The year saw the retirement of two of the longest serving members of the KGS staff.

Mr. Brian Taylor retired as Head of German after 35 years' service. Brian arrived in 1968 after taking his degree at Leeds University and his PGCE at Liverpool. Arriving as a fresh faced youth, Brian oversaw the development of German throughout the whole school. He was initially appointed by Bill Kennedy and subsequently worked with four headmasters. During his time here, Brian made a significant contribution to the life of the school. He was housemaster of Lytham House until its demise – at which point he transferred to Preston House and remained at the helm for several years. On the sporting front, Brian was in charge of junior cricket for many years and also held the lofty position of captain of the staff cricket team. Legend has it that he was a fine wicketkeeper who always kept the slips on their toes! Brian even drove our first XV on their first ever tour abroad. to Narbonne in 1977. He did, of course, lead many trips abroad in his role as linguist and was responsible for the success of the German exchange with the Anne Frank Schule in Linden. As chairman of the Fell Walking Society, Brian led generations of KGS pupils across the hills and dales of the Lake District and more recently managed to persuade the ladies of the staff room to take to the hills at weekends. His talents also extended to the school choir, of which he was a stalwart for many years, and his recent role in the staff play, as Mr Peach in the Farndale production of Macbeth, was unforgettable. In his twilight years, Brian assumed the unenviable task of President of the Staff Common Room and led this diverse body with much patience and good humour.

He now looks forward to a long and well-earned retirement and takes with him the best wishes of all at KGS.

Also retiring after 31 years' service was our Director of Music, Mr John Catterall. As a boy, John attended KGS, where, he claims, he enjoyed all aspects of school life, apart from winter games. He apparently spent most of his games lessons practising the psalms on the wing. managing successfully to avoid the scrums. He was, however, an avid Preston North End fan, and as a youth was a regular singer on the terraces. although today he is more of an armchair supporter. But music is his passion, and John was already a church organist before leaving school to study music at Chester College. John joined the staff of KGS in 1971 and to sum up his career since then is an impossibility. Apart from teaching music, he played a full part in the life of the School by his boarding duties and all the productions he staged, ranging from choral presentations of solemn masses to light hearted Gilbert and Sullivan. The quality of his work is incredible. Nobody who ever attended one of his concerts could doubt the dedication and effort of the man. It is through John that the school and his parish church enjoy an exceedingly high reputation in the world of music and his award of the MBE recently was richly deserved. His kindness and willingness to help colleagues could not be faulted; his presence illuminated many a break and lunchtime in the staff common room.

Now that John has left KGS, he will have his church music to occupy his time, so we do not know how much he will miss KGS. We do know that the school and the staff will certainly miss him. We wish him a long and happy retirement.







Overview

nce again, K.G.S girls have experienced a very successful year of sport. Not only have we continued to dominate in our major sport of hockey, but we have also experienced increasing success in our minority winter sports of netball, swimming and cross-country. It is my hope for future years to maintain our exceptionally high standard of hockey, whilst improving our standards in our other competitive sports. I hope that in doing so a greater percentage of the girls in each year group can experience the enjoyment and personal fulfilment of competing for their school.

The senior hockey teams have continued to show a committed and mature approach to both their matches and training sessions. Both senior teams have played with determination and a strong desire to succeed and have gelled into two cohesive squads. The first XI has been extremely successful, winning the majority of its matches and was very unlucky not to qualify for the regional round of the Under 18's BAe Systems competition. The second XI has experienced similar success, with many of their Wednesday games being played against First XI mixed or men's sides.

The junior hockey teams have also performed admirably throughout the season. The Under 15 team had a somewhat shaky start, but their game improved immeasurably throughout the season. Our most successful team was undoubtedly the Under 14's, who were crowned county and regional champions, and went on to compete in the National Schools' Hockey finals. The team was also crowned Under 14 7-a-side champions in the HMC Lancashire Schools' tournament. The Under 13 team has also performed superbly this season, winning 16 of their 21 matches played, and scoring a tremendous 67 goals. The 7-a-side team qualified for the North mini hockey finals and enjoyed a fabulous day's hockey at Belle Vue. The Under 12 teams improved immensely towards the end of the season, with their most impressive performance being saved for the Arnold Invitation tournament. They are now looking forward to 11-a-side hockey next year.

would like to thank the 'Friends of K.G.S' for their support and funding of the new first year team shirts and goal keeping equipment. The girls are delighted with the new kit and look forward to their coming matches.

In addition to our hockey success, the girls have also competed well in netball, swimming and crosscountry. The Under 14 netball team lost only one of their league matches, and competed well in the Blackpool Schools' netball tournaments, as did the Under 13 and Under 12 teams. The girls' cross country teams also performed well in the Fylde Coast Championships at Hodgson High School. The first and second year teams were runners up, and the third year team came in third place. Jane Greenwood performed superbly to achieve first place in the senior girls' event. The Under 14 swimming team is made up of many talented swimmers and has won all but one of its matches this year.

The success of the girls' sports teams is due to the girls' personal commitment and hard work, the tremendous support of their parents, and the dedication and expert coaching offered by the coaching staff. I am truly grateful for all of the hard work and enthusiasm shown by the coaches throughout the season. I really appreciate their commitment and professionalism.

HOCKEY First XI

This was undoubtedly a talented squad, but talent without hard work would only have produced occasional success and the outstanding achievement of this team was built on developing talent, application and tremendous team spirit.

Each girl made a vital contribution and each deserves special mention. Jemma Thackray became increasingly dominant in goal to a point where she could intimidate the opposition, and her penalty flick saves at each of our Championship finals were crucial. Maddie Eaves, who missed part of the season through injury, returned to play some of her best hockey in the latter stages, whilst Sarah Cooper deserves great credit for the way she approached her change of role from defender to left attack. Francesca Emery did an important covering role in a number of positions and was a valuable squad member. Jessica Morris had an excellent season on the right wing, fast and direct and a constant threat to opposition defences. Throughout the season the team was led by Kate Gledhill from the centre of midfield and in every sense Kate was the heart of the team. A totally committed player who never gave anything other than her best, it was fitting that in the last match of the season it was Kate who stepped up to score the winning penalty to secure our third trophy.

This team now needs to go on from here to perform at more senior levels. By staying focused, working on skills and remaining willing to learn, they will continue to bring great credit to themselves and to the school.



RUGBY First XV

ecause the fixture list was stronger than ever this year with a particularly difficult start to the season, it was decided to improve pre-season training with two matches against club sides containing elite youth players in Wales. Both matches were lost and, although players had responded to the stimulus of a tougher pre-season, the players new to first XV rugby were surprised by the standard at which the matches were played. Dimitris Kazantzidis incurred a serious knee injury in training which sadly meant he missed playing until the end of the season. His absence was highlighted by the outstanding performance he gave on his return in the Sedbergh Tens. The injury to Adam Newton against Woodhouse Grove which necessitated him missing all matches until Sedbergh may have been partly responsible for this. Every cloud has a silver lining, however, and Adam returned from injury a vastly improved player.

Sedbergh were next. KGS had rehearsed tactics to beat them for ten days. Sedbergh had rehearsed tactics they felt they had to use to stop us and beat us for ten days. The scene was set.



CRICKET

First XI

The first XI has played eleven games which includes an Under 17 Lancashire Cup game. They have won two, lost six and drawn three. Better weather this season has meant that the team has played on a fairly regular basis which has helped develop a sense of continuity.

The season started off well with a good win over Arnold. KGS scored 157 off 30 overs (Peter Reeh 71). Arnold replied with 137 all out (Matthew Hopton 5 for 5, Bradley Hamilton 4 for 19). Then the team played a strong Hutton G.S. side who could only manage 47 all out batting first (Peter Reeh 3 for 8), with KGS winning by seven wickets at 48 for 3.

Unfortunately, the game against Woodhouse Grove was cancelled due to poor weather. This new fixture would have proved a stern test for the squad.

The team then travelled to the Isle of Man to play two fixtures on a short tour. In the game against King William's College, KGS posted 181 declared (Matthew Hopton 42, Adam Newton 52). King William's threatened to overcome this score with their own South African representation, but eventually could only reach 136 for 6 before they ran out of time - match drawn.

The day after, the team played a very strong Isle of Man representation team which contained many older players. The select team scored 159 off their 30 overs (Adam Newton 5 for 42). In reply, the first XI could only manage 53, the select bowling proving too strong for our batsmen. Nevertheless, this was a valuable learning experience.

After a break for exam duty, the team returned to

play two fixtures. In the best game of the season, against Lancaster, KGS batted first and scored 153 off 35 overs, mainly due to the efforts of the 'Marcuses', 37 by Marcus Jackson and a late flurry of 31 not out by Marcus Plowright. In reply, Lancaster looked to be coasting to victory, but good tight bowling towards the end of the game (Matthew Hopton 3 for 21) put the late batsmen under real pressure. The score was only finally reached with two balls to spare.

Next, the first XI played King Edward and Queen Mary School in an all day declaration game. KEQM, with the help of some shoddy fielding and bowling in the early part of the game, posted a good score of 237 all out. In reply, KGS responded well (Matthew Hopton 30, Peter Reeh 39), only to lose quick wickets. A late rally by Captain Bradley Hamilton (38) got the team back on track, but a lack of firepower in the tail resulted in us falling short at 190 for 8 - match drawn.

In the annual match against the MCC, our guests scored 194 declared from 39 overs. This left a potential 50 overs to achieve the score, but poor batting, except for gritty displays by Marcus Jackson (29) and Joel Unsworth (34), resulted in a disappointing collapse at 111 all out.

In the Under 17 Lancashire Cup, the team faced a very strong Turton High School side. In only 25 overs they amassed 189 for 4. Kirkham responded well to the run chase (Unsworth 46), but a lack of overs left us 27 short.

Against Sedbergh School the team bowled well but were let down by poor fielding. However, the score of 191 off 40 overs was not an impossible task. However, the batting gremlin once again got to us and the loss of early wickets made the task too tall to climb. Once again, Joel Unsworth was the only recognised batsman to hit form with a battling 47.



In the penultimate game of the season, the school entertained Belfast Royal Academy. In a declaration game the visitors scored 190 off 57 overs. We bowled well in this marathon fielding effort, with Adam Newton providing the mainstay of our attack (3 for 46). With only a miserly 33 overs to chase the total, we were always under pressure from the fiery opposition and the characteristic collapse soon reared its ugly head. However, a fantastic knock of 59 from third year Robert Sissons provided the much needed momentum to get going. As he was ably supported by Adam Newton (26), the scoreboard ticked away, but when these two fell, we were lucky to hold out for the draw.

In the last game of the season the school narrowly lost to Queen Elizabeth's School, Blackburn. Both teams were weakened by unavailability and Kirkham's score of 122 off 40 overs did not seem enough. However, at 78 for 8 QEGS appearred dead and buried, but their late rally and an interesting series of bowling changes led to our downfall. A disappointing way to end the season, especially for the U6 playing their last match.

Generally, I have been delighted with the team's attitude and commitment during the season,

especially during exam time when communication with each other becomes difficult, practice becomes impossible, and the demands of revision and exam schedules naturally take precedence. But once players were back in circulation after the exams, the season picked up again. Tough challenges against the MCC, Sedbergh School, Belfast Royal Academy and Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School, as well as the Lancashire Cup, have provided a fitting climax to the season.

The team has been well led by Bradley Hamilton. The all-round talents of Matthew Hopton, Peter Reeh, Adam Newton, Joel Unsworth and Marcus Jackson have created a strong back bone to the team. They have been supported by good contributions from Kit Ingham (WK), Jack Ward, Marcus Plowright, Ali Bhatti, Alex Tudge, Luke Dickinson, Liam Hanley and Sam Bensky. Darren Bell fitted in to the team well whilst on the short tour to the Isle of Man. Adam Kyriacou has performed well recently, Robert Sissons is first XI standard as a third year and Mark Hodgkinson, Chris Calvert and Matthew Lee, all from the fourth year, did not look out of place when they played for the first XI against QEGS.

Under 14

he Under 14's had a good start to the season. Before half-term the team, led by Robert Sissons, won all three of its matches, against Arnold, King William's College, and Hutton Grammar School. In the opening game at Arnold, our bowlers struggled to get any real consistency and allowed the opposition to get 147 runs in 30 overs. Valloire, December 2002

es, it was meant to be Châtel, but at very short notice Mr Scott was informed of a change in location due to the lack of snow in the Northern Alps. Valloire, a very attractive French 'station village' in the Savoie Alpes, was the new venue. KGS had visited here at Easter in 1992 and so some of the older staff remembered it.



field course prepared to depart for Scarborough. Once the minibuses were packed, we were ready to set off east over the pennines.

Helen Thrower again thrilled the audience with another exceptional display of dancing which has led her to national success. The Concert Band, Orchestra and the newly formed String Group played. The Girls' Choir performed a varied programme from Bryan Adams to Lerner and Loewe. The Choir performed arrangements of

three well known pieces, 'I got rhythm' and 'Tea for Two' were followed by 'In the Mood'.



The Old Hall was the setting for a performance of 'I was a Good Lil Girl til...', a powerful piece about the suffragette movement which was very effectively conveyed with Jenni Gill as Mrs Pankhurst and Ian Duncan as Mr Asquith in a cast of 15. Meanwhile, in the MPH, another group was setting up 'Titanic' using the fixed seating to convey the idea of the Titanic's ruptured sides. Vicky Biggs and Isobel Morley took us through a music hall interpretation of this tragedy, their humourous contributions pointing up the harsh facts of this piece.

We were delighted to welcome a theatrical make up artist into school to pass on her expertise and skills to members of the fourth and fifth form GCSE groups. In total some 60 students were able to spend time with Louise Grant from 'Grimas' and to gain hands on experience. Louise has worked a great deal in television and was able to let us into the secrets of how that perfect black eye is achieved in 'Hollyoaks' or 'Coronation Street'. Alex Dean was given 'a right shiner' which had members of staff



what had been going on....Lauren Emery volunteered to be aged by about 50 years and astounded all by the transformation that she underwent. There were one or two nasty injuries too, including gunshots to the head, severed wrists and burns. On a lighter note, Louise was able to help us with the designs for the make up for 'Grimm Tales' and we had great fun trying on beards, feathers and a range of prosthetic noses while trying to create the right mood and atmosphere for both the piece and the characters.

This year's dramatic production was 'Grimm Tales', an adaptation of some of the best known and best loved fairy tales from Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm. There were lots of 'firsts' in this production: Juniors worked alongside the Upper Sixth for the first time, the new lighting system installed in the MPH and so generously sponsored by 'The Friends' was put through its maiden voyage by Mrs Alison Walker and the enormous stage of the MPH was given a totally new look by Mr Hill's huge steel and corrugated card structure.

The interpretation of the piece was to be as far removed from the saccharine sweet idea of fairy tales as possible, with the cast dressed as 'urban warriors' inhabiting a tunnel, damp and graffitied, stuffed with junk, old washing machines and rusting bicycles. The cast created their costumes themselves and a very able group of GCSE Drama students added the finishing touches with make up which ranged from tribal markings through to full face paint for a dog and a lion! The accompanying sounds for the world of chaos and disorder which the cast created were splendidly provided by the improvisations of Hannah Smith on organ and Martin Cropper on drums. Evan Beswick created six original electronic pieces for the interval music, all of which did a great deal to convey the quirkiness of this grim world. Megan Davies added to this, too, with her hauntingly breathy rendition of a song which captured a longing for the innocence of childhood.

The evening began with the Sixth Form's presentation of 'Hansel and Gretel', with Janyll Rawlins as a very compelling witch. Rebecca Ridley and Travis Peters were the unfortunate children, lost

in the forest who eventually meet up again with their father, played very memorably by Andrew Gregson.

In 'Iron Hans', Freddie Buxton and Oliver Fisher headed up a very strong cast in a tale which allowed these two talented young actors to play good comic roles.

'The Lady and the Lion' gave Maddie Eaves and Nick Rhodes an opportunity to show off the strength of their acting partnership as a couple who lose sight of each other, largely because the boy keeps turning into different animals!



Act Two opened with 'Aschputtel', or Cinderella as we more commonly call it, with Hannah Spacey as a very compelling Aschputtel.



The evening was rounded off by the seniors again in 'The Golden Goose', with Andrew Gregson also playing three sons.



CCF SUMMER CAMP **WARCOP, JULY 2003**

hat an excellent send off for Colonel Sayer! The weather was fine, the training was excellent and the cadets performed superbly - it could not have been better. We even brought home some trophies!

After three consecutive years at Cultybraggan (one forced because of foot and mouth), it was good to have a change of venue and locate at our own brigade camp in Cumbria. Warcop has always been a favourite and much frequented in the past. As our CSM said in his valedictory speech, his first day spent as a cadet was at Warcop and so was his last. This moving farewell brought even the hardest NCO's close to tears. It is not usual at the end of camp to see the CSM and CO hugging each other through bleary eyes. In the Preston and District Volleyball League






Gazette Young Seasiders Arts and Crafts Exhibition
