
The students have taken on the challenge and have started to create retro style playable games, some of which have been launched on Itch.io.



Our J2 pupils have been learning about the Tudors and explored the Tudor Rose in Creative Arts last week. They were tasked with creating their own 'Tudor Rose' in a media of their choice.

In Science, they have been exploring the effect that different drinks have on their teeth. They used eggs to mimic the teeth and placed them in different drinks for a week. They predicted what might happen to the eggs and then wrote down their findings. We think Alexia (see far right), had the right idea to wear a mask whilst carrying out the experiment!

They have also enjoyed reading 'The Spiderwick Chronicles' this term and were inspired to write letters to the authors telling them what they thought of the book and asking some questions. The pupils spent one lesson looking at the structure of a formal letter and writing a first draft. The next day, they edited their letter, checking carefully for missing punctuation and to see if they could add any more detail.











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
