A success in any language

EXAMINATION

I would like to congratulate our pupils on achieving some of the best examination results in the School's history. Regrettably, the way the DFEE calculate the results, based on age cohorts rather than actual examination entries, has again undermined the achievements of our pupils. Nine fourth year pupils, who had reached the age of 15 years but will not sit their GCSE examinations until they complete their fifth year in summer 2000, were included in our results as if they had sat and completely failed all their examinations. In order to set the record straight and pay proper tribute to those KGS pupils who actually took their GCSE examinations, I am including with this letter a full list of our GCSE results, which were absolutely first-rate as you will see.

We should applaud a GCSE pass-rate of 94 per cent, against a national average of 56 per cent. Out of all 757 grades, 71 per cent were either A*, A or B. This represents a record for KGS and contrasts sharply with the national average for these top grades of 32 per cent, 97 per cent of all our GCSE candidates achieved five or more grades A*-C at an average of 8.2 'passes' per pupil. There were some outstanding individual performances. Twelve of our pupils obtained at least nine A*/A grades and Oliver Brambles excelled with ten A*s and one A.

The largest upper sixth in the School's history, 88 students, achieved one of the highest pass rates of 90 per cent. We congratulate Katharine Sharrocks, Kathryn Shaw and James Whewell on their Oxbridge successes and the many others who achieved top A-level grades and chose to go to other universities. Drapers' Company Scholarships were awarded to Bruce Helme (four grade A's) and Janine Swarbrick (five grade A's) and it was good to see three of our students who stayed for a third year in the Sixth achieve outstandingly good results and progress to the Universities of their choice - Ayse Ince (grades A,A,B) to Leeds reading Psychology; Andrew Johnson (grades A,B,B) to Bristol reading Physiology, and Kevin Turner (grades A,A,A) to

Liverpool reading Medicine. Many other students worked hard to exceed expectations.

Overall, this year's examination results, when accurately reported, confirmed the academic status of the School and the conclusion of the Inspectorate, that Kirkham Grammar School achieves the potential of its pupils and in many cases, beyond.

OPEN





An eventful term began with the pleasing news that Sergeant Helen Jacomb had passed her demanding leadership course with the RAF over the summer. Well done Helen!



The launch was a complete success, and Starchaser 3a soared to a height of 20,000ft. A very spectacular sight! Since the launch, Steve Bennett has agreed to some of our pupils producing computer models of his proposed craft, and talking to him about space flight in general. This visit, it is hoped, will take place in the new year. Staff will have information on tap regarding all school curriculum matters. The new networking needed to run this system will be installed over the Christmas Holiday. We are also looking forward to extending ICT facilities to the new library extension and refurbishment next year.

'Our Country's Good'

For three nights the New Hall has resounded to the crack of whips, the creaking of timbers and the cries of brutalised prisoners. 'Our Country's Good,' a play by Timberlake Wertenbaker has been the source of these disturbances.

The play, an 'A' level Theatre Studies text, has attracted strong audiences who have enjoyed the humour and pathos. The cast was made up from fifth and sixth form students, several of whom intend to study Drama and Theatre Arts at University. Mr. John Callister joined the strong cast to play Major Ross - the 'baddie' of the piece, in his acting debut! The minimalist set used "Power Point" projected onto a 4oft. cloth to create statements about the nature of crime and punishment and the importance of drama and the theatre to create meaning and change lives.

This production has been staged with special effects in mind; there have been silhouettes, gun shots and bleeding wounds,

all of which were created by our own students. The props too have been designed and constructed by the fourth year GCSE group.

Mrs. Poole went to Stratford to select the costumes from the RSC wardrobe. All the cast have very much enjoyed wearing 'professional' costumes and it has been very instructive for many of our



students to look carefully at their construction and styling. Many of our first and second years have had fun trying on the costumes and being a Royal Marine Officer or a convict from 1789!

It would be hard to single out any individual performances - each was a tour de force and a fitting tribute to the School's 450th celebrations from the Drama Department.

At the time of going to press most people are thinking of and looking forward to Christmas. I am sure we all are. However, some 40 pupils and four members of staff are looking further ahead than that and are eagerly preparing for the New Year.

On 3rd January 2000 (to avoid the perils of the Millennium Bug), we prepare for the departure of the KGS Ski Society's annual ski holiday. This year, again, we are jetting off to the French Alps, probably from Gatwick. This will be our 19th consecutive trip to various locations in Europe. We have decided on a new venue and a different tour operator has been chosen. STS Skiplan are taking us to the resort of Les Gets, which will be obviously mispronounced by KGS pupils. I am informed that it is correctly pronounced Lay Jay!

The area is the largest skiable area in Europe with over 650km of pistes straddling the French and Swiss borders. The Portes du Soleil is one of the largest linked ski areas in the world with 229 ski lifts. This select alpine resort is a traditional Savoie village with an ambiance which is very typical of this region and is a popular choice for schools. This is probably because of the ease of access to the slopes, (within 300 metres of the hotel). It also has a superb skiing range with excellent progression from nursery slopes to the greater challenges of the longer, higher, steeper runs for the more adventurous.

So, for recreational skier or expert, there is skiing to suit all abilities. The Les Gets nursery area is ideal for first-timers with an easy progression via the Chavanes chair lift to the green and blue runs below the Tetes des Crets. Both sides of the mountain give access to good intermediate skiers with the Mont Chery chairlift and the cable car rising rapidly to 1850m. Advanced skiers will appreciate the extensive area and maybe want to try 'Le Mur ('The Wall!') - an extremely steep black mogul run! In the event of last minute panic there is a chair lift which transports skiers back to the hottom

The Cle des Champs is a traditional farmhouse style hotel, well located close to both the lifts and the resort centre. The nearest lift is only 150m away. The hotel is arranged on three floors with a lounge/recreation area on the ground floor and a pleasant dining room on the first floor. The majority of bedrooms are on the second floor and are usually for three to four pupils. Each has en suite facilities with either shower or bath. The hotel is unpretentious and we have exclusive use of all the facilities as we are sole occupiers.

So far the organisation is going to plan and Mr. Scott has reports that the snows have arrived already in the



Alps. We all look forward to the usual good fun and excellent skiing we have been so lucky to enjoy over the last few years.


OLD ASSOCIATION


