

HEADMASTER'S FOREWORD

The year 2007/08 has been a very significant and successful year in the school's development. I travel widely in my role and I have been struck by the fact that whereas at one stage people would ask "where is Kirkham Grammar School", the developments of recent years have put us very much on the educational map. The school maintains many of its traditions but now, thanks to the Governors' foresight, has a magnificent set of modern facilities to match the family atmosphere of which we are all so proud.

To those new to the school they have missed the mixed pleasures of sitting in the temporary teaching rooms that had rather overstayed their welcome after 20 plus years. As we now enjoy our new classrooms within the Waite building, it is with real pride that we can oversee our school campus boasting the best facilities in the area.

I have always believed that the best schools provide a wide range of challenges for their pupils. These challenges take many forms and are not solely the obvious one of providing appropriate challenge within the classroom. Challenge will be different for every single pupil and what for one youngster will be easy for another can be a major hurdle requiring courage and fortitude to overcome. That is why I place great emphasis on the breadth of what we provide at school. We cannot be successful at everything but in a school providing scope for finding new avenues to explore and new challenges to meet, we have ample opportunity to experience the exhilaration of overcoming any adversity.

As the renowned 19th Century Tory PM Disraeli wrote:

"There is no education like adversity."—

And one thought expressed by Washington Irving that I find helpful in difficult times:

"Little minds are tamed and subdued by misfortune; but great minds rise above it."—

It is only when we are stretched that we find out our real capabilities and it is my belief that our pupils benefit from this challenge in so many different ways at school. Their busy lives act as a real preparation for the life beyond our walls and that they grasp the opportunities both in their studies and amidst all the other activities on offer is testament to that willingness to meet the challenges placed before them. This has never been more evident than in this last academic year, which has seen an array of successes for individuals, teams and school as a whole.

The central challenge within any school is the pursuit of the highest academic goals attainable and I am pleased to report that our public examination candidates have done us proud this year. Another hugely successful set of A level results saw the Upper Sixth students off to a wide variety of University destinations and almost universally to the institution of their first choice. No less than 61% of grades were awarded at A/B level with a pass mark at 99%. This is the fourth consecutive year that the proportion of high grades was over 60%. Outstanding individual performances were recorded by Christopher Box who gained no less than six A grades, while Clare Newbery and Jenny Patel followed closely with five grades at the top level. Alex Chow was identified as having a mark within the top ten nationally in Further Mathematics, while Adam Calvert was recognised as scoring one of the top five marks nationally in Business Studies. Overall no less than ten students gained four A grades while fifteen amassed a minimum of three.

Another of the most important challenges for all schools is to ensure that students access the best possible courses and venues for their further education. This has become the subject of a constant press enquiry regarding the issue of access for those who appear socially disadvantaged. The corollary to this is the potential threat to students within the Independent sector. I am pleased to report that both through analysis of our own experiences and the research carried out by ISC that Independent Schools are in fact having even greater success in gaining places at the top Universities. The simple fact is that the Universities want the best-qualified students and are wholly resistant to interference in their ability to choose these candidates. Certainly this year we were delighted with both the level of offers received by our candidates and by the breadth of courses and Universities they have accessed. Pleasingly all three of our students who received offers from Oxbridge this year were successful in achieving entry. Christopher Box, Jonathon Jacobs and Rose Whitehead all take up their places at Oxford buoyed by the news that recent Captain of School Lucy Martin gained first Class Honours from her Oxford College this summer. In congratulating Lucy it is clear that the challenges do not end at school.

GCSE results reached even greater heights with nearly half of all grades at A or A* and no less than 21% at the very top grade. Individually, special mention must be given to Emily Fisher who gained a full set of A* grades. This outstanding performance was so closely followed by a further fourteen students who gained a complete set of ten A/A* grades with twenty scoring a minimum of nine at this high level.

The academic challenge is a part of a broader spectrum at KGS however and these achievements are complemented by those in other arenas often on the National stage. This year saw the Debating team gain outstanding success. Long a popular House event, debating has gone from strength to strength at school and this year Caitlin McMillan and Grace



Garlington successfully argued their way to the National Finals held at the Oxford Union. Overcoming local competition and the regional round in Manchester they went on to perform confidently in those hallowed rooms where so many great figures of our past have begun their careers. The occasion did not overcome them and although they were not victorious in the final itself, the girls' achievement proved a suitable finale to an outstandingly successful Debating year from all those involved.

In the sporting arena our teams met with conspicuous success in National Competition. Perhaps pride of place this year must go to the Senior Sevens Squad for their triumph in the National Schools Sevens Competition at Fylde and the Northern Sevens at Birkenhead. Close victories against lvybridge and Hymers respectively illustrated not only the ability of the squad but also the determination to succeed under pressure. In the National event at Fylde Daniel Bibby was awarded player of the tournament and I will long recall the manner in which Tom Bowden responded after running in so many tries to overcome cramp in order to defend the lead bravely in the final. Individually Kieran Brookes must be congratulated on his International Cap for Ireland Under 18's in the European competition. There were other successes in the oval ball game where the Under 16 team were runners up in the North West Floodlit Cup and the Under 13 XV similarly successful in the Lancashire Cup.

It is healthy that at KGS both girls and boys vie for centre stage in their sporting pursuits and this year was no exception. As if not to be outdone, the Junior girls battled through the early rounds of the National Athletics Competition. Their reward was a trip to Hull for the National final against the top dozen schools in the country. A very wet start saw them fall behind but some outstanding individual performances saw the team pick up points in the latter stages to finish an exceptional sixth. What was notable was the fact that the other schools were all predominantly big city schools, which puts the magnitude of the girl's achievement in context. Overall in our Athletics this year we met with conspicuous success with both girls and boys dominating the Fylde Coast area and reaching regional finals.

In hockey the girls also met with success as the 1st XI regained the Lancashire Cup under Jenny Bowden's leadership. Their achievement was one borne of great spirit and determination, battling through two penalty shootouts rather than winning with pure superiority. They may also certainly have benefited from their exciting tour to Barbados, which provided an ideal training camp in mid-February! Individually our congratulations go to Nicole Pike who captained Scotland Under 17 in the Home Nations Championship. The Under 12's also met success in winning their first County title in an exciting contest.

I was pleased to note also the news that our Under 13 Tennis team battled through to the North West finals by winning their County Competition. Top pair Jodie Hope and Olivia Bence led the way through a good competition and we await the outcome of the next round.

There were many other sporting highlights this year in an array of different sports but I have been struck by the constant theme that has run through our pupils' achievements - that of sheer grit and determination. This quality has been exhibited by so many of our pupils who have committed themselves to either A or B teams in a vast array of different sports. Sport must always take its place amongst the breadth of opportunity within school and I am

always careful that we achieve balance both in our reporting and our provision but I have felt that this year, the manner in which our sporting teams have both competed and achieved success has epitomised so much that is good about our school and the way they have met the challenges facing them, battling and so often performing above themselves, was worthy of special mention tonight.

In mentioning the balance that is so important within school it has also been evident that in other spheres the school has had rather a special year. Our Upper Sixth musicians from last year have provided us with so much pleasure but in this their final year we had to make the most of their talents for one final time. The array of varied musical disciplines and the sheer joy of music-making were evident throughout. Whether it was Ashley Parkinson and James Edgar on the guitar or indeed singing; Rose Whitehead on the piano; Jenny Patel dazzling us on the Marimba, Xylophone or with her own singing, or Alex Chow with his mesmerising piano playing, they all provided us with a year of great entertainment. I am sure that Music Secretary, Suzanne Midgley was proud to lead such a team and also to emerge victorious on her clarinet in the House music competition in such a year. I commend all our musicians for an outstanding years' entertainment which has been enjoyed by many appreciative audiences.

Our Drama Department has set its own challenge after years of exuberant productions. They have now to reach a similar peak of performance annually by involving not only a multitude of performers but also teasing out the star quality from the main characters. The Taming of the Shrew once again did not disappoint, set within a Country & Western setting and giving license to some wonderful accents, and excellent performances in lead roles by Alice Whitehead and Benedict Fulford-Brown, supported by an outstanding cast. Beyond this annual production it has been pleasing to see the sheer number of pupils and staff participating in the regular theatre trips.

Not all the activities undertaken by our pupils take place within the school campus and some of the most challenging moments in a school career can come in the fells on a Duke of Edinburgh award expedition or amidst an initiative test on adventure training with the Cadet force. It has been a feature of the year that the D of E has grown so much in stature under Mr Callister and Mrs Sutcliffe's leadership. Much greater numbers now participate in this excellent award to complement the work undertaken within the CCF. Our Cadet force remains strong receiving national recognition as one of the strongest in the country. The combination of the excellent camps held this year, alongside regular field days and the burgeoning BTEC award provide further opportunity to explore the varied aspects of school life.

Challenges may not come in any major school activity but could be just leaving home for the first time on a school trip. Last year our students explored widely on a variety of visits including trips to Barbados, Italy, Normandy, Germany and the Alps alongside many other equally valuable excursions within the UK itself. Such opportunities afford youngsters with great experiences and wonderful memories but represent a challenge for all concerned and particularly for those organising and taking charge of these expeditions. The responsibility and preparation that is involved seems to increase annually and I must express my gratitude to all my colleagues who are so ready to take on these responsibilities to provide such a variety of experience for our students.

One of our key responsibilities within school is in ensuring we consider those less fortunate than ourselves and I am pleased to report that our Charity Committee has had another very busy and successful year. The centrepiece at Christmas saw a talent show look-alike with "KGS Has Talent". Further less high profile work continued throughout the year, however, with nearly £10,000 being raised for chosen causes. Always poignant is the visit of the Chernobyl children, an occasion that is humbling in so many ways.

The limits of time preclude me from mentioning all the multitude of different activities that go on in school but I must pay tribute to the increasing array of Clubs and Societies on offer and the willingness of our senior pupils to take a lead in developing these valuable opportunities alongside members of staff. They all play such a crucial role in developing enthusiasm, engaging perhaps minority interests and giving balance and variety within school. Be it LAMDA awards with over 100 enrolled, or Maths Challenge to Warhammer Club or Craft Club they are all an important part of the jigsaw that is KGS.

Each year the family that is Kirkham Grammar School experiences a degree of change. Not only do a cohort of students move on to pastures new but also a number of staff move on to new challenges, be they in another school or the busy life of retirement. We are fortunate at KGS to benefit from healthy stability yet some change is inevitable. This year we said goodbye to Mr Smith who has held the position of Head of Boarding for over 15 years and worked at KGS for nearly 29 years. His contribution to boarding within school has been inestimable as exemplified by the recent inspection where all gradings were at the top level. He has also played a key role in developing school sport during his time in the PE department and also as Development Officer worked to provide the funds and impetus for the Technology Development that now graces the school campus. His commitment to school can be no better shown than by his eagerness that School House won the Whitby cup each year and by his dedication to teaching Junior Science. Mr Smith was committed to the philosophy of providing challenges for pupils to meet and in setting the bar high. His faith in young people served them well. He leaves with our best wishes and gratitude.

Mrs Jones has sadly retired a little early owing to ill health. Her contribution to the English Department has been significant, not just in inspiring a stream of students into a love of literature but also in pioneering the introduction of English Language at A-level and leading the Young writers Club. We wish her a swift recovery from recent illness and best wishes for retirement.

We also said goodbye this year to Mrs Miller who has played such a valuable role in providing us with a high quality of music over the years. Plagued by illness of late it does not though seem long since Mrs Miller was leading the girl's choir or indeed showing her compassion and concern for her pupils as Head of Year. We wish her also a swift recovery from ill health.

Mr Reeves is a Kirkhamian in the fullest sense of the word. As a student here he enjoyed an excellent reputation in many walks of school life while upon his return as a teacher he threw himself into the KGS system in every sense. A talented Physics teacher, a committed CCF officer and a sports coach who gained notable success were the immediate conclusions. Mr Reeves went on however to add to his portfolio of duties by taking Fylde House from a sleeping giant to champion house overnight. We trust he will be

successful in meeting his own new challenge as Head of Physics at Leicester Grammar School.

Mrs Amey seems only to have just arrived and yet it has been four years since she joined the Religious Studies Department and testimony to her success in that short time that I had no hesitation in appointing her to Head of Department last year. She has been highly thought of by both staff and pupils and we wish her well as she travels the world before settling in Australia.

Before I close I would like to dwell a moment on an oftignored aspect of school life and that is the work of our support staff. In the modern educational world their role is ever more central and challenging. We are fortunate currently to benefit from an outstanding team of people who look after our school. They ensure that it is running smoothly administratively, looking clean and well maintained, ensuring the finances are sound, grounds are ready for our sports, telephones calls are received efficiently and warmly, medical attention is expert and on hand, bags are collected after school, repairs are carried out urgently, lockers are accessed, pupils are registered in school, stationery is delivered, the curriculum and pupil welfare are supported, very importantly that we are all fed, and the list goes on and on. This level of service received currently at school has no parallel in my experience in educational establishments, and I congratulate Mrs Brown and the varied teams of support staff on the success of their contribution to the school over recent years.

I am no believer in complacency. Any institution must not rest on its laurels and KGS has no history of that. The story is still unfolding and the challenges remain. But in the same way that our pupils relish the challenge, so do we as teachers and governors. We want our school to go from strength to strength and after this one opportunity for reflection we move on to face the clear challenges of continuing to move our school forward amidst the difficult economic climate, a declining school age population nationally, forthcoming charitable legislation and ongoing curricular change. Yet I am always minded of the words of Henry Ford who rejoined that:

"When everything seems to be going against you, remember that the aeroplane takes off against the wind, not with it."—

We shall relish the challenges and will work hard to ensure that the school sustains its development and matches our youngsters in meeting their challenges and thus fulfilling the words of our founding fathers:

Paul Smith

Paul trained as a teacher at Loughborough University and after teaching in London was appointed to KGS as Assistant Physical Education teacher in 1979, the year KGS took the major step from being a state to an independent school again. He immediately contributed enthusiastically to the work of the department in a unique way, never being afraid to think 'out of the box' and initiate ideas and practices which would be for the benefit of the pupils.

He took on a heavy workload, taking over responsibility for swimming, coaching rugby and introduced a GCSE PE syllabus.

He coached the under 15 and under 12 rugby teams until 1992, achieving much success with both teams. He did 'see the bigger picture' and fully accepted that his responsibility was primarily to develop skills and attitudes in junior players which would equip them to play at the highest level on reaching the first XV squad. He avoided the 'win all the matches this season' mentality which can sometimes be achieved at the expense of developing the skills required in the more mature teams. He believed that personal discipline was essential for success, as without this players lack the qualities needed to realise their potential.

In 1992, when he moved from the PE department to become Development and Marketing Manager, he still managed the time in a busy schedule to coach the under 12 XV for a few years. He also coached at representative level, coaching North Lancashire under 15 XV from 1980 until 1986, when he took over the Lancashire under 16 XV. He was uniquely successful, being the first county under 16 coach to achieve two consecutive unbeaten seasons, including an unbeaten tour to Portugal, where Lancashire beat the national team.

He led KGS tours to many countries, including Denmark, Germany, Holland, France, Spain, Portugal and Jersey, also being in charge of the time-consuming fund-raising for

He was also responsible for the fundraising of the first XV World Tour in 1987, in which £52,000 was raised in thirteen months! The fundraising culminated in a dinner at the Guild Hall, Preston which 589 people attended which was a record for that venue. During this venture he gained considerable experience of fundraising and was grateful to Bob Ribchester and Roy Wilkinson for passing on their knowledge. This led indirectly to his future appointment outside teaching as already mentioned.

In 1979, he also became teacher in charge of swimming, developing a regular fixture list for boys and girls and initiating training for boys and girls teams at 8 o'clock twice weekly. Age groups were successful in the Inter Grammar, which became the Senior School Championships, which were of a very high standard. He also organised the swimming section of this high quality, yet now sadly defunct, organisation for many years.

He coached the senior boys hockey team in 1979 to 1980. even playing in a match against an adult team to strengthen the side.

In the summer term he was one of only two coaches who coached all six boys athletics teams with much success, coaching every lunchtime and after school, except Friday when junior matches were usually held.

Paul taught Chemistry and Physics up to GCSE from 1984

onwards, except for the years when he was in development and marketing, teaching with the same commitment to high standards.

In 1992, as previously stated, he took a radical change of career to become the Development and Marketing Manager for KGS. He was central to KGS letting facilities for community use long before this became Government wishes. He was involved with the governors in deciding that new buildings should be built in the original character of the school. The first development in which he was involved was the building of the new Sixth Form Centre, music facilities and the Lodge, which received a civic award.

The main thrust of the development of the school at the time was that of developing technology. He was involved in running an appeal for raising funds to develop technology at KGS. British Aerospace awarded sponsorship and KGS became an 'International Centre for the Development of Technology in Education' linked to BAe Systems. A partnership was formed between Loughborough University, BAe and KGS with the aim of furthering technology teaching in schools. This resulted in the visit of the Secretary of State for Education to KGS to view the development.

Additionally a partnership was formed between the Malaysian Government, BAe and KGS which resulted in two presentations given by Paul to the Malaysian Minister for Education. At this time technology was taught in temporary buildings, but the school raised money for the present superb Technology Centre after Paul had stepped down from his post in 1996. Paul had been fully involved in the exciting development of technology at KGS which became acclaimed internationally.

In 1993, as he was developing his new role, he was asked at short notice to take over the running of the Boarding House on a temporary basis. However, in 1994, he was approached by the governors to make this a permanent appointment. Despite the combination of two arduous workloads, he asked the governors to advertise the post and was the successful applicant from a formidable list. He was instrumental in developing a child-centred environment, having the philosophy "this is their home".

He was responsible for much upgrading and many developments in facilities, removing large dormitories and replacing them with personal rooms and leisure/study

Backed by the governors, KGS bucked the national trend of decreasing numbers wishing to take up boarding places and became oversubscribed. Three inspections were carried out while Paul was in charge, the first one by the Social Services, meriting a "Good" rating, while two later ones by the DFSE gave "Excellent" ratings. Paul continued in this role until his retirement this summer.

Throughout his time in the profession Paul strove for excellence in all he did.

Those familiar with the workload involved in running the Boarding House and being Marketing and Development Manager were aware of the extreme effort required to carry out these roles simultaneously and yet he never flinched in carrying out these duties to the best of his ability.

Paul has made a huge, unique contribution to KGS and its pupils and he has earned a long, restful and very happy retirement.

Yvonne Jones

This year KGS bade a sad farewell to a member of staff who has since 1984 – perhaps an appropriate date! - been a real part of the fabric of the school: Mrs Yvonne Jones. It is perhaps fitting that this pillar of the English Department should have left us at the same time as the English Department left its base in the Wareing Buildings for a new home in the Waite block – as if Yvonne was such a fixture of the Department that her leaving necessitated a physical as well as a metaphorical relocation!


Mrs Jones will be remembered with great affection by generations of school children who have benefited from her genuine care for her charges and love of the task of teaching. Plutarch wrote that "A mind is a fire to be kindled, not a vessel to be filled", and this was always Mrs Jones' belief — no-one who entered her room could doubt her passion for English in all its forms — and her enthusiasm was truly infectious, as all of her pupils will testify.

It is often said that teaching is an acting profession, and Yvonne would agree with this: her classroom was a stage in which her pupils performed. Active learning was integral to her teaching approach: Shakespeare was not a dry dusty text to be studied academically, but a script to be acted and, most of all, enjoyed. And, of course, enjoyment engenders achievement, and those thousands of pupils lucky enough to be taught by Mrs Jones found themselves stretched and challenged, often without realising that that was what was happening!

Before the establishment of a separate drama department Yvonne directed several acclaimed school plays, including The Crucible, The Importance of Being Earnest and The Caucasian Chalk Circle. She was also a great believer in the importance of public speaking, setting up the School's first LAMDA lessons and successfully entering teams for local Public Speaking competitions, including Rotary and the BPW. And perhaps her proudest achievement in the latter years of her career here was the setting up of "Writers in School", a group that enabled large numbers of pupils to enjoy poetry writing, and to experience the thrill of having their work published.

Yvonne now enters a well-deserved and, we all hope, long and happy retirement, and is looking forward to spending more time gardening, and enjoying the company of her husband, Bob, and her new walking companion, Gizmo the dandie dinmont! We all hope that she will now also be able to gain her advanced drivers' certificate – something Yvonne has secretly been yearning to achieve for many years now. We wish her well – Kirkham Grammar School will miss her – but we hope that she will be a frequent visitor to the school.







As we drew closer to Christmas we opted to support the 'alternative' Christmas presents offered by so many relief agencies, and were able to send a wide variety of items ranging from emergency relief packs to mosquito nets – and also animals – including several hairy yaks, buffalos, donkeys, pigs, turkeys and chickens.

MUSIC

The 2007-08 year in the Music Department started with an excellent Coffee Concert presented at the end of September by the Music Scholars of the second and third years. November saw a series of concerts, beginning with a Coffee Concert presented by three upper sixth form musicians, Suzanne Midgley, Jenny Patel and James Edgar. Suzanne and Jenny then had the wonderful experience of playing with the Lancashire Youth Concert Band in the National Festival of Music for Youth at the Royal Albert Hall in London. During this concert, Jenny performed Rossini's William Tell Overture in an arrangement for xylophone and concert band.

Three concerts in the space of eight days in late November began with a concert entitled 'A Celebration of Talent', given by musicians from the first year. A wide variety of excellent solo performances showed the great wealth of talent present in the year. A week later it was the turn of three of our upper sixth form musicians to present a charity concert that raised a significant amount of money for heart research. James Edgar and Ashley Parkinson (guitars and vocals) have presented similar charity concerts for the past two years and this year, their final year at KGS, they were joined by Rose Whitehead (piano) in a most professional and enjoyable performance. The final concert took place on Friday, 23rd November at Park Street Methodist Church, Lytham and was performed in support of NCH, the Methodist Church Children's Charity. The Orchestra, Concert Band and String Group were joined by soloists in a concert performed to a large appreciative audience.

The Choirs performed to their usual high standard in the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at St Michael's Church and on the following day they were joined by members of the various instrumental ensemble (Orchestra, Concert Band and String Group) in a very well supported Christmas Concert. The Autumn Term drew to a close with a final Coffee Concert, this time presented by fifth form GCSE students.

The Spring Term is always a very busy term and we once more welcomed the Band of King's Division to KGS. The members of our Concert Band greatly benefited from taking part in a workshop with the Band before presenting a joint concert in the MPH. Later in the term over twenty musicians from the second year presented a very varied evening concert in the Old Hall. March started with a hectic three days of auditions for the House Music Festival. Once again,

there was a very large and varied entry, with over 400 performers vying for a place in the Finals, which were held at the end of the month. The adjudicator in the Finals was Mr Barratt's brother, Timothy Barratt, who is Professor of Piano at the Royal Academy of Music, and he chose Suzanne Midgley's performance on the clarinet as the winning solo entry, closely followed by Sarah Quarmby (Cello) and Ashley Parkinson (Drum Kit). The Ensemble winners were Helen Kelsall, Charlotte Lewis and Chloe Walker, who sang a gospel arrangement; the composition class was won by Amy Wilson and School House won the House Choir Class.

Saturday, 8 March saw the String Group and Concert Band being invited to take part in the 'Celebration of the Best in Youth Music' alongside five local schools at the Guild Hall, Preston. This prestigious charity event, organised by the Rotary Club of Preston, gave our ensembles a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate their musicianship in front of an audience of over 1000 people. The Spring Term was brought to a close with Founders' Day, during which the Choir performed excellently, and the Gala Concert, when the winners of the House Music performed to a packed Old Hall.

At the beginning of the Summer Term, the Choir had the experience of singing with 100 strong Lytham St Annes Choral Society in performances of Fauré's Requiem and The Armed Man by Karl Jenkins. Performing with a professional orchestra is always a treat for singers and a very large audience in the MPH gave the choirs a standing ovation at the end of the concert, during which Grace Garlington and Helen Kelsall were excellent soloists.

A very enjoyable Coffee Concert was given at the beginning of May by sixth form musicians Suzanne Midgley, Amy Wilson and Tom Fielding, who accompanied his sister Lucy (violin) on the piano. The final formal concert of the year came with the Spring Concert on Thursday, 8 May, during which all the various school ensembles performed alongside soloists, who included a number of upper sixth musicians who have been loyal participants in music throughout their time in school, James Edgar, Suzanne Midgley, Ashley Parkinson, Jennifer Patel and Rose Whitehead.

On Friday, 9th May the String Group was invited once again to perform at Preston Guild Hall prior to one of the Royal Liverpool Orchestra's regular concerts.

DRAMA

What's the connection between line-dancing, misogyny and the Bard of Avon? Those who were fortunate enough to secure tickets for the sell-out performances of this year's KGS play know the answer: Shakespeare's The Taming of the Shrew!

The sexual politics of this story is a real challenge to a modern audience: and this is the challenge that Ms Barrie confidently accepted in her production. Her leads, Benedict Fulford-Brown as Petruchio, and Alice Whitehead as the Shrew, Katherina, bore out their roles with aplomb. Alice was the epitome of the "wild Kate", and Hannah Duckworth's beautiful but placid Bianca was an excellent foil to Alice's energy and (disturbing!) violence. Kate was well matched by Benedict: his Petruchio embodied the enigmatic combination of humour and cruelty in his "Taming" of Katherina.

So why the American context? Ms Barrie's "Cast of Thousands" included many talented dancers and musicians, and the audience was captivated by the country-and-western classics belted out by the vocalists, fronted by Melissa McCarthy and Sarah Dickie, and the duelling guitars and drums of the band. And the visual and aural excitement afforded by the line-dancing was justification enough for the choice of setting.

There were, of course, a number of set-pieces to treasure: Matt Edgar's Hortensio wearing the guitar (or lute!) that "Kate the curst" has broken over his head; the Tailor (Joe Casson) in tears after Petruchio's assassination of his beautiful dress. However, perhaps the most startling – and genuinely frightening – parts of the play belonged to the Cronies, who with their Gothic costume and makeup reminiscent of Kubrick's A Clockwork Orange threatened to steal the stage.

All those who assisted in this theatrical triumph deserve both praise and thanks, whether as actors, musicians, or as part of the Crew, without whom the play could never have been produced. And, of course, the audience and cast alike would wish to thank Ms Barrie and Mrs Walker, the Director and her assistant, as well as the Musical Director Graeme Barrie and the Choreographer, Liz Cross.

But who received the loudest ovation as the curtain fell? All the cast were vociferously cheered by the audience, but the Pantomime Horse (Cerys Buck and Rachel Kitchen) bore






away the prize! And indeed, the greatest testament to the success of the production was the enthusiastic response of the audience. "Disgusted of Tunbridge Wells" is often heard complaining about directors "mucking around with Shakespeare" – but no-one had the temerity to make such a criticism of this performance. For ultimately Shakespeare was a showman – and I can confidently give the greatest compliment possible to any troupe of actors performing the works of the Bard: Shakespeare would have LOVED it!

Lucy Knowles recalls: "On this day our group took the challenge of going up Catbells, which we knew would be hard, especially with our heavy rucksacks. We found it really challenging, but determination was shown by everyone; there were many steep parts of the walk and at one time we were almost rock climbing!"





The June expedition took place in the south of the Lake District, whilst the two Gold groups travelled from Elterwater to Coniston taking in Wasdale and Eskdale.

Enjoying better weather than most this summer, the groups all demonstrated fantastic team morale and camping skills. Even navigation skills were impressive, apart from the Silver group on the first day, who travelled north for three miles when they should have been going south!

Heather Cara was part of an all girl group and she explains the feelings of her group after their wildcamp at Angle Tarn, "It felt absolutely amazing to wake up in utter silence, to find our tents were surrounded by cloud and that we had managed to survive the night on our own." Another member of that gold group, Alice Whitehead, writes, "Our third day of the four showed me the importance of motivation and team work within a group. We knew we had set ourselves a challenge on this day, walking 24km with our packs, but by 5pm we still had 9km to go and I had lost all my energy, but the team pulled together and we made it to our campsite."

BIOLOGY

Field Trip

We set off for Malham in glorious September sunshine, lifting our spirits for the tasks ahead. The 'pit-stop' at Clitheroe service station gave a welcome opportunity to stock up on chocolate and other treats to boost energy levels. On arrival at the field centre, we were directed to our rooms. The girls were pleased with their cosy rooms close to the laboratory and the boys occupied the newly refurbished High Stables block in the top section of the woods. This proved to be very entertaining later that night when only the teachers had taken torches and the boys had to use mobile phones to light the path through the woods to their rooms.

Our first afternoon was spent kick sampling in Gordale Beck which runs out of Malham Tarn. We enthusiastically identified the numerous freshwater invertebrates and many students decided that it was a great location for their coursework investigation and planned to return two days later. The small 'Bull –head' fish that were in some of the nets created much interest, but Grace decided that leeches were more fascinating and tried an impromptu experiment to see if one could suck blood from her wrist.

On return to the centre, the afternoon teas and cakes were very well received and became a much anticipated highlight of each day. At first the prospect of evening lectures seemed daunting, but this became part of the Field work experience and allowed thorough discussion of the data collected.

The next day was spent on the bog at the edge of Malham Tarn. The boardwalk to the study area took us through the rare protected habitat of this National Trust and SSI designated area.

The bog plants were quite difficult to identify but everyone worked very well to ensure successful collection of data along two transects. Some students were a little unlucky in their allocation of sample sites. Tommy's wellie disappeared in the bog and had to be dug out, by which time his toes were rather cold. Back at the field centre we celebrated Amanda Yu's 18th birthday with a huge chocolate cake. Fiona had done a great job getting the cake and candles to the field centre and Amanda was totally surprised. Having eaten a massive evening meal, including chocolate pudding and sauce, we did not do justice to the cake, but it allowed us to save some to take back to the boarding house to share with Amanda's friends.

We were very fortunate with the weather throughout the

field course, only experiencing a short shower on the Woodland Ecology day. Our experience of sampling techniques grew and all felt confident about collecting individual data for coursework investigations. The wide variety of investigation topics was pleasing and the careful planning by each student was very impressive.

Field Work at Ainsdale Sand Dunes 2008

Ainsdale is one of the few sand dunes systems in the world that is still growing. New embryo dunes are forming at the strand line on the beach. Much of the sand deposited here has been washed up the shore from Formby Point which is gradually being eroded by high tides and storms.

Sixth form biologists investigated the types of plants found along a belt transect across the sand dune system. In effect this shows the changes going back in time as the dunes next to the coast road were made about 200 years ago.

We had a considerable walk along the beach to the study site as wind blown sand had made a thick layer over the car park that could have stopped the mini bus in its tracks. In fact, in a reconnaissance trip two days before, the staff did try to drive on this section and had to be towed off the beach by the Sefton borough council land-rover.

Despite the rather cold June weather, we collected accurate data using point quadrats that had been specially made by our school caretakers. These quadrats were ideal for sampling the dense vegetation without flattening it. The transect led us over the highest dune ridge and down into a large dune hollow where we had to be careful to avoid trampling the lush vegetation and rare orchids.


On our return to school we successfully analysed our data using statistical tests. Our students will reap the benefits of studying this text book example of succession when they sit their Module 5 exam in June.

SCARBOROUGH Geography Field Work

Wednesday, 26th April, the lower sixth geographers and art students combined on their annual trip to sunny Scarborough. Mr Gardiner decided not to lock his car so returned to KGS after ten miles. This divided the two groups, so the geographers continued on to study Saltaire (the Victorian utopian town), whilst the artists visited the Photographic Museum in Bradford.

On arrival at the hotel, we unpacked rapidly as the local castle visit was booked. We were confronted by a party of Germans intent on storming the fortifications. It started to rain so we took shelter from the prevailing conditions and the invaders!

Remember it's not a holiday! The evening work session eventually finished by 9.00pm. Next day was the rivers' day. The groups worked their way downstream on the River Derwent to Forge Valley. Unfortunately, due to recent rain and health and safety regulations, we were limited to only a few sites as the water was too deep. However, the experience of the North Yorks Moors proved quite exciting as several (three!) adders were spotted sunbathing near the river! Not having had enough water, Max and Richard decided that a dip in the South Bay was required. Little did they know that this part of the North Sea is really the Arctic Ocean.



Day two was the study of the heritage industry and flood defences in the ancient city of York. After a walk round the walls to the Fosse Barrier, we visited Clifford's Tower followed by a walk around the old streets of the old centre. After lunch a tour of the Castle Museum was organised – but no shopping! We were treated to a display of army uniform, where Miss Thompson resembled Private Benjamin!

The final day in Scarborough was spent studying the coastal defences around the Marine Drive and south to Bridlington. Cayton Bay was inaccessible due to recent cliff collapse, causing two holiday homes to be demolished! The highlight of the day must have been the arrival of the police van. Mr Scott's son arrived and the group had more fun playing with the sirens and flashers and wearing his helmet!

By Flamborough Head fatigue was setting in, but Mr. Whittle and Miss Thompson took the group around the headland to study the classic chalk coastal features (Mr Scott drove around!). After a final night's work, the busy week ended and we prepared to depart the next day. En route home we spent some more time in York Minster. Catching the end of the Sunday morning service impressed everyone after another walk around the historic walls.

We managed to get home by 4.00pm, despite the fact that Mr Whittle was temporarily misplaced – geographers do not get lost!

NORMANDY TRIP

At 5.00 am in the morning everyone arrived at school with our heavy suitcases. We piled on the bus and little did we know about the memorable weekend to come.

Over twelve hours later, we arrived at our destination, a beautiful chateau with large grounds where we could wander before and after meals. After our first night's sleep, we went to see the Bayeux Tapestry, which having learnt about in the first year made it all the more interesting and enjoyable. We visited the 360 degree cinema, which was very realistic and an eye opener to the experiences of World War II.

The Omaha Beach Cemetery held over 9,000 graves. It was hard to take in that earlier the same day we were running about, having fun on that particular beach when so many people had perished there.

The next morning began with a visit to a traditional market, an opportunity to practise our language skills and a chance to try the local cuisine. From there, we travelled on to a war

museum which entailed several short films and lots to get involved with. When exiting the museum, it was snowing heavily and we couldn't wait to get back to the coach, our safe haven for the weekend. To end this day, we went to a cider farm and got an insight into how it is made (and even got to try a little sip!).


CLIMBING CLUB



COMBINED CADET FORCE

CCF - Barry Buddon Camp

This year's CCF Summer Camp took us north of the border into Scotland to Barry Buddon Training Camp near Dundee. The RAF camp in England at the same time suffered appalling conditions, but we were more fortunate, as we only had one day badly affected by rain.

After a very long coach journey to Victoria Barracks, Ballater, on Royal Deeside, where the adventure training package was based, the party of nearly 50 cadets, together with several officers and former pupils, settled into rather cramped accommodation. Nearly 150 cadets from three different contingents were billeted in rooms designed for about 50 regular soldiers who form the Royal Guard when HRH is in residence at Balmoral.

The training consisted of walks of varying levels of difficulty, from 'bagging' several Monroes (including Lochnagar) in some of the most beautiful parts of the Cairngorm National Park, to a low level circuit of a loch. Another day saw the groups abseiling on a fearsome rock face and kayaking on a nearby lake.

Back at the main training camp we prepared for the first 'green' day on the ranges. The high point of the morning was firing the Light Support Weapon (LSW), which can empty a magazine of 30 rounds in less than 2 seconds! We then returned to be guided over the Obstacle Course by the PTI's. No longer can it be a race over an Assault Course, but H & S deem it to be 'a Confidence Training Area'. So strict was this that each cadet had to declare their own fitness and many asthmatics were disappointed. But it was still made safe fun although sometimes quite wet if confidence was lacking on some of the jumps!

After drying off, our volunteers for the drill competition assembled on the square under the eagle eye of a CSM drill instructor from the Scots Guards - awesome! He gave the



squad some excellent instruction - he must have done, because when it came to the test we were considered the best team over the whole two weeks of camp. This means we came top from about 18 schools . Congratulations to Sgt Grace Garlington, who was the drill NCO, and to all her squad. The evening saw a party of senior cadets go clay pigeon shooting with 12 bore shotguns. Capt Reeves showed his youthful reactions by out-shooting the CO.

The next day was a specialist-training day. This involved a round-robin between first aid, signals, Royal Engineers mine clearing and command tasks, Infantry training on mortars and, the highlight for most, the Royal Horse Artillery who allowed KGS cadets to play with a 105 field gun. Some of our smaller/weaker cadets now realise how heavy this weapon is. This was a great opportunity for our cadets to get their hands on military kit that they do not often see, let alone attempt to break! Cpl Tom Sanders tried to disprove that the drill purpose mortar was 'squaddie-proof!.

We were all building up to the final big infantry exercise. However, at reveille (06:00h every morning!) it was a little wet - no, it was pouring down. Apparently some places in England had had one month's rain in 24 hours the day before! We received it in Scotland the next morning.

"If it ain't rainin' - it ain't trainin'. "

We did manage to complete (survive) the morning package of Survival Exercises. How appropriate this was, as it consisted of making fire, shelters and collecting water! But the most enjoyable instruction was the snaring and preparing of rabbits! The photos of this activity really do show the fun in what most initially thought was quite a gory exercise. By lunchtime it was apparent that the rain was really set in. When our CO saw the condition of the other schools returning from our afternoon ex, the decision was made to 'bug out'. We returned to camp to clean weapons and have a barbeque cum picnic with our operational ration packs under a shelter. Morale was high and although there was much disappointment about the cancelling of the night ex, this was partially alleviated as our CO managed to book the DCCT range for the whole of the last day.

This very expensive small arms trainer is basically a computer video system which can both coach principles of marksmanship and simulate actual battle scenarios with various different shooting techniques, in complete safety. All cadets spent a good couple of hours on this trainer thanks to Sgt Mick Devaney, our new SSI and qualified DCCT custodian. This is a facility we may be able to use at Weeton camp in the future.

The last day also allowed us to pack up, hand in stores and tidy our billets for a speedy hand-over on Saturday and also have our own drill competition. As usual on the last evening we had a presentation. All the officers, cadets and NCO's were thanked by the CO, especially the Old Kirkhamians who gave up their time: Natalie Roberts and Nicola Clough from last year; Collette Gallagher and Charlotte McNeela from previous years and a very old boy, Sgt Mike Ward (a regular Royal Engineer), who helped out on the AT for other schools as well!

The Anzac Trophy for best junior cadet on camp was awarded to Robert Malings of the fourth year, but a special trophy was given to Rhys Williams. Rhys came at the last minute due to a cancellation. He had done no cadet activity at all and he performed superbly all week. Being the only

third year on camp, he thoroughly deserved the special award for all his efforts.

The choice for the Waterloo Trophy, best fifth form cadet, was very difficult indeed. That entire year group performed very well and thoroughly deserved being promoted to lance corporals for next term. The Waterloo Trophy was awarded to Jenny Miller who excelled in our own drill competition, and Mathew Gladwell, who also won the Anzac last year, but every one of the fifth form cadets could have won the award.

All the lower 6th NCO's showed excellent leadership qualities. Promotions were awarded to Lucy Knowles (Sgt), Caitlin MacMillan and Maria Hindley (C/Sgt) and Charles O'Flaherty and Grace Garlington were appointed as our CSM's for next year. The Colonel's Trophy for best junior NCO on camp was awarded to James Moncrieff and he will be next year's Cadet RSM. They all thoroughly deserve their ranks and our congratulations. James was also awarded the shooting trophy for posting the best scores on the range day.

A final thank you and farewell must go to Capt Phil Reeves who has been our Training Officer for the last few years. He is not really saying goodbye, as he will be eligible to attend our central camps in the future, but we will miss his fun and humour on parade days and especially his ability to organise the fire duty!

Adventure Training St John's in the Vale

Early April we set off to the Lake District for our annual adventurous training camp at St John's in the Vale, near Keswick. Last year the weather was fantastic – sunscreen needed for all. How things change over 12 months! It was still in the depths of winter in Cumbria!

This year it was not as oversubscribed as usual, possibly because of other competing trips at the same time. However, the 22 cadets (mostly seniors) had a very testing but enjoyable week under the quite extreme weather conditions. The activities varied between the usual orienteering and mountain biking with a 24 hour expedition walking out to Patterdale and returning the next day via Helvellyn. Because of the snow conditions it was impossible to do Striding Edge, but the trek over Sticks Pass was quite interesting in such arduous conditions. All cadets discovered how to really read a map and prepare for a 24 hour expedition without the need for mobile phones or hair straighteners!

One new adventure was added this year. At the Honister slate mines there is a Via Ferrata, which follows the route the old miners used to follow to climb to work. This quite steep scramble is similar to the methods Italian mountain troops devised to climb in the Dolomites safely as they were clipped on to an iron ropeway – the via ferrata. All the cadets found this activity very challenging, especially as several inches of fresh snow had fallen, even at valley level. It was almost like being in the Alps! After lunch the groups were then given a guided tour of the slate mines with an idea of how hard it was to work in those conditions 100 years ago!

This may be the reason why Sqn Ldr Callister is thinking of a change of both format and location for our next AT camp. He is thinking of trying to take a group to the French Alps to do similar activities which would be run by a commercial company, possibly in the summer of 2009!

All activities were competitive and each section was assessed on everything from orienteering, mountain biking and even the kitchen duties. Congratulations to CSM Ben Blackburn and all his section on winning the competition. The usual last night fun and festivities were enjoyed by all, but there were a few wet cadets who had not experienced the mess games introduced by Captains Miller and Reeves.

All in all, another highly successful AT camp and the CO's most sincere thanks must go to all the staff involved, especially all those who camped out every night (in quite harsh conditions!) so that the expedition could take place.





Taking over the first XV from Mr Gornall was always going to be a daunting task. New captain Richard de Carpentier, however, did have the support of at least eleven other upper sixth who had experience of first XV rugby from the previous year. This and the fact that many boys came back fitter than in previous years made my job a lot easier than I anticipated.

Manchester Grammar School was dispatched 54-0 in the first match of the season, which showed Kirkham had much ability and a willingness to run from everywhere. The next match was against Colston's, whom Kirkham have never beaten at the fifteen-a-side game, and had not even come close away from home. This time it was different. Kirkham played with confidence and no little skill and deserved to be further ahead than just a Joe Brown penalty at half time. James Edgar was outstanding in this match and caused problems for Colston's all afternoon. However, Colston's did come back strongly in the second half and went 8-3 ahead. Kirkham showed resolve and fought back despite being hindered by a yellow carding. Tom Bowden scored a try after outsprinting the Colston's defence from seventy metres. Later on Kirkham had the chance to win with a penalty attempt which just went wide. Instead Kirkham had to be satisfied with an 8-8 draw, an outstanding result against one of England's top sides consistently over the last ten years.

A 54-3 win over local opposition King Edward's, Lytham again showed that Kirkham wanted to play attractive rugby.

Unfortunately, we seemed to lose our way in consecutive defeats against RGS Newcastle 9-16 and RGS Lancaster 3-19, where more of an emphasis was needed to battle. So, after half-term the pack was re-vamped and Phil Berry, Tom Sanders, Dan Sissons, James Hesketh and Gregor Aitken all forced themselves into the starting line up. This new emphasis gave Kirkham an easy 48-3 win at Calday and allowed Kirkham to travel to Llandovery College with confidence.

The match at Llandovery has to be the pinnacle of the season, as everyone in the squad of eighteen performed. Llandovery had a huge pack and a number of international school boys on the pitch. Kirkham defended heroically and was well led by Richard de Carpentier and Alex Spratt who contained everything that Llandovery offered. Inspired by a Lewis Russell try to open the scoring, Kirkham created a superb team try for Tom Bowden just before half time and finished 19-7 victors with another Tom Bowden special from sixty metres out. This was a first win at Llandovery by KGS.

The following week KGS faced Sedbergh. Unfortunately, KGS missed numerous opportunities to win this game. If they had been more composed and kicked their penalties, a victory would have been forthcoming. Instead, Sedbergh walked away with a 15-0 victory, knowing they had been very lucky.



South Africa Tour 2008

KGS's rugby touring party undertook an adventure of a lifetime in South Africa where they not only played rugby, but explored the Western and Eastern Provinces of the country. The teams played some memorable games that included the 36-0 win against Hamilton Seapoint RUFC and an agonizing 8-6 defeat to Nico Malan High School. The boys won many admirers for their tenacity and sportsmanship on the field as well as their charm and friendliness off it. All opposition sides sang KGS's praise, particularly with regards to the strength and skill of our forwards. The boys' rugby improved significantly as the tour progressed and they will no doubt be much better players for the experience. Throughout the tour they made many new friends and were cheered on by the locals as well as our own 'Barmy Army' of parents, family and staff.

In addition to the rugby, an enormous amount was packed into this 19 day tour. Cape Town was the starting point, with visits to the Victoria & Alfred Waterfront, Table Mountain and the old Maximum Security prison on Robben Island, where Nelson Mandela and many other political prisoners were incarcerated. Perhaps the most unusual excursion was a visit to the Langa Township. The tour party was met by an African guide and shown around this famous township where Nelson Mandela lived and was instrumental in setting up the ANC. Features of the tour included areas of interest such as the sheep's head kitchens, the local hostel, the old shanty town dwellings, the local home brew house and the herbalist/witch doctor.

The boys were a real hit with the locals, especially the young children, who posed for photos and played cricket with them. This was the first encounter of the real Africa and the warmth and generosity shown by the township people left the group with a great sense of humility.

The days were very busy, packed with either rugby matches, training sessions or excursions. In the Cape Town area the boys had matches against False Bay RUFC and Hamilton Seapoint RUFC. These two club opponents were a warm up before the tougher school rugby they were later to encounter.

Moving on from Cape Town, the group travelled the short distance to Simon's Town, visiting Cape Point and the Cape of Good Hope, where they experienced the full force of the Southern Atlantic Ocean crashing against the Cape Peninsular shoreline. In Simon's Town the boys had a day of contrast, as they visited the penguins at Boulders in the morning and played rugby in the afternoon on a ground that had a spectacular view of False Bay. The two teams were to experience two very good wins, with the under 15 XV beating Fish Hoek HS 30-3 and the under 16 XV defeating Simon's Town HS 31-0.

The following day they were on the road again, travelling 250 miles east along the "Garden Route" to the Wilderness. On route, the boys took in some seal spotting at Hout Bay. From the Wilderness stopover a trip into the Little Karoo (thirsty land) followed. Travelling via the Outeniqua Mountain's pass to Oudsthoorn the group visited the spectacular Kango caves and an ostrich farm, where a

At these two schools the two teams felt the full passion of South African rugby as they played on pitches with stands full of supporters. The final two days were a real treat for the tour party as they stayed at the Game Reserve, Kariega and undertook two game drives. Wrapped up ready for the late afternoon game drive there was an air of excitement as the group drove off into the bush in their open top Toyota Land Cruisers. The vehicles split up in pursuit of elephants, driving up and down hills, stopping occasionally to watch wildebeest, impamla and nyala, both South African antelopes. An hour into the drive, a small herd of elephants was spotted just off "Ambush Alley" (all dirt tracks have a name), a group comprising of three females and two males, one being a large bull. It was a fantastic sight to see these magnificent creatures in the wild. The bright red African sun was rapidly dissolving into the distant hills. With the dark of night upon them, imaginations only exaggerated what was beyond the reaches of their vehicles. 

vs LRGS. Lancaster batted first and amassed 303 off 35 overs. Even in this onslaught Kindred still managed figures of 3 for 37. KGS replied with 166 for 8, Brown offering stern resistance for a 54 not out. LRGS won by 137 runs.

Hutton were soon in trouble due to a devastating first over from Brook, dismissing both openers. KEQMS batted first and struggled to 50 all out. The KGS

bowlers showed their continuing progress as a varied attack with Garlington 3 for 22 off 5 overs, Brook 2 for 6 off 4 overs and Whalley 3 for 4 off 4.4 overs. KGS fielded well with 4 catches and a run out. In reply KGS made short work of knocking off the total. Garlington made a quick fire 35 and, although wickets fell at the other end, KGS cruised to a six wicket victory.

The game at Lancaster brought a quick return to reality. Despite some tight early bowling, the home side finished at 219-3, Taylor returning 2 for 36. The loss of early wickets put KGS under pressure. A good stand between Brook (30) and Coulthard (24) and some sterling defence by Barclay (20) made the score a little more respectable as the North of England 20/20 winners dismissed the last man with the score on 117.

Despite poor weather the game at Bury G S went ahead. Kirkham won the toss and chose to bat. The all too familiar poor start found KGS at 29 - 4 after eight overs. A rearguard effort by Jones (26), Coulthard (16) and Wilson (17) brought a final total of 93. A small total and short boundary coupled with some erratic bowling saw the home side win in the tenth over for the loss of three wickets.

The final game of the season was at Rossall who won the toss and elected to bat. A wicket fell in the first over and then the floodgates opened as the KGS bowlers tore through the Rossall batsmen. Garlington took four wickets for three, whilst Whalley, Taylor, Brook and Malings mopped up the rest. The Rossall side could only muster nineteen runs in total. In reply, the KGS side achieved the target quickly and consequently used the time available for some batting practice as the home side agreed to continue the game.



However, Tom Hurst was the pick of the bowlers, taking 3 wickets for 18 off his 7 overs - Tom also had a cameo role with the bat earlier in the match, scoring an impressive 21 not out as a number 11. After Hurst



dismissed Woodhouse Grove's top batsman for 24, victory looked on the cards and the team soon ran through the lower order. Woodhouse Grove were all out for 83, giving Kirkham a victory by 35 runs.

Our next fixture saw the first of two ties of the season in controversial manner against QEGS, Blackburn. In an exciting match a late flurry of wickets denied KGS a victory. On a damp early morning pitch, KGS invited QEGS to bat. After some early luck, both openers got a start, but KGS struck in the seventh over when Adam Galley removed the pinch hitter Taylor for 24. The other opener and danger man Davies soon followed, thanks to the accurate bowling of Tom Hurst. Throughout the innings KGS bowled and fielded well and managed to restrict QEGS to 86 runs off their allocated 25 overs. The team bowled well as a unit, although Will Roper stood out, taking three wickets for nine runs. In reply, KGS's top order struggled, with only Captain Adam Galley scoring runs (27). Fortunately, some sensible batting by the lower order gave KGS a fighting chance and, with 3 overs to go, KGS looked comfortable with the score moving onto 85 for 7. Unfortunately, a late flurry of wickets meant KGS finished all out for 86 and the game was tied. In all the excitement Ryan Vaughan thought he had secured a victory With a well-placed shot, but the visiting umpire declared he had run his first run short! Unfortunately, Ryan was stumped off the next ball and at the beginning of the next over Joe Walsh was cleaned bowled! All agreed that this was a dramatic end to a first-class game of cricket, played in a friendly but very competitive spirit.

The team's Lancashire Cup campaign got off to a winning start against Arnold. Inserted into bat, KGS started slowly but Adam Galley, scoring 47 runs, soon picked up the pace. Tom Hurst, scoring 28, then swatted the ball to all parts of the boundary (Hurst only faced 15 balls) to set Arnold a challenging target of 154 from 30 overs. Galley (2-24) and Fraser Burnie (1-20) bowled tidily initially for KGS, but Hurst made batting difficult with his miserly spell of 6 overs for 10 runs of left arm spin. Will Roper and Ryan Vaughan then took two wickets each as Arnold crumbled under the pressure of a souring run rate and finished on 134-9. All ten out field players of KGS bowled during the innings, showing such variety and strength in depth as KGS advanced into round three.

Three further victories followed, against Merchant Taylors', Crosby; Our Lady's, Fulwood, and Hutton Grammar School. However, the highlight of the fixture list would prove to be a double-header against archrivals, LRGS, after the half-term break. The team went into these two matches with every confidence after the most emphatic victory of the season against KEQMS by 138 runs - Adam Galley scored a magnificent century in which he batted for 28 overs, finishing 114 not out, hitting 14 boundaries, including two magnificent sixes.

On a sunny Saturday afternoon KGS kept their unbeaten record for the season in an exciting battle with LRGS. KGS batted first, putting on 18 for the first wicket. After a flurry of wickets went down, Adam Galley was again top scorer (56), passing fifty for the fourth time this season - Galley was

ably supported by Max Baker (12), Ryan Vaughan (15) and Tom Hurst (20 not out). Jonathan Pickbourn, playing in his first 'A' team game of the season, contributed a crucial 11 runs at the end of the innings. LRGS started their innings steadily and found it difficult to score off the excellent bowling of Joe Walsh (6 overs for 8 runs). Galley (1-22) and Hurst (2-26) both bowled solidly, making LRGS slip further behind the run rate. However, in the final over, with 14 runs needed to win, KGS saw red mist, giving away several runs in overthrows to make the scores level at the end of the match.

Unfortunately the second of two fixtures against LRGS saw our good run in the Lancashire Cup, which has included two finals in the previous two years, come to an end by a clinical LRGS at Wrea Green Cricket Club. After losing the toss, KGS was invited to bat and was somewhat blown away by the accurate, tight bowling of LRGS. On a pitch where good line and length produced results, only Fraser Burnie put up any real resistance, scoring an unbeaten 22. KGS bowled well in patches and Tom Hurst's spell of 8 overs for 14 runs and 2 wickets pegged back Lancaster for a short period. Unfortunately, with not enough runs on the board, Lancaster eased home and won by 7 wickets.

Fortunately, the boys responded in the best possible manner with victory in the last game of the season, beating last year's Lancashire Cup winners in an emphatic manner. Only one Bury batsman got into double figures as KGS took wickets regularly. Adam Galley, bowling spin, was the pick of the bowlers and he produced the best figures of the season, taking 5 wickets for 7 runs in 3 overs. Everyone bowled well and it was clearly our day as even poor deliveries took wickets! The weather did not look good as KGS was about to bat, so the management and captain changed the batting order and sent in the big hitters to knock off the runs as quickly as possible. This proved to be a masterstroke as Galley and Hall played in true Twenty20 fashion, treating Bury's opening bowlers with contempt! Both batsmen let fly and Galley finished on 39 not out which included five fours and one enormous 6! KGS only batted for 5.4 overs, knocking off the 47 runs needed with ease just before the heavens opened. This was a tremendous end to the season against one of the strongest teams in the area who had just beaten Manchester Grammar the previous week. (Incidentally Manchester Grammar went on to win the Lancashire Cup against Lancaster.)

Both myself and Mr. Carter really enjoy coaching the team and we are both honoured to look after one of KGS' most talented sides of the last few years. Many in the team can be match winners and it is pleasing to see so many different players stepping up to the mark in differing match situations. The team can build on these steady foundations as they move into senior cricket in the future.


The wind is that of such crescendo





Rugby

This year KGJS has had children competing at U8, U9, U10 and U11 level. All the teams throughout the autumn and spring terms have trained hard and developed their individual and team skills.

This year the U11s embarked on a tour to the Isle of Man which was thoroughly enjoyable and a reward for their outstanding efforts throughout the season. It was also a pleasure for KGJS to be able to host the return visit of our Manx opponents.

The U11s have been a very talented year group who developed as a team as the season progressed. They have strengths in all areas and played some very attractive rugby. The U11A team results were fantastic. They won eleven and drew two, making them undefeated in their matches. The B team won one, drew one and lost one.

A.J.I.S. Tournament winners – this is the 3rd consecutive year we have won this tournament and the 4th year in the last 5.


North Finals runners up.

The boys' U11A team also finished 2nd in the Lancashire tournament and qualified for the North Finals where they lost to the eventual winners in the semi-finals.






Netball
