to be able to send home an alternative canapé in the form of cheese and biscuits for us all to enjoy during the first formal school event.

The term culminated in an array of delightful hampers, collated by all members of the KGS foundation, being delivered to our local care homes, where the residents welcomed the packages with great delight and appreciation. Hopefully the wooden baubles, decorated by our pupils, and messages of hope will uplift our neighbours now and in the future during this ongoing period of uncertainty.

The Children's Laureate, Cressida Cowell MBE, enticed our pupils into the wonderful world of children's literature and answered questions about how to write with creativity, entertaining us all with readings from her most acclaimed novels via a live Google Meet. It was superb to be able to offer them such an enriching experience given the literal geographical distance between Cressida down in London and our children here in Lancashire. During this week we also announced some of the long-awaited positions of responsibility to our J4 pupils, including our Head Boy and Head Girl for 2020/2021.

The Pirate-themed week in I1 and World Nursery Rhyme Week in Pre-School were a highlight for the term, engendering a real love of learning for our pupils across the curriculum in a safe, fun and stimulating learning environment. It was an inspiring five days of learning during both events; a highlight for our Pre-School pupils being the use of recyclable materials to make their own small model buses to continue their learning at home. Events such as Hallowe'en were celebrated in-house with an array of suitably-adorned Hallowe'en-inspired accessories being modelled by our pupils. Skull masks, Dracula fangs and pumpkin headbands somewhat changed the mood of the school for the day, with the children taking part in an array of themed activities.

After-school sporting activities and clubs all began as the term commenced. We were overtly aware that our pupils were champing at the bit to begin to enhance and build upon their repertoire of interests. Pre-School and Infant Fun Runs and the House Cross Country all took place with the sun shining throughout, offering the pupils perfect racing conditions. Our older pupils in the U11 A and B hockey teams also enjoyed playing against each other in some Saturday competitions to continue to enhance their skills during gameplay. Our inaugural Tuesday 8 am Infant Hockey Club also began with nearly thirty pupils turning up every Tuesday morning. Over the course of the term their skills and interactions with each other developed remarkably well and I continued to be impressed with their commitment to this club despite the progressively colder and icier mornings as we moved into December. Indoor Athletics matches took place within the comfort of our own Sports Hall and the AJIS Virtual Cross Country one-mile course was also completed on site, with all scores recorded in-house and subsequently submitted for comparison against other settings. Our pupils' ability to adapt to such a way of working and still perform to the highest of levels is remarkable.

As the Christmas period drew near, our pupils engaged in a Jack and the Beanstalk pantomime screening, Christmas parties and Christmas jumper days. The Infant Christmas Nativity, Prickly Hay, and the Junior Christmas Story, both produced via the wonders of green-screen technology, brought our Autumn Term to a fabulous close. Within a fortnight, during which core subject teaching still took place, our pupils rehearsed and videoed small scenes, with the compilation being screened during the last week of term. I couldn't have been prouder of their ability to work hard, showing determination to succeed in the face



of adversity. I know that our KGS families, near and far, have been impressed by the pupils' ability to pull performances of such magnitudes together in such a short space of time; with the Infant Nativity even including pupils from Pre-School! Our piano being wheeled out to the playground to be utilised for an adapted, COVID-safe Christmas song is something that will remain forever etched on my mind as a reminder of our staff's ability to overcome barriers, and ensure that we continue to offer our pupils a unique and enriching experience whatever the context. I suspect that this little act of ingenuity will become a long-cherished part of our history at Kirkham Grammar Junior, Infant and Pre-School.

The events of Autumn Term and Christmas 2020 were somewhat different, low-key but celebrated nonetheless. Since returning in the middle of August our pupils have encountered experiences, highlights and happenings that I hope will remain with them for a lifetime, for all of the right reasons. They have accomplished so much, both in and outside the classroom, that I will be forever proud of them for, given the restrictions imposed upon them to heighten safety. As I often impress upon our pupils, they must never lose sight of the positive impact that each individual has on the growth and development of the school. They must always remember their value and importance in the everyday happenings and highlights of school life. They have certainly played their part this term!

Although 'hands, face, space' still seems to be the mantra as we move into 2021, I am confident that we will continue to offer our pupils the very best despite such adaptations, ensuring that the Spring Term of 2021 is as vibrant and life affirming as ever for all members of the KGS family.

The Kirkham Grammar School Community Trust will continue to plan events and projects on a regular basis to support a variety of worthwhile causes throughout the year.




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#### **SPANISH LESSONS**



# KGS@HOME



As the first lockdown began, it became an opportunity for everyone to upskill in a multitude of technological ways. Google Classroom quickly became a regular feature in our daily school life as staff and pupils alike learned how to make the most of this online learning platform. Staff faces and voices began to appear on recorded videos that pupils could watch during their lesson time, or when their own time zone allowed. Thousands of documents, presentations, quizzes and spreadsheets were professionally produced so that students could complete and hand them in online; alongside photos of their amazing work done by hand and videos of themselves performing language speaking, drama and music. Many classes also included a live element using Google Meet where students were able to talk with their teachers and classmates.

As school opened in August, the opportunity to keep the blended teaching moving forward was too good to miss. As individuals were required to isolate in order to protect loved ones and family members, we upgraded all staff equipment so that every lesson could include a live link to the classroom, bringing isolating students and a few isolating teachers back into school on a daily basis. From live RPE discussions to live practical science lessons, with students being able to screen-share the school whiteboards from home, the effect of staying fully connected meant that all of our subjects stayed on track and all Kirkham Grammar School students were well-placed for another lockdown when it came.

Since January, KGS@Home has gone from strength to strength with fully live remote lessons across all departments with teachers able to fully interact with each pupil within our normal timetable. Teachers have incorporated new features such as recording audio feedback for assignments, class sets of interactive whiteboards that pupils can use on their phones and a myriad of online platforms to support and improve remote learning. In the run up to February half term each pupil received 140 live lessons and the feedback from parents and pupils alike has been amazing.

We have also enjoyed two virtual Parents' Evenings since January where parents and teachers could chat about the fantastic progress pupils have been making. This new system has also been well-received and we look forward to more virtual parents' meetings soon.

## **SIXTH FORM** SCHOLARSHIPS

A number of scholarships are awarded annually for entry into the Sixth Form. There are four types of scholarship in the Sixth Form: academic, sport, music and drama. Academic scholarships are calculated based on GCSE results. Music scholarships are awarded on the demonstration of potential contribution in the musical sphere. Candidates will normally be expected to be at grade 7 although the school reserve the right to allocate an award to those on a lower grade who are judged to have outstanding potential. Drama scholarships are awarded to candidates who have some experience of public performances, although those who demonstrate potential in this sphere will also be considered. This is not a Musical Theatre Scholarship. It is anticipated that sports applicants have gained selection at least at County level in one sport or more, or have equivalent accreditation where appropriate.

### **SIXTH FORM VIRTUAL OPEN EVENING**



### Should I stay or should I go?

Firstly, every student needs to make his or her own choice about whether to change schools for Sixth Form based on the right support and advice. No two Sixth Formers are the same and even though a school may have suited someone well into the earlier years, it's always possible that a particular set of talents and abilities will be better catered for in another school or college. Part of what a good school offers is the right advice on balancing the various factors.

In order to make a change, the opportunities available elsewhere need to outweigh some very significant advantages of staying in the same school. A students Sixth Form education is a very important phase of his or her life and, to my mind, if the school's advice is to stay, there needs to be a very strong argument for 'taking a chance' on something new. Far off fields are not always greener.

Let's take a look at some of the benefits of staying on for our Sixth Form. The first set can be grouped under the heading of 'continuity', something that most of us look for in other areas of life.

From a logistical point of view routines can

stay largely the same, removing a potential source of distraction. Academically, the Sixth Form represents a significant shift in expectation levels, so a student's focus needs to be on making this step rather than a new set of life circumstances. Often the teaching staff will already be familiar with a student's strengths and weaknesses, which also makes the step into Sixth Form work an easier one. There is a risk that problems will take time to surface when a student is new to a school, in part because of the need to allow them to settle in before questions start to be asked not an issue when their teachers already know them. Another important aspect of continuity is social. Established friendship groups can be a great source of support when a student is making the transition to Sixth Form and can minimise the risk that they 'go off the rails' in the process of trying to carve out a role for themselves among their new peers.

I'm very conscious that a lot of what I've said makes 'remaining' seem like the risk-averse choice. In some ways that's true — and I'm not sure it's a bad thing. As I've already indicated, I think a student's Sixth Form education is too important to take chances. A change won't be right for all, but it's certainly worth considering. Especially when the school

does not go beyond 16+ or offer the many co-curricular opportunities we do at KGS at such a high standard. It allows students to make a new start without the same friendship groups and expectations of others that they have had for several years. In some ways, it allows students to redefine themselves if they wish to. They may also be able to find an environment that suits them better given the stage they are now at. For example, they may prefer a Sixth Form that could possibly be a bit more challenging or they may simply want a bit more freedom to express themselves. The reasons for moving are, therefore, varied. In some cases, students are in search of specific subjects. There are many options to choose from and students should enjoy looking at their options. Even if they decide the best thing is to stay where they are, at least they will have made a more informed choice.

This is also a reminder for the ones who are still considering their options and want to know why they should stay. We often take the list of additionally for granted. However, like at KGS it's about so much more than just good A Level results.

# SIXTH FORM TASTER DAY



On Friday 4 December, this year's Sixth Form Taster Day took place giving our Fifth Year students the opportunity to explore a wide range of 'preparatory' activities in every subject.

In biology, students extracted DNA from raspberries; BTEC Sport teacher, Mr Unsworth, introduced the students to the links between nutrition, health and performance in sport and exercise; in physics, students carried out a practical experiment to estimate the temperature of a Bunsen flame; Head of Geography, Mr Whittle, discussed the subject content of A Level Geography; students learnt about Sophocles and the origins of Greek Theatre in Drama; A Level PE was delivered by Mr Roddam which saw the students investigate heart rate response to submaximal exercise by completing a 1k row at 26s/m followed by a 700m treadmill run at 12km/h; Dr Rollin's students carried out a chemistry practical experiment to test for aldehydes and ketones by oxidation reactions and Head of Art, Mr Gardiner, talked about the exciting and extensive range of creative and technical skills they will develop if they choose to study A Level Art and Design.



# Pauline Cooper



The retirement of Pauline Cooper, who has called time on her teaching career after a long period of ill-health, brings to an end one of the longest careers at KGS and, more importantly marks the departure of a teacher widely regarded by generations of pupils as the best teacher of mathematics, a core subject feared and even loathed by some, yet valued and loved by many.

First of all, we must all express our deepest gratitude that Pauline has been able to choose retirement with her health restored to a good extent. We have all spent many months of deep concern for her wellbeing and sympathy for her family and friends, so it is wonderful that we can pay tribute to a retiring teacher as she embarks on what we hope will be an enjoyable and well-earned life of greater leisure.

Pauline joined Kirkham Grammar School in September 1984 as Miss Walsh, technically as a replacement for the late and legendary Geoff Cheeseborough. The contrast between Geoff and his successor was more than one of age and gender: Geoff was very much part of the School's days as a boys' state Grammar school, his service at KGS dating back to the days just after the Second World War when teachers were recruited from among demobbed servicemen. Pauline was from a new era of eager young professionals, schooled in the craft of the classroom by an increasingly rigorous PGCE programme.

When she arrived, the School was still finding its feet as an independent co-educational school, and driven by the likes of Neil Gamble as Deputy Head, academic rigour, accountability and professionalism was being added to the School's offering in an increasingly competitive market. Pauline was the perfect fit for such an ethos, and throughout the subsequent 35 years, she has been the epitome of professionalism, an upholder of the highest standards of achievement and behaviour, yet driven at all times by a deep care and concern for the wellbeing and happiness of her pupils.

As a maths teacher, she was ruthless in the best possible way: her expectations were clear, consistent, ruthless yet utterly fair. She was clear that maths was challenging for many, yet

impossible for none, provided that they made the appropriate efforts. To Mrs Cooper, lessons were for sustained, serious work, homework was to be completed fully and with appropriate attention to detail, and fun and games were very welcome, but not in the classroom or even out on the corridors. In an age when pupils sometimes appear to expect to be entertained, indulged and cajoled, she saw mathematics as having an intrinsic value which should require no dilution of this kind.



Such an approach did not seek popularity, yet over time, it invariably gained it. Whilst younger pupils were often a little scared of her, and older pupils somewhat resentful, such reactions were initial ones which were invariably modified by experience. The fun and satisfaction of mathematics is from a challenge met and responded to, and she was skilled at explaining complex concepts, at demonstrating solutions with clarity, such that pupils soon modified their initial fear or resentment into first grudging admiration and eventually affection. Like all good teachers in an 11-18 school, she modulated her approach with senior students, and with Sixth Formers she adopted a more nuanced approach which inspired affection and huge respect.

In her early days at KGS, Pauline was a young, single teacher who had the time and opportunity to participate widely in the broader

life of the school. She took on residential duties in the Boarding House, demonstrating care and concern and providing a welcome female presence as the gender balance of boarders equalised. She also indulged her love of sport, notably of netball, by acting as a coach to girls' teams in that sport, took part in ski trips and in 1992 she was an accompanying member of staff in the World Hockey Tour led by Jane Taylor. In these co-curricular aspects, her consistency of approach and thoroughness of preparation served her well, just as in the academic classroom.

It is, however, in that classroom that Pauline's achievements are rightly best remembered. Countless Old Kirkhamians willingly attribute their success at a grade well above what they consider to be their "natural level" to the drive and determination of Mrs Cooper, and enquire after her in a tone of apologetic repentance for not fully appreciating her efforts at the time.

Pauline's results record would stand comparison with any maths teacher anywhere, but perhaps her most famous achievement was back in 1989, when a top set class of hers in that year's Fifth Year was entered early for GCSE Maths by bringing the following summer's entry forward to the previous November. When the results were published in January 1990, it turned out that every single member of the 28-strong set had achieved the highest grade, at the time a Grade 'A'. This was in the very early days of school PR and press releases, but the School duly made much of this achievement and a photo was duly staged for the local press and much was made of this achievement in assembly. Pauline graciously shunned the credit, praising the work of the pupils involved, but there is no doubt that it was to a large extent her achievement as well as theirs.


Beyond her work in the classroom and her co-curricular roles, she demonstrated consistent and attentive concern to those under her care in a pastoral sense and a great respect for the many pupils who achieved the appropriate balance between their academic and co-curricular lives. In the Staff Common Room she was a thoughtful and supportive colleague who enjoyed lunch and break time conversations. She was private and undemonstrative about her personal and family life, yet proud and loving of her own children.

Pauline Cooper has for 35 years been a model of consistency, excellence and professionalism in the teaching profession. We are delighted that she leaves us in much improved health, and wish her every happiness in retirement.

# Sam Walmsley

Sam Walmsley passed through Kirkham Grammar School like a whirlwind, and in the course of a four year association with the School has fulfilled a remarkable variety of roles, driven by a sense that he somehow should have been at the School for his entire life. In that short time, he became utterly steeped in the ways of KGS, accumulating a feeling for its unique ethos and values which many take years to fathom out, and some never do

Sam first came into contact with the School on a placement with the Junior School, when considering a career in primary teaching after leaving a Sixth Form college following A Levels. He was already familiar with KGS, as a member man and boy of Broughton Parish Church Choir, directed by former KGS Head of Music John Catterall, and he took a placement at KGJS on John's advice and instigation.

Sam was coming to realise that his career options were perhaps narrowed by his previous choice of A Levels, not least as he was feeling increasingly called to the priesthood. So it was in the summer of 2015, that he took the bold

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decision to study for an extra year at KGS Sixth Form, adding two more A Levels in music and politics to his existing qualifications, in order to better prepare himself for a planned degree course in theology on the route to his eventual calling.

To join an established and younger Sixth Form cohort is a big challenge in both academic and social terms, but Sam's decision proved to be a wise and effective one. Thanks to his gregarious personality and an exceptional gift for building bridges with and between strikingly different friendship groups, he rapidly became an integral part of a large and diverse Sixth Form community.

School and student friendship groups are often defined by their co-curricular interests, such that the sporty types, the arty types, the drama types and so on are easily identifiable and somewhat mutually exclusive groups. Joining a year group with a strong presence of sports men and women, of gifted musicians and of strong-minded intellectuals, Sam's natural milieu as a would-be ordinand studying politics and music would have been expected to be among the musicians and intellectuals. However, he refused to be type cast, and within days was known, liked and accepted by the rugby lads thanks to his openness and manifest goodwill. His ability to send everyone up, including himself, with a winning mix of humour and respect made him impossible to ignore and to dislike. During that one year, he illuminated lessons with his irreverent yet respectful humour, and enriched school life with his ability to connect with everyone from the Chair of Governors to senior management to teachers to support and ancillary staff. He played the organ for assemblies, accompanied soloists at concerts and generally threw himself into school life as if making up for a lost six years. When a student studies part-time for one year in the Sixth Form, they would normally be known only to the one or two who teach him or her; Sam made it his business to know or be known by everyone.

After leaving as a student, it was immediately apparent that Sam had not seen enough of Kirkham Grammar School, nor it of him. The years 2015-2018 were difficult times for the School, with a measure of instability caused by a variety of factors, and newly-installed



Headmaster, Daniel Berry, saw in Sam a man who clearly had more to offer while continuing to reassess his longer term career goals. So it was that Sam came to serve the School between 2017 and 2019 in a variety of roles, official and unofficial, encompassing music, pastoral care, maintenance and caretaking, administrative support, alumni relations, registrar, reprographics and Head's PA. All these roles were performed with the same 'can do' attitude, an ability to connect with others and unfailing good humour and kindness.

The School owes Sam a great deal of gratitude for all that he so willingly took on at a challenging time in its recent history, a time from which it has emerged strengthened and renewed.

We are delighted that he is now taking the university degree of which he is so manifestly capable, and we hope that he will in time be able to pursue his vocation and use his disarming charm and bridge-building skills to good effect.

It seems unlikely that we have seen the last of Sam Walmsley and we look forward to seeing him in whatever capacity he next reappears at KGS

of: sometime Astronomer Royal, Ralph Copeland; pioneer of Maglev rapid transport, Eric Laithwaite; ITV football commentator, Clive Tyldesley; Coronation Street actor, Tupele Dorgu; and several rugby players who have made it to the highest level at international and club level. Wikipedia overlooks the likes of: former Head of OfWat, Sir Ian Byatt; US-based computer game entrepreneur, Karthik Bala; Professors John Buckley (History) and Matthew Pateman (Popular Aesthetics); cricket statistician, Tony Lewis; and TV scriptwriter Roy Russell.

However, with all due respect to this diverse and distinguished list, none has come remotely near to the level of public prominence achieved by Ranvir Singh (KGS 1988-1995), who, just before Christmas, left the television dance show Strictly Come Dancing at the semi-final stage, bathed in the love and respect of the nation, her face and words all over the national media.

Before we pay tribute to her part in Strictly, we must emphasise that Ranvir was already one of the School's most prominent alumni: a respected TV journalist, she made her name firstly in BBC local radio, then as anchor of the much-loved regional news programme North West Tonight alongside the legendary Gordon

Burns. She moved to ITV in 2012, and has become a ubiquitous voice and face, reporting on many of the biggest news stories over the past decade. Her main role is as Good Morning Britain's Political Correspondent, but she also appears as a newsreader on News at Ten and presents a variety of factual programmes and features for ITV. She was honoured by her home city when installed as Chancellor of the University of Central Lancashire in 2017.

However, as with others who have taken up the challenge of BBC TV's ratings juggernaut Strictly Come Dancing, her journey on a show which pairs celebrities with professional dancers has propelled her to a whole new level of fame in the nation's lounges in a year when the programme was warmly welcomed as an antidote to the prevailing gloom at the end of such a difficult locked-down year.

Her dance partnership with Italian Giovanni Pernice, one of the show's established professional dancers, took her well beyond the point to which a woman of her age and self-confessed insecurities would have expected to progress in a show where younger contestants of a performing background are rightly perceived to have an advantage. Millions of viewers with no connection to Kirkham Grammar School or to the North West warmed to her engaging, modest, and

Given its size and location, Kirkham Grammar School boasts an impressive roll-call of distinguished former pupils of national repute. Old Kirkhamians of all ages are to be found all over the world in a remarkable variety of walks of life. Successful Kirkhamians are to be found in all the traditional professions such as Teaching, Law, Medicine, Engineering and Business, but are also to be found in areas as diverse as the media, journalism, catering, professional sport, the theatre, the clergy, the armed forces and archaeology.









down to earth personality as she uncovered hitherto undiscovered talents, notably in the Ballroom dances.

So what of the Ranvir that we knew at KGS? Did her school career in any way suggest that she would achieve such celebrity 25 years on?

Ranvir joined us at the age of 11 in September 1988, towards the end of Malcolm Summerlee's time as Headmaster, with KGS by then fully established as a co-educational independent school. She is the first to say that she was not a typical privately educated child: her attendance at the school was thanks to the Government Assisted Places Scholarship Scheme, which for 17 years from 1980 enabled bright children from less advantaged backgrounds to attend independent schools with state funding. Ranvir was from a Sikh family of Punjabi Indian origin in Ribbleton, and lost her father at an early age, and recalls being startled by the prosperous homes and lifestyles of some fellow pupils from the wellto-do rural Fylde villages.

However, she was always self-evidently determined to justify the faith put in her by the award of a scholarship, and as one of those who taught her and came to know her well, I believe that this determination and positivity clearly points the way to her subsequent

success in both her professional career and in a TV talent show. As a pupil, she was for her entire career one who gave her utmost to everything, both in the classroom and outside: her best friend Kate (Mrs Aldeen of KGJS) recalls their entering the House Music competition as a duo, undeterred by complete lack of musical expertise. She was an archetypal House Captain, leading what was at that time Mr Trenhaile's Preston House through a golden era of success thanks to her "have a go" attitude. Sounds familiar? She was also a keen student of drama and LAMDA participant; among those who shared a stage with Ranvir in a 1994 school production of The Crucible was none other than Kirsten Chatwin, now Headmistress of KGJS, Mrs O'Donoghue. The producer of that play, Yvonne Jones, who also taught Ranvir A Level Theatre Studies (as it was called in those days) still follows the progress of her protégée from New Zealand, where she lives in retirement.

My strongest memories of Ranvir extend from the two ends of her career: in 1989, during her first year, she took part in one of my many school trips to Paris which are so fondly remembered by former pupils. These trips were always deliberately whole school in composition and were far more about fostering friendships and learning intelligent tourism, rather than any specific language learning purpose. So on that trip - her first to Paris, I believe - she mixed with fellow pupils of all ages as we took in the sights, sounds and atmosphere of the "city of light", with leisurely drink stops at pavement cafés to watch the world go by, three-course restaurant meals and a gentle but very real encouragement to pupils to appreciate cathedrals and museums. She took it all in, and developed a love of the French language and culture which led her to pursue the subject to A Level.

At A Level, she was part of a large class so large, in fact, that Headmaster, Barrie Stacey, had to call upon my wife as an "emergency" teaching appointment in order to split the group into more manageable size. Ranvir engaged in all the challenges of advanced language learning with spirit and determination, and above all else, a sense of fun. That girl-dominated class often dissolved into interminable digressions and fits of giggles, and every time I saw Ranvir sitting with Giovanni on It Takes Two this autumn, I

saw the same person that I knew at school, totally unspoiled by fame.

Ranvir has been unshakeably loyal to her home city, her home region and her old school: she has always remained in touch with KGS, and honoured us by acting as Chief Guest and Prize Presenter at Speech Day in 2007. I recall the reaction of a Sixth Form group I taught the next morning, who were so happy to have, at last, heard a speaker with whom they could identify as a product of the school they themselves loved. She has willingly referred to KGS as a key influence, has readily produced quotations for the School's publicity purposes, but most importantly has delighted in visiting us and seeing her own former teachers - now few in number. The video that was made before she started Strictly, featuring 'Good Luck' messages from some of her teachers, moved her to tears.

Her humility and willingness to build and maintain connections are the qualities of a true star, who never quite believes she is as famous and successful as she is. A few years ago, I mentioned to her that a young friend of mine had an interview at ITN for a journalism apprenticeship and she asked for the girl's number and called her for a chat and some advice, immediately after coming off air from reading News at Six. More recently, throughout the Strictly journey, Ranvir and I have exchanged texts before and after each show, giving this unlikely superfan a real delight at being "on the inside" for one series.

The KGS motto ingredere ut proficias, meaning "enter in order to profit", is sometimes seen as a disappointingly self-serving one, but Ranvir Singh is as good an example as we could ever have of one who lives it out to the full: she has absolutely made the most of the opportunities given to her by entering the school, but more significantly she has profited society by making the most of her talent, and giving so generously of her time and so openly and honestly of her personality in this most difficult of years.

We at KGS have every reason to be proud of our most famous "old girl".

### **Leslie Scott**

It was with great sadness that we learned of the passing of Old Kirkhamian, Leslie Scott (Les) who died on Monday 21 October last year at the age of 91. Les would often wax lyrical about his time at Kirkham Grammar which he attended during the war years. He last visited KGS ten years ago during the holidays, and enjoyed a tour of school along with one of his grandsons. At the time he said that he felt he could still smell the smoke from the staffroom, in his imagination, of course! He commented how he had kept all of his school reports, which thankfully were positive, and felt he had a good education at Kirkham, especially considering it was during the war years and a lot of the Masters were called up to fight.

Born in Preston, Les worked for the Department

of Social Security initially in Blackpool and then transferred to Newcastle upon Tyne. He met his wife, Evelyn, in Glasgow whilst doing his National Service after World War II where he was in the Fleet Air Arm. In the early 60s, Les was at the forefront of Computer Programming and Systems Analysis, in a team designing the new computerised Social Security system. He loved this role which suited his mathematical mind. He rose to be a Senior Principal in the Civil Service. Evelyn and Les had two daughters, Lesley and Alison. They had three grandsons and five great grandchildren. Les played golf three times a week for about 25 years after retirement but gave up when he became frailer and his eyesight had deteriorated. He continued to meet his golfing friends at the clubhouse and also his work colleagues until two months before his death.





### **Chris Lees**

Chris attended Kirkham Grammar School from 1978 to 1985, leaving after Sixth Form to undertake a degree in economics. His degree led him to a career in accountancy and his role within Turpin, Lucas, Lees Accountants Ltd, where he has been a director for many years.

In 2005, Chris joined the Old Kirkhamians' Committee and was elected to the role of Honorary Treasurer in 2006. Over the last 15 years Chris has been a stalwart and enthusiastic member of the committee, attending Oxford dinners, KGS reunions, OKA rugby fixtures, OKA Golf and of course always the Northern Dinner held at School.

In 2011, Chris worked with the School to organise an Old Kirkhamians Three Peaks Challenge. Two minibuses were booked, Chris completed the training to drive the

second minibus, but as the date drew near, the numbers dwindled so just the one minibus was needed. However, this allowed Chris to share the driving and do some of the walking as well.

In 2014, the OKA committee were delighted to hear the news of the birth of Eleanor Lees. A beautiful baby girl for Chris and fiancée Clair Holden (KGS 1985-1992). Clair, and in more recent years Eleanor, have also attended many of the Old Kirkhamian events.


