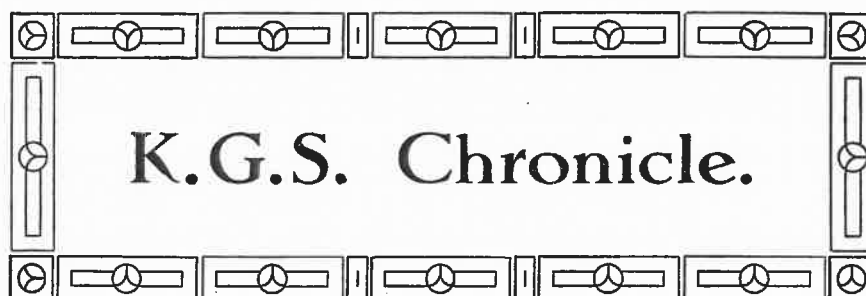

Dear Old Boys of K.G.S.,

No doubt most of you have found this past year a very eventful one and not without its personal anxieties. It has been an eventful one in the history of K.G.S. Last July saw the opening of the new buildings and these have gradually reached completion until by last Christmas they were all in full use. They make a tremendous difference to the fuller and better working of the school and it must be a satisfaction to Old Boys to realise that their old school has accommodation worthy of its great name and history. Those who have not seen these buildings should take the first opportunity of doing so. I need not say they will be very welcome.

The Governors have completed this great work by extending the playing fields and have acquired about $5\frac{1}{2}$ acres of adjacent land for the purpose.

National and world affairs have brought a great call to service and I am daily receiving evidence of the fine answer of the Old Boys of K.G.S. to this call. In almost every case of which I know members of K.G.S. welcome the opportunity of being prepared to play their part in whatever need may arise. We all hope and pray that the tragedy of war may be averted and my feeling is that the better prepared and stronger we become the less we have to fear. We as a nation are sparing nothing in the task of preserving peace, and I know that Old Boys of K.G.S. are doing their share in this.

The year has been a full and interesting one at K.G.S. School certificate results brought a record, 25 out of 29 entries proving successful.

The extensions have necessitated a complete reorganisation and the introduction of Art and Gymnastics into a full place in the curriculum.

As you will see from the records in the Chronicle, in Football, Running and Cricket we have more than held our own.

The Old Boys' Committee have worked with enthusiasm and issued a questionnaire to members to try and find out in which particular direction each Old Boy's interest may lie.

I sometimes wonder how far Old Boys find the receipt of the Chronicle and Summer Calendar a welcome privilege of membership. I wish to take this opportunity of mentioning that when invitations are issued for Prize Day and the Sports, they are addressed to each member, but in the case of Old Boys who are married they are intended to include the wife.

I wish to thank all Old Boys for the interest they continue to take in their old school and to send my best wishes to one and all.

Cricket, 1938.

The 1938 season opened with only four of the very good team of 1937 still at school, and it was realised that it would have to be a season of experiment and rebuilding.

With more than half of the fixtures completed we were in a state of amazed delight at the fact that of eight games

played seven of them had been won. Inevitably the tide turned and the team finished the season with five consecutive defeats. It was unfortunate that events turned out in this way as it meant ending on a note of depression when, actually, the side had done rather better than could reasonably have been expected.

As far as the batting was concerned only H. Harrison and W. W. Cottam were sufficiently experienced to make big scores and even they were not consistent. Of the rest J. A. Wright and J. B. Langtree were useful in rather a crude way and J. Marquis and E. Forshaw showed some promise.

The bowling was very limited and lacked variety. As usual H. Harrison was outstanding (53 wickets in 11 matches) and R. W. A. Biddlecombe and R. D. Lawson worked hard to support him but were not quite good enough.

The fielding was good without being exceptional and H. Harrison, W. W. Cottam and L. Nicol showed most experience in anticipation and taking up position.

J. A. Wright was a keen and whole-hearted wicket keeper but he did not possess the real flair for this specialised post.

Full colours were re-awarded to H. Harrison and W. W. Cottam. No new colours were awarded. XX. Caps were re-awarded to R. D. Lawson, J. Kershaw, L. Nicol, E. Willacy and G. W. Allison and gained for the first time by R. W. A. Biddlecombe, E. Forshaw, J. A. Wright, J. B. Langtree, J. Marquis, D. J. Marshall, J. S. Brotherton, H. D. Coupe, C. Swan, J. Hornby, P. N. R. Carr, H. G. Longstaff and H. E. Calland.

The second XI. were well up to standard with J. S. Brotherton, H. D. Coupe, C. Swan, J. Hornby and P. Carr all showing considerable promise. They won 4 matches and lost 2.

The Senior House Competition was won by the Kirkham House which defeated the School House in the final. The scores were Kirkham House 59 and 2 for 0, School House 37 and 22.

Swimming, 1938.

Another good season has been experienced at the Baths. At the end of the Summer Term 187 boys were able to swim out of a total strength of 209, *i.e.* 89%. The 150 yards test was passed by 114 boys and a further 42 boys passed the 25 yards test. Much enthusiasm was shown throughout the term, and the baths were well patronised after school hours as well as during the regular daily periods.

The competition for the House Cup was as keen as ever and produced a very close contest in which the School House beat the Kirkham House by the narrow margin of one point. In the Annual Swimming Sports a large number of boys took part, and the fast times recorded testify to the high standard of the swimming. The contest for the School Championship was very close this year, and in the Junior Championship competition a pleasing feature was the exceptionally large number of entries although we are as yet without a Cup for the winner.

Mrs. B. Stevenson kindly presented the trophies and certificates to the winners at the end of the Sports and this concluded a very satisfactory season.

In 1939 it is intended to swim against Blackpool Grammar School and also to compete for the Fylde Inter-Schools

Championship Cup, and we have every reason to expect good results.

Rugby Football, 1938-39.

In many ways this has been the most satisfactory season since we changed to the Rugby code. The number of matches won (10) equals the record number of 1935-36 but whereas we were very indebted to two outstanding players at that time, this year success has been achieved to a much greater extent by good team work.

One match had to be abandoned when we were leading 9—3 in the second half. We were pressing heavily and would have won almost certainly and so set up a new record.

With regard to the team it has to be admitted that the pack as a whole did not compare favourably in weight, speed and combination with the very good packs that we possessed some seasons ago. They were not by any means poor but there is room for improvement here. W. W. Cottam, J. A. Wright and L. Entwisle were the only three forwards of the desired class.

Behind the scrum we had one of the best half back combinations we have ever had. E. Willacy, a sound scrum half had an excellent understanding with H. Harrison at stand off who was brilliant in attack and much improved in defence.

J. Kerr and R. Rigby, the former more in attack, the latter in defence were good centres but on the wings there was some weakness N. Cook, R. Gardner and L. J. S. Jacques all having speed but no guile. Credit must be given to Cook however for superb tackling.

The team was completed by E. V. Ball at full back who was always sound and courageous.

Of the matches the defeat of Giggleswick 2nd XV. by 48 points to 3 saw the team in its most dominant mood but perhaps the holding of a very powerful Blackpool G.S. XV. to 0—11 and 0—14 were even more praiseworthy performances. A glance at the table of results will show that on no occasion was the School completely outplayed.

The second XV. only played three matches but showed considerable promise as did the colts in their matches against Blackpool G.S. It is always a disappointment that more of these boys do not stay at school long enough to reach the first XV.

The Senior House Competition was won by the Fylde House which narrowly defeated the Kirkham House in an exciting final.

The Fylde House also won the Junior Competition their strongest challengers being the School House.

Eight schools met at Blackpool on March 27th, 1939. The running and jumping reached a very high standard. K.G.S. was placed 6th equal with Barrow G.S., with 5 points.

Prize Day, 1938.

Opening of the New Buildings.

Prize Day was held on July 23rd and the day was made memorable by the presence of the Master of the Worshipful Company of Drapers and the Opening of the new buildings.

The Governors were well represented and also present were Sir Percy Meadon, Director of Education, Sir Ernest Pooley, Clerk to the Drapers' Company, Mr. E. N. Clifton, Architect to the Drapers' Company and C. W. C. Jenkins, H.M.I.

Mr. Duckworth kindly invited the Governors to lunch at Ribby Hall to meet the representatives of the Drapers' Company.

The Rev. R. W. M. Holme, M.A., Chairman of the Governors, presided and commented upon the satisfaction which the Governors felt in the progress of the school. The existing buildings were for 120 boys, the additional wing allowed for an attendance at the school of 275 boys. The attention of the Governors had been occupied by the matter of additional playing fields and he was pleased to announce that negotiations had been entered into for the acquisition of about $5\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land.

The Headmaster presented his nineteenth annual Report. Reviewing the past year he stated that there had been good work, pleasing examination results, successes for Old Boys and a good year in sport. Commenting on the international situation he said the whole system of democracy was being challenged by an efficiency obtained by means and methods which revolted our sense of what was good. It could only be met by free men and women realising to the full the obligation of freedom, and exercising a self-discipline and free service which is sterner but infinitely happier than that of forced labour, and concentration camp. He believed that our nation was realising and facing this fact magnificently—but it would be a long and hard path, and the future depended to no small extent, upon the way in which our schools fulfilled their function and duty. There was no room for selfishness or slackness if our ideals were to survive and triumph.

Speaking of the opening of the new buildings he said, "This is an occasion of great happiness and satisfaction. My mind goes back to 32 years ago, when I first made the acquaintance of K.G.S., a Headmaster, two Assistant Masters and 52 boys, in poor and unsuitable buildings; to 27 years ago when these buildings were opened by the Master of the

Worshipful Company of Drapers, a Headmaster, three Assistant Masters and 65 boys, and now to-day again we welcome the Master of the Drapers' Company to open these fine extensions, with a Headmaster, nine Assistant Masters and 210 boys. Let us humbly thank God, that He has blessed the work of this school, and that it has been able to grow and develop. Let us also thank Him for those who have been raised up to carry out this purpose. It was the vision and determination of the late Headmaster, the Rev. T. C. Walton, so ably backed by the Chairman of the Governors, the Rev. W. T. Mitton, and the Governors of that day, which saved K.G.S. from extinction, and gave it this new life and opportunity. It was the skill and art of Mr. Greenway, and the generosity of the Drapers' Company that brought into existence this most beautiful of School buildings. It was the generosity of past benefactors and the wisdom of the present Governors assisted by the advice of the Drapers' Company and of the Lancashire Education Committee, which has enabled Mr. Wilkinson to create this glorious extension, which so beautifully blends with the old. Let us acknowledge with gratitude our indebtedness to our predecessors on whose foundations we have been able to build. Let us also remember that it is the same school—the same that struggled in a little thatched school-house from 1549 onwards—the same that some of us knew in School Lane—the same that has carried on here for these 27 years.

“We must carry on into the new and fuller life the precious traditions of the past. This is something intangible but very real—something to which the generations of the past 400 years have all contributed. It is something to which the Drapers' Company have contributed very greatly. Their association with our school dates from 1655, when Henry Colborne made benefactions to the Company and to this School. As Trustees of this benefaction the Drapers' Company appointed the Headmasters, and drew up regulations for the management of the school for 200 years. They still

appoint six of our Governors. We owe to the Company a debt of gratitude for what they have contributed to our traditions in those far off days. We owe them a debt of gratitude for what they did in 1910, when their gift of £3,000, and the provision of the services of their architect created these buildings. The bond which I like to think exists between the school and this Company is one of sympathy. They treasure their historic traditions, and so do we, and we prize and revere the fact that for a considerable period of our history we were under their wing and guidance."

Mr. F. R. D'O. Monro, Master of the Worshipful Company of Drapers, who presented the prizes said one of the first things he wanted to mention was the gift of the fields adjoining the school by Mr. W. Duckworth, of Ribby Hall. He realised now he had been there how very important these fields were to the school. "I do think" added the speaker "that this school, which I have never had the pleasure of seeing before, is a most beautiful building, and I have asked the Chairman if he would be kind enough to let me have a photograph of the school which I can hang up in the Drapers' Hall."

Speaking to the boys, Mr. Monro said he took it that it was the work of education so to train people that they might think out every problem for themselves and rely on themselves.

He wanted to impress two things on the students. One was not to accept anything unless they could prove it was correct. The other was to rely on themselves.

"In the conduct of life there is a very simple test" he said "One course is right and the other is wrong, and if you are honest with yourselves you will always know which is the right course. A school is largely judged by its old boys, and if you follow the right course your old school will be proud of you, and you will look back on your school life with pride. And you will do another thing—you will add greatly to the

glory of this School of which I am sure you are all so justly proud."

After the Prize Giving Mr. Monro opened the new buildings. The ceremony was simple and impressive.

After prayers conducted by the Headmaster, and the singing of the passage from Ecclesiasticus "Let us now praise famous men" by the school choir, the Chairman of the Governors invited Mr. Monro to open the buildings.

In the unavoidable absence of the County Architect, Mr. S. Wilkinson, the presentation key was handed to Mr. Monro by Mr. H. Ovenden.

A most interesting event in the proceedings was the presentation to the school by Mr. R. C. Dickson, Secretary to the Governors, of the sabre of Lieut. H. R. Buck, an Old Boy of K.G.S. who fell at Waterloo in 1815. Lieut. Buck was in the 33rd Regiment. He was the son of the Rev. Charles Buck a former curate of Lund who died in 1808. Lieut. Buck's grandfather was vicar of Kirkham from 1744 to 1771. He married Alice Dickson. The sabre has been in the possession of the Dickson family for generations.

There is a tablet on the south wall of Kirkham Church to the memory of Lieut. Buck.

Annual Meeting and Dinner, 1938.

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Association was held at the School on November 16th.

The minutes of the previous meeting and the balance sheet showing a balance of £73/0/0 were read and approved. The Secretary stated that the membership of the Association was 328 of whom 199 were Life Members. The President expressed the thanks of the Association to Mr. J. H. Rigby for his service as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, and he was unanimously re-elected.

The inclusive cost of a chair with the name and date would be 12/- and he invited any Old Boys who would like to commemorate their school days to give a chair.

After the meeting a representative gathering, numbering 81 sat down to dinner in the School Assembly Hall.

The Toast of the School was proposed by the President. In the absence of the Chairman of the Governors, the Rev. R. W. M. Holme, who much to the regret of all was prevented by indisposition from being present, the Rev. E. Parker replied on behalf of the Governors, Mr. A. Gastrell on behalf of the Old Boys, and Mr. G. Barton on behalf of the Masters.

The Toast of the Committee was received with enthusiasm and, in reply to it, Mr. Jolly gave a resumé of the activities of the Committee and invited members to make suggestions to the Committee.

Mr. H. Taylor proved a very excellent entertainer, and songs by Mr. Stafford were highly appreciated.

In the afternoon the Annual Rugby Football Match was played. The ground was very heavy and the forwards had a hard duel. At half-time the Present School led by one try. In the second half the superior weight of the Old Boys told its tale, and scoring two unconverted tries they won an excellent game by six points to three.

Memorial to the late Canon Mitton.

On February 15th, 1939, the memorial to Canon Mitton was unveiled and dedicated by the Rt. Rev. Dr. P. M. Herbert, Bishop of Blackburn. The memorial consists of a stained glass window of heraldic design and is placed in the Library; in the centre are the arms of K.G.S., and on the left the arms of Canon Mitton's college, Pembroke College, Cambridge, and on the right the arms of the Mitton family.

The window is the gift of the Governors and Past and Present members of K.G.S.

Before dedicating the window Dr. Herbert spoke very impressively to the whole school assembled in the Hall.

The Headmaster in inviting Dr. Herbert to unveil and dedicate the window spoke of the great service which Canon Mitton had rendered to K.G.S. during the long period of his chairmanship of the governing body and of the deep and kindly interest he took in the school and its members.

The Bishop spoke with appreciation of the life and work and character of the late Canon Mitton.

The Chairman of the Governors moved a vote of thanks to the Bishop which was seconded on behalf of the Old Boys by Mr. H. C. Turner.

Mrs. Mitton and other members of the family were present, as well as representatives of the Governors and of the Old Boys and the present school.

Afterwards the Headmaster and Mrs. Strange had the pleasure of entertaining the company to tea in the school Dining Hall.

The cost of the Memorial window was £47, and the tablet £3/15/0; Printing £1/12/7; making a total of £52/7/7. Contributions received were: The Governors £18/6/6; Old Boys £22/19/6; Present School including the Masters £8/4/3; Bank Interest 9/3; Total £49/19/6. This leaves £2/8/1 to be raised. Old Boys will remember that subscriptions were limited in the first appeal to 5/-, and the Headmaster will be pleased to hear from any Old Boy who would like to be associated with this memorial.

The Old Boys' Dance.

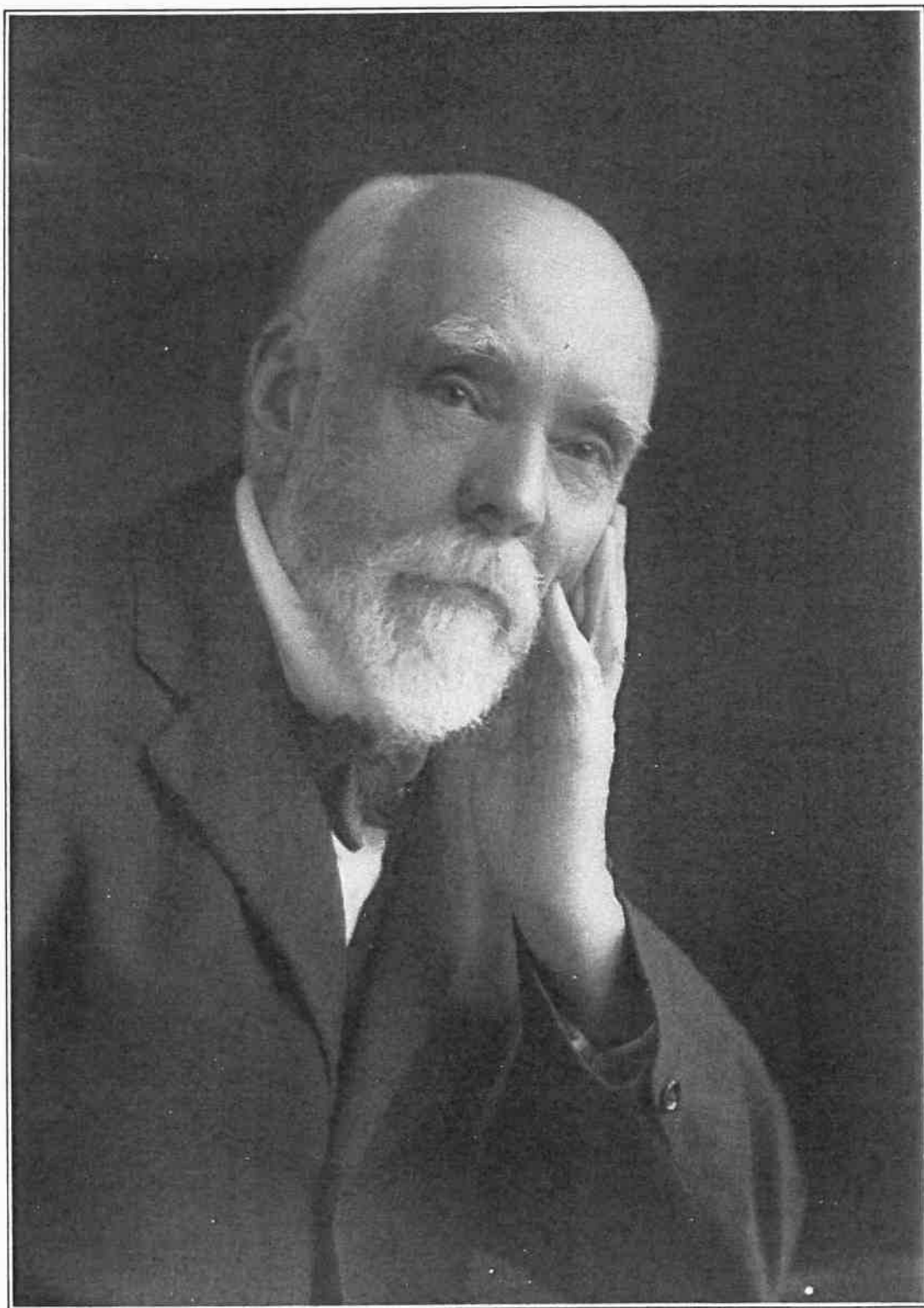
Amongst various suggestions the Committee have noted :—

OUR OLDEST OLD BOY
MR. J. J. COCKSHOT, O.B.E.,
AT K.G.S. 1854-57.

Mr. J. J. Cockshott, O.B.E.

We publish with great pleasure in this issue of the Chronicle a reproduction of a photograph of the oldest living Old Boy of K.G.S., Mr. J. J. Cockshott of Southport. This is due to the initiative of our Hon. Secretary, Mr. J. H. Rigby, who obtained Mr. Cockshott's permission and is delighted to pay the cost of the reproduction and of the copies required for the Chronicle.

Mr. Cockshott has kindly given some memories of his days at K.G.S., 85 years ago.

He was admitted in 1854. His first recollection is a reading test which he passed so well that, before he had finished the page, one of the Governors called out, "Stop! Stop! Stop!"

The School buildings now known as the Hermitage, were in School Lane, the Lower School occupied the ground floor, and the Upper and Middle School the top floor room. Mr. Bradley, an expert penman, was master of the Lower School, Mr. Charlton was master of the Middle School, and the Headmaster, the Rev. Exsuperius Wentworth, had charge of the Upper School.

In 1857 Mr. Cockshott had reached the Upper School and was then removed to a private School.

We would add that Mr. Cockshott has had a distinguished career as a Solicitor. He is held in very high esteem and for a time represented the Lancashire County Council on the Board of Governors.

All Old Boys will wish to congratulate him and hope that he may be spared for many years to enjoy health and well earned repose.

Letters from Old Boys.

W. Bond serving with the 1st Batt. Irish Guards in Palestine writes, 2/9/38.

"Our camp is in my estimation a death trap as it is situated in a deep valley. To the south of us and not three hundred yards away is the Holy Hill, from which we were informed no firing would take place; however, on the first night in camp the Battalion had just got down to it when a large party of Arabs opened fire on us from this Hill. As a result there followed great activity and we had a pitched battle for about 25 minutes and it was not until the mortars bombed the Hill that we finally dispersed the enemy, having killed about twenty. After that we have always kept a sharp eye on the Holy Hill."

W. Bond has been in England since November last and paid a visit to K.G.S. at Christmas.

C. C. Toyne who is an apprentice at the Metropolitan Vickers Co. and taking an Honours course at Manchester University writes, 25/6/39.

"Just a few lines from an Old Boy who is working his passage in a cargo boat to India and back. The ship is quite a small one of about 4,000 tons, and we have a crew of seventy, twenty of whom are Europeans and the rest either Goanese or Indians. My official position is that of Supernumerary Engineer and my work consists of doing any repairs or renewals about the ship. As most of these so far have been on deck I have been afforded an excellent opportunity of observing the general life and routine of the ship and also of seeing anything interesting which we have passed.

"We sailed from Birkenhead on Thursday evening, June 15th, and all day Friday we found ourselves passing south along the coast. We could see quite plainly the Welsh Hills in the distance until we came to the mouth of the Severn and then didn't see land for two days.

"As these two days were Saturday and Sunday we played the ship's own particular version of cricket, which is most interesting. Our pitch is the regulation twenty-two yards long and is situated on the afterdeck, whilst our crease is a convenient row of rivets which help to keep the iron deck together. To prevent the ball from going over the side it is attached to a long piece of thick string which is secured at the other end to the rails and it was surprising to me what little effect its presence had on the bowling and batting. The runs scored by each shot depend upon the place where the ball lands, and the scores are carefully kept and at the end of each game averages are meticulously worked out. In fact the folks here take their cricket very seriously.

"After leaving England (or rather Wales) the next land we saw was the coast of Portugal just south of Lisbon. It is a magnificent coast consisting for the most part of high reddish brown cliffs which rise sheer from the roaring breakers which pound incessantly at their foundations. The erosive action of these waves has worn deep crevices and here and there I could see large caves whose blackness contrasted sharply with the light brown of the cliffs. On top of these cliffs the land seemed sparse and bare and no trees were visible on the gently rolling hills which stretched far back into the hinterland. We passed along this coast until we came to the Straits of Gibraltar in the early hours of Tuesday morning.

"When I got on deck at about 6.30 a.m. on Tuesday we were just passing Tangier on our starboard side. The white topped houses clustered together on comparatively low-lying land presented a particularly picturesque sight as they glistened in the early morning sunlight. As we passed along the Straits the number of ships increased and gradually the familiar outline of the Rock of Gibraltar loomed slowly into view. A low mist was hiding the base of the rock and also the low-lying land which joins it to the Spanish mainland, this giving the rock an island appearance.

"For the rest of Tuesday we were passing along the Spanish coast and about forty miles inland we could see the high mountains of the Sierra Nevada range whose highest peaks were covered in snow. Gradually we left the coast and eventually found ourselves passing along the Algerian coast and we passed Oran and Algiers on Wednesday. On Thursday we passed Tunis and in the evening we saw French warships from Tunis holding target practice. Friday saw Malta pass slowly by and yesterday (Saturday) we were out at sea, well on our way to Port Said where we hope to dock in the early hours of Monday morning and where I will be posting this letter."

G. H. D. Dawson writing from the Serpts.' Mess of the R.A.F. at Cranfield, 9/7/39, gives an interesting account of his experiences flying a bomber. He is representing his Squadron in the R.A.F. Athletic Championship at Uxbridge this month.

"About ten days ago I flew over Kirkham and finally found the School from the air. It is rather hard to find as it blends with the background very well indeed."

L. P. Salisbury.

Many Old Boys will hear with regret that by the time this Chronicle reaches them L. P. Salisbury will have retired on superannuation.

He is held in affectionate regard by many generations and will long be honoured for his faithful service, his whole-hearted love for the school, his keen love of sport and his unfailing willingness to help and do a good turn.

He was himself educated at K.G.S. (1880) and entered on his duties as Caretaker and Groundsman on June 28th, 1911, and carried them out unaided until the extensions of the buildings necessitated additional assistance.

Old Boys will unite in wishing him health and happiness in his well earned retirement.

He is succeeded by his son Leslie H. Salisbury who was at K.G.S. (1927-31).

The Headmaster feels that many Old Boys would wish to contribute to a testimonial to their old friend to mark their appreciation of his fine record of 28 years service to K.G.S., and in remembrance of many an act of kindness and help received.

Contributions sent to the Headmaster will be gratefully acknowledged.

When the present buildings were opened in 1911, Mr. Walton invited Old Boys to commemorate the occasion by subscribing for two Library Book-cases. Sufficient money was subscribed for each subscriber to be commemorated by a chair with his name and date carved thereon.

Many Old Boys have from time to time expressed their wish to give a similar chair.

The present time appears opportune for Old Boys to commemorate the extensions to the buildings. It is estimated that the cost of a chair will be in the neighbourhood of 12/- each, and the Headmaster will be pleased to hear from any Old Boy who would like to give a chair.

Athletic Sports, 1939.

On Wednesday, May 17th, we held our 40th Annual Sports which in spite of atrocious weather conditions attracted to the School Field a large number of friends, including many Old Boys and parents of present boys.

The spirit shown was excellent and all events were so keenly contested that our visitors seemed to forget the rain

and cold in their enjoyment of the splendid entertainment provided by our athletes.

The coveted title of Victor Ludorum was well earned by J. Kerr with 40 points, his nearest challenger being I. D. Johnson who gained 30 points.

The Junior Champion this year was R. G. Tomlinson who earned the title with a splendid score of 26 points against which no other junior showed a better score than 9 points.
