Welcome to the end of year edition of the Kirkhamian Newsletter. We also produce two electronic versions in the autumn and spring terms. There is so much going on at KGS that I continue to be amazed and proud of the talent we have on show.

I would like to start by looking at how the School has been performing academically and across a number of key areas over the past year, before focusing on the many co-curricular opportunities we have undertaken. It may be worth mentioning that KGS has three values which underpin our mission statement 'Enter in order to profit'.

They are:

- Inspirational Teaching

I do hope that all I share now upholds all the values that underpin and allow the statement to be met by many different children across many areas of school life. Our job is to find the talent that shines within.

Overall the results are looking incredibly positive for the fourth year in a row. We have achieved results well above the national average once more at GCSE A**/A and at A Level A*/A. We should be mindful that the past few years have been very challenging and continue to be so. This has added additional pressure on the pupils but, once more, they have exceeded expectations.

As a School we undertake an annual Mock Inspection and two rounds of monitoring to ensure the quality of teaching and learning remains high. We have continued to train and educate staff in a wide range of pastoral and safeguarding matters to ensure this level of support matches the investment in the academic side of school. The Kirkhamian also celebrates the large number of pupils who are involved in the wide range of co-curricular activities we have on offer. You will see from the following pages just how much talent is on show at KGS across many areas of school life.





Music

September 2021 saw a return to a new version of normality in the musical life of Kirkham Grammar School. The usual routine of rehearsals sought to re-establish themselves as pupils returned to peripatetic tuition and the bands, choirs and ensembles settled into a familiar pattern.

The first concert in early October, before an audience, fell to our Sixth Form musicians in a Coffee Concert which included pieces by Ravel, Leoncavallo and various others. It was more daunting than usual, as none of the contributors had performed before a live audience for a long time. However, they rose to the occasion in true Kirkham style, delighting the small but appreciative audience.

The senior members of the School then handed the 'baton' to our youngest members, as the First Year performed a concert for parents, friends and staff in mid-October. This evening event in the Recital Hall gave us a glimpse of the breadth and depth of talent that will no doubt delight us for years to come.



Thursday 11 November at 11.00 am saw the School fall silent for the Armistice Remembrance Service. A Sixth Form music scholar delivered an immaculate rendition of the Last Post and Reveille, as all remembered the fallen.

The Carol Service in December, was delivered through an online event. The choir sang the festive carols of the season, interspersed with readings.

The Christmas Concert, in the Summerlee Hall, returned for the first time in two years, and what a return it was! The audience were thrilled and delighted. At the beginning of February, the KGS



singers had a night to themselves when the Recital Hall rang to the sound of voices old and young. They treated their audience to a fabulous variety of songs from the world of musicals and music halls, which could have graced any stage. The common denominator to all these performances was the outstanding singing teacher at Kirkham Grammar School, Miss Howard, who had coached and encouraged each and every one of them to a high standard that drew cries of appreciation and applause from their audience.

The Spring Term advertised the return of the annual Music House Festival, Miss Crook and Mr Dalton had the enjoyable experience of listening to almost three hundred pupils. As individuals and in groups they sought to secure points for their house, or maybe even progress through to the final. Every year so many of the pupil body choose to give their time and participate in this annual music-making festival. After the initial auditions, it all rested on a Friday in early March and what was to be a thrilling final. Mr Ryan Breen was the adjudicator for the day and had the unenviable task of selecting the winner. The Gala Concert in the following week gave an invited audience an opportunity to hear the winners and finalists. It was a truly wonderful evening, with some outstanding playing that confirmed that the future of music at KGS continues to be a beacon of excellence. The House Choir competition again took the form of a 'sing off' in the Summerlee Hall with the four house choirs doing battle. The standard was very high and in a closely fought contest, School House emerged triumphant. Congratulations to all the finalists who are so talented in their own individual ways.

Early March saw a new addition to the music calendar in the form of a 'Guitar and Drums Showcase', which was presented by our wonderful peripatetic teachers, Mr Powlesland and Mr Lister. Pieces from Aretha Franklin to Ed Sheeran showed how diverse the talent at Kirkham Grammar School is from pupils across all the year groups. No doubt this evening will be repeated next year.

Late March saw the Choir performing at the annual Founders' Day Service. They led the congregational hymns with conviction, and also brought musical moments of their own from the likes of John Rutter, Victor Johnson and Beethoven, all to their customary high standard.

Early May saw the return of the annual Spring Concert after a two year hiatus. This featured all the major ensembles of the School, together with Upper Sixth soloists, and LAMDA readers. The high standards of traditional music-making continues to go from strength to strength here at Kirkham Grammar School, and whilst opportunities abound to venture into and enjoy contemporary popular tastes, the core of our being rests in the classical traditions that have served us all so well in the past; a firm foundation for present growth and future fulfilment, for all our musicians.

Girls' Sport

Hockey

The 2021/22 hockey season has been nothing short of impressive. The squads have enjoyed regular Saturday matches. The 1st XI played in the England Hockey Tier 1 National Competition against some top class opposition, Repton, Sedbergh, Oakham. We are pleased to report that the 1st XI finished in fourth position overall giving them an overall ranking of 12th in the country.

The 1st seven finished as champions of the Austin Friars Sevens tournament scoring no less than 16 goals throughout the day and sealing the cup final with a 4-0 victory.



In the Cheadle Sevens tournament KGS entered two squads. Both teams progressed through the group stages. In the final KGS took on Sedbergh School. KGS had plenty of chances but unfortunately couldn't convert. One shuffle and one open play goal left the final score at 0-2 with KGS taking 'runners-up' spot.

In the U16 England Hockey National Competition the girls played strong opposition. Our team played extremely well but unfortunately bowed out after round two of the competition.

The U14 squad also played in the England Hockey National Cup. Matches against local and regional competition provided challenge for the girls with Repton School progressing through as winners to the national finals.

The U13 mini hockey provided opportunity for both the A and B team sevens squads to compete in various matches. Tough competition saw them finish as runners-up in both pools which unfortunately meant that they fell short of qualifying for the regional round.

The current U13 and U14 squads now look forward to their hockey tour to Ireland in November, whilst the seniors await their postponed tour of Barbados in February.

Cross Country

The girls' cross country teams have been involved in two top class competitions. The first being the Stonyhurst Invitational event which was run in pretty tough conditions. The team worked hard with one pupil finishing in overall second place and the team taking silver overall. In the Sedbergh Invitational event, KGS put in an outstanding performance against several top class schools.



Swimming

In the pool, KGS competed against QEGS Blackburn, Hutton Grammar School, Bury Grammar School, St Edwards, Ripley St Thomas and Hulme Grammar School. The swimmers worked hard as a team clocking up excellent points within each competition. In the QEGS quadrangular event, KGS finished in a creditable fourth place overall.

Congratulations to two pupils who qualified for the Lancashire Championships in the 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m and 1500m freestyle and the 400m, 200m individual medley and the 200m backstroke. They also gained qualification into the regional finals in various freestyle events, the 400m IM and the 200m backstroke.

Netball

We are delighted to report that four of our KGS sportswomen have been selected into the Lancashire Netball Squads.

Tennis

In the U15 Division 1 LTA Schools Cup, the girls progressed through the group rounds to qualify for the regional finals in Sunderland during the October half term break. After successfully seeing off St Peters, York and Yarm School, the girls secured a place in the National Final held at Bolton Arena in December. The tennis on display was magnificent and after some very tough matches it was close at the top of the table. After the final doubles game of the weekend against Repton School, it was clear that KGS had topped the table and were crowned LTA 2021/22 National Tennis Champions. The 2022/23 tennis season is now well underway.



The U18 Aberdare Cup Team progressed through the group rounds and enjoyed success in their quarter-final matches v Stonyhurst. The girls won three out of the four singles matches and one out of two of their doubles. In the semi-final stage, they defeated Alderley Edge School for Girls' which led to the final group round against South Hunsley School for a place in the U18 National Final. A 10-2 victory secured this place and the girls travelled to Nottingham National Tennis Centre for the finals in July. At the National Finals, played over four days, our relatively young team faced tough opposition. However, the event was an excellent experience for them, one they all thoroughly enjoyed.

In the Year 7/8 LTA division one competition, the girls have qualified for the Regional Finals which will be held in Sunderland in the 2022/23 academic year.

Athletics

After a very successful Easter camp, the girls' athletics season began strongly with the girls' achieving great results in their warm-up fixtures against Lytham High School and Canon Slade School.

The Junior and Intermediate squads took to the first round of the Track and Field Cup at Stanley

Park. Many personal bests were achieved on the track and likewise in the field. At the half-way point, KGS were in the lead in both age groups with all to play for. During the afternoon events KGS continued to work hard being awarded excellent points for each event.

When the final results were announced KGS were crowned Lancashire Champions resulting in progression to the Regional 'A' Finals at Trafford Park

On Monday 13 June at Trafford Park, the girls certainly didn't disappoint. They, once again, scored highly within both track and field events, resulting in them leading the way at the half-way point. It was always going to be tough, but KGS performed with real gusto. At the final results, both the Junior and Intermediate teams were regional runners-up. It was a terrific experience and performance from all involved!

The Fylde Coast Athletics Championships were next and with all four teams competing it was set to be a great day! The U13s performed well with Emilia Simpson and Abbie Ely leading their team to overall victory in their age group. The U14 squad clocked up great points in their events but were unfortunately pipped to the post finishing as runners-up. A great team performance from the U15s secured their overall age group victory, whilst the U17 squad finished in style in their last Fylde Coast event with Georgia Nicholls and Keira Tomes collecting the final trophy of the day.

Overall, another incredibly successful year.

Boys' Sport

Rugby Union

1st XV

Kirkham Grammar School 1st XV had an outstanding season, especially after the previous season was decimated by Covid. The team started the season with fine wins. For the first time in a number of years, the team entered the Schools' National Cup and again KGS made good progress. Despite being unbeaten, the team handled the pressure well with a number of players performing at a high level. From November onwards the team maintained this high level. This led Kirkham into a semi-final against Barnard Castle which again, despite an almighty effort from the Durham side, KGS won 18-13 and were rewarded with a trip to Twickenham for the first time since 1997. In a nail biting game, spoilt by the weather conditions, KGS succumbed to a 15-10 loss to Trinity School from Croydon.



Despite this loss and a narrow defeat in the later stages of the Rosslyn Park Sevens, KGS rebounded with an outstanding success at the Sedbergh School National Tens. On the second day, Kirkham dominated QEGS Wakefield and Ipswich School and then met our friends Barnard Castle in another semi-final clash. Once again KGS narrowly gained success with a 7-0 victory

which took them into the final against the host school, Sedbergh. In the final, KGS produced an outstanding performance with a 25-7 victory and lifted the trophy for the first time since 2003.

KGS also won the Birkenhead School Under 18 Sevens and were semi-finalists in the Surrey Under 18 Sevens.

Headmaster's XV

The Headmaster's XV enjoyed another successful season, only losing two out of ten matches. Two other highlights were wins against Manchester GS and The Grange, Northwich 1st XV.

3rd XV

The 3rd XV only lost one game, a very close game away at Bloxham (3-5) and there were notable wins against St. Ambrose (17-10) and Austin Friars 1st XV (45-12), the latter of which was an entertaining spectacle with 7 tries from Kirkham in a resounding win.

U16

The campaign began with a tough pre-season friendly against George Watson's College, Edinburgh where they narrowly lost 10-12. However, the boys responded well beating Wirral, Lancaster, Denstone College and AKS, Lytham in the first round of the Lancashire Cup. After half term, the boys experienced some tougher tests and successfully beat RGS Newcastle away 10-7 and Ballymena Academy away in Northern Ireland 19-5. This set the boys up well for their long anticipated fixture against Sedbergh where they also won 17-7.

After Christmas the main focus became the Lancashire Cup where Kirkham beat Bolton School in the quarter-final, Hutton Grammar School in the semi-final and became overall champions, beating Lancaster RGS 34-5 in the final.

The U16s also enjoyed a very successful Sevens campaign. They were semi-finalists in the RGS Newcastle and Warwick Sevens, losing to the overall tournament winners on both occasions. They were plate winners at the Sedbergh Sevens and second day qualifiers at the Rosslyn Park Sevens, the first ever KGS U16 group to make it to the last 24 teams from 144. On day two, Kirkham faced Harrow School in the knockout who went on to be tournament winners.

U15

The Under 15s have had an excellent season, showing some great progress. After a slow start to the season, the group have worked exceptionally well and performances gradually started to improve. The team had some excellent wins in the Lancashire Cup, a particular highlight being the 33-12 quarter-final win versus Lancaster Grammar School. The cup run culminated in an outstanding cup final performance, where the U15s ran out convincingly 31-7 winners to become the County Champions for the first time in their school careers.



U14

An excellent set of results considering there was only four home games. Alongside some excellent results in the National and County cups, the boys worked hard all season, their attitude and commitment to improve was outstanding; they grew as a side showing great character often against more physically mature boys. The foundation has been set for further success if the boys maintain their desire to improve.

Preparation for the Sevens season started late due to good 15-a-side cup runs with only two sessions prior to Sedbergh Sevens. But, with the same attitude to learn, steady progress was made resulting in winning the Richard Wilson KGS Sevens despite having six boys on the school ski trip.



U13

The U13s had a slow start to the season coming up against three strong teams from Wirral Grammar School, St Ambrose and LRGS. The U13s then travelled down to Denstone College where the team ran in 9 tries and only conceded 1. This was a great result on the road. The season had its ups and downs with a number of fixtures being cancelled due to Covid and weather issues. Some stand out moments for the rest of the season was a 50-15 win over Leicester Grammar School with some stand out performances from a number of players. A trip to Bloxham School in Oxford saw the boys take part in a very competitive game that resulted in a draw. Two further wins against Austin Friars (45-20) and Audenshaw School (30-20) topped their 13's season off.

U12

The U12s had a hugely successful start to their senior school rugby careers. Despite a year full of cancellations, the boys were continually looking to better themselves week upon week. Tuesday after school training sessions and Friday games lessons were always very competitive due to excellent numbers and equally excellent attitudes.

Amongst many of the highlights from the year was that every boy in the year played at least one game of competitive rugby. For some of the boys, it was their first time ever picking up a rugby ball. This was made more pleasing by the more experienced boys in the year having such patience and determination to encourage those who were new to the sport to develop as best as they possibly could.

The two teams in the first year were known as the Wizards and the Moles. These were mixed ability teams and the primary focus was on developing a cohesive, safe environment where the boys could express themselves and, most importantly, have fun.

Cricket

The 1st XI had a busy start to the season beginning with a pre-season friendly against Kirkham CC which resulted in a comfortable victory. As usual, the MCC provided our opposition for our first game proper and after posting a very competitive 178-4, this proved a difficult score to overcome. The next day the 1st XI played AKS away and bowled brilliantly to dismiss the hosts for 103, Third Year Theo Smith taking 4 for 13 runs, then his brother helped knock off the runs with another unbeaten 50. Birkenhead School followed this match for our first Saturday game and, as last season, the visitors racked up another score past 200. The following week the initial round of the Nat West 20/20 took place at AKS with Kirkham drawn against RGS Lancaster and batting first made a competitive total of 150. However, Kirkham could not contain the RGS batters who crossed the line with eight balls to spare. In late March 2023, the current Third and Fourth Year cricketers will embark on their first overseas tour to Barbados, the first time since 2010 that the School has ventured abroad. The coaching staff hope the trip will provide an ideal lead in to our own domestic season and will help develop their cricketing skills and camaraderie during the 12 day trip.

Hockey

Boys' hockey continues to grow in popularity and the U12s and U13s enjoyed some friendly fixtures away at Sedbergh in February.

Cross Country

We represented Fylde in the County Championships. One pupil qualified for the English Schools' Cross Country Championships representing Lancashire.

Tennis

Last season's league was disrupted by Covid restrictions with many schools not being able to fulfil fixtures. This season we have entered both our U13 and U15 into the Lancashire B league.

Athletics

Unfortunately, Covid put an end to all competitions last year. We increased the number of friendly fixtures for boys this year with a focus on development. We met with AKS Lytham home and away, and we hosted Lancaster RGS.

The boys' Track & Field Cup teams competed in the North West regional finals at Trafford Athletics Club on Monday 13 June. The KGS Intermediate boys, consisting of eight Fourth Years and six Third Year boys, really rose to the challenge and finished a respectable fourth place. Cieran Milligan was first in the 800m; Max Musson ran a personal best in his hurdles heat; Harry Case won the high jump with a new personal best; and Charlie Bray scored highly in the discus. Notable performances from the Junior Team came from Ryan Shaw in the 100m; Theo Wren in the hurdles; and Oliver Yates in the javelin and 800m. It was encouraging to see the progress being made from the Juniors.

On Thursday 30 June, the boys took part in the annual Fylde Coast Athletics Championships with the First Years finishing runners-up, Second Years crowned champions, the Third Years runners-up and the Fourth Years finishing in third place. Overall, the KGS team finished runners-up on the day.

It has been fantastic to have both the Track and Field Cup and Fylde Coast competitions back in our sporting calendar after a three year absence due to the pandemic. The athletes and coaches

have thoroughly enjoyed the experience this season and are definitely hungry for next year's competition already.

Kart Racing

One pupil enjoyed a very successful kart season finishing vice champion in the British Kart Championships. He also ended the season as the number two seeded driver in Britain.



Golf

As a school, we decided that it would be worthwhile to offer competitive golf to our pupils, given we had a number of keen players in the school. After enquiring, it became evident that we had enough to field two teams of three in the Independent Schools' Golf Association match play competition. This involved fixtures against schools in the designated area, where a win would see teams proceed to the next round. Given it was our first time of asking, we were very pleased to have the second team reach the semi-final, and the first team reach the final of the area competition. Both teams were beaten by the eventual winners, who had two Upper Sixth Form pupils both looking to turn pro next year, playing off plus two! The future is very bright indeed for this vounger team, as those exceptional lads will move on next year.

We also entered an ISGA tournament day at Worsley Golf Club, which involved a member of staff making up a four ball with three pupils. It was a great day out and something we would definitely look to do again. In all fixtures and competitions, our pupils were excellent ambassadors for the school, with impeccable etiquette at all time. Golf club members regularly commented how well behaved they were and a credit to the school.

It is great to see so much success and so many new sports being introduced.





Drama

During the Autumn Term, the department was able to invite an audience back into school after two years of uncertainty with Covid. On the last week of term, we produced two showcase evenings; one performance in the Drama Studio and one larger performance in the Summerlee Hall

Key Stage Four and Five pupils kicked off the week, showcasing the work that they had produced in lessons for their GCSE and A Level coursework. The Fourth, Fifth, Lower and Upper Sixth pupils performed a selection of devised performances which were created from a given stimuli. It was a fantastic opportunity for the pupils to share their final ideas and how far they had progressed. The Drama Society took to the stage for the final time at KGS performing a scripted extract from Chatroom by Edna Walsh. We extend a huge thank you for their passion and commitment over the past three years.

On the second evening, First to Third Year pupils showcased the work they had produced in Drama Club. First, Second and Third Year pupils were dedicated to create a range of devised and scripted performances, monologues, duologues, dance routines and Christmas melodies. I was delighted that this showcase sold out and had to relocate from the Drama Studio to the Summerlee Hall. Both evenings were a huge success which got pupils excited for our whole school production which would take place at the end of the Spring Term.

Over the past two years, theatres have been forced to close due to the pandemic. As soon as it was safe and theatres reopened, the department was keen to get pupils back into the theatre watching live performances. Key Stage Three, Four and Five pupils had the opportunity to watch UBU at the Lowry, The School of Rock and Blood Brothers at the Palace Theatre. Theatre visits are currently being organised for the next academic year.

The Spring Term ended on a high with our whole school production of Dream On, a modern adaptation of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. Pupils from First Year to Upper Sixth brought this magical world to life and I applaud their dedication and commitment during rehearsals and the performances. We are currently looking into buying the rights for our next production of Peter Pan which will take place during the Autumn Term of 2022. This would be a fantastic play with a wide array of opportunities for a large cast after having over 70 pupils take part this year. It is so pleasing to see drama fully back.

Combined Cadet Force

It has been an excellent year for the CCF with the news that a pupil was appointed Lord Lieutenants' Cadet for Lancashire for this year. This is the second year running that we have had the Lord Lieutenants' Cadet, which is the highest honour a cadet can achieve. Our year started with a new set of Fourth Year recruits, totalling 105, on drill for the first few weeks. This took our contingent strength to over 230 cadets. The Fourth Year cadets took to drill very well and soon showed great promise. The five weeks of drill flew by and before we knew it, it was time for the Passing Out parade. Families gathered for the first time since Covid, to watch the CCF parade and the Fourth Year cadets were excellent - probably one of the better parades we have seen to date.

Whilst the Fourth Year were doing drill the Fifth Year were being put through their paces with various activities. Mrs Taylor was the RCO for the shooting detail; Mr Routh and Mr Hancock were challenging the cadets with archery and climbing; Mrs Horvath was looking after the physical training side with some PT; Mrs Sutcliffe was developing their leadership skills; Miss Russell and Mrs Marsh were looking after the RAF cadets doing the RAF syllabus; and Mrs Atkinson and Mrs Parkinson were running one of the cadet's favourite activities, paintball.



After half term, 28 of the Fifth Year opted to stay on with CCF.

We also had a Field Day in November where we took around 170 cadets to Weeton Barrack's Training Area.

After Christmas, the Fourth Year were experiencing weapon handling, paintball, fieldcraft, archery and climbing, first aid and the RAF syllabus. The Fifth Year were learning how to instruct in preparation for their first teaching experience. Our RAF section had a day at Inskip Cadet Centre where they were treated to flying the flight simulators; they also visited Hangar 42 at Blackpool to see how a WW2 RAF fighter squadron operated.

The second Field Day was in March for Fifth Year and Sixth Form cadets.

The Summer Term is always one of our busiest in CCF. We had all the administration for the incoming recruits in September, a Field Day and Summer Camp.





Duke of Edinburgh

So far this year we have 96 Bronze Awards, 20 Silver Awards and 25 Gold Awards fully completed. There are quite a few more almost complete. Completing all the sections of the award demonstrates the dedication and determination of our pupils and the activities our pupils undertake, especially for the volunteering section, are inspiring. Over 270 of our pupils will have ventured out on an expedition this academic year, some of them will have undertaken two expeditions (Bronze and Silver). Running two Gold expeditions, four Bronze expeditions and one Silver expedition has been tough going, but the efforts of everyone involved has made everything worthwhile.

The KGS staff supporting the DofE at KGS are so dedicated and always put the needs of our pupils before their own. Their efforts have given our pupils the opportunity to know that patience and perseverance pay off and that teamwork does make life easier. By July, we had caught up with all the expeditions delayed from the pandemic lockdowns!

So with all of this going on what does the future hold and what about the next 480 years?

Behind the scenes we have been heavily recruiting the following new staff for September 2022 to replace only three staff who are retiring or leaving: two teachers of mathematics; teacher of English; teacher of languages; teacher of Latin and the classics; teacher of humanities; and teacher of design technology. Additionally, we have appointed three Boarding House Staff, a Conditioning Coach, a Pastoral Mentor (mental health), a HR Manager and two extra site staff.

We have also held internal appointments for Head of Year, Head of Computing, Head of Design Technology, Director of New Technologies and Deputy Head Pastoral, Equality and Diversity and a Pastoral Manager.

We have also added four new classrooms for September, eight new smart boards, expanded the Boarding House and created a new Pastoral Hub. This is all linked to an ambitious investment plan in the school over the next seven years. The project will be called, Project 480 and we will share more information on this in the new academic year. Due to our envious reputation and popularity, we really are in a position to continue to develop and grow but retain the family ethos that is KGS.



As a pupil here at Kirkham Grammar School back in the nineties, the absence of mobile phones and the Internet enabled me to lead a less chaotic and more low-key existence in comparison to the children of today. One thing that hasn't changed since then though is the level of care that the KGS staff provide; such attention was offered, as it is now to our pupils, to me and my counterparts in abundance. Albeit, I may not have recognised the importance of this level of support back then, I most certainly value and often reflect upon the impact it subsequently had on my development growing up.

The KGS Combined Cadet Force for example, and many of the staff that promoted this particular element of School life, afforded me with a platform to experience how to adapt and challenge myself to the extreme, whilst demonstrating resilience in the face of adversity; all as relevant now, perhaps more so, than they were back then. Had the KGS staff not been there to guide me with their expertise and genuine care, I suspect I would have been less able to cope, reflect and learn from the many and varied experiences that life subsequently presented me with. The KGS staff shaped me into the adult I am today.

As a consequence of my education here, every professional decision that I make in my role as Headmistress centres on ensuring we offer the very best opportunities, experiences and staff for your children to learn from. Undoubtedly, the last couple of years have certainly seen a spotlight shone on those in the teaching profession; without doubt the KGS staff have delivered. Despite the various interruptions from Covid-19 that were still present at the start of this academic year, our staff have unwaveringly guided and supported every pupil in their care, going above and beyond in all that they do.

Naturally, due to the worldwide pandemic, some of our usual offerings, experiences and opportunities looked different for our pupils. Despite the setbacks though, we remained resolute that we should remain positive, provide for our pupils and that eventually normality would resume. Queen Elizabeth II delivered a heartfelt and reassuring message in line with this to the nation in 2020, with part of her speech expressing: 'We should take comfort that...better days will return'. Although nearly 18 months later, the Autumn Term 2021 continued to be punctuated by Covid-19, better days certainly followed, and I sense that we are now all starting to feel somewhat revitalised as we move towards the end of this academic year. It has been a year of 'getting back on track', developing relationships, reinstating opportunities and consequently shaping our young people in readiness for the future.

As we have moved forwards, we have been able to nurture our relationships with our pupils in particular, in addition to our parents. and each other. The sense of community has never felt so strong. The presence, support and feedback of our parents, grandparents and wider family members at our weekly Achievement Assemblies has been uplifting for example. Our parents have been invaluable as key speakers at events; they have provided ideas and decorations to improve the aesthetics of our building for festivals and celebrations; some of them have even temporarily donated animals to support the teaching of our curriculum; and we have been overwhelmed with their kindness when they have delivered cakes and biscuits as a token of their gratitude to our staff. All have been a source of encouragement as we have navigated our way through 2021 - 2022.

Our co-curricular clubs have continued to grow, with over thirty clubs this term to choose from, three of which now operate at 7.50 am! Our pupils take part in these across multiple year groups, and it has been a delight to watch them foster new relationships with each other across the age ranges. Fixtures have expanded, most recently to also include those pupils who are developing their confidence when competing, giving them a taste of healthy rivalry in a collaborative and supportive environment. Those that are ready for more intense competition have been afforded a range of experiences including fixtures, and we have continued to be aspirational for even our youngest pupils in Infants, with the introduction of some new tournaments this Summer Term. Football and Cricket for all of our pupils has been a particular hit.

Our School Council has been reinstated, with pupils meeting weekly to discuss issues at the forefront of their minds. They have raised awareness of charitable organisations and fundraised for Red Nose Day, Children in Need, the NSPCC and the Save the Children, Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal. They have been keen to sort out minor organisational issues in-house that have affected them directly, creating a new lunch rota for the pupils. My weekly meetings with the Head Girl and Boy, who represent the group, have been enlightening and I am looking forward to starting to assist this group of young people with their initiatives relating to the environmental issues we are all passionate

At the end of the Spring Term, the postponed and long-awaited ski trip was a resounding success. Even our youngest pupils in J2 proved themselves to be more than capable of handling being away from home for the week. It was mesmerising to observe the quiet tenacity that many of our pupils

demonstrated when overcoming fears and tackling new skills. The very fact that our 8 to 11-year-olds could motivate themselves to get up, organise their belongings and get breakfast all in time for 9.00 am each day, and relatively independently, means we must all be doing something right!

The penultimate week of the Summer Term 1 enabled us to reflect upon the vast array of opportunities and good fortune for those in the Junior, Infant and Pre-School. The buildings were awash with the nation's colours of red, white and blue as we celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee: the celebrations were phenomenal. with multiple pupils expressing that 'KGS is the best school ever!'. Day excursions, residentials and various in-house events have all enhanced the curriculum once again this year. The J4s finishing the academic year with a residential to Eskdale, exposing and nurturing their mental and physical capabilities.

As the academic year drew to a close, I was excited that all of our pupils were given the opportunity to be involved in our annual Sports Day and our inaugural Verse Speaking Competition, with our Pre-School pupils opening the event with a delightful poem. With our pupils demonstrating their abilities in the likes of the Lytham Performing Arts Festival, and being placed first in the AJIS Music Festival, our first ever Young Musician and Drama Pupil of the Year festival was a very memorable occasion. Our end-of-term 'Review of the Year' was a wonderful opportunity to celebrate all of our pupils' achievements.

As always, without such determined and vivacious young people at KGS the School would not be the success it is today. Alongside them, showing them the way as always, are our committed, passionate and driven KGS staff. The staff of the past, alongside those of the present, are most certainly interwoven into the fabric of KGS, positively permeating the entire culture and ethos of this very special school.

Better days have certainly returned, and my staff and I remain committed and determined to provide opportunity and experience for all our pupils in a caring and supportive environment. Our J4 pupils will move on to senior school with many happy memories and life experiences. Undoubtedly, they will feel trepidation, but above all, I sincerely hope that they carry with them the fact that they are cared for here and that they matter. "The course of true love never did run smooth"

William Shakespeare, A Midsummer Night's Dream (Act 1, Sc 1)

Over the last few years, it has not just been 'true love' that hasn't 'run smoothly', but many of the activities that we take for granted.

Therefore, we were delighted to be able to welcome back a live audience to the Summerlee Hall for the 2022 production of Dream On, a modern adaptation of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream.

Alison Chaplin's version of Shakespeare's play includes the same high-spirited mischief, led by the notorious 'wanderer of the night', Puck.

We see the human world and the fairy world merge in scenes of chaos and misunderstandings, much to the amusement of the fairies. The fairies are also able to relish in the unexpected antics provided by the group of mechanicals, who are attempting to rehearse their own play to perform for Theseus and Hippolyta. However, their acting talents and rehearsal plans leave a lot to be desired, as they also arrive in the forest at night.







Pupils from the First Year through to the Upper Sixth brought this magical world to life. The fantasy woodland landscape of the fairies was beautifully created by the First, Second, Third and Fourth Year, who were part of Puck's gang and enjoyed the misfortunes of the mortals who wandered into their demesne.

These friendship fall-outs and fickle behaviour of the mortals were also mirrored in the world of the fairies, with Oberon and Titania struggling to agree with each other.

The role of Puck was convincingly played by Isabella Durston, who portrayed the sprite's mischievous side brilliantly.

The mechanicals, presented as boiler-suited workers by Fourth Year GCSE drama pupils, created entertainingly comic vignettes, most notably led by Dotty Hackett's portrayal of Bottom, the egocentric and bullish buffoon.



ACPS – Air Cadet Pilot Scholarship

One of the major opportunities for RAF cadets is the chance to fly and the ACPS is the opportunity to learn to fly solo with a fully funded 12 hours of pilot instruction, with all costs covered too!

Each year, 39 scholarships are given out to cadets who apply from the CCF alone. I was lucky enough to have been selected after my application was shortlisted.

I travelled to Tayside in Dundee on Sunday 27 March 2022

Monday 28 March 2022 - My first lesson took place the next day following the welcome brief and my first theory lesson. I had an amazing first day and the weather was perfect. I was able to practically apply the principles of flights covered during my First Class Classification to the real thing. Not every day is a flying day – this is dictated by the weather but it does allow for the theoretical side of flight and I had plenty of work to do in preparation for the ACPS Test which I had to pass to be able to fly solo.

Wednesday 30 March 2022 - Today was a fun day which started off with arriving at the airport about 8.30 am. I hung around for a while in the cadet cabin before my instructor came and asked if I was ready to go flying. Of course I was, so off I went to prep the aircraft and he met me out there. We went on the first flight and the weather was great. We came back and had a short debrief before I returned to the cabin. Later on, after lunch, we had a short brief for the next lesson before my instructor came along and we were ready to go flying again. This time the weather was a bit dodgy but it cleared up perfectly by the end for a nice landing. Then, after landing, we refuelled and put away the aircraft before returning to our hotel for the night.

Thursday 31 March 2022 - Another slow day today due to high crosswinds preventing us from flying. I spent the majority of the day continuing with my revision for the ACPS test which I will hopefully be ready to take soon.

Friday 1 April 2022 - Today was an awesome day! Started off as always with the morning walk rounds of all the aircraft and we then headed to our cadet cabin for a while before my instructor came and grabbed me for our first flight of the day. This was stalling which is a fairly simple lesson so we finished after about 30-40 minutes and decided we were going to have a bit of an adventure. A few radio transmissions later and we were headed on the way to RAF Leuchars! We had been cleared for a low approach and go around which meant we could do a slow pass right down the runway and have a good look at the airfield. It was an absolute treat! Then, the afternoon flight was a simple lesson on climbing and descending part 2, followed by my first landing which went very smoothly. A good end to a great day.

Saturday 2 April 2022 - Once again, a great day. Only got one fligh in today which was stalling part 2. This involved a recap of the

previous stalling lesson followed by experiencing stalls in different configurations such as landing configurations which can lead to some very interesting and exciting stall characteristics. The worse of which is called a wing drop and this happens when one wing stalls before the other, causing a violent change in direction of the aircraft to such an extent that the aircraft can even flip upside down. This was quite an adrenaline pumping part of the flight, but I loved it! We then finished the flight with another landing performed by myself. Another amazing day overall!

Sunday 3 April 2022 - Another awesome day with lots of flying: 3 whole hours in total. The first flight began with a recap of general handling and then we went on to do my first few circuits, which all went smoothly. The next flight was an hour and a quarter of circuits which went very well and the weather was great. Finally, the last flight was another 45 minutes in the circuit continuing with simple circuit practise but also with some simulated engine failures after take-off (EFATO), which included a pretend mayday call to my instructor, and then a series of checks after pitching down to the best glide speed. All went very smoothly and I am now on a total of 8 hours and 45 minutes flight time out of my allocated 12.

Monday 4 April 2022 - Another very slow day today due to very high winds so no flying. We arrived this morning and did the walk rounds before heading back to our cabin. We did a little bit of final group revision testing each other and then we asked the instructors if we could go and sit our ACPS test. After about 25-30 minutes in the test room I had finished and then we headed back to the cabin while our tests were marked. Another 10 minutes went by and the instructor came into the cabin and announced that I had passed! The remainder of the day was spent sitting in the cabin before returning back to the hotel. Hopefully better weather tomorrow.

Tuesday 5 April 2022 - Once again, rained off. Spent the day hanging about the cadet cabin getting some bits and bobs done around the airfield for our instructors. We were also tasked with tidying up the cabin and taking down some of the things left by previous groups, because we are the last course of the 2021/22 year and the new group that have just arrived are course 1 of the 2022/23 year.

Wednesday 6 April 2022 - Today was amazing. To begin it was my birthday! So I woke up to some nice messages from family and friends and that was great. We had agreed with the instructors yesterday that we would go to the airport early today because the weather was better in the early morning. So after departing the hotel at 7.20 am, I was in the air by 8 continuing my circuits and gathering up the remaining 1 hour and 15 minutes of flight time I needed before I could go solo. During this we practised some more EFATO, glide approaches and some flawless approaches - all went very smoothly. After we landed for our final circuit my instructor







asked me if I wanted a birthday present, I replied, 'Always!' and he then proceeded to ask me if I wanted to go solo. He gave me a small brief after we shut down before hopping out of the aircraft and heading to the control tower. I was now alone in my Aquila and it all became very real. This is what I was here for. I started up and made my first radio call, 'Tayside 1DA ready for departure'.

After this call I continued communicating with the controllers until I had my clearance to take off. The next call to tower was downwind and so far the circuit had gone very smoothly. The Aquila saw a huge performance increase when I was on my own because the overall weight had reduced and this is already a very light aircraft. So the circuit continued on and all was well, I got onto final in the circuit, made my last call of the circuit to tower 'Tayside 1DA final, to land' and continued my approach. Then I reached the runway, flared nicely and touched down. After clearing the runway at taxiway Charlie I performed my after landing checks and requested taxy to the south side of the apron to pick up my instructor, to which tower replied 'Tayside 1DA taxy approved, congratulations on your first solo and happy birthday!'. This was a pretty amazing moment and one I'm sure I will not forget.

After my solo flight I had an hour and a half flight time left until I had completed my flight time for the whole course. So for this my instructor and I did some more circuits, some bad weather ones this time (this is just a lower, closer to the runway type of circuit used in bad weather) and then a bit of a cross country journey before returning back to Dundee. That was my hours complete, I went and did my end of course debrief with my instructor and that

was it. Thank you to everybody that helped me get this far and ge a place on this course.

I will never, ever forget it.



KGS U14s travelled the short distance to Preston Grasshoppers RFC at the beginning of March to compete in the final of the Lancashire Cup. With talisman and Captain, Milligan, out injured, they knew they would have to pull together against a strong Stonyhurst team.

Kirkham started strongly and dominated possession in the early exchanges with Captain, Edwards, leading from the front and Crompton and Kelso carrying strongly down the middle. After sustained pressure in the Stonyhurst twenty-two, a quick tap penalty enabled Bray to burst through and score. This was soon followed by Kirkham's second score when the Kirkham front row of Stott, Blackburn and Prior put a Stonyhurst scrum in mid-field under pressure; Singleton and Chapman then forced the ball to go loose with Kelso on hand to pick up and beat the cover defence and score, to take a ten point lead.

Stonyhurst responded well, with strong running from their back row and centres giving them good field position. Sumner, who had a terrific first half, was strong over the ball and won the turn over, but an interception and score from the Stonyhurst centre brought them back into the game. Stonyhurst were having a purple patch where Kirkham were

indebted to some outstanding defensive work, with Gildea, Crompton, Kelso and Bray all making crucial tackles. Kirkham came back strongly with a powerful run down the left from Musson, who had excellent support from Sumner, Collinson and Edwards, which released Bray to score his second try just before half time - Bray also converting to give Kirkham a 17-5 half time lead.

The strong Kirkham bench had an instant impact after half time with Shackleton making a big hit. This enabled Simpson to win a turn over which set up the position for Gillett to score, after some

neat foot work, and then taking a couple of defenders over with him. Unfortunately, it was his last part in the game after gaining injury in the process. Another Bray conversion opened up a 24-5 lead, but a resilient Stonyhurst side again came back with a converted try.

Kirkham responded well to the pressure, and after a period of sustained pressure, player of the match, Bray, set off on another rampaging run. Edwards and Musson, also running well, punched holes in the Stonyhurst defence to enable Bray to charge over for his hat trick, which he again converted giving Kirkham the win 31-12.



KGS U15 Lancashire Cup Final v Stonyhurst

Kirkham Grammar School U15 made it two Lancashire titles on the same day, with a good 31-7 victory over a strong Stonyhurst side. After some early combative exchanges, Kirkham scored first through the powerful Connor Norman, off the back of a scrum to make it 5-0. Not to be outdone, Stonyhurst attacked well with their elusive back line causing some problems, however three magnificent try saving tackles from Taran Mathauda, kept them at bay. Stonyhurst continued to apply some good pressure and eventually took the lead, with their 12 running under the posts and with the conversion to make it 5-7.

From this moment on, playing into the wind, Kirkham decided a more direct approach was needed, with Isaac Burrows, Alfie Guthrie and Jasper Johnson carrying with some real venom, getting them onto the front foot. This resulted in a period of concerted pressure on the Stonyhurst line and some good awareness from Ewan Huck saw him dive in the corner, with Harry Case adding a sublime conversion from the touchline, Kirkham regained the lead (12-7). Just before half time, Kirkham managed to extend their lead with some good phase-play, which saw Ben Firth score, with Case adding the extras again from the touchline to end the half at 19-7.

With the wind now at their back, Kirkham controlled much of the second half, with Firth using his big boot to good effect. That, coupled with some good line-speed, led by Charlie Wiltshire, Oliver

Kollard and Hugo Loggenberg, meant Stonyhurst's threatening attack was being nullified well. Some good, quick-thinking from Harry Ribchester and James Shuttleworth, saw Ewan Huck score his second (26-7) to all but end the game as a contest with 10 minutes to go.

In the dying embers of the match, after dominant scrummaging from Max Carter, Alex Smith and Jensen Stott, a good run from Luke Schmid set up Connor Norman to conclude the scoring in the corner at 31-7 and Kirkham were crowned county champions.

The development of this group has been magnificent and their efforts and improving performances have been a credit to themselves and the KGS family. Well done to all 23 players that represented the school in the final.





KGS U16 Lancashire Cup Final v Lancaster RGS

At the end of March, Kirkham Grammar School U16 rugby team played local rivals Lancaster Royal Grammar school in the Lancashire Cup Final at Fylde RUFC. The two sides had met earlier in the season where Kirkham had won comfortably, however Kirkham knew they must not underestimate their opponents, as Lancaster are a formidable outfit who always perform well in cup ties. The first half did not disappoint. Kirkham were first on the score sheet when second row, Henry Whitton, powered over the line following a catch and drive at the lineout. Kirkham had a short lineout about forty meters out from the Lancaster try line, it was secured by Henry Whitton, passed by Harry Tomlinson to Kelly who made a big dent into the Lancaster defence. Kirkham maintained the momentum with a succession of carries and it was back rower, Monty Loggenberg, who got over the line for Kirkham's third try. With twenty minutes to go Kirkham made four further changes, Sam Medhurst and Seb Mati were replaced by forwards, Alex Greenhalf and Fin McLachlan, and wingers, Xander Kane and Will Davies, were replaced by Tom Wilkinson and Ben Firth. Kirkham's next try came from a fumble by Lancaster and scrum half, Tomlinson, pounced onto the ball. Kirkham then played fast, loose rugby until Wills Gut found a gap in the Lancaster defence and scored following some impressive footwork. Tom Wilkinson added the conversion.

Kirkham were now firmly in control of the game with Lancaster looking tired. Captain, James Stacey, found his way to the try line with an impressive solo run from first receiver, this was also successfully converted by Wilkinson. Strong carrying from Saif Amr, Fin McLachlan and Jack Chapman made inroads yet again into the Lancaster defence and it was Harry Reay, one of the stand out players of the season, who sealed the victory with Kirkham's sixth and final try. The score line of 34-5 to Kirkham was not a true reflection of the battle that had taken place, Lancaster can be proud of their performance, they played with heart and determination, showing lots of potential.

On a glorious spring day in March, it was great to see the U14 Richard J Wilson Trophy on offer again. Due to the pandemic, it was last competed for in 2019, when the current KGS Lower Sixth side retained the trophy.

This year's U14s have had a promising start to their sevens rugby at KGS, but as yet had been unable to secure any silverware. The return of inspirational Captain, Milligan, less than 4 weeks after dislocating his shoulder, counter-balanced the impact of those away on the school ski trip. Kirkham powered through their group with Bolton up first. KGS scored 6 tries with the explosive Kelso bagging 4, Milligan and C Sumner 1 each, plus two conversions each from Wilsdon and Milligan for a 38-5 win. Next up was Lancaster RGS, who have proven to be a stubborn opponent in previous games. Kelso powered away to score early in the second half, but St Mary's refused to give up pulling one back to make it 19-12 with 2 minutes left. Brilliantly, Kelso again broke free to make it 24-12.

The final against Cheadle Hulme, who beat Lancaster in the other semi-final, proved to be a classic with the lead changing hands several times. First half tries from Milligan and Kelso, and a Wilsdon conversion, gave KGS a 12-5 half time lead, but Cheadle came back strongly with 2 good scores of their own to go ahead 17-12. Kirkham's effort to qualify for day two had drained a lot of energy out of the boys and they were not quite the same outfit on day two. Luca Mihell, Xander Kane and Jack Austin really stepped up, contributing well to the whole squad effort.

Harrow went on to become champions beating Eton College in the final. The Kirkham players were a credit to their school and they can be proud of their achievement, being the first ever Kirkham U16 side to qualify for day two at the Rosslyn Park Sevens and the last 24 from 144 teams.



KGS Crowned Sedbergh Super Tens Champions 2022







After narrowly losing the National Schools' U18 Cup Final at Twickenham, Kirkham Grammar School senior rugby players turned their attention to the National Sevens at Rosslyn Park and the National Super Tens at Sedbergh School.

Kirkham reached the quarter-finals of Rosslyn Park so this left them with one last opportunity to win some silverware this season at the National Super Tens. On the first day, Kirkham were matched with some strong rugby schools: first up were Hurstpierpoint College who they overcame, in a controlled way, with hooker Harry Thompson scoring 4 tries as KGS eased to a 36-7 victory. Second up were Felsted School who proved tough opposition but tries from Will Riley, Huw Davies, Niall Povall and Tom Lee gave KGS a 22-5 victory. Last in the group stage were Stamford School, who had also won all their games, but with Kirkham growing in confidence they scored 3 tries in 21-0 victory with Osian Roberts, Niall Povall and Tom Campbell contributing. This victory allowed KGS into the semi-final group stage of the competition with more tough opposition including QEGS Wakefield, Barnard Castle and Ipswich School.

Although KGS started the second day slowly, they eventually got on top of the Wakefield side and were impressive 26-0 winners with Tom Campbell (2), Will Riley and Rhys Fray getting on the score sheet. Fly half, Tom Lee, also contributed with his kicking skills with many conversions, and kicking out of hand, as he drove Kirkham forward with his boot. Next up was Barnard Castle who had pushed KGS to the limit in the semi-final of the National Schools XV Cup; again they proved to be tough opposition with only a try from Osian Roberts giving Kirkham a 7-0 victory. The last game in the group was against Ipswich School. Knowing a win would give them an opportunity to meet Sedbergh School in the final, Kirkham were in no mood to let this chance slip and comprehensively defeated lpswich 29-5 with tries from Will Rilev. Tom Campbell, Joe Medcalf and Tom Lee to set a repeat of the Kirkham v Sedbergh 2019 final.

As the final approached, the touchline started to fill and Sedbergh's support increased, as both teams were met with huge anticipation. Sedbergh started fast and, after a mistake on the KGS line, the host team took a 7-0 lead. However, Kirkham responded immediately with

outstanding forwards, Yande Nkonge and Huw Davies, making huge inroads into the Sedbergh defence, finished off with a try for Niall Povall. Kirkham continued to put pressure on Sedbergh and this time Huw Davies crashed over to give KGS a 12-7 lead. The next score was crucial as half time approached, and it was Sedbergh who gave a penalty away in front of the posts. Tom Lee stepped up calmly to kick the penalty and give KGS a 15-7 lead. Sedbergh seemed shell-shocked and, despite the urging of the crowd, could not overcome the vice-like grip Kirkham had on them. Again, Kirkham made Sedbergh's defence work hard; they conceded more penalties and Tom Lee kicked KGS into the corner. A well-constructed lineout was used and, once again, Huw Davies crashed over as the lead grew to 20-7. Sedbergh still had time but a crucial tackle on the Sedbergh Captain was made by KGS centre, Cameron Scanlon, who had been superb in defence all tournament. As time started to run out, Kirkham piled on the pressure which eventually led to another try for the charismatic Huw Davies to complete his hat trick! This resulted in an outstanding 25-7 victory with KGS winning the tournament for the first time since 2003.



1st XV National Cup Under 18s Cup Final at Twickenham

In March, Kirkham Grammar Schools 1st XV travelled to Twickenham to participate in the National Schools' U18 Cup Final, for the first time since 1997, to play Trinity School, Croydon. The atmosphere at Twickenham was electric; both schools had huge support and the teams started nervously. Trinity dominated KGS in the early exchanges which resulted in them eventually taking a 5-0 lead. In typical Kirkham tradition, a response was immediate and the KGS forwards started to use their power. Both second rows, William Riley and Huw Davies, started to dominate the lineout and were forceful in the loose. They made inroads into the Trinity defence, which led to an opportunity for prop, Patreece Bell, to crash over near the posts. Captain, Aaron Pope, converted for KGS to take a 7-5 lead which they kept until the half time break.

The second half started with both teams trying to attack, despite the poor weather conditions. The KGS forwards, again dominated by Harry Thompson and Yande Nkonge, started to influence play with some strong carriers. However, with around 16 minutes to go, a mistake was made by Kirkham, which led to Trinity regaining the

lead 10-5. KGS tried desperately to force the game and, with the weather getting worse, another mistake was made which Trinity capitalised on, increasing their lead to 15-7. Despite this setback, the team dug deep and against the odds started on a comeback of giant proportion. As time started running out, Kirkham forced Trinity to concede a penalty at the breakdown and Captain, Aaron Pope, stepped up to calmly kick a penalty to close the gap to 15-10 with just 6 minutes left on the clock. Kirkham gave everything in these last few minutes and gained momentum with Josh Lynch, Huw Davies and William Riley gaining yards. Suddenly, the KGS crowd realised there was a chance as KGS reached the Trinity 5 metre line with just seconds left. A KGS lineout gave the team their last opportunity for glory. Unfortunately, a mistake was made and the ball bounced into the hands of a Trinity player who kicked the ball off the pitch. Trinity celebrated a famous win as the KGS boys sunk to their knees knowing their chance was over.

It was truly a sterling effort from this talented group of KGS players and an unforgettable experience for all the School.











25 Years Ago...

The success of this season's KGS 1st XV in reaching the final of the National Schools Cup came almost 25 years to the day since the last such success by a KGS 1st team.

It was on Saturday 22 March 1997 that a stellar KGS senior squad reached the final of the Daily Mail Cup at Twickenham, and was cheered on by a vast travelling army of pupils, parents and friends of the School. It was a glorious spring day as they went head to head with Colston's School, Bristol, who won, on what remains one of the proudest days in the School's long history. This was very much a highlight of Brian Gornall's time as 1st XV coach and of Barrie Stacey's headship - two true KGS legends who cheered their successors as Aled Trenhaile's 2022 squad followed in their footsteps, hoping to go one better.

All who were at KGS at the time remember that squad with great respect and affection. Captained by Rob Porteous, it was a team bristling with talent and character, with the star name being

Alex Sanderson, now Head Coach of Sale Sharks RUFC. Alex went on to be First Team Captain the following season, as well as School Captain.

In some ways, it feels like only yesterday, but in other ways it seems like a totally different world and a different game. 1997 was just before mass access to the internet shrank our world and brought us all into such constant contact, with our every moment captured on smartphones and shared to social media. There is little trace of that final on the internet, and photos taken at the match were taken on analogue cameras, not hi-res smartphones. However, coverage in traditional print media was in remarkable depth, with those ordinary Fifth and Sixth Form lads briefly elevated to the status of local superstars, getting their 15 minutes of fame.


The image below of coverage from the local press - still published in broadsheet form and delivered to most homes - gives a good impression of the impact of that team.

Rugby Union was still at the dawn of the professional era, and top schoolboy teams like KGS were the nurseries where sporting talent was fostered, most often alongside boys' other career ambitions. Members of that 1997 team are these days engaged in a variety of professions across the country and indeed the world, and many are active and supportive members of the Old Kirkhamian community. Their togetherness as a group was reinforced that summer when they undertook the School's first South Africa tour, paving the way for KGS' links and exchanges with South Africa, which have flourished to this day.

In the true spirit of rugby union, the boys of 1997 were the first to hope that their successors could go one better by bringing the trophy home to KGS as the school prepare to celebrate the centenary of the School's adoption of the rugby code in 1924.

Thank you to Old Kirkhamian and silver medallist with GB Sevens at Rio 2016 Olympics, Dan Bibby, for taking the time to come along to the camp on the final day to deliver a session with each group and give the attendees a chance for a photograph opportunity with Dan and his silver medal.

The camp concluded with a tournament and presentation in The Old Hall and it was wonderful to see parents, friends and family at KGS supporting the pupils.

Track and Field Cup Athletics Regional NW Final







On Monday 13 June, our junior and intermediate boys and girls athletics squads travelled to Trafford Park to compete in the regional final of the National Schools Track and Field Cup. Throughout the day all athletes competed in both a track and field event gaining points for each respective team.

The junior boys had qualified as best runners-up in the first round. Knowing the NW final was going to be a tough competition, their target was to try and improve on their points total from round one, which they achieved by beating their score by 21 points.

The intermediate boys were winners in the round one competition, so they knew they would be amongst the top teams in the final. They finished a respectable fourth, scoring 406 points. Interestingly, their amount of points would have made them champions in many of the other regions around the county, thus showing the quality of the competition in the North West.

The intermediate boys, consisting of eight Fourth Year and six Third Year boys, really rose to the challenge. Cieran Milligan was first in the 800m; Max Musson ran a personal best in his hurdles heat; Harry Case won the high jump with a new personal best; and Charlie Bray scored highly in the discus. Notable performances from the junior team came from Ryan Shaw in the 100m, Theo Wren in the hurdles and Oliver Yates in both the javelin and 800m.

In the junior girls, Emilia Simpson and Aglae Ranc got the day off to a great start with their hurdles events. In the 200m, Abbie Ely scored huge points, as did the 800m runners. In the field, Chloe Murro scored well in the javelin, whilst Ophelia Loggenberg also performed well in the discus event.

SUMMER HOCKEY CAMP August 2022

Kirkham Grammar School were delighted to welcome back Team GB bronze medallist, Susannah Townsend, to host their annual Summer Hockey Camp for a third time. English international field hockey player, Sophie Bray, who played as a forward for England and Great Britain, also joined this year's camp coaching team, alongside Strength and Conditioning Coach, Charlotte Benson.

Susannah competed for England in the women's hockey tournament at the 2014 Commonwealth Games where she won a silver medal; for GB at the Rio 2016 Olympics winning gold; and her most recent achievement, winning a bronze medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics. At the age of 32, after achieving an outstanding 188 international caps for GB and England, Susannah decided to retire.

Sophie Bray also competed for England in the women's hockey tournament at the 2014 Commonwealth Games where she won a silver medal, and was a member of the Investec sponsored winning team at the EuroHockey Championships in 2015. In 2016, along with Susannah, Sophie competed for Team GB in the women's Olympic field hockey tournament at the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio where Team GB won gold in the final against the Netherlands after a penalty shoot-out.

Sophie was appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the 2017 New Year Honours for services to hockey. She had also played for Surbiton, University of Birmingham, The Netherlands for MOP Hockey Club, Vught, near Eindhoven, and most recently Kampong. On 4 February 2019, Bray announced her retirement from international hockey. During her international career she scored 44 goals and made 134 appearances for England and Great Britain.

Charlotte Benson has worked with athletes from a wide range of high-performance sports teams including GB Hockey, GB Rowing, Harlequins Rugby and Surrey Storm Netball. Coming from an elite sporting background in football herself, she is aware of athletes' needs and expectations through the pathway into elite sport. She looks to implement this into her physical preparation strategy when coaching everyday female athletes.

During the week, in addition to the hockey technical sessions, Susannah, Sophie and Charlotte shared and inspired the girls with their hockey and sporting journeys. They learnt about the importance of nutrition and thoroughly enjoyed Charlotte's strength and conditioning sessions, which are crucial in preventing injury.









The final day saw a tournament take place which gave the girls the opportunity to put into practice everything they had learnt over the four days.

After the tournament, a prizegiving presentation took place, in the presence of parents and family members, with Susannah and Charlotte presenting a selection of awards.

Where are they now?

A catch-up with KGS legend, Brian Gornall

The next in my series of catch-ups with retired KGS staff features former Head of PE and 1st XV Coach, Brian Gornall.

Just like the subject of my first interview - John Catterall - Brian is another legend who needs neither a surname nor a first name. The administrative initials are all it needs. BG not only works as two letters, but even became a word used by generations of colleagues and pupils at KGS: Beeg.

Unlike with JC, whose interview had to be done remotely during the Pandemic, I had the pleasure of meeting BG for lunch to chew the fat over his days at KGS and share memories of people and incidents from the many years that he and I were colleagues. We met at Dizzy Ducks Bistro, just round the corner from his Wrea Green home, where he is clearly a much-loved local celebrity. Recognised and greeted by staff and customers alike, BG was looking cool and relaxed, entirely recognisable from his tracksuited days as the driving force behind KGS sport. His answers were characteristically thorough and thoughtful, reflecting a man who is about so much more than the game which remains his passion.

What were your years and roles (as a teacher) at KGS?

I joined in 1969 as the first assistant PE master at KGS, after my first teaching job in London. The School's traditional excellence in rugby, with Lancashire County players often emerging from the ranks, was a big draw for me. Yet my first position of responsibility was being put in charge of...changing room pegs. Yes, a fully qualified rugby union coach was tasked with ensuring that every boy had an allocated peg in the changing rooms!

Greater things were to follow: I became Head of PE in 1979 and held that post until 1997, alongside classroom teaching of physics, then I stepped aside from a teaching role to spend 10 years as First Fifteen Coach. I was also in charge of athletics throughout my time as Head of PE. I was also Chairman of the Inter-Grammar School Sports Association, later the Senior School Sports Association.

What have you done since retiring?

I spent some distressing years nursing my wife through severe illness soon after my retirement - she died in 2010. Unbearably

tough days and painful memories. Since then, I have immersed myself in assisting with coaching of Fylde RUFC 1st XV, travel, keeping fit at the gym, walking and gardening. With a new love in my life, life is good again after some dark years.

What do you do with your spare time in retirement?

I have undertaken a major reconstruction of the house that I bought with my fiancée, and have enjoyed watching Old Kirkhamians flourish as players and coaches of rugby, following their careers with pride. I enjoy keeping up and meeting with Old Kirkhamians and count many as personal friends. To see the values developed on the sports field being applied in lives beyond school and beyond sport is a source of great joy.

What does KGS mean to you?

KGS has an indefinable atmosphere and spirit, known and loved by all who have attended or been taught there. I would love to know when this dates from, in a school so old.

What are your favourite memories of KGS?

I always found the company of my pupils to be invigorating and refreshing. Whatever irritations arose with administration and bureaucracy, the minute I was out on the sports field I felt a sense of enjoyment and fulfilment. I also took great pride in my physics teaching, which I took every bit as seriously as PE teaching, setting my academic standards against those of the Head of Department.

My sense of fulfilment and satisfaction came from helping young people to lead healthy and active lives, and to enjoy being physically active.

Highlights of my rugby coaching career were winning the All-England Festival at Hoppers in 1985 - the School's first major team honour in rugby, won by a great side led by a player of outstanding talent - Mark Preston. Coaching the First XV to the National Final at Twickenham in 1997 was another highlight.

The pioneering World Tour in 1987 with a squad full of great character and talent was a significant and memorable achievement, showing for the first time the School's ambition to be a big player on the national and international stage, despite the scepticism of others, both in school and beyond.

In athletics, with great support from Paul Smith, we developed highly successful school teams at all ages, and many championships were won over those years.

A favourite memory from athletics is of stopping 1st XV training to watch KGS pupil, Peter Beaven, win the European Under 19 400 metres Championship in Paris in 1970, from the outside lane. Peter was a superstar athlete, who trained outside of school but always ran for KGS in championships; a great memory for me is of Fred Sayer's starting gun failing several times when Peter was on his marks at Sports Day, a source of great embarrassment to Fred, who bought a new pistol as a result, having had to watch a European Champion return to his marks several times.

At an individual level, I was lucky to work with some outstandingly talented rugby players, but I have to single out the late Bruce Craven, an all-round athlete of great character, who went from a school javelin thrower to Great Britain U19 in one term. His dedication and commitment was unparalleled, and he was the nicest guy you could ever hope to meet.

What achievement are you most proud of from your time at KGS?

I was able to reverse a long term decline of sport at KGS and establish it as a subject of value at the School. I achieved this before the advent of adequate funding, with no administrative support - not even an office or telephone with which to run the Department. Over time, this issue was addressed but it was a real issue in the early days.

Whom did you particularly admire on the staff from your time?

I was supported by some wonderfully dedicated sports coaches from the teaching staff, notably Paul Smith, Steve Turner, and Richard Browning. Richard, in particular, embodies all the traditional values of school sport, imparting values which extend way beyond the sports field. I also admired and respected my predecessor, Sidney Crane, and I still possess the distinctive hat that he passed on to me when he retired.

My successor as 1st XV Coach and Head of Rugby, Aled Trenhaile, with whom I worked for many years, has been hugely influential in establishing the excellence and reputation for sport that KGS now enjoys. It is easily forgotten that he is not a PE teacher (RS is his specialist subject and he ran that Department for many years, as well as later taking on the onerous post of Boarding Housemaster), but Aled has proved the value of laying foundations for success with younger teams thanks to the stimulating coaching methods which he has employed and encouraged. His contribution to KGS sport over a period of more than 30 years has been immense.

Beyond sporting colleagues, I would mention Bernard Coates

(history), Harry Reay (French, Deputy Head), Kath Bagley (maths), Paul Stockdale (biology, Deputy Head) and Dave Walls (history and politics). And I cherish very fond memories of the late Anita Devine, with whom I shared a form as tutor. We were poles apart in so many ways, yet clicked as a team and enjoyed a great relationship with our form.

All these were wise, honest, professional, hardworking, possessed of integrity and kindness - the qualities of a true teacher.

Of the Headmasters I worked for, Barrie Stacey stands out: absolutely the right man in the right place at the right time, who lifted the School to another level thanks to his positivity, enthusiasm and vision for the School.

What do you not miss about teaching?

Lengthy staff meetings and assemblies; mountains of secretarial work.

Any regrets/disappointments?

Losing at Twickenham in 1997 and in the Quarter-Final the following year. We could have won it in both years. Some selection decisions still play on my mind!

In conclusion, BG's thoughts on a life in teaching: "a wonderful profession if you enjoy company, helping young people and giving 100%." Nobody at KGS would doubt that Beeg ticks every box there, and many more besides.

From Cadet Force to Armed Forces

Louise Wareing (nee Green) (1986 - 1993)

I left the CCF in 1993 as a Sergeant. I loved the CCF and have great memories of treks across Darwen Moor and camps at Cultybraggan and Catterick. I wasn't brave enough to join the real Army but the leadership skills I learnt in the CCF certainly helped in my teaching career. In 2019, after joining LRGS, I took the plunge and volunteered to help out with their CCF. I soon found myself on Basic training at Frimley and am enjoying every minute of being an Officer in the CCF here, it was obviously lurking in me all those years!

Katherine McDiarmid (1979 - 1984)

When given the choice between Army and RAF there was no way that I was going to do the physical Army stuff so chose RAF, which led to my love of flying. My best memory of CCF was flying from Woodvale in a Chipmunk over the Grand National course. Unfortunately, at the time the RAF didn't accept female pilots, so I wasn't able to follow that path. Many years later, working in education, my all-girls' school was given the option to join up the CCF unit at our equivalent all boys' school. Having had the Cadet experience and knowing what being a girl in an all-boys' school was like, I happily volunteered to be the adult representative. Officer training at Cranwell followed and the moment I swapped my white tabs and hat band for my officer insignia I burst into tears of joy - it meant so much to finally have achieved, in some small part, my dream. We now have a thriving female element to the Contingent with over half of our current Year

9s attending; two cadets have gone to Cambridge University; we have had a Lord Lieutenants, Cadet and a current strong group of NCOs. I am proud to be supporting their cadet experience and it would not have happened with KGS cadets all those years ago.

Many have gone on to join the RAF:

Heather Burns (KGS 1986 - 1993)

I was a Supply Officer in the RAF for 6 years which was amazing but was an Army cadet at school as there was less marching and more adventurous activities.

Becky O'Shea (KGS 1986 - 1991)

I spent 14 years in the RAF. They sponsored me through university to get my nursing degree. Giving me a second chance at getting an education after mucking things up at school. I will always feel grateful for the opportunities offered and the life it gave to me and my son, Ted. The huge financial support of the RAF BSA also allowed Ted to attend KGS as a boarder which made me so happy. I loved cadets but used to look out of the window wishing I'd joined the Army cadets who seemed to be doing much more fun activities outside.

Steve Swift (KGS 1978 - 1985)

22 years in the RAF. I wanted to be a pilot so joined the RAF contingent, failed the aptitude test but found I liked teaching physical activities more than being in a classroom. Fred agreed I could change to the Army but would lose my rank. I loved my final year in the Army contingent but still joined the RAF as a Physical Training Instructor – best job in the Forces! Interesting anecdote: as a recruit instructor I taught someone I knew from School House and Doc Hall's son!

Others were not as successful.

Brian Walters (KGS 1955-1962)

I remember being required to volunteer for CCF. I didn't like the Army cadets: boots, gaiters, ringing ears and bruised shoulders after the firing range. I couldn't wait to get into the Air Force cadets. I enjoyed the lessons in aeronautics and loved flying in Chipmunks with exfighter pilots who loved throwing those little aircraft all over the sky. I even got to take the controls and fly a couple of times and on one occasion, I managed to 'loop the loop'. I applied for and was offered a place at Cranwell but because my eyesight wasn't 100%, I couldn't train for aircrew so abandoned the idea of joining the RAF.

Steve Hudson (KGS 1971-1978)

I had aspirations of a military career from an early age and the CCF reinforced that ambition. Like many I wanted to fly, but juvenile asthma put paid to that idea. I had gone to Biggin Hill to have a 'test in advance' which was basically the first part of officer selection, comprising aptitude testing, medical and an interview. I did apply for entry whilst still at school and was told to come back in a year, which in hindsight was the correct decision. Had I passed Biggin Hill, I doubt that I would have taken any (as opposed to limited, sorry lan Scott!) interest in my A Levels. As it turned out, I joined the TA and re-applied to join the RAF, joining as an Officer cadet in July 1979, commissioned in the Supply Branch in November 1979. The CCF really assisted in getting an appreciation of the Forces and of course the camps at places like Sennybridge, Jurby, Cranwell and Linton on Ouse.

Now let's look at a few memories of CCF from serving members of the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force and the British Army

John Wyper (KGS 1984-1985)

Served 25 years in the Royal Navy from 1986-2011 on HMS Devonport, Portsmouth, Faslane & Rosyth.

1984/85 - promoted to LCpl. in the Fifth Year so that I could attend the UK Land Forces Annual Cadets 'thing' (I forget its official name). There I discovered that I was completely out of my depth and the keenness that I had shown on the quad and surrounding shrubbery at KGS did not help me one bit. I had also volunteered to be the right hand marker and with hindsight, I always put too much effort in the arm swinging which resulted in my hands exceeding the height of my head!

Fred Sayer and Brian Gornall were the only two members of staff sorry to see me go as they had plans for me in the Lower Sixth; I don't think the academic staff really cared.

Most influential member of staff/role model: Mick Clarkson (School House Master) – a nicer bloke you could not wish to meet. Fair and always struck me as calm and usually saw the good in every situation.

Chris Kay (KGS 1977-1984)

A Squadron Leader who has commanded Force Development Squadrons at RAF Cosford and RAF Leeming.

KGS CCF from 1980-84, reached rank of Sgt (Army Section). Memories of winter camps in the Lake District at Thirlmere, breaking ice on water to wash in the cold February mornings, summer camps at Monmouth, usually including the obligatory navigation exercise over the Brecon Beacons and overnight exercises at Holcombe Moor Trg Area.

Biggest influence upon me during my time in the CCF was undoubtedly, Fred Sayer, closely followed by Ian Scott and Steve Turner. I thoroughly enjoyed my time in the CCF and it gave me an insight into military life, which led me to later join the Territorial Army as an infantryman and then the RAF as a Regular officer. It inspired me with a sense of adventure and made me aware that my limits were set higher than I knew, encouraging me to push myself.

Charlie Bradbury (KGS 2011-2018)





Commissioned into the Army Reserve, 4th Battalion the Duke of Lancaster's Regiment in 2019, where he now serves as a Second-Lieutenant.

I joined the CCF in 2014 and attended every annual camp and overnight trip. The highlight for me was the 2016 summer camp at Nescliffe where WO2 Trevor Barrow delivered an amazing camp and AT package and concluded with my promotion to Sergeant to enter Lower Sixth. I was lucky enough to be chosen as the RSM for the 2017-2018 academic year, which was a brilliant experience and taught me a lot about motivating and leading my peers.

Mrs Sutcliffe made a huge impression on me, and her selfless commitment to both the Duke of Edinburgh award and the CCF has undoubtably had a huge impact on many pupils. She was always cheerful and would do anything to help, and when I was struggling in Upper Sixth, she frequently made time for a walk and a chat which I really appreciated.

Ashleigh Brown (Nee Gregory) (KGS 1996-2003)





Currently a Major with the Royal Engineers, where highlights have included two tours in Afghanistan, multiple exercises in Canada and deployments in USA and Estonia as well as plenty of skiing.

I joined in the summer of 2000 as I attended the Summer Camp at Warcop at the end of Third Year. I then continued with CCF through Fourth Year, Fifth Year and both years of Sixth Form. I ended up as a CCF SSgt (I think). I remember attending other camps at Cultibraggen and another couple at Warcop.

Fond memories of an Adventurous Training expedition one Easter to the Lake District for walking etc, I just remember the weather being absolutely awful and the staff taking it in turns to cook, with pupil assistants.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time in CCF; I must have done as I joined the Army. Fond memories of Col Sayer, Maj Scott and Capt Sutcliffe, particularly her running up hills in Warcop very heavily pregnant with her first child and thinking she was crazy; having now been pregnant and had a baby I think she was even crazier!

The only other thing I remember was playing a lot of camouflage and concealment (mainly hide and seek with cam cream on), being useless at getting over a 6 ft wall and having great CCF dinner nights in fancy black tie!

Old Kirkhamians' Association Centenary Dinner







In October, over eighty KGS alumni and partners gathered in the School's atmospheric Old Hall for a special edition of the Old Kirkhamians' Association Annual Dinner.

Not only was this a joyful return to in-person events after eighteen months of enforced inactivity, this was also a delayed celebration of the Association's centenary.

The OKA was set up in 1920, with the express purpose of remembering and celebrating the lives of the many old boys of the School killed in the First World War. The forming of an Association was the idea of the newly-appointed Headmaster Rev'd Creswell Strange, under whose leadership between 1919 and 1945 so much of the School's modern-day ethos and traditions were established.

The Old Boys gathered for the first time on January 21, 1920, for an evening of fine food and drink and camaraderie, in the same hall which is used to this day. One hundred (and one) years on, much has changed, but much hasn't. Guests at Saturday's event received copies of the menus from that inaugural dinner, the 50th Anniversary one in 1970, as well as for their own centenary one. Side by side, these gave a fascinating insight into the evolution of fine dining over the past century; few would have preferred the rich and simple 1920s' fare.

Yet so much else would have been familiar and recognisable to that war-ravaged gathering in 1920, or indeed to the long-haired, sideburned 1970 gathering, dressed no doubt in kipper ties and flares. One guest from Saturday was also present on that day: Arthur Baines, School Captain from 1957, Head of Biology from 1967 to 1997 and OKA stalwart for decades.

In the oak-panelled Old Hall, where portraits of former Heads keep a watchful eye on their legacy and gold-lettered boards speak of the successes of alumni in academia, culture and sport, Old Kirkhamians of all ages feel the intangible togetherness that belonging to a proud old school brings.

Saturday's gathering was diverse in age and background, mixed in gender yet united in an affection for the School which was wonderfully expressed in the Speech by OKA President Mike Ward, whose irreverent yet deeply respectful memories of his own 1980s' schooldays struck a chord with all present. Likewise, 2020-21 School Captain, Thomas Hewitt, already an authority on the School's and the Association's history thanks to his subject specialism, evoked perfectly the Association's founding principles and enduring values in his speech proposing a toast to the Association.

The presence of pupils, musicians, sportsmen, teachers, armed forces officers, healthcare professionals, business people, farmers, civil servants, a recent Mayor (Fylde) and Lord Mayor (City of Portsmouth) and many others represented all that is good about KGS. Guests chatted, laughed and reminisced long after the end of formalities and took home an engraved commemorative port glass and a new edition of the OKA lapel badge, and each and every one departed with their love for the School enriched and renewed. "My first OKA Dinner, but certainly not my last" wrote more than one on social media.

The OKA is in safe hands for another century and more.

Married or single? Newly married to Thibaud since September 2021

Favourite sport? Hockey ever since my KGS days, although I've recently taken up rugby league!

Favourite team? My dad has converted his loft into a 'soccer museum' that's largely populated with Liverpool FC memorabilia, so I'd probably be disowned if I said anything other than the red men! Obviously I'd always support England in any sport, although marrying a Frenchman has certainly caused some tension...

Last holiday? We recently got back from Kagi in the Maldives, which was our long-awaited honeymoon. I don't think I'll ever go on a more beautiful (beach) holiday, so I've been spoiled for life now.

The Old Days

What years were you at KGS? 2000-2007

What is your best memory of those days? I loved that there were so many opportunities to try new things. There was a club or society for pretty much everything, and I probably tried all of them at some point or another (much to my parents' delight when I came home for the holidays with a hamster from the Animal Ark Club)! For those who knew me, it will be no surprise that my favourite memories involve being part of the sports teams, and I was incredibly proud to reach the national finals for both athletics and hockey. A memory that never fails to make me laugh, though, is Doc. Watson trying to keep a straight face when we were reading aloud one by one in First Year English. It was Redshaw's turn and he was struggling over a particular word before eventually opting for 'tit' and the whole class looked around nervously to see if it was okay to laugh or if trouble was on the cards. The response from the Doc? "Civilised people, Redshaw, prefer to pronounce it 'teat'!"

Who was the most influential person at

school that helped you succeed? It's hard to pick just one when there were so many, but there are some who definitely went above and beyond. On the sports field, Mrs Glover and Mr Sampey were always in my corner and definitely encouraged me to become the keen sportswoman I am today. I was the Lancashire hurdles champion several times over and went on to play hockey in the National Premier League thanks in no small part to their belief in my abilities. Academically speaking, I doubt I'd be where I am today without the entire languages department! So many people say they hated languages at school largely because of their teachers, but my experience couldn't have been more different. Mrs Long gave up her time outside of normal school hours to take me through to A Level Latin as the only pupil in the class, Mr McDowell and Mr Rushton were the first teachers to introduce me to German and I loved it from day one, and I have very fond memories of the laughs we had in A Level French with Mr Long and Mrs Walker.

What was your first job? I worked on the reception at a go-kart centre on Preston Docks throughout my teens. It was cash in hand and I saved up the money towards the KGS hockey tour to Cyprus! My first 'proper job' after graduating was as an in-house translator for a company in Manchester.

What is your degree in if you have one? I have an undergraduate master's degree in modern languages (MML) specialising in German and French, as well as a postgraduate master's (MA) in translation and interpreting.

What do you wish you had been told about that would have helped you the most? Something I really believe in now is letting go of imposter syndrome and believing in your own expertise that you've worked hard to develop. That's not to say you're the finished article and you don't have more to learn, but if you want other people to have confidence in you and your abilities then you need to have confidence in yourself first.

And now to business

Tell us about your job, what do you do? I am a chartered translator first and foremost, but I'm also the director of my own language services company, which involves all the peripheral tasks that come with running a business.

How did you come to have a career in this particular industry? It really was as straightforward as it sounds: I loved languages at school and knew I wanted to work with them in some capacity. The translation exercises and modules were always my favourite, so when I realised that this was something you could make a career out of, it was a no-brainer to pursue this ambition.

What inspired you to launch your own business (if applicable)? I worked as an



in-house translator for several years after graduating with my second master's degree, as I knew this would be a great way for a newbie to learn from more experienced colleagues and benefit from the safety net of working as part of a team. But as much as I love translating, it's incredibly intense to only focus on one thing all day every day, no matter how interesting the texts may be. That's when I knew it was the right time for me to set up on my own and take on all the different responsibilities and opportunities that come with running your own business. Some more fun than others, of course!

What has been the biggest challenge in the last 12 months? Fortunately enough, the pandemic has had next to no impact on the way I operate, as I was already working from home and translation is all done remotely anyway: people send me files. I translate them and I send them back. A real challenge facing the translation sector, however, is the rise of machine translation. I'm a long way from fearing for my job, as I work in the premium sector and know the quality of machine-translated output is nowhere near good enough for my clients to make the switch, but it is having an impact on what new, inexperienced clients expect to pay when they can get something that sounds okay for peanuts. As with most things in life, though, you get what you pay for, and I'm confident enough in my services to know that I will continue to attract clients who share the same values.

What is your best tip on how to succeed in business? When it comes to translation, networking and putting yourself out there are so important. I'm always more likely to recommend and work with colleagues I've met in person, as even though a brief chat at a professional event doesn't tell me anything about their linguistic ability, the fact that they are there in the first place adds to their general credibility. Anyone who knows more than one language can call themselves a translator, but they aren't going to produce the same quality as highly qualified, professional linguists who are investing in themselves by attending professional events and becoming qualified members of (inter)national institutes.

Do you take risks in business? I would say I'm generally quite risk averse, although if I strongly believe there are benefits to gain then I will stand by my position. Pricing is probably the biggest area where I can take risks in my line of work: if I pitch too high then I might lose a potential client, too low then I'll probably resent taking on the project. That said, I never undervalue my work and time, so if that's out of a client's budget then I'm happy to let them go. When it comes to the actual translation side, I would never take on a text that I felt was beyond my capabilities due to the subject matter. Just because I speak German and French, that doesn't mean I'm familiar with every field in the same way I'm not in English either. I would rather turn down a project or refer a trusted colleague in that field than take it on myself and do a substandard job.

How do you differentiate yourself from the competition in a crowded market?

The obvious way for any translator to set themselves apart is to say they offer high-quality services – I've already mentioned it several times in this interview, in fact – but that's really not enough. High quality should be a given for any qualified professional in any sector, even though that's sadly not always the case! For me, I think my USP is myself. I will always be the first port of call for any clients wanting to work with me, and I always take the time to get to know their needs,

expectations and style inside out so I can replicate their voice in international markets. People choose to work with me because they like me - the fact that I offer high-quality services on time is just a bonus!

What business tool couldn't you live without? I have always been a fan of spreadsheets and I use MS Excel for everything from keeping track of finances to scheduling projects. People love to tell me about fancier tools that are specifically designed to do X, Y and Z, but my spreadsheets work for me every time.

Do you use Social Media in business and what works best for you? Absolutely! I have accounts on all of the major platforms in line with what I mentioned earlier about networking and putting yourself out there. As there isn't a whole lot of scope for face-to-face interaction as a translator aside from attending conferences and specifically setting up meetings with clients, social networks are a great way to make new connections, stay in touch with existing ones and generally raise your profile.

What are some trends in your industry that you're excited about or think that our readers should be paying attention to? I touched on the rise of machine translation earlier and it's a really major topic in the

translation world. It's certainly come a long way since my classmates were trying to use Google Translate to do their French homework (naming no names!) and wondering how the teachers always knew! I know plenty of colleagues are refusing to acknowledge its existence, but I think it's naïve not to move with the times and look at how translators can use it to their advantage without feeling like it's going to take over their jobs. A good-quality machine translation engine can certainly make life easier by autosuggesting common words and phrases, and it can even do a half-decent job if you're happy with a basic gist of what a text is all about, but it's never going to be able to offer all the cultural insight, nuance and sophistication that only a professional human translator can bring.

And finally, if someone wanted to get in touch how could they do that?

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Richard Evans

It was with great sadness that we shared news of the death of Richard Evans at the age of 87 on Friday 22 April, a much-loved teacher of brass music at Kirkham Grammar School.

Below, former KGS teacher, Mr Adrian Long, shares with us the significant contributions Richard made during his time at KGS.

Richard's influence on music at both the Senior School and the Junior School was hugely significant: he worked as a peripatetic teacher and band conductor in the 1990s and early 2000s and during that time he inspired numerous young people thanks to his warmth and charisma allied to an insistence on the highest standards of musicianship.

His flowing locks and exuberant manner gave him the persona of an entertainer, who loved connecting with band members and audiences alike, yet in individual lessons he demonstrated a deep concern for the welfare of those whom he taught and an attention to detail which made him one of life's natural teachers. He would always start his lessons with a chat with pupils about how they were, what they were doing in school, putting them at their ease before getting down to the serious business of developing and improving their skills and techniques.

His time at KGS brought many highlights and triumphs, but for one golden generation of Concert Band players, he will be remembered for organising and leading a residential weekend for the band at Borwick Hall in July 2002, just before his retirement. In a relaxed atmosphere away from the usual surroundings of school music rooms, musicians of all ages spent two days rehearsing and bonding as a group, ending with an impromptu concert for parents and families who came to collect their children at the end of the weekend. I had the privilege of being one of the additional staff helpers for that weekend.

I can never hear a Sousa march without picturing in my mind the

KGS Concert Band of that era, their eyes fixed on their charismatic conductor, all giving their very best in the joyful togetherness that ensemble music alone can bring.

The time and attention that he devoted to KGS was all the more remarkable given his many other commitments in the world of band music, in which he was one of the UK's most successful, respected and well-loved bandmasters, as the many tributes appearing online so eloquently attest.

We send our condolences to Richard's family and friends, and remember with joy and gratitude his contribution to music at KGS.



Rosemary Cartwright

In October, the whole Kirkham Grammar School community was deeply saddened to learn of the death of Rosemary Cartwright, after a period of ill health.

Rosemary is held in deep respect and affection by generations of pupils, parents, teaching and non-teaching staff and governors, and it would be impossible to exaggerate the length and scope of her commitment to KGS, and more importantly her love of the School. She worked in various capacities with each of the last five Headmasters as a parent, in the Friends of KGS and as a governor, including latterly as Chair of Governors.

Rosemary's first connection to KGS was back in 1985, when her first child, Emma, joined the School as a First Year pupil. Two years later, Emma was joined by her brother Daniel, and both Emma and Daniel enjoyed happy and successful school careers, fully involved in the academic, cultural, sporting and social life of the School. It was a sign of the family's commitment to the School when they moved from Longridge to Kirkham. Rosemary was always there, supporting her children on the touchline, in the concert hall and everywhere in their busy school lives. But perhaps more notable was the way in which she befriended and supported all their peers: the Cartwright home near school quickly became a social hub for KGS life. Emma served with distinction as School Captain in 1991-92.

Rosemary's instinctive sense of community meant that she joined The Friends of KGS Committee as soon as her children had started at the School, and she immersed herself fully in the work of the Friends: her social and administrative skills and personal charm were a perfect fit for the group, and at events she was equally immersed and at home in front-of-house and public speaking roles as in unglamorous behind-the scenes work.

She rapidly rose to prominence in the Friends and was soon appointed Chair of the group, a role in which she served with success and distinction for many years. In 1992, when the new Head of Sixth Form was tasked by newly-appointed Headmaster, Barrie Stacey, with organising and establishing a glitzy black-tie Leavers' Ball for Sixth Formers, Rosemary's knowledge and experience of social events was of enormous value, and her easy friendship with her daughter's Sixth Form peers meant that she and her husband, Derek, played a pivotal role in establishing the Ball, years before other schools started staging the now ubiquitous 'proms'. Within a few years, the Sixth Form Ball was replicated the following day as The Friends' Summer Ball, such that these two key events in the KGS calendar are very much part of her legacy.

When her own children left school, she rightly stepped back from her leadership role in the Friends, but continued to serve and support with her characteristic good cheer and good sense. The School wisely recognised her commitment and expertise as of potentially huge value to the Governing Body, and she was appointed to the Board, serving for many years with the same mix of interest, care and commitment, along with the administrative expertise and business acumen that she brought from her professional work as manager of Progress Business Park and later the Kirkgate Development in Kirkham.

She took over as Chair of Governors in 2014 and guided the School with the same personal commitment that she had brought to her Friends of KGS role, assiduously attending sporting and cultural events, always quick to connect with and congratulate pupils on their achievements and to applaud the commitment of staff. It was she who presided over the imaginative and successful appointment of current Headmaster, Daniel Berry.

Outside School, Rosemary was equally loved and respected for her work in the community, with all the same qualities on display. She had the rare and precious ability to relate to people from all sections of the community. treating all with equal care and respect. She is remembered with affection as a supportive and sympathetic manager for the many small businesses who occupied premises at Progress Mill, and was a committed and devoted Christian servant, first of St Michael's, Kirkham, and later at St John the Evangelist Lund, where she served as a churchwarden having moved to Clifton in later life. Her work there, and elsewhere, was recognised and rewarded when she was a recipient of Maundy Money from the Queen at Blackburn Cathedral in 2014.

All at Kirkham Grammar School extend our sincere condolences to Rosemary's friends and family, and especially to her Old Kirkhamian children, Emma and Daniel.


The event saw Mr Barrie Stacey, the Headmaster who appointed Mr Painter in 1996, perform the opening ceremony, having shared some memories of the early days.



I am very grateful to Kirkham Grammar School for all the support they have given to me to achieve this next step in my future."

Thomas enhanced his growing reputation as one of the Fylde's leading young local historians when, along with KGS Head of Latin, Mrs Sue Long, he recently delivered a lecture on the earliest history of Kirkham at the opening of the Kirkham in Amounderness Local History and Heritage Collection, which has been established at St Michael's Parish Church, in the year of the church building's bicentenary celebrations. The collection has been set up and curated by retired KGS Head of Sixth Form, Adrian Long, and is based on documents and artefacts bequeathed to the church by the late Martin Ramsbottom, who was a leading authority on the history of Kirkham and the Fylde.

The lecture introduced some fascinating thoughts on the town's earliest human history, with Thomas telling the story of Kirkham's most famous artefact, the Roman Shield Boss, the replica of which is now housed in church. The original of the Shield Boss, now housed in the British Museum, was discovered in 1796 by a KGS Schoolmaster, so a KGS connection runs right through this story.
