This new academic year is a significant one for me personally as I enter my first full academic year as Headmaster.

In these challenging times where other independent schools are opting to be free schools or become part of a Multi-Academy Trust we have strengthened our 'Truly Independent' status. It is heartening to stress that we have welcomed a large cohort into the First Year and have retained the largest number into the Sixth Form for a number of years. I have become convinced that central to our success going forward is maintaining the principle of independence.

We have emerged during the Summer Term as a school that is well equipped to move forward and to ensure that the pupils, who only travel through this school once, receive the very best. We can reflect proudly on our achievements from last year to prepare us well for the future. During 2015/2016 we gained the most A*-C grades awarded at GCSE and A level compared to other local independent schools, 94% of leavers gained a place at their University of choice; we were awarded the most NODAs compared to other North-West Independent Schools, we were Lancashire Hockey Champions; and we were named 'National Rugby School of the Year'.

As we look forward to this year and an extremely busy end of term, we have a lot to celebrate. However, it is the tradition and long history of KGS that remains strong and underpins our ethos. People, buildings and the world around us are constantly changing, however the core of KGS remains. We will ensure the traditional values are recognised alongside modern ambition. The longer I spend at Kirkham Grammar School, the more I understand what clearly makes it such a unique school.

The following is still relevant to our fine school today. The virtue of a school does not depend entirely on its classrooms, the equipment in its laboratories, the number of its pupils, nor even the success of its exam results. There is an unseen influence that is exerted by buildings and surroundings that are beautiful and dignified and in keeping with fine honourable traditions and high ideals embedded at KGS.

We are proud of our school and the lifelong memories that are heart clinging and full of opportunity. Memories of muddy rugby fields, friends laughing and sundrenched cricket pitches. There is something at KGS that is intangible but very real, the atmosphere in which we dwell, that pervasive spirit which surrounds us and influences all of which we strive to achieve. It is a great heritage at KGS and one which will stay with you for life. As we enter a new chapter in the school's long and successful history, we look forward to even more from our wonderful pupils.

When looking back on a term, I am always astounded at the diverse range of activities and events which have engaged our pupils, and this term is certainly no exception to that. Our pupils have been inspired and challenged by master chefs, visiting lecturers, masterclasses and academic competitions as well as tours and trips far and wide, not to mention sports competitions. Our hope is that pupils will be able to find their niche at KGS and feel confident that they are developing new abilities and skills as well as consolidating areas in with which they have already demonstrated prowess.

Highlights from the Headmaster's Annual Review

KGS Prizegiving 2015 - 2016 15 September 2016

"It is a pleasure to add my first ever welcome to our Annual Speech Day and Prize Giving where we celebrate an incredibly busy year at KGS. It has been an unusual year for the school during a period of change which brings with it opportunity and fresh ideas including a new Headmaster, appointed mid-year. Once again, however, it is the achievements of our pupils that takes the limelight and, in that sense, it has been a truly remarkable year.



I am especially pleased that Dr Tony Lewis has agreed to join us to present the prizes on this special occasion. Dr Lewis was born in Bolton and is a Mathematician and, more importantly, an old boy of KGS. He received degrees in Mathematics and Statistics from Sheffield University and was formerly a lecturer at Oxford Brookes University and University of West England and is perhaps best known for his development of the Duckworth-Lewis method of resetting targets in interrupted cricket matches. Dr Lewis was also appointed a Member of the British Empire in 2010.

It would be remiss not to make reference to the fact that this is my first full academic year as Headmaster and I believe tonight is about the achievements of all of our pupils and not the ramblings of the new Headmaster's vision for the next 36 years. Why 36 years you say? That is the record for the longest serving Head at KGS. There remains a very busy year in front of me in leading a school that can boast excellent facilities, highly committed staff and, most importantly, a talented and motivated body of pupils making the most of opportunities put in front of them. I have always been committed to ensuring we educate the whole child and that the children we serve get the very best. This is the least they should expect as they only journey through formal education once. I could not have been welcomet to a school that meets that philosophy more. So my report tonight concentrates wholly on the work of the school and its pupils over this last year.

It is fair to say that we are still riding on a tide of Olympic emotion that is continuing during the paralympics games. In fact, only last week did I receive a request from a family to go and watch their son in Rio. Like many of you, such events leave us glued to the TV screens as the Olympic Heroes take us through penalty shoot outs to win the much coveted gold medal.

The Olympic spirit is one that resonates to us as educators and is a theme I have used at the start of this year in Assembly. Clearly the message is centred to a degree around sport, however, I did believe there is so much more that is being represented. This includes values, commitment, team spirit, courage and the ability to see both triumph and failure as part of the experience. These qualities are inspirational in any sphere and values that I hope all generations will recognise and replicate in all aspects of their lives in school and beyond. I stressed that all of our pupils are Olympians and they must strive to achieve a range of gold medals in Sport, Music, Drama, Academic Studies and all the opportunities KGS offers. In fact, I did state that the only part which will hold you back is you! KGS is full of opportunity if you want it. It was also made even more real when we had a past pupil winning a silver medal in the Rugby 7s, Dan Bibby. Such a wonderful



summer deserves to have a lasting impact and I hope we can develop and maintain the values that were so visibly exemplified there.

The major highlight of every summer is the publication of the examination results.

Results 2016:

A-level:

A*/A stayed the same as previous years nationally, where here at KGS grades awarded went up at A* with Geography/Maths leading the way. With 28 A-level courses being offered, 24 had a 100% pass rate. More pupils than in 2015 have been awarded grades at A*/A/B and C grades. Largest cohort of 92 since 2007.

GCSE:

Nationally A*/A grades were down 0.6 % whilst here at KGS they were up by 3%, nationally A*-B down by 1.0% at KGS up by 5%, nationally A*-C down by 1.3% at KGS up by 1%. Overall all categories at GCSE improved on 2015 with 93% A*-C including English/Maths is 38% above the national average with 75% of grades awarded at KGS are A*/A/B. A larger than expected cohort remained at KGS 6th Form (88% retention).

HMC Schools:

Increased students getting ABB grades which will see many go on to Russell Group Universities. With actual grades remaining impressively high in strong A-Level/GCSE subjects. A concerted effort to halt grade inflation in recent years has seen A-level/GCSE grades level off and fall. This is not the case in independent schools.

I wish the cohort of 2016 well as they set out on the next adventure in their lives. They served the school very well, both academically and in the broader life of the school, and I hope to hear of their successes over the coming years. Stepping out from school is exciting but I hope none have any sense of complacency for it is a challenging world out there and we hope we have equipped them with a wide array of skills to be the best they can possibly be.

As I have firmly believed in my years as a Headmaster, it is the breadth and balance of the provision that helps pupils become the best they can possibly be. That must incorporate the opportunity to aspire to the very highest levels, but also an opportunity to find an activity within the school which gives all pupils the opportunity to shine. I have been overwhelmed so early in my KGS career at how much extra-curricular goes on in our school. The diversity and range of clubs and societies that take place weekly is outstanding and a true testament to KGS and the staff and pupils.

Academic Excellence:

The Psychology Department has yet again gained awards from the Good Schools Guide – the most recent one being a commendation for excellent performance by boys studying Psychology at an independent school. This is added to the collection of awards which also include best Psychology results in National and International Schools and best performance by girls studying Psychology in independent schools which have been awarded in previous years. Students have taken part in a number of university based competitions and the department is continually being recognised for its academic excellence and innovation within the subject.

Julian Shield gained a bronze award in the Chemistry Olympiad which is the world's biggest (and most difficult) competition for young Chemists.

There continues to be excellent performances on the UKMT National Mathematics Challenges at all levels within the school and there were prestigious Gold Awards in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels.

The school's World War One centenary commemorations continued last year with two more lectures taking place in front of sell-out audiences in the Recital Room. Richard Van Emden, the prolific historian of the conflict, and Sir Hew Strachan (photo below), from the University of St Andrews, both enthralled their audiences with their knowledge and passion for their





subject. Professor Gary Sheffield who delivered his lecture on General Haig and the Battle of the Somme in October features in this newsletter. The school also held a curriculum day on 1 July to commemorate the first day of the infamous Battle of the Somme, where pupils analysed differing interpretations of the battle and remembered three Old Kirkhamians who died at the Somme; Dan Davies, John Murray and Hayward Wane. A GCSE History field trip also visited the battlefields of Northern France and Belgium both to learn more about the conflict and to pay their respects to the fallen soldiers of the war. Plans are already in place for further events over the next twelve months.

Of note from the Geography Department last year would be the October trip to the West Coast of America: 43 pupils visited San Francisco, Yosemite, Grand Canyon and Los Angeles over 10 days.

CCF:

It has been an outstanding year all round from the Combined Cadet Force. In October 2015, 15 cadets took part in the National Shooting Competition at the Army Training Camp, achieving success in the final of the 100m and 200m marksman shoot. In May 2016, 3 KGS students attended the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire's annual awards ceremony for cadets and reserve forces. This was a very prestigious event. Sophie Warden and Elizabeth Brocklehurst won the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire's commendation for outstanding service to the cadet force. Rachel Horsfield won the highest award, which was the Lord Lieutenant's Cadet, which in the cadet and reserve forces world is the equivalent of an MBE.

In June 2016, Kirkham Grammar School was invited to attend the Army's North of England Cadet & Reserve Forces awards ceremony in Manchester. The school was presented with the award for 'Outstanding service to the Reserve Forces' – a first for KGS. In July 2016, Kirkham took 50 cadets to the annual CCF summer camp at Nescliff Training Camp (photo right) in Shrewsbury and won the overall prize for the most outstanding school on camp.

Sport:

In the Lancashire Track and Field County Championships, eight girls were chosen to represent Lancashire. In the English School Qualifiers, one girl was selected to represent Lancashire at the English School Championships. In cross country, six girls were selected for the Fylde and Wyre team. In hockey, numerous pupils were selected to represent Lancashire.

Lancashire Junior Regional Performance Centre: U15, U16, U18 Pennine Pumas Squad: U16 Hipac: U18 England Blue: U18 England: U16

In swimming, we were represented in the Lancashire County Championships and North West Championships. Our pupils also achieved 4th in the Mixed QEGS Blackburn Quadrangular and 3rd in the Mixed Stanley Cooke Trophy.

Our junior girls athletics team won the Junior Girls Sainsbury's English Schools Cup, became Lancashire Champions and Regional Runnersup. Our intermediate girls' athletics team won the Inter Girls Sainsbury's English Schools Cup, became Lancashire Champions and were 3rd place at regional level.



Hockey: U12 A Lancashire County Champions, 2nd U12 B Lancashire County, U13 Mini Hockey Lancashire Joint Champions, U13 Mini Hockey Regional Finalists, U14 Lancashire County Champions, U14 Regional Finalists 2nd Place, U14 North Finalists, U15 Lancashire County Champions, U16 Lancashire County Champions, U16 Regional Champions, U16 North Finalists 2nd Place, U18 1st XI Lancashire Champions, U18 1st XI Regional Champions and U18 1st XI North Finalists.

Rachel Greenwood represented England U16 XI against Holland (photo above), scoring at Lilleshall, with further games against Scotland and Germany, Belgium and the 6 nations.

Girls Tennis: Division 1 Lancashire League U13 winners, Division 1 Lancashire League U15 winners, U13 Aegon National Tennis Regional knock out round, U15 Aegon National Tennis Regional knock out round, U15 Regional Champions and U15 National Finalists 3rd Place.



Our 1st XV rugby team was unbeaten for a second year running and awarded the National Rugby School of the Year at the National Rugby Awards held at Twickenham. The U15s were Lancashire champions whilst the U13s were runners up. In the seven-a-side programme, the 1st VII won the Durham School Sevens and were semi-finalists at the Rosalyn Park Sevens. The U15s won the Kings' Macclesfield and AKS School Sevens and the U13s won the Packwood Haugh Sevens.

There were many players who achieved international honours which include: 2 players in the Scotland U19s, 2 players in the England U16s and 3 players in the England Counties U18s.



One pupil represented Lancashire for athletics and qualified for the final at the English Schools Championships in the senior boys 1500m. He was also the Lancashire champion at this event. The intermediate boys athletics team qualified for the English schools North West A final. The boys athletics team was Fylde Coast Champions 2016.

The 1st XI cricket team enjoyed a relatively successful season with the annual MCC fixture going down to the wire as the visitors ran out winners by 9 runs. The U17s were Lancashire Plate winners.

Duke of Edinburgh:

During the last academic year, over 100 DofE awards have been completed by our students – 79 at bronze, 25 at silver and 14 at gold. This is an increase of 50% from last year – 80 last year and nearly 120 this year. Last year 160 of our students took part in expeditions and we hope that all of their efforts with route planning, camping and walking some tough routes in some less than favourable weather conditions are complemented by their commitment to the volunteering, skill and physical components of the award and that we see many completing their awards. Our gold award achievers have received their award certificates at ceremonies at St. James's Palace, Buckingham Palace and Holyrood Palace this year, meeting royalty and celebrities. In the 60th anniversary year of the DofE award scheme, a number of our students and staff have undertaken a Diamond DofE Challenge.

Drama:

It has been another busy and successful year in the drama department hitting the ground running with a fantastic production of Hamlet just before the October half term. The cast was led by Mason Forrest as the troubled eponymous hero who performed with intelligence, understanding and sensitivity. This is one of Shakespeare's biggest roles and, for many professional actors, the pinnacle of their careers, so, to take it on in the fifth year, is pretty spectacular and a testimony to this young man's outstanding talent. Ms Barrie says he is one of the most extraordinarily talented actors she has ever worked with and that he fully deserved the National Operatic and Dramatic Award, or NODA, for Best Lead Actor that he later received. Mason was ably supported by Elyssia Cockshott as a fragile and haunting Ophelia, Anthony Hudson as the dastardly villain Claudius, and Sophie Copplestone as the haughty Queen Gertrude. It is fitting and a matter of great pride to the department that all four won NODAs at the North West regional awards ceremony in Manchester; an outstanding achievement.



It should also be noted that Zac Crowe, only a third year pupil, and Sophie Warden did an outstanding job with the choreography. The dancers were excellent. performing once again to our completely accomplished live band led by Louis Johnson, Rob Ellis and Joanna Bako.

We continued to run multiple theatre trips which were always well attended and culturally enriching, and are looking forward to February's trip to New York. Exciting times ahead as always in drama at KGS.

Music:

All year groups have taken part in coffee concerts and evening recitals during the course of the year. The annual Carol Service at St. Michael's Church was a chance for the Senior Choir to impress, and this they did in some style. The Autumn Term was rounded off by the Christmas Concert that produced a dazzling array of individual solos, combined with contributions from the Orchestra, String Group, Concert Band, Swing Band and Choir. Late March delivered the annual Founders' Day service, again at St. Michael's Church in Kirkham, where the Senior Choir led events, with an emotionally charged performance of the fiendishly difficult, intensely demanding 'Ubi Caritas' by Paul Mealor.

Another highlight of the year had to be the Spring Concert which took place in late April. The Orchestra, String Group, Concert Band, Swing Band, Choir and individuals thrilled the audience with some very accomplished performances. West End musicals, contemporary and classical choir music and sultry jazz transported the appreciative audience to other worlds, and the tremendous applause was most gratefully received by all performers. It was wonderful to see how mature and well-prepared all of our musicians were.



I must take this opportunity to pay tribute to all the staff who make all of these activities in all of these areas of school life possible, at a time when the teaching profession continues to be under pressure to relentlessly raise levels of improvement and react to ever changing government policy. We must also say a fond farewell to the staff who left KGS during the summer term. They gave so much of their time and energy to the school and its pupils. We wish them well.

The life of any school is complex and owes so much to its stakeholders. We all rely on those around us to create the environment in which our pupils can thrive. This includes the selfless support of their parents which is a Hall Mark of our parent body, and one which I have recently joined. The early Saturday morning drop off, military like planning on a Sunday evening for the week ahead. Success is not guaranteed without the dedication of all of our staff and a team of dedicated Governors. 2016/17 is going to be a year of some change, new developments and opportunity. Just like the pupils we serve, we are always learning and must therefore constantly adapt and develop to the changes around us. KGS will not be standing still, nor will we get left behind. We are looking forward to increasing popularity and becoming seen as no longer the best kept secret in Lancashire.

Our school will not copy others; we are going to be a pattern for others to follow. The school will continue to favour the many and not the few. Innovation and creativity will abound and we will continue to create a truly evolving school with traditional values and modern ambition.

We will continue to trust in systems and policies and even more in the spirit of the school and the people who work and study in it. I have only been in post for five months and have quickly come to realise what a truly wonderful school this is".

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HEADMISTRESS' ANNUAL REVIEW 2015-2016

I would like to start my review of the year with two pieces of wisdom given by two very different people who were at very different stages and in very different circumstances in their personal lives when they said them, but each has really rung true to me over this year and keep recurring in my mind.

The first was said by Anne Frank and can be found in her powerful 'Diary of a Young Girl; 'How wonderful it is that nobody need wait a single moment before starting to improve the world'. WOW! Given Anne's tragically short life and the circumstances in which she lived I find this very thought provoking and then I look at our children! Every single one of them unknowingly has embraced this statement not just in their myriad achievements but through the values by which they are growing up. Please keep this thought at the back of your mind as you read my review of the year.

The second saying I would like to share with you comes from Zig Zagler, the motivational guru; Zig states that 'Your attitude, not your aptitude will determine your altitude'. Three 'A's placed in a very important and specific order. Again WOW! So who we are, the values by which we live and work, the confidence, resilience, enthusiasm, positivity, work ethic, empathy and all the other attributes we wish to ingrain into our children, are more important than the innate genetic ability with which they were born if they, or indeed we, are to reach for the sky and become the very people we want to be, and aspire to become, both personally and professionally. Please also bear that saying in mind as I proceed.

At KGS, learning and improvement permeates the culture of the school and in order to achieve that we aim to celebrate not just achievement but also progress. We understand that learning itself is learnable through difficulty, confusion, novelty and surprise. Our enduring aim is to provide each pupil with a tailored education within a caring community whereby they can maximise their abilities and achieve their personal objectives - academic, artistic, sporting or excellence in other fields. We are ambitious for every pupil and want them to have the confidence and desire to be ambitious for themselves.

In fact I would like to remind you of the words uttered by Barack Obama on his election to the presidency of the United States in 2008, the same year that our leavers joined KGS: "If there is anyone out there who still doubts that America is a place where all things are possible; who still wonders if the dream of our founders is alive in our time; who still questions the power of our democracy, tonight is your answer."

Perhaps the KGJS version should be along these lines: "If there is anyone out there who still doubts that Kirkham Grammar Junior School is a place where all things are possible; who still wonders if the dream of our founders is alive in our time; who still questions the strength of our school community, today is your answer."

Academically, we had a successful year with most of our children well exceeding above the national average in Maths and English. Fifty of our children were chosen as Young Writers and are now in the Lancashire Young Writers Publication. Whilst these core subjects are, and will always remain, a priority, we are forced to consider whether a traditional education should include a traditional curriculum. We are constantly refining our curriculum so that its traditional values, such as the teaching of tenacity, work ethic, polite and positive co-operation and creativity are retained, whilst laying the foundations for the learning of technological skills and thinking skills. Our children have produced some outstanding work in Science, they have used independent research to produce some wonderful projects and DT and Art have also been a prominent part of the children's learning. ICT continues to play a



major role in all subjects and the iPads are in constant use. I would like to extend a big thank you to all of the boys and girls who have served on the School Council and the Eco Committee. Their ideas and thoughts are very much valued and such an important part of our school. Such ideas as Switch off Fortnight, Fruity Friday, whereby, fruit snacks are sold for charity, and the initiation of 'KGJS has Talent', where we were all entertained by a cross section of amazing talents, have all been wonderful initiatives.

We are one school from 3 to 18 and for many their educational journey starts in our wonderful Pre-School, led by Mrs Blanco-Bayo. The children have great fun whilst learning such vital skills. They have looked at how other cultures live and made their Pre-School into an Indian sweet shop to celebrate Diwali. They have held a Royal Banquet, made an igloo out of 100s of milk cartons and visited Clitheroe Castle to learn about dragons and knights. They have been involved in two wonderful productions where they have entertained us all with their singing and dancing. Our Pre-School is certainly an exciting place to learn and this is down to the staff who teach in there.



Our Infants also had a very busy year! They studied children across the world and produced some beautiful work surrounding this topic and their exploration of multiculturalism. The I1s studied different foods, the I2s studied Africa through Art and Music and the I3s enjoyed learning all about India. They all enjoyed a Royal Day to celebrate the 90th birthday of Her Majesty the Queen and came to school in some beautiful costumes. The I2s studied James and the Giant Peach and the peach they made has been all over the world, even arriving in Nepal at one of the 'Classrooms in the Clouds'. Our I1s have visited Park View in Lytham and Martin Mere and had a visit by some lambs and calves! They had a demonstration of Indian cooking by Mrs Hughes - I would still like to know how she makes that wonderful chickpea curry! The I2s went to Towneley Hall to enhance their History learning, had a polar adventure at the Senior School and even had a visit from Buddy the Elf just before Christmas. Our I3s had a trip to Salmesbury Hall to meet the Tudors and they produced some outstanding work in a wide range of subjects.



Moving on to our juniors. When I asked the children what they had enjoyed the most, these are some of the things that they have remembered. The J1s enjoyed their visit to Blackpool Zoo along with their follow up work which was a project on the Rainforest. They enjoyed dressing up as Romans and particularly the Roman feast! The J2s reminisced about their overnight stay at Castle Head in Cumbria, their visit to the Manchester Museum of Science and Industry, Cycling Proficiency and World Book Week where they went to read to the younger pupils. The J3s have never sat still! They have had a forensic scientist in their classroom, produced some amazing mountain projects, which I hope many of you were able to see on display at the front of school. They visited the Senior



School for their WWII experience and enjoyed a trip to Waddow Hall. Of course the one highlight of their year was their Bushcraft experience. Well done to all of you on that trip as you all put yourselves out of your comfort zone and this is, of course, what these trips are all about! Although I'm not sure about the eating of a raw salmon's eye ball is something I would attempt myself!!



To enrich the curriculum there have also been many visitors and events. We have had visits from authors, an Online Safety Week, a theatre group to deliver a Maths performance, Book Week, Infant Maths challenges and of course many individual visitors to talk about religion and banking to name just a couple. Our extra-curricular clubs also give our pupils many opportunities outside the classroom.





Music and dramatic performance continue to be at the fore. Time and again I sit at the back, or at the side, of a performance and watch as, once again, our pupils step up to the mark and produce a performance that they often didn't know was in them. This willingness to try, this willingness to get to grips with a musical challenge, be it choral or instrumental, is wonderful to witness. Last year, we received a NODA award for our production of Beauty and the Beast. We were the youngest ever group to be awarded this and we were up against Senior Schools and Amateur Dramatic Societies. The Christmas Concert is always a time to showcase the talents of our boys and girls and saw performances from the Choir, Boys Choir, Vocal Ensemble and Instrumental Ensemble. In March, we held a very successful Cheese and Wine Performing Arts evening with many individual and group performances in both Drama and Music. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the parents who joined our Staff Parent Choir who performed not only on this evening but also at the St George's Day Ball in Lytham. Our choristers also performed beautifully at this event and have also been out into the local community, visiting hospitals and supermarkets. Our Infants have also enjoyed being part of the Infant Ensemble, Recorder Group and a verv talented Infant Violin Group.

In Speech and Drama, many children have sat the LAMDA examinations with outstanding success.

The Choir were inspirational this year with so many talented individuals. We were very proud when they won the NW Independent Schools Choral Competition when they went up against 16 other schools. They also took part in the Young Voices at the MEN Arena and qualified for the final of the Last Choir Standing Competition in Blackburn where their performance was outstanding.

KGJS would not be KGJS without a good amount of fresh air, and so on to sport. There is no doubt that once again we have had a hugely successful year, reflecting the huge benefit we have derived from specialist coaching and dedicated staff. The first mention must go to our U11 Boys and Girls Hockey teams who both won the accolade of becoming not only Lancashire Champions but North West Champions which then took them to the North of England Finals. Both teams reached the final. The girls decided to share the trophy with Cundall Manor School whereas the boys decided to go to penalty flicks but unfortunately lost out to the eventual winners, Altrincham Prep School. The U11 girls also went on to win the Budge Hockey, AJIS and St Mary's Hall Tournaments. A wide array of matches have been played at U8, U9, U10 and U11



levels with regular B and occasional C teams being put out. Our U10s were runners-up in the U10 Invitational Tournament. Our Boys Hockey also won the AJIS Hockey Championships. The Girls Netball team also won the St Pius Netball tournament.

In Rugby, our boys had a successful season. The year began with some very friendly Saturday tournaments for our U9, U10 and U11 Boys. There were numerous matches for all age groups and our U8 and U10 teams have played in curtain raisers at both Fylde Rugby Club and Preston Grasshoppers. The U11 Boys Rugby won the NW Independent Schools Tournament and were runners up at the St Mary's Crosby Competition.

The 2015-16 season saw the Cross Country squads continue their huge success from the year before. The girls took part in three major events; AJIS, Sedbergh Invitational Championships and the St Mary's Hall Competition. In total they have competed against 35 different schools and in each event they have come home with the trophy. A special mention must go to Bo and Hattie Madden, Amy and Dani Merrick, Talia Armstead, Poppy Kearsley and Olivia Aberra. The U11 boys and U9/U10 boys and girls also competed very well with some outstanding individual performances.

We also had notable success in Indoor Athletics with our boys and girls achieving five gold, four silver and six bronze medals in the AJIS Indoor Athletics Championships. Records were broken by Talia Armstead in the balance and Archie Dowds in the triple jump.

Netball, Swimming, Rounders, Athletics and Cricket also featured on the fixture list. Individual congratulations went to Talia Armstead who represented Lancashire in Gymnastics and to Archie Dowds who won three gold medals in the Lancashire Track and Field Events, against boys two years older.



House Events are an important part of school and this year was no exception. All boys and girls took part in House Cross Country, all the juniors took part in a very exciting and noisy House Swimming and a new event this year, which was the House Singing. I am sure you will agree these events are invaluable in a school such as ours.

You might well be forgiven for thinking that KGJS is such a busy place that we rarely have the time to look outside our own very privileged environment, but really that could not be further from the truth. The boys and girls have made the choice to think about others often this year and have thrown themselves, not only into supporting the large fund-raising events that the



school organises, but they have more importantly championed their own choices of smaller and more personal charities, too. Through the year we have all enjoyed the big events like our Macmillan Coffee Morning, Reindeer Dash, cake sales and concerts, However, many of our boys and girls have come to me with their own more thought provoking fund raising, sometimes it was wanting to give their pocket money to others less fortunate than themselves. One little boy took part in a sponsored swim to raise money for clean water in Malawi, another to collect toys for children at Christmas. Guide Dogs for the Blind, The Stroke Association and Brian House are just some of the charities who have benefited from your fundraising. Classrooms in the Clouds is, as you know, our International Charity, and I am delighted to say that this year we have raised over £2500 for this wonderful cause. The total amount raised at KGJS this year is an incredible £5000.

It is important to pay tribute to the contribution of so many people who make up the staff of KGJS. Our teachers, teaching assistants, nursery nurses and office staff are an expert and highly talented group of people. Across the whole school, there is a very real sense that we are all on the same team here and no one stands on ceremony. The support staff are the engine room of the school and I would like to convey our thanks to the long suffering administrative staff and catering team, who put up with our requests of "just one more thing". To all the caretakers and ground staff and to our Bursarial team, under the direction of Mrs Brown, a huge thank you.

There are giants in our past and in our present and I could not finish my review of the year without saying a few words about members of our team who have moved on to pastures new.

Peter Lockett retired at the end of the academic year after a wonderful 18 years at KGJS. He joined us as Head of Music and Year 5 teacher. He was a caring and very sensitive form teacher to all his pupils as well as all things to do with Music. His enthusiasm at events and his love of Music will be sorely missed. We wish him well in his retirement and hope to see him back visiting us all soon.

Mrs Christine Brindle joined KGJS in 1997 as a part time teacher covering a number of different age groups. A year later she was appointed as a full time member of staff and in her nineteen years here she has taught all age groups, but has spent most of her time with J1, J3 and latterly with J4. Christine Brindle has played a huge role in the history of our school and she will be greatly missed by everyone at KGJS. We wish her health and happiness in her retirement.

Linda Baxter taught at KGS for 20 years, albeit only 13 in the Junior School. Having taught the girls games and occasionally some classroom cover she can only be described as extremely committed and passionate about sport. Now with two boys at university and the purchase of a lovely new camper van, she decided to hang up her boots and head off into the sun with her husband, Simon. Thank you Ms Baxter for all that you have given to KGJS!

We also said goodbye to several members of staff after a shorter period of time; Miss Elena De Maine who was only with us on a one year contract, Mr Matthew Edgar who was our gap student for nearly two years, who we said a huge thank you to for his contribution to school life and to Mr Toby Roberts who filled in for Mr Edgar.

I am delighted, however to welcome Mr Michael Smith to our team and he joined us in September to teach our J1s and Miss Emily Whatmough who joins the PE department.

We sadly bid farewell to the bedrock of our community, the J4s. What a year they had! Enterprise Week, the Wales trip, Chill Factore, Isle of Man and, the most enjoyable of them all, Entrance Exam preparation! Thanks to Thomas and Poppy, as Head Boy and Girl, who together with all the Senior Prefects, House Captains and monitors have been supportive and led by example. The whole year they were an inspiration to us all in their commitment, leadership, school spirit and genuine good humour. We will miss them and hope that they will come back and see us.

There is an incredibly bright and exciting future ahead; a shared vision by Mr Berry and myself to ensure that the same ethos and culture is across the Foundation and that our pupils are offered an increasingly high quality of Teaching and Learning. At the beginning of July, eleven of KGJS' most promising young musicians took part in a Coffee Concert in the School Hall. The annual autumnal 3rd Year Art trip was to take place over in the 'White Rose County', West Yorkshire, in one of the largest purpose built gallery spaces in the UK, The Hepworth Wakefield.

Housing over 40 original sculptures from one of Britain's greatest sculptors, Barbara Hepworth, the gallery comprised of dramatic spaces holding many monumental sculptural pieces. Here the pupils could see with their own eyes the development of her work, from small sketches and maquettes, up to full size models.

In complete contrast to Hepworth's work, the adjacent gallery housed the work of renowned author, rugby player and playwright David Storey. A fellow Yorkshire born artist, he went on to train at the world-renowned Slade School of Fine Art and diversified into writing, but never let go of his artistic passion. As well as a wall of posters representing his written work, the room was filled with hundreds of postcard sized images from his sketchbook, drawn daily over a six year period.

Finally, the group were confronted by the powerful work of Sir Stanley Spencer, and his richly detailed paintings. Spanning his entire career, the exhibition included over 70 works, some of which we had studied in the classroom. They were a spectacular sight after having only seen reproductions on a small scale back at school. The 3rd Years jumped at the opportunity to imitate the human stance seen in the paintings by posing in the same position and sketching each other. Many other engaging activities were undertaken and the day seemed to conclude very quickly.

We will certainly be back and look forward to the forthcoming exhibitions the Hepworth Museum has to offer.



THE HEPWORTH WAKEFIELD






In November, the Art & Design Department's GCSE pupils and staff spent a day in the East End of London, in particular the area around Brick Lane. It is often described as London's Cultural Quarter, home of the Curry Mile and alternative fashion and street art. The area was formerly the hunting ground of Jack the Ripper and is now a big tourist draw for world famous graffiti art, featuring artists such as Banksy, D*Face, Roa and Conor Harrington. The lane provided a rich vein of creative images for our pupils that will now feed into their artwork and development of their digital images.

The department has a further trip planned for 2017, a four day trip with the Sixth Form to Paris in April.
