

Let me, before I close, extend to you all an earnest invitation to visit K.G.S. when you can and to write to me when you can, and let us share your news.

There appears to have been a falling off in recent years of attendance at the Old Boys' Dinner. We wish to have a record Dinner next November, both in the excellence of the fare and entertainment, and we want you to see that the attendance is a record one.

I know how much there is to do, and how difficult it is to do all we should like to do, but it is of great importance to maintain this happy annual gathering.

# Cricket, 1935.

At the beginning of the term there were several factors which seemed to justify considerable optimism. H. Harrison and Mayo had made a welcome return after illness, seven of the previous season's XI. were available, and prominent members of the successful 2nd XI. of 1934 were also back at school.

Unfortunately with the notable exceptions of R. O. Wilson and Russell, no member of the 1934 1st XI. showed any advance in his form of the previous year. Indeed, as time went on, it became obvious that in three cases at least there was an alarming decline in power.

The result was a season of moderate success only, and the position was made worse by a certain slackness and lack of fighting qualities.

Very good form was shown in defeating Blackpool G.S. twice and in an emphatic victory over Stonyhurst College 2nd XI., while there was some strong batting in the Old Boy's Match.

The batting generally was well up to the average with Russell in particular and Mayo, Wilson and Roberts having a satisfactory season.

The bowling caused great disappointment and furnished one big surprise. Last year's regular bowlers completely failed and it was left to H. Harrison to bear the brunt of the bowling. In match after match he kept one end going with surprising steadiness, and finished with nearly twice as many wickets as any other bowler. R. O. Wilson was the only other bowler who gave consistent support.

Russell kept wicket well and the fielding showed improvement. Wilson, H. Harrison and Bradley showed the greatest aptitude for this side of the game.

Full colours were awarded to R. O. Wilson, H. Harrison, and R. Russell. XX. Caps were re-awarded to W. R. I. Walmsley, W. Bond, J. C. Howarth, W. V. Bradley and G. H. D. Dawson, and gained for the first time by C. C. Toyne, J. Mayo and J. C. Royles.

The 2nd XI. following the tendency of previous years was a good team, winning five out of seven matches. Cottam, Wilkinson and Charnley were very promising.

Both first and second elevens lacked outstanding captaincy.

The Senior House Competition was won by the School House who defeated the Kirkham House in the Final. The scores were School 64 and 33 for 4. Kirkham 54 and 35.

The Junior House Cricket Cup was won by the Kirkham House. Again they beat the opposition fairly easily. This is their fourth successive Championship.

# Swimming, 1935.

In every respect this has been easily the best season on record for swimming. Never before have so many certificates been presented at the end of the Summer term. Here is a summary of the awards, showing that there were 74 new swimmers:—

The keenness of the competition is evident when it is realised that the Kirkham House, finishing second, produced 50 swimmers out of 50 boys in the House, and the Fylde House, finishing last, had only one non-swimmer. It is intended in future years that each boy shall swim 6 lengths (150 yards) to gain full points for his House.

# Rugby Football, 1935-36.

The season 1935-36 has been a memorable one by reason of the setting up of a new playing record. Previously nine wins constituted the record for a season and this time the XV. have won ten of their matches.

It must be said at the outset, however, that this success has been due, very largely, to the strength of W. Bond and R. O. Wilson, the centre threequarters, rather than to any

very outstanding qualities of the team as a whole. The other members of the team were good but not exceptional.

The pack was average with C. C. Toyne, the hooker, much the best player and G. Allanson often conspicuous by his plucky and tenacious tackling. Carson usually showed up well in the loose but we missed good, quick-breaking wing forward play.

Praise is due to J. B. Wilkinson who, called upon to play in the position in an emergency, soon showed that he was the scrum half that the School was looking for, and thereafter became an automatic choice for the rest of the season.

J. Roberts at stand-off half made the most of his skill in kicking and was a useful purveyor for Bond and Wilson, who found the elusive running and speed of H. C. Fleetwood a great aid in finishing off their numerous devastating thrusts down the centre.

Probably the best performance of the season was the victory over Stonyhurst College 2nd XV. after being behind until the last quarter of the game. Incidentally this is the first time that we have won this fixture.

The holding of the strong Lancaster R.G.S. 1st XV. to a single point also represents an outstanding achievement.

On the other side of the picture was an overwhelming defeat at the hands of Manchester G.S., although the team was much depleted in strength for this occasion.

The 2nd XV. acquitted themselves well and were decidedly above the average. After losing, not ingloriously, to Lancaster R.G.S., they won four very comfortable victories in succession.

One Colts' match was played against Blackpool G.S. and the School team was victorious after a close and skilful game. The Senior House Competition was won for the first time by the Kirkham House who defeated the School House in the crucial game by the narrow margin of 5—3. The luck of the draw favoured them and they made the fullest use of their opportunity.

In the Junior Competition the Kirkham House was again successful, all four matches being won.

1st XV. Colours were re-awarded to W. Bond, R. O. Wilson, C. C. Toyne and S. M. Carson, and gained for the first time by J. B. Wilkinson, H. C. Fleetwood, W. Parkinson, G. Allanson, J. Roberts, W. V. Bradley, J. P. Whitridge and H. Merrall.

Honours Caps were re-gained by W. Bond and R. O. Wilson, and awarded for the first time to C. C. Toyne.

The new cap was generously presented by Mrs. Penney and the Headmaster.

## K.G.S. Harriers.

# Prize Day, 1935.

Prize Day was held on July 31st. The prizes were presented by Sir Ernest Pooley, Clerk to the Worshipful Company of Drapers of the City of London.

The Rev. R. W. M. Holme, M.A., Chairman of the Governors, who presided over a large gathering, after reviewing the excellence of the work that was being done by the school said that several extensions to the School were to be made in the very near future. More classrooms, a gymnasium and a library were some of the extensions which would be made.

The Headmaster presented his 16th Annual Report, and after recording numerous successes of the school of both past and present scholars, called attention to the complexity of modern life and the necessity in political, economic, educational and moral life of setting a clear course.

"These last sixteen years have proved that we cannot afford to abandon our old anchorages or drag our anchors.

'God' Our Country' Our Home' to dilute what these terms stand for by cheap free thinking or aimless internationalism is to cast ourselves upon an uncharted sea.

The only hope of universal peace is when the citizens of all countries have a true love of God and their own country.

So too in school life, the things that matter most are the things that have always mattered most. Nothing can replace the necessity of acquiring habits of industry and painstaking care, of learning to learn, of being honest and truthful and upright and brave, of pulling one's weight, of sinking self, of enduring hardness and overcoming difficulties by grit and determination.

These are the things which to us at K.G.S. matter most.

We are alive to all the latest theories in education; we are ready to improve and adapt old methods but never to abandon the essentials.

The upward path can never be downhill, and we require from our boys hard work, courage, devotion and perseverance.

To those who seek in this spirit we will give all the aid in our power."

Sir Ernest Pooley in presenting the Prizes mentioned the long connections which his company had had with Kirkham Grammar School.

These connections, he said, had existed since the 17th century and could be traced from that time for 200 years.

Sir Ernest, in addressing the boys, declared that two of the greatest things in life to possess were courage and concentration. By courage, he did not mean merely physical courage, but the courage to shoulder the responsibility and do things which were very often distasteful.

Laziness, he added, was one of the things which was often a big factor in spoiling the life of young men.

# Annual Meeting and Dinner, 1935.

The Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Association was held at the School on November 20th.

The President referred to the loss suffered by the Association by the death of Mr. W. Bagot and the members stood in silence.

The minutes of the previous meeting and the Balance Sheet, showing a balance in hand of £34/9/4, were read and approved.

The Secretary stated that the membership of the Association was 307 and included 157 life members. The President paid tribute to the great work done for the Association by Mr. J. H. Rigby who was unanimously re-elected Honorary Secretary and Treasurer. The following were appointed to form, with the President and Honorary Secretary, the Committee for the ensuing year: Messrs. F. H. Jolly, R. W. Parker, J. Threlfall, H. C. Turner, F. A. Mullineaux, R. S. Crozier, W. E. Durant, F. M. Toon and S. Middleton.

The President reported that the scheme to perpetuate the memory of the late Canon Mitton at K.G.S. had met with a good response: donations amounting to £22/12/0 had been received from 110 Old Boys.

The President and Secretary explained the difficulties that had arisen in arranging the Old Boys Dinner. The meeting were strongly in favour of the importance of continuing to hold the Dinner annually at the School and recommended that steps be taken to make the dinner next year a very good one, to engage the best possible entertainer and to issue a strong appeal to members to attend in force.

The meeting also recommended that the Old Boys Dance on January 3rd be held at the St. John Ambulance Hall, Kirkham.

Messrs. A. H. Jones and A. Aiken were appointed representatives of the Association on the K.G.S. Sports Committee.

After the meeting 59 members sat down to dinner in the School Assembly Hall.

A very enjoyable and happy evening was spent. The toast of the School was proposed by the President, who outlined the great service that was being rendered to K.G.S. by the Governors, the Masters, the Old Boys, and Present School. The Chairman of the Governors, the Rev. R. W. M. Holme and the Rev. E. Parker, Vicar of Kirkham, replied on behalf of the Governing Body; Messrs. A. Gastrell and J. K. Platt on behalf of the Old Boys; and Mr. W. E. Motley replied for the Masters; and the Captain of the School, R. O. Wilson, for the present school.

Speakers emphasised the importance of attending the Annual Reunion at the Dinner.

Mr. Eugene Earle provided capital entertainment with Banjo and Piano Accordion music and many of the company present added to the general enjoyment with witty speeches and musical items.

In the afternoon the annual Rugby Football Match, Past v. Present was played. The ground was soft and the ball slippery. Both teams gave a display of good football. The present school led at half time by 5 points to nil but the Old Boys scored twice in the second half and secured a meritorious victory by 8 points to 5.

# The School Societies.

It is pleasing to record that the School Societies have had a very interesting and active year. The improvement in this direction is a patent sign of the general keenness and intelligence of the School.

The Debating Society has held a series of interesting debates during the year on a variety of subjects. A mock election was held at the time of the General Election, and proved to be popular with the members. The experience gained in the meetings has been of great value to the members in that it has stimulated their interest in current affairs, and also helped them to cultivate the art of public speaking.
