HEADMASTER'S FOREWORD

This year is a significant one for me personally as I enter my tenth year as Headmaster of KGS. Time passes so quickly. It seems only yesterday that we gazed over the Wareing buildings and the Norwood block and plotted the future. At that stage no less than 14 of our classrooms were in temporary buildings and it is certain the school would not be in the strong and stable condition it is now were it not for those brave decisions taken by the Governors to develop our facilities. We have been fortunate throughout to have had the support from our parents during this period, and I would like to record my thanks to all those who have played a part in the continuing evolution of the school over these exciting years.

In these stringent times where other independent schools are making significant cutbacks or even losing their independence, it is heartening to stress that KGS remains essentially full with a school roll of 700 and includes a very healthy Sixth Form of 170 plus. I am convinced that central to our success is the principle of independence. As a management team and staff, supported and indeed monitored by our Board of Governors, we are able to make our decisions based on local factors. We can respond quickly, unencumbered by external control, be it an education authority or any other central body. We believe we have always been receptive to parents' views and have continually developed the school which has resulted in the strong position we find ourselves in today. Wise and prudent investment in facilities, a strong drive to improve academic achievement while never losing sight of our care and concern for individuals, alongside a commitment to broad opportunity, have been our key aspirations. Never have we been dictated to by an outside body, and I sigh with relief that some of the regulatory minefields are being lifted from our shoulders. We have emerged with a school that is well equipped to tackle the challenges we all face economically and one that can provide continuity of education. I believe that our independence from interference has provided the freedom yet direct accountability to our parents which is a recipe for success. I stand assured that KGS will remain as a bastion of independence amidst the changing local educational climate, and that it will continue to develop its position and its resources in order to ensure the best education possible for our students.

This year has seen the completion of our Sixth Form Centre, 6°. We have consulted widely with the students themselves and incorporated wi-fi provision within their new workspace and ICT room. The resource appears popular and represents a haven for our Sixth Formers from the humdrum life around school. A haven for dedicated work I might add! We are also pleased with the refurbishment of our catering facilities and dining room. Additionally we have further developed our multimedia facilities alongside an expensive upgrade to our internet link to enable unhindered access. I am indebted

to members of our support team for the manner in which they have carried out so much of the work themselves amidst a busy summer holiday. It is the nature of the school that while our staffing levels are prudent, everyone is prepared to go the extra mile. I hope parents will agree that my colleagues take pride in the way our school looks even down to the flowers in the beds outside school.

Academically this year has once again been notable for some outstanding successes. While not a vintage year at A2, it is inspiring to report on the success of two of our pupils who gained no less than nine A* grades between them! Lucy Fielding and Kobi Chan now further their careers in Classics and Medicine and we wish them well in the next exciting stage of their education at Oxford and Birmingham respectively. Overall the year group recorded another 100% pass rate and nearly 60% of the grades were at the top levels and they now move on having made an impact at KGS greater in proportion than the size of the year group.

At AS level our results rivalled the best ever at this level and we look to this year group to aspire to the highest levels. It is a large cohort of over 90 pupils but while their prospects are bright there is a lot of hard work to come. It is also pleasing that further extensions to the Curriculum has seen Philosophy added to our A Level options, especially as the first outcomes were so pleasing.

In their GCSE examinations our Fifth Formers did themselves proud with results on a par with our best ever. Effectively half the grades were at A*/A and 26 pupils gained a minimum of 9 grades at this heady level. Gemma Coleman excelled with 11 A* grades, while Jodi Gaston-Ross gained

10 A* grades after the outcome of re-marks became available, and it was heartening to see so many students gaining such a high level of attainment. On a more worrying note we pursued appeals to the Boards in three subjects where marking appears totally wayward. This is now such a common occurrence which is clearly the consequence of the extended number of modular examinations. I was therefore not surprised to hear that these are to be abandoned at GCSE from 2012.

I cannot, however, leave the subject of external examinations without recording the success of the Fourth Year in those modular papers. Over 50% of grades were at the top level and it is evident that with continued effort they will do extremely well at GCSE next year.

There is no question that the students of today have to work hard for their results with ongoing assessments and controlled coursework, and it is unhelpful to question the validity of the levels gained by comparing them to the past. We can only ask of them that they excel in current circumstances and I am very pleased that our pupils are continuing to set themselves appropriate challenges.

This year has brought a significant change and challenge for me and my family with our move into the Boarding House. As part of our ongoing strategic review of school, the Governors and I determined that a restructuring of the Boarding House was required and my move into the House is an interim measure to further this strategy. I believe boarding is critical to the ongoing success of KGS. Not only is the House at the centre of the school it is also at the core of its ethos. Living there has already given me a perspective on its place at the heartbeat of school life and in my short tenure there I am determined that the continuing refurbishment is enhanced, an exciting activity programme embedded, and a stable and sustainable staffing structure is in place. It is heartening that numbers are strong this year; so strong that we have had to turn prospective pupils away and this emphasises that a healthy Boarding House is at the very core of the school and that a strong boarding community will contribute greatly to the success of the school over coming years.

School continues to encompass a wide variety of different interests and enthusiasms. Each year sees these extended while traditional pursuits continue to flourish. Only recently I was thrilled to see 25 clubs advertising their wares in the Societies Fair. New ventures like Radio Club, Glee Club, and Archery are underway while academic clubs like Spanish Club and Greek Club are welcome. These activities are so important in enriching the lives of our pupils.

Drama continues to be an enthusiasm for so many of our students and it has been a particularly busy and successful year. We all enjoyed the imaginative production "Much ado about nothing" which was a real team effort. Our Juniors, however, stole the limelight with their collaboration with the Royal Shakespeare company. Their rendition of Midsummers Night Dream initially at the Charter Theatre and then the

House of Lords was an outstanding success. The group was even brave enough to perform in assembly, managing to keep the irrepressible George Shuttleworth-Brown to limited encores! Only this week we were visited by Wesley College from Melbourne who performed at school on their UK tour. They chose KGS as a venue on the basis of the strength of the dramatic provision demonstrated on the website. I believe the initiative proved a success.

We were also privileged to enjoy a series of excellent concerts and I contend that the Spring Concert represented the pinnacle of the Music Department's efforts. Not only the quality of the music but the sheer number of musicians populating the ensembles struck me as exceeding even previously high standards. I can only congratulate Mr Barrett and his team on this and also on preparing our musical interlude this evening.

Each year we hold a series of House competitions in many different activities but one of the highlights is the House music competition. This year we were fortunate enough to enjoy a sing off by the House choirs in the MPH. These performances, largely organised by the students themselves, represent all that is best about KGS – where we see students of all ages working together to a common end. Also, of course, great entertainment.

I have received many compliments this year about our Cadet Force which continues to be the envy of most schools with nearly 250 members. Although we do expect all our Fourth Years to join, I remain convinced that this experience affords our pupils something completely different from the normal routine of school life and also gives broad opportunities for life experiences beyond the scope of most schools. Congratulations to Jack Ingham on his Army scholarship, another in a long line of successful candidates. Alongside the CCF, our Duke of Edinburgh capacity continues to grow, stretching Mr Callister and Mrs Sutcliffe to the limit. Popular expeditions have challenged candidates and it is pleasing to see so many gaining this outstanding qualification.

As always our sportsmen and women have been very busy and their achievements broad and varied. It is impossible to list them all but there are some real highlights:

Our athletes once again excelled. No less than five Fylde trophies were amassed by girls and boys, while three teams from four entries reached the regional TSB finals. Two of these travelled to the National finals where the Junior girls team finished 5th in the UK with the Inters 9th.

In the County Athletics finals school had 18 competitors finishing on the podium, a very large contingent. This is the strongest performance by any single school represented there while Ben Everson, Alex Hastie, Daniel Jones, Kate Lawler and Rachel Williamson won their events. Congratulations to Rachel, Daniel and Ben who went on to the National finals. Rachel became National Triple Jump Champion and represented her country – an outstanding performance.

School now boasts a host of talented runners in different age groups and each has gained success this year both individually and collectively. At district level Lucy Keelan, Jake Lonsdale, Bradley Yates and Ben Everson all won their age groups while we won team events at Under 12 girls and Under 14 boys. Bradley and Jake went on to top two finishes at County level.

The Senior Girls Hockey team finished second to British Colleges in our own tournament recording excellent results against Millfield, Sedbergh and George Watson's School from Edinburgh. They also enjoyed a highly successful tour to Barbados in February. At Under 16 level our girls finished a very creditable third in the North after winning the County Championship.

On the rugby field the U16 XV reached the Semi Finals both of the NW knockout and the County Cup whilst the 1st XV were third in the Western League beating Colstons and Bromsgrove, but losing narrowly to Millfield and Sedbergh. Nonetheless their achievement against such company was notable. Individually Matthew Beaty represented his Country at Under 16 level.

In a busy Sevens season the Junior sides did extremely well. The Under 16's recorded a victory in the Stonyhurst Sevens, the Under 15's in the Arnold competition and the Under 14's were the first home winners of our own tournament.

On the Cricket field the 1st X1 had its most successful season for many years with Adam Galley, Oliver Jump and Charlie Swarbrick making outstanding contributions. All three were selected for the North West representative team.

The Under 15 Tennis squad were county champions once again.

Our Golfers Toby Roberts, Callum Wilkinson and Macauley Murgatroyd became the 5th rated team in the UK after winning the County and Regional trophies.

Given that we also fielded teams in Netball, Swimming and Volleyball, there is a healthy breadth to our provision. Our sporting commitments would not be possible without the support of parents who turn out in all weathers to ensure our teams are well populated. The experience, however, of being part of a team is a valuable one which imparts important lessons to those who participate.

Mrs Benter left after seven years to move back to her native Lancaster. She committed herself fully to the sporting life of the school, coaching all sports with care and skill. Always readily involved she accompanied ski trips and hockey tours showing genuine care for her charges, and we will miss her broad contribution to KGS life.

Mr Ian Scott retired after 37 years at KGS. No mean feat! He taught Geography and led the department for many years, while also coaching rugby and cricket in his younger days. Coast 2 Coast

A group of KGS students, inspired by their time in the CCF, their respect for the armed forces and looking for a challenge for their next DoE Award, took it upon themselves to organise and complete a coast to coast bike ride in aid of the very worthy cause of Help for Heroes. We were delighted to hear they all completed the bike ride in one piece and raised a huge amount of money in the process. An account of their experiences is given below:

On 28 October, a group of KGS pupils navigated, badly at times, the arduous coast to coast bike ride over the scenic hills of the Lake District through county Durham and on to Sunderland. 150 miles in total!

It all started on a rainy Friday morning when, after a hearty full English breakfast, we set off from a windy jetty in Whitehaven with our back wheels dipped in the water (as tradition dictates). Within the first two miles we had realised that we had gravely underestimated the difficulty of this task: I managed to have a bike which refused to change gears, we mistakenly headed north instead of east and Will Fleuriot was sick into a bush! Our success on the first day continued in this vein as we had numerous punctures and faced gale force winds as well as massive steep hills which halted our progress to almost a crawl. We took the wrong turn near Keswick and ended up 17 miles off course. We would still be there if it was not for a caring local in an amusing hat who rescued us.

The second day began much better, even though we started by cycling up to the top of the dreaded Alston Moor. The views were spectacular and we could see how far we had already come. The day had gone far too smoothly, so right on cue Rhys' wheel fell off. We also discovered on that day that I was terrible at going round corners, Marcus was invincible in his concrete helmet, Tom and Harry were mental, Will Roper loved the tracks, Will Fleuriot was cheeky enough to grab the support van to drag him uphill and finally Rhys' "Granite Giant" was a beautiful bike that seemed to be actually made from the material its name suggests. We ended this tiring but successful day with a curry at a local restaurant! Even this was eventful as Marcus was nearly murdered as he was accused of stealing the majority of the chicken.

As our final day began, we were full of anticipation and excitement. We set off on the flat but bumpy road and were soon on off-road tracks speeding along at 24mph. This was rather scary off-road and it was not helped when Marcus and Will Fleuriot took a different path and ended up 5 miles ahead of us at the Stadium of Light. Homelessness

A group of third year pupils were encouraged to challenge their own pre-conceptions of the issue of homelessness in their English lessons last term. Having read Swindell's novel "Stone Cold" and researched the topic themselves, representatives from the charity Streetlife in Blackpool came to talk to them about the realities of homeless young people in our local town.

Pupils had discovered that Lancashire has one of the most desperate homelessness problems in the country and the children prepared questions to ask in advance of our visitors' arrival. They had investigated local and national issues covering work carried out by Crisis and Shelter but were understandably very interested in a local charity that helps 16-24 year olds.

Many different tasks were inspired culminating in a competition for the article which most challenges a reader to sit up and take notice of such a serious problem in society today. Here is the winning entry by Emily Carpenter. As a

general thank you and recognition of its work the pupils donated all proceeds from ticket sales of the Junior Disco to Streetlife.

What can you buy with a 20 pence piece?

Chocolate. Sweets. Sugar. This is what you can expect a typical child to spend their change on. However, a 20 pence piece is a rare luxury to a child, or anyone else, living on the streets. Whilst you are comfortable in the warmth of your own home, there are people out there who are struggling to keep out the cold and who have spent what is perhaps their last 20p to gain access to a grimy public toilet for the night.

To you and me, homeless people are just dirty hobos lingering in shop doorways, although, in reality, most homeless people make sure they are fresh with clean clothes, so that they blend in with the many others making up the busy crowds. Most people become homeless because of family issues. Often due to arguments between partners in relationships, things become difficult.

Living on the streets has its consequences. Homeless people are vulnerable to hypothermia, abuse, and some women even end up pregnant. They can become involved in crime due to the desperate nature. There are also many mental effects of being homeless, including loneliness, boredom and depression. Some people commit a crime just to escape the cold and to sleep with a roof over their heads. Others go to police stations or community centres which all send them to Streetlife for refuge.

I know this because we were fortunate enough to have two volunteers visit us from Streetlife. They informed us about homelessness and what Streetlife can do to help. They explained what homelessness means, the effects of homelessness and how unfortunate the people are with no family or a place to call their own.

Although homeless people suffer many hardships, Streetlife can give them the opportunity to get back on their feet. Streetlife provide a cook and eat session on a Saturday which allows them to order food and cook their own meal. This gives them life skills to help a return back to normal life. The shelter relies wholly on volunteers, who generously give up their time to help those who need it most. Popular charities such as Red Nose Day and Children In Need sponsor these volunteers, giving them the budget to make all this possible. Unfortunately, this charity has limited resources, which means that every night they have to turn people down and those people are then left to go and find shelter for themselves. How would you feel if you were turned away and left in the cold with nowhere to go, no one to offer any comfort and with no way out?

Learning about homeless people has had a great impact on me and I hope that it will influence you similarly. I am not asking you to give them a home, but if you walk past them in the street, do not just carry on walking. Give them some loose change as you pass by. Just remember 20p to you might be nothing, but it is all these people want. So, give them some change and think a little next time before you spend 20p.



LIBRARY NEWS

Author Visit

We were delighted to welcome to KGS an exciting new writing talent, Jason Wallace, whose debut novel "Out of Shadows" has been shortlisted for the Booktrust Teen Prize. Jason's family moved to Zimbabwe shortly after Robert Mugabe was elected as President; the 1980's were a time of great change as the country moved from white rule to majority rule. Jason was educated at a tough boarding school in Zimbabwe and his book is loosely based on his experiences while at school.

Jason spoke to all the pupils in Years 9 and 10 about these experiences and entertained his audience with some extracts from the book. The pupils enjoyed his visit and gained a valuable insight into a school experience very different from theirs at KGS!





A Very Special Guest Makes a Return Visit

The staff and pupils of KGS gave a very warm welcome to a wonderful guide dog, Mae, who visited us in April, 2010 and was the star of a school assembly. The collective "Aaaahhh" which greeted her entrance in the MPH was something to which this special dog has become accustomed during her many visits to schools. Her owner was unable to accompany her because of a recent hip replacement but Mae behaved impeccably as I spoke about what is needed to train a guide dog and how important these dogs are in returning people to independence.

It was a great privilege to be able to welcome Mae back to school in early October, this time with her owner. Their visit took place during Guide Dog Week. Marsha Corper spoke with great humour and honesty about why she had decided to get a guide dog after almost 50 years of relying on a cane. She talked about the trust needed on the part of both the human and the dog and described how it takes time for each of them to get to know each other. Her choice of music – "A hard day's night" – seemed very apt in the circumstances!

Marsha enjoyed meeting some of our pupils during the morning and she commented on the warm and welcoming atmosphere within the school.

All Change ...

Every organisation has to move with the times and KGS library is no exception. The software package which manages the cataloguing and circulation of all library resources has been in existence for over 10 years. There have been many changes to computer technology during this period, not least of which is the possibility of remote access and external hosting. The library software has therefore been upgraded to the latest version, which enables a more sophisticated and versatile service to be given to all borrowers. A great deal of work has to be done before any major upgrade and libraries are no different. The Network Manager, Mrs Janet Cannell, oversaw the entire process, liaising with the company and setting up the system to enable the new data to be embedded with the minimum of disruption to the school community. We owe a huge debt to her for her hard work and customary efficiency. One interesting side-effect of the upgrade has been the extension of the Christmas holiday period to 8 February - having to produce regular overdues would have added to the complexities of the process, so the holiday period was extended at the end of the autumn term to avoid having to produce overdues too early in the spring term. What a shame that our actual Christmas holiday was not as long as the library version!

World Book Day

World Book Day this year at KGS followed the popular format of stories to all lower school classes. This went very well — there was a good variety of stories, some of which were then borrowed by the pupils. The book to cause the most interest was "The Hunger Games" by Suzanne Collins. Collins, a former television writer, has written of a thrilling, twisted world where the chosen victims [two from each of the twelve districts of a fractured United States] have to fight for their lives – while playing to the cameras and trying to win sponsorship deals. Themes of government control, "big brother," and personal independence are explored amidst a thrilling adventure which appeals to science fiction, survival, and adventure readers.

On the recommendation of some Year 11 fans I read an extract – and you could hear a pin drop in the library! The reading generated a long waiting-list for this, as well as the subsequent books in the trilogy. It has garnered many awards and sparked a 'Twilight' type following.

Pupil Librarian Event

Five pupils from Kirkham Grammar School participated in a Pupil Librarian Conference on Tuesday 14 June which was organised by the Lancashire branch of the School Library Association. Charlotte Cross, Siva Dwarampudi, Beth de Klerk, Caroline Paley and Jonathan Parkinson-Swift were able to take part because of their sterling work with the Carnegie Award shadowing. Mrs Jo Harwood, Librarian at Broughton Business & Enterprise College, kindly hosted the event which attracted forty seven pupils from fourteen schools across Lancashire and was supervised by fifteen librarians!

Mrs Harwood welcomed us all to the event and refreshments were served, giving everyone an opportunity to meet other people. She employed Kagan Strategy to build teams so that the pupils got to know each other without staying with their own school group. Each team had to then build a free standing structure, including at least one cube/square, using cocktail sticks and midget gems! The group who built the highest structure was judged the winner and received prizes; Siva was in the winning group! There then followed an amusing literary quiz, with questions on opening lines, book characters and film clips. This was followed by a 'Speed Dating' event with a difference – it involved books, not people! Each pupil brought along their favourite book and had 30 seconds to sell it to their 'opposite partner', who then reciprocated. They then changed partners. The pupils awarded points to their 'date' and these were totalled up at the end. Two books earned the maximum possible number of points (80) and these pupils were awarded a prize each. The first winning book may come as a surprise to some people - 'Rebecca' by Daphne du Maurier is famous for its opening line but was published in 1938 - proof that older books can still appeal to younger readers. The second book was 'The curious incident of the dog in the night time' by Mark Haddon, an unusual book which won Whitbread Book of the Year when it was published in 2003.

Lunch followed, after which we were able to enjoy the warm weather by walking outside and enjoying the grounds – the wildlife pond was very popular! The afternoon event took




place upstairs in the library, watched with silent benevolence by the Book Worm, a huge worm which is suspended from the ceiling. The Reading Game is an opportunity for the pupils to sit in groups of their own choosing and look at a selection of books from a variety of genres. Quite a few of us found books which we had not read and which will now be requested for our own libraries.

The afternoon ended with everyone being given a 'goody bag' containing books, stationery and other items; a personalised certificate of attendance is presented to each participant. The event was voted a success, with the only complaint being that we arrived back in school in time for the last two lessons of the afternoon!

Carnegie award

Six books were on this year's shortlist and our judging took place on 23rd June, on the day of the actual result! The enthusiasm has been outstanding again, with some new readers joining our regulars. The judging meeting saw pupils from all year groups, including some who have officially left the school - a sure sign of the popularity of this annual event. Ice creams were purchased and we took over the library to debate the merits of each book and the scores were added up. The final result was a win, for the third successive year here at Kirkham, for Patrick Ness. His book "Monsters of Men" is the last part of a trilogy and all his books have been on the shortlist of this very prestigious award (something that not even Philip Pullman could manage!). Each year our readers have voted his book the winner and we have been disappointed with the judges' decisions. It is certainly a case of third time lucky for this very talented young author. His book garnered twice the number of votes of any other title and our only complaint is that the result was not published officially on the website until after the meeting ended and the readers had left for lunch!

MUSIC

Attaining Grade 8, the final examination for the major music examination boards, is a highly significant achievement for any student. The long path to this examination may take up to ten years and demands considerable dedication and determination, with many hours spent patiently practising. In the school year to July 2011, five KGS students passed this examination, Jessica Balmer, Gemma Broomhead, Sam Fuentes Moreno, Helen Kelsall and Katie Penrose. Along with the other higher grade examinations (Grades 6 and 7), this examination gains the musician between 55 and 75 UCAS points, the equivalent to those gained for an A grade at AS level (60 points).

Each term KGS and KGJS enter for examinations offered by the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. An examiner comes to school and students take a range of examinations from the Preparatory Test to Grade 8. A Distinction (over 130 out of 150 marks) is a coveted prize and was gained by 27 of our pupils last year.

Over 120 KGS students take music lessons in school, with many more receiving lessons outside school. The sheer range of talent and high standard of performance is seen no better than in the annual House Music Festival, where this year almost 400 performers battled through the auditions in March to reach the Finals, which were held on April 1st. The adjudicator, Mr Chris Wootton, was most impressed with the general standard of musicianship displayed on the day. Eventually Sophie Midgley, playing the clarinet, emerged as the winner of the Solo Section, with Lucy Fielding (piano) in second place. The vocal group Septimus was a worthy winner in a closely fought Ensemble section and Fylde House won the House Choir competition for the second consecutive year. The overall winners of the Music Festival were Kirkham House, with an array of fine individual and group performances.

This year has seen KGS musicians continue to give an excellent series of concerts, from the monthly Coffee Concerts, held in the Old Hall on Friday lunchtimes, to the termly formal concerts held in the MPH, during which the larger school ensembles, such as the Orchestra, Concert Band, and String Group, have the opportunity to perform. The Swing Band continued to grow in strength through the year, performing most enjoyably and excellently on a number of occasions. Musicians from the first and the second year presented progress concerts to packed audiences in the Old Hall, illustrating once again the depth of musical talent at KGS.

The Choir, as well as being the mainstay of the Carol Service and the Founders' Day Service, had the opportunity to take part in a performance of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana, with members of the Lytham St Annes Choral Society. To perform such a challenging choral work with a large chorus and instruments is an opportunity that comes all too rarely to choral singers, and the members of the KGS Choir acquitted themselves superbly on the day of the concert.

Each year we say goodbye to musicians who have been involved in music throughout their time in school and who have made excellent contributions to school music. To single out individuals is necessarily to omit some students who have played major roles in the Choir and ensembles, but I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Johnny Davies for his excellent work as Music Secretary in his final ryear at KGS and Lucy Fielding, who prides herself on taking part in every KGS ensemble in her final year!







DRAMA

Much Ado About Nothing

A performance "As merry as the day is long" "Sigh no more, ladies, sigh no more, Men were deceivers ever One foot in sea and one on shore,
To one thing constant never."

Shakespeare has often suffered with an image problem: that of actors in tights spouting incomprehensible words from an unfamiliar epoch. The challenge for all directors is to show the audience the contemporary relevance of the plays: and this is a challenge to which Ms Barrie triumphantly rises each year.

Transporting Kirkham Grammar School's multi-purpose hall to Messina in Italy, her production of Much Ado about Nothing was nevertheless firmly rooted in contemporary issues. From the moment of the audience entering the hall, the projected Facebook pages (provided by Chad Bentley, who also made the demanding role of Don Pedro his own) of the major characters proclaimed that Much Ado about Nothing has a great deal to say about our world: the play is focused on relationships and the way that these can be strengthened or disrupted by rumour, malice and scandal: something very pertinent to today's cyber-generation.


The twists and turns of young love were persuasively demonstrated by the paired lovers. The "Merry War" between Beatrice (Jodi Gaston-Ross) and Benedick (Fraser Burnie) was intense and vividly portrayed with real spite and energy, making its segue into love even more moving. The relationship between Claudio (Aaron Davies) and Hero (the suitably vulnerable Lydia Gascoigne) acted as a foil to this, moving from a deliberately unrealistic "love at first sight" to a more considered and deeper relationship once Claudio had experienced the trauma of false suspicion and remorse for his harshness towards Hero.


This is a play that has a real dark side: indeed, its theme of jealousy is one shared with the tragedy of Othello, and there are strong links between the two. It is a credit to the performers that they were able to show this side too: the calculated evil of the lago-like Donna Juanita (Lydia Kolb) assisted by her (rather more inept!) side-kicks Borachio, Guiseppe and Conrade (Oli Carpenter, Callum Wilkinson and Gus Graham) which threatens to destroy the fragile Hero; and the culpable cruelty of Claudio and Don Pedro must have struck a chord with all those aware of how bullying and

spitefulness (whether on-line or face-to-face) are fostered by rumour, malice and lack of trust.

However, this is a comedy and in comedy harmony is always triumphant. Shakespeare's comedies often highlight music to show this and Much Ado about Nothing is no exception. The dancers, choreographed by Elizabeth Cross and Rosie Spedding, gave us a visual representation of the beauty of this harmony and the Band also played a major aural role here. Jake Baxter as band leader, organiser and bass player produced a wonderful ensemble that supported the visual and verbal pyrotechnics on stage: Olivia Duxbury and Joe Martin, ably supported by the rest of the musicians, interlaced the play with musical harmony, contemporary love songs which served both to counterpoint the angst of young love on stage and to highlight again the fact that Shakespeare deals with issues that are still a major part of our lives. Both dancers and the band received well-deserved applause after each number.

Another example of this harmony was the garden: a true coup de théâtre wildly appreciated by the audience. A garden is a metaphorical representation of the harmony of people working with nature, and Ms Barrie's anthropomorphising of the garden with living statues, fantastic flowers, angity apple trees and perky privet hedges added more than simple enjoyable comedy to the staging:





there was a clear message here about the relationship of humans and the universe.

Comedy was also reinforced by the bumbling Dogberry (Josh Burrows), Mrs Verges (Amy Garland) and the Watch – in this production a cross between the Keystone Cops and Inspector Clouseau clones! It is, of course, typically ironic that their chaotic ineptitude is finally responsible for the restoration of order in the play!

This is an appropriate moment to comment on a Ms Barrie trademark, the cross-gendering of characters. Mrs Verges and Heidi Oatcake (Hannah Lewis) from the Watch were good examples of this; but allowing Leonato to become - in the person of Olivia Butler - Leonata made an excellent pairing with Donna Juanita, and extended the female roles so that more focus could be placed on the relationships within the play.

However strong the principals, this was not a play carried by individual performance. This production was very much an ensemble piece and the strength in depth of the large – and young – cast was the major factor in the success of the play. Success depended of the vital contributions of all concerned, from the many actors (including another of Ms Barrie's trademarks, the additional characters, such as the villainous Guiseppe and the hilariously incompetent Mandy Crackers) to the garden, the dancers and the band, and of course the backstage crew, with Katie Simpson as stage manager. Congratulations all.

The play, of course, leaves a number of questions unanswered, the most fundamental perhaps being that posed by a seven year old who had loved the play but asked "So why did Hero marry Claudio when he called her those names?" Perhaps the answer is given elsewhere by Shakespeare: the aspirational "Love is not love which alters when it alteration finds / Or bends with the remover to remove."

Ultimately, then, Much Ado about Nothing depends on the redeeming power of love – and, of course, in this production the genii of Ms Barrie and Mrs Walker.

My Lord, what a show!

KGS actors showcased Shakespeare before lords and ladies when they

were invited to perform A Midsummer Night's Dream at the Palace of Westminster.

The cast of thirty second and third year pupils had performed the themed comedy at Preston's Charter Theatre as part of the national Shakespeare Schools' Festival. More than 550 schools took part in the annual event which encourages schools to look for new ways to interpret the work of the world famous playwright. Judges were so impressed with the magic of KGS, they invited them to perform in front of some of the country's most influential peers.

Ms Barrie, Director of Drama, said "I was utterly shocked when I got the phone call inviting the group to perform, but probably not as shocked as the pupils. They were nervous but did a fantastic job and had a wonderful experience. It was an inventive and comic performance which closed the show and literally brought the house down. George Shuttleworth was an excellent Bottom and got lots of laughs by acting up and trying to sit on the knees of the audience".

KGS was one of five schools in the country invited to perform a small section of the show working with a special school as part of a montage of the festival's highlights.

The drama staff had worked with the pupils to give a more contemporary twist to the play, with characters given a 1950's makeover. Titania the fairy queen was lulled to sleep by sweetly singing, gently dancing fairies accompanied by flute and glockenspiel.

The pupils had an experience few of them are likely to forget!

16/10/11 Day 1 10:30am

"Lads I need a roll mat," the RSMs first words upon leaving his car. At this point, we realised the scope of the challenge facing us. Joe had no idea what was going on; it was fortunate that the rest of us did. Our discussion with Mr Callister took place in the CCF hut, where we finalised routes and were tested on certain procedures which would be needed in an emergency. Vincent stated "I have a jacket ... but it doesn't have a hood." Once the remainder of our preparations were completed, we embarked on our way to Coniston (of course, via Morrisons).

It could have started better, but never mind.

17/10/11 Day 2 6:30am

A new day, a new start, the sun was shining and the rain was coming – typical DoE weather. Morale was 10/10, so we set off with haste to our first check point and our first mountain (Weatherlam Peak). However, half way up this massive mountain the phrase "if it ain't raining, it ain't training" became a cold (snow, hail), wet (torrential rain), windy (70mph), reality but we persevered and got to the top. Morale was 8/10.

Eventually, the well-weathered team reached the next valley where we rendezvoused with the equally wet Mr Callister. We were looking forward to our campsite and a good night's sleep.

18/10/11 Day 3 6:15am

A new day and the weather was great, as usual...not. We charged up the valley like men possessed, until the team had to confront the most feared, impassable obstacle, the raging torrent that was... the stream. In order to mentally overcome this obstacle, we decided to have a sit down in a conveniently placed sheepfold. Morale was 6/10.

After our short break, we intrepidly set off to cross the stream and scale the next mountain on our trip. Common sense told *some* of us to cross the stream by using the bridge but Ven and Vincent had other ideas. Vincent had a flash of inspiration [strange as that may seem!] and decided not to go first, and on that note Ven embarked on the adventure of a life time and launched himself into an ocean of problems which resulted in a leg injury.

Ven was lying helpless on the far bank of the stream and at this point all our training kicked in. Claiming he could not move his right leg, Sam and Joe made a splint for Ven's leg (from walking poles and tape). Meanwhile Vincent and Johnathan pitched their tent in the sheltered sheepfold and prepared sleeping bags and warm drinks. Joe and Sam carried Ven back to the tent (via the bridge). Once he was safe and warm, Joe took it upon himself to move Ven's kit from one side of the river to the other (not via the bridge). Then, when the inevitable happened, Sam occupied himself by playing "hook a duck" with Ven's kit (of course, saving it all). Ven and Vincent looked back in shock at the Monty Python style sketch unfolding before their eyes.

Now came the serious business of alerting the authorities to the incident. Sam and Joe made the quick decision to backtrack down the valley in the hunt for a landline (which coincidently led them to the pub). When they reached the landline, Sam and Joe rang the police and sent Mountain Rescue to the 3 team members waiting at the top of the valley. An hour after the initial incident, two Land Rovers arrived at the scene of the incident, removed Ven and sent him to Lancaster Royal Hospital. The four remaining team members were then evacuated to the Mountain Rescue Centre, where we awaited Mr Callister and the inevitable sarcasm – readers will be pleased to hear that he did not let us down.

19/10/11 Day 4 6:15am

A new day, the sun WAS shining, the wind was not blowing and it was, for a change, relatively warm. Morale was 8/10, we were happy. So the four survivors set out, hopeful for an uneventful day. We re-traced our route from the day before, continuing past yesterday's milestones and setting out on the rest of the day's journey. Despite Sam's constant underestimations of various distances ("It's just over there") the day went by without major incident. The past few days had taken their toll on Johnathan, making him unable to move quickly – at least by Sam's standards; we swear he was a slave driver in an earlier life!

By 4:30 we had achieved something remarkable, we arrived at the next campsite and daylight was still upon us. Morale was at its highest since we started, 10/10.

20/10/11 Day 5 6:00am

Exhaustion was setting in, so much so we could not even start this paragraph with "a new day". It was also clear to us that Vincent had snapped: we found him curled up, fully dressed at the back of his tent, demonstrating a remarkable resemblance to Gollum. Eventually, we conjured up the will to start our "longest day". Fortunately, it was not destined to be as highly demanding as previously. The team limped desperately over the first hill in a race to the coast and our final destination on the expedition, Ravenglass. Once we saw the assessor for our congratulations we bought a nice plate of chips and an ice-cold Coke each; the most rewarding achievement for our efforts (until we are awarded our certificates, of course).

BELGIAN BATTLEFIELDS

Waking up at 4 o'clock in the morning is often thought of as an impossible task for teenagers, but didn't we prove them wrong? Forty students slowly but surely piled on to the coach and we soon made ourselves comfortable for the long journey ahead. Even with mild sleep deprivation, spirits were high as we all looked forward to seeing in real life what we have previously only seen in black and white photos. After a smooth sailing across the channel, we quickly realised we were going to be blessed with fantastic weather; what a shame nobody listened to Mrs Atkinson (or Boss as she liked to be called) about bringing sun cream!

On our first full day in Ypres, we visited our first site, which was Essex Farm, one of many casualty clearing stations. It was a useful way to start the trip, as it painted a picture in our minds of the challenging conditions medical staff had to work in and how women also played a big role in the reserve trenches. Whilst there we visited the grave of V. J. Strudwick, a 15 year old soldier who sadly died on the front line. This



really hit home as he was a similar age to us and we could never imagine being in his position at such a young age.

After settling into a steady routine of seeing Commonwealth Graveyards all around the Belgium countryside, we noticed a lack of German graves. So, when we pulled up to Langemark, we all experienced a different type of sadness which we did not expect. Perhaps this was because 45,000 German soldiers had not got the burial they had deserved. In 1918, only a small piece of land was given to the Germans to lay their soldiers to rest as the people of Belgium blamed them for starting the War. Due to the lack of space, these soldiers were buried upright and, in parts of the cemetery, up to 40 unknown men share one headstone. 25,000 German soldiers did not even receive that type of grave as they were buried in one mass pit. This was a real eye-opener for everyone, as it reminded us that there were two sides to this war and many innocent Germans died too.

We had a very intense and emotional morning, so you can imagine our relief when we were told by our tour guide Dave that we could go for a bit of 'choccy shopping' and walk through the beautiful town of Ypres. We were able to indulge ourselves in Belgium's famous waffles, and they definitely lived up to their reputation! Later that evening, we walked a short distance to the Menin Gate for the 8 o'clock ceremony, which happens every evening. We were lucky enough to be represented by four pupils who laid a wreath on our behalf. This was a great honour as there were over 400 people present to pay their respects to those who died in the War.

Whilst on the trip, it seemed only sensible to visit some of the preserved trenches and experience the cramped conditions that the soldiers not only had to fight in, but live in. Around the Ypres Salient we visited British, French, Canadian and German front lines, but for us the most



poignant were the Irish trenches of the Somme. We appreciated the time given to us by the curator, Teddy, but enjoyed the light relief that Julia Glynn and Jonah Winn provided when they dressed in complete WW1 outfits. Julia sometimes took her role too seriously as she pretended to resuscitate poor Jonah!

A fitting end to our day on the Somme was a visit to Thiepval. This memorial was dedicated to the missing of the Somme and was truly breath-taking in size, but had to be to fit on all the names. We had 45 minutes there to enjoy the afternoon sun and, in the quiet, to reflect upon our experiences.

Of course, these sights showed us only a fraction of what the War was like on the western front, but they emphasised the sheer scale on which the War was fought - something we had never been able to imagine until we saw them first hand.

The visits were only part of a brilliant four days as we also enjoyed our free time in the hotel where we took full advantage of the ping pong tables, with matches of truly epic proportions! And, of course, no one can forget the murdering of the karaoke which we will never be able to remove from our memory. As well as being able to try the Belgian waffles, we also had the unusual chance to experience the bizarre speciality of "Chicken, Chips and PEACH!"

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all teachers for accompanying us and helping make this fantastic trip possible. We would also like to say a massive thank you to Mrs Atkinson (aka Boss) for taking so much time to organise this amazing experience and for also putting up with all of us! I am sure this is a trip we will never forget.





women. As the New York Post put it "If you see one show this season, make it 'The Scottsboro Boys'. It's as simple as that".



BIOLOGY FIELD COURSE AT MALHAM TARN FIELD CENTRE

The lower sixth Biologists made a great start to their A2 course through outdoor investigations, using a variety of sampling techniques. Wading into the tarn, to position light and dark bottles containing plankton, was entertaining when some students found that their footwear was not waterproof. Fortunately, the field centre was able to lend us more wellingtons and waterproof trousers for the next investigation based on the invertebrates in Gordale Beck. Standardised kick sampling allowed a comparison of the species found in fast and slow flowing sections of the stream.

The highlight of the course was the unusually large success rate of the small mammal traps. These capture the animals without harming them so that they can be marked with tags and released – allowing an estimate of total population size to be made from the proportion of marked animals recaptured. Most of the traps had caught either a mouse or a vole which is unusual because the mice are nocturnal and voles are diurnal so they are not normally active at the same time.

The last day involved a study of succession on the bog at the edge of the tarn. Over time the tarn is gradually getting smaller as more plant communities become established. This is a natural process which would eventually lead to the development of woodland. Our transect showed a surprising number of different species of plants in the early stages of succession which contrasted well with our previous study at Ainsdale sand dunes.

GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

The sixth form geographers have been getting to grips with some of the best available geography in the county. February saw the AS and A2 students visit Lancaster University for two workshops with vulcanologists in the Environment Centre. The first session focused on the nature of plate tectonics and the formation of different rock types and tectonic features. The second session was undertaken in one of the research laboratories, where the students were able to witness and ask questions about an experimental model of a volcano conduit. The key emphasis was on how predicting and understanding volcanic events can be linked to how gases separate from molten rock. All students came away with a better understanding of tectonic processes and landforms, and were privileged to have had access to recent research ideas and techniques.

Early March then saw the AS students embark on two days of work 'in the field'. Building on their previous theoretical studies, and in preparation for their AS module exams, they started off their first day with a detailed comparison of different settlements to the north of Preston. The afternoon then saw them undertake a practical look at coastal processes and landforms and gave them an opportunity to make an informed opinion of some of the recent coastal defences along the Fylde coast. The second day saw a bitterly cold but enjoyable study of the River Wyre and how it changes from source to mouth. The teachers were very

impressed by the efficiency of the students as they collected their primary data in what were rather chilly waters. Chocolate cake and coffee helped to revitalise everyone in the afternoon and the group returned to school with a thorough understanding of a river system and how it does not always behave as it should.

For many of these students, their next fieldwork experience will see them visiting Iceland in October.

YORK HOCKEY TOUR

On Tuesday, 19 October, 31 pupils (made up of under 13 and under 14 hockey squads) left KGS to embark on a three day tour to York. We were to follow a packed itinerary, taking in a number of York's famous landmarks as well as playing hockey matches against some top York Schools.

Our first stop en-route to our hotel was an hour's coaching at St Peter's School taken by Bob Maltby, the junior coach at York Hockey Club. We practised a few dodging techniques before focusing on shooting, including the taking of penalty strokes. This was a great start to the tour and helped to expend some energy before we checked in to the Ace Hotel in the Micklegate District of York.

The next morning, after a hearty breakfast, we walked to York's Dungeons. We had a brief city tour, learning some of the grim history associated with Clifford's Tower and the Magistrates' Court before our 'tour' of the dungeons. 

Sunday, 20 February


The girls arrived excitedly, eagerly awaiting this Caribbean tour for which they had been counting down the months, weeks and days!



Giggleswick at Giggleswick 30th April 2011

On a beautiful but windy day Kirkham won the toss and chose to bat in a 65 over game on an excellent wicket. The first team batting has the benefit of 35 overs, but Kirkham played the game in 20/20 style and were all out after 22.2 overs for a total of 126. Wickets fell at regular intervals and only a stand of 52 between Lewis Leach (42) and Harry Mason steadied the innings.

Giggleswick had the benefit of the 12 overs Kirkham failed to use. Tea was taken after 12 of the 42 available overs, with Giggleswick at 18 without loss. On a good wicket and a short boundary on one side, it was going to be important not to bowl 'short'.

Kirkham lost the toss and were asked to bowl. The failure to bowl line and length was costly as the St. Mary's openers enjoyed some wayward bowling to get to 45 off only 5 overs. It was not until the seventeenth over that the partnership was broken with the total at 163. The final three overs brought two wickets and only 13 runs, leaving Kirkham 177 to win.

KGS at 97 for 7 with seven overs remaining. Ward (42 n.o.) and Powell (33) mounted a spirited rearguard action with a stand of 70 and required only ten off the last over. A disciplined over by the opener who had earlier scored a century saw Kirkham miss out by 8 runs.

Stonyhurst at Stonyhurst 14th May 2011

Despite the inclement weather and poor forecast, the start was delayed by only 30 minutes.

It was decided to play a 33/27 over match, thus offering the opportunity of a draw. Kirkham won the toss and put Stonyhurst in on a good if wet wicket. The opening partnership batted well and, combined with some wayward bowling and poor catching, were able to get to 100 without loss, having seen seven catches go down. The eventual demise of the openers and an improvement in bowling and fielding brought some respite and restricted the scoring. Hostile fields were set and, despite good bowling, Peacock and Burrows managed to hold out for a draw.

Hutton G S at Hutton Tuesday 17th May

The inclement weather meant the game was to be 20/20 format. Hutton won the toss and put Kirkham in to bat. Accurate and hostile bowling restricted Kirkham to twelve for the loss of one wicket after five overs. The sixth over brought another wicket and, despite a stand of 32 between Ward (12) and Lavelle (17), before the third wicket fell in the thirteenth over the score was just forty six. The accurate bowling by Hutton continued to put pressure on the Kirkham batsmen and it was only in the final three overs that runs came more freely, to leave KGS on 93-8 after their twenty overs.

The Hutton innings started badly with a wicket falling to the third ball and when Jones (3-10) struck twice in the fifth over and a run out in the sixth, they were struggling on eighteen for the loss of four wickets. Cowley were the next opponents and Kirkham elected to bat in a 20/20 game and managed to amass 170-4 with the runs shared between Thomas (25), King (27), Williams and Graham (both 25). 

The under 16 squad left for Manchester on Friday, 19 November to play in the under 16 regional round of the National Hockey Competition.


















STAFF CHANGES







The main outing for the J2 children this year was a trip to the Manchester Science and Industry Museum. This museum has recently been modernised and new attractions added. The Air and Space Museum was the first port of call where the children could see a variety of models and real planes. The highlight of the trip was definitely the 4D Experience where most of the children got very wet!

To tie in with their Science work on 'Teeth' the J1 children visited Blackpool Zoo where the staff there introduced them to elephant teeth as well as cockroaches, both of which were passed around the group! In their Geography lessons the J1's studied their local community and went for a walk around Kirkham, looking at the shops and facilities of the town. They then learnt all about 'Weather' and, after creating their



own weather reports, Emma Jesson from ITV, came into school to talk to them about her job as a weather presenter.

It was an early start for the J1 trip to York to visit the Jorvik Centre. The children enjoyed an archaeological dig to discover treasures from different periods and then a tour of the museum. It was a long day but all the children had a fantastic time reliving the Viking era.

Debi Gliori, the author of the Mr Bear books, visited us in March. All the infant and J1 children were fascinated by her talk on the writing and illustrating of her books and were encouraged to complete drawings of various animals.

Throughout the year the top infants have welcomed a number of visitors to school. Two firemen came to talk to the children about fire safety and what to do if they see a fire. Mrs Kemp brought in some baby chicks to the classroom and Mr Dowbiggin came in to help the class build their enormous robot, Colin. Chef Nigel Smith from The Villa also visited to demonstrate and help the children prepare a variety of mouth-watering dishes. As part of their Science topic on Health and Growth two of our I3 parents came to talk to the children. 
My Island

The moral of this story is 'Do not be boastful'.


