HE production of the 28th Edition of the Chronicle for the year 1946-47 has been the responsibility of a Sub-Committee, formed to take over the work previously undertaken by the President.

This departure from tradition was advised by the Committee because it was felt that it was asking too much of anyone to produce and edit a magazine for a growing Association of over 500 members, representing some five decades of Old Boys, and that the onus of preparing the *Chronicle* should be on an elected Committee.

It has been suggested by many members that news of Old Boys should take precedence over School news; others feel that events at K.G.S. should occupy a large part of the *Chronicle*. We have tried to compromise and produce a magazine of interest to all members. We also believe that the register of members justifies the space taken. The function of the Committee is to canalise the wishes of members, and suggestions and criticism are both welcome and necessary, and the Hon. Secretary will be glad if members will continue to advise him of changes of addresses and items of news suitable for inclusion in the next issue. Such assistance is needed if the *Chronicle* is to be topical and interesting.

During the year, the Old Boys' Committee has met several times, and many recommendations have been put forward and considered. The Committee hoped that these would be discussed at the Annual General Meeting, which was to have taken place before the Dinner, when a Statement of Accounts would have been read and approval asked for.

Unfortunately it has been decided that it is impossible to hold the Dinner this year, and this regrettable decision was not taken without very careful consideration, as all felt that, whatever the difficulties, the Dinner should be held somehow.

Seven firms had been invited to cater at K.G.S., and none would undertake the work. New restrictions prevented the Dinner being held outside the School, and it was decided, despite the manifold difficulties, to cater ourselves, and we believed

that a good dinner could have been served and an evening enjoyed, but the advent of potato rationing and the abolition of basic petrol, along with all the other restrictions, makes it impossible to carry on, and another year must pass without an Old Boys' Dinner.

The Rugby Match, Old Boys v. School, will be played on December 6th, and the Annual General Meeting held in the School Hall at 6 p.m. on Sports Day (20th March, 1948). It is hoped that as many members as possible will be present, and the business will include the following:

Receiving and passing the 1946-47 Accounts.

Election of Committee in place of the Interim Committee now in office.

Consideration of an increase in Life Membership Fee from £2 2s. to £5 5s., or 21 payments of 5/-.

Appointment of Vice-Presidents, and any other business.

For the benefit of members who are unable to attend the Annual Meeting, a copy of the Balance Sheet for the year 1946-47 is printed below.

It has not been an uneventful year, and Old Boys have had opportunities of revisiting K.G.S. and meeting old friends at the Dance and Rugby Match, and on Founders' Day. The Committee was anxious that the Winter Season should provide many more such opportunities, but ever-increasing restrictions have prevented the accomplishment of this, and for the time being, at least, we must defer Association events, and hope that 1948 will bring with it less austerity and more reunions.

In the meantime, the K.G.S. Old Boys' Association is growing in numbers and strength. May it long continue.

The Old Boys' Dance.

The Old Boys' Dance, the first since the war, was held on January 10th, 1947, at the School, and was as popular as ever. One hundred and sixty guests were present, and a most enjoyable

evening was spent.

Thanks are due to the members of the Committee who helped in the preparation for the Dance, and especially to Mrs. Norwood and Miss A. Lord, both of whom worked so hard to provide refreshments voted by all to be excellent. We are also grateful to Mr. Duckworth for the loan of the plants for decorating the stage and to all Old Boys who helped to sell tickets, and to the M.C.s, Messrs. G. L. Taylor and H. A. Tomlinson. A telegram, wishing all a happy evening, was received from the Rev. C. Strange and Mrs. Strange, and we thank them for this kind thought.

"Auld lang syne" was sung at 1 p.m., and, with "God save the King," another Old Boys' Dance came to a close.

Founders' Day Service.

The first Founders' Day Service since the School was founded in 1549 was held at Kirkham Parish Church on Saturday, July 26th, at 11-30 a.m. Boys marched from the School to take part, and the church was filled, many Old Boys attending. The Vicar of Kirkham, the late Rev. A. Candler; B.A., Chairman of the Governors, conducted the service. The address was given by the Bishop of Hulme, the Rt. Rev. H. Hornby.

The Bishop said that the days when the School was founded were just as troublesome and unsettled as they are to-day. "But it was a day saved from utter contemptibility by a few great men of faith and courage, who possessed the zeal for advancement and true learning."

The Captain of the School read the lessons and the School Choir sung the anthem, Walford Davies's "God be in my head and in my understanding."

All who attended the service regarded it as a truly memorable occasion, and were proud to take part in commemorating the founders and benefactors of Kirkham Grammar School.

A buffet luncheon was very kindly provided by Mrs. Norwood for Old Boys.

The Old Boys' Cricket Match.

Founders' Day, a Saturday near the end of the Summer Term, was chosen for the Annual Cricket Match, Old Boys versus the School, and in addition to providing the spectacle of an admirable contest as in pre-war days, it produced a social gathering, when hundreds of Old Boys were able to enjoy the congenial companionship of their old friends within the precints of their Alma Mater.

The setting was perfect, and it was good to mingle with the players in the pavilion and spectators seated round the boundary or taking tea in the marquee, and hear incidental music coming from the loudspeakers outside the gymnasium. The large attendance testified to the loyalty of Old Boys who, after long years of war were showing their eagerness to renew their contact with the old School, and to give a new lease of life to the Association.

Our Secretary, H. C. Turner, occupied a strategic position between the players in the pavilion enclosure and the spectators around the field, and felt the pulse of the meeting, and one gathered that he was pleased with the fruits of his labour by the fact of his asking the writer to contribute this article to the Chronicle.

It was good to see A. D. L. Rawstron with us again after long war service, and as staunch an Old Boy as ever; he is doing useful liaison work between the School and the Fylde R.U.F.C. J. E. Ward, released from his duties as Education Officer in the Army, is now teaching at the Palatine Technical Secondary School in Blackpool. A. Rigby, after service with the Artillery in the Middle East, is now a master at Lancaster Modern School. George Bell, of Lytham, has returned home after seeing much service with the Merchant Navy all over the world. Jackson, now a sailor, and his brother were also with us. The Rishton brothers, from the Grenadier Guards were looking very upright and fit. One noticed also W. C. Charnley and David Smith and the father of Basil Duckworth. John Hall now Headmaster of Warton School continues to show a keen interest in the sporting activities of the old School, and J. C. Plummer, also of Warton, who gained a place in the team, received the moral support of the Stephenson brothers. N. J. Wilkinson was back from his work on long-distance patrol with the R.A.F. in Iceland. G. E. Partington, we learn, is doing research work for the Marconi Company, and A. Clift and G. K. Benson have started their University careers at Liverpool. Stanley Clarke, back from a varied career in the mines and the Army, must have recalled many a six hit on our ground-shades of Jazells Tomlinson! This reminds me of the late Rev. A. H. Candler,

whose recent death was so great a shock to us; it was on this occasion that he told me how once, when batting as number eleven, and being regarded as small fry, he opened his shoulders

and pulled the game out of the fire for his side.

However desirable, it was impossible in the limited time to exchange news with all the Old Boys whose presence graced our gathering. The spectators had a great day, and the score book speaks for the players. The spirit of the game is as good as ever. One recalls the paradox of Mr. J. H. Matthews at an Old Boys' Dinner: "It takes a player who scores two ducks to make a team!" I like the story of the boy who, after making one and nought, was questioned on reaching home as to his performance, and remarked: "In the first innings I scored one, but in the second innings I was not so successful!"

THE MATCH.

The weather was not of the best during part of the afternoon's proceedings, and although play was temporarily abandoned just before the tea interval, the game was played to a very exciting finish.

Having dismissed the School for 153 runs, 55 of which came from Mr. R. M. Barker, the Old Boys were faced with an early set-back when, by the first ball of the second over, H. G. Longstaffe was bowled by G. Chatburn, the School 1st XI captain. J. Harrison was joined at the crease by A. Bamford, and this partnership produced 47 runs before J. Harrison lost his wicket for 16, the total score being 51. H. Harrison was next man in, but he and Bamford were soon separated when the latter was bowled by Mr. Crane two runs later, having contributed 37 runs himself. The next two batsmen were J. E. Bullough and J. Plummer respectively, and they both failed to add to the score, which now stood at 55 runs with half the wickets gone. D. W. Ruddock had a fruitful partnership with H. Harrison, and the total reached 97 before Ruddock was taken by Mr. Stevenson behind the wicket when his individual total was 30. A. H. Jones added further 14 runs before he was stumped when the total was 110 for 7 wickets. H. Harrison was now partnered by R. O. Wilson, who added 19 runs to help the score up to 139 for 8. F. H. Jolly came out to bat, and played back the remaining two balls of Mr. Crane's over. The umpires then called "Last over "with the Old Boys needing 14 runs to win. H. Harrison went for the bowling and from the second, third, fourth and fifth balls of the over he scored boundaries, to pass the School's total with two runs to spare; his own score was 41 not out. F. H. Jolly also was not out, and R. D. Lawson was not called upon to bat.

The late Rev. A. H. Candler.

It is with very great regret that we announce the sudden death of the Reverend A. H. Candler, Chairman of the Governors of Kirkham Grammar School, at Kirkham Vicarage, on Monday,

21st October, 1947.

After his training at Manchester University and S. Augustine College for Missionaries, Canterbury, the Rev. Candler was for some years a curate in the East End of London before going, in 1916, as a missionary to the Gold Coast. He spent 16 years in West Africa, first as a missionary and then as Education Officer in charge of Education in the Northern Territories. On his return to this country, Mr. Candler spent nine years as Vicar of S. Mary's, Nelson, before his appointment in 1941 as Vicar of Kirkham. It was in 1945 that Mr. Candler was elected to the Governing Body of K.G.S. He had but recently been elected Chairman of the Governors.

Mr. H. Brooks, a former Postmaster-General of the Gold Coast, in a recent letter to Mr. Candler, writes of our late Chairman: "An earnest Christian, a fine athlete, a man of many parts, his buoyant and cheerful nature was an inspiration to all who knew him, and his fund of anecdote enlivened many a social

gathering."

To us at K.G.S. it was always transparently clear that he was a keen educationalist, and that he had the welfare of masters and boys, past as well as present, very much at heart. His personality pervaded any company in which he found himself. It can truly be said of him that his life was his sermon. K.G.S. has lost a very real friend.

News of, and from, Old Boys.

The following extract from a letter sent by Col. J. Butler-Porter, D.S.O., will be read with great interest, especially by those who were at School with him. We congratulate the Colonel, and thank him very much for sending this account to us.

THE ROYAL VISIT TO DURBAN.

The Royal train arrived in King's Park Siding at 9-30 a.m. on Thursday, 20th March. The first function was driving through the streets to the City Hall, where the Mayor presented an address of welcome. Durban was absolutely crowded, the streets were lined by thousands and thousands of people enthusiastically cheering and waving flags. It is estimated that nearly 500,000 witnessed the Royal Party's arrival.

After the Royal Reception, tea was served for those in the reserved enclosure in the City Hall, which was beautifully decorated with ferns and flowers. The Royal Party were in a horseshoe, and in a semi-circle in front were tables to hold about eight people. Tea was served by St. John Ambulance nurses, the Royal Party using 200-year-old Georgian silver. We had a table with the City Engineer, the Deputy Town Clerk, the Assistant Town Clerk and his wife, and Ena and I, within 20 feet of Their Majesties. As we sat down a man in mufti asked me if I recognised him, and he was an interpreter who accompanied me when General Smidt, the first German General to surrender in the war, surrendered at Bardia. I asked him what his job was, and he turned out to be the Queen's personal bodyguard—his opposite number being Detective-Inspector Burt from Scotland Yard. My old Brigadier, General Palmer, was responsible for security, as he is now Chief Commissioner of the South African Police.

The following day, Friday the 21st, was the Garden Party, which took place in Mitchell Park, a beautiful setting, with its rich green turf and myriads of flowers and huge beds of cannas, which is a tall and beautiful flower indigenous to South Africa. The women were gorgeously attired, and one wonders in this day of shortage of clothing where all the grey and black top-hats appeared from.

I took Ena, Beryl and some friends, and we had a very nice table on the pathway, past which came the Royal entourage. The Queen, with her usual radiant smile, was gracious to everybody. They spoke to a few people in the vicinity of their tea-table. When the Garden Party was over, the crowds lined the pathway down which the Royal Party came, and I took a number of pictures as they came closer, until Ena said "For heaven's sake, put down that camera." I was holding the camera as the Royal Party approached, when I heard the Mayor saying to the King, "Your Majesty, I would like to present Colonel Butler-Porter." I immediately said to Ena "Take this camera." After the presentation we had a few minutes' conversation on the regiment, my own war service, and then Ena was presented. It was a very great thrill, and one of the greatest moments of our lives.

We were congratulated by all and sundry in the vicinity, as not only did we have the honour, but they had the wonderful opportunity of seeing the King close up. We were the only ones presented from this long isle of people. When the Royal Family passed, the Town Clerk said "Jimmy, I think you have earned a drink. Come up to my house and we'll celebrate."

The following press-cutting will also be read with interest re Mr. Roy Russell (1931-35):

"Young playwright, Mr. Royd Russell, of Palmers Green, London, N.13, formerly of Blackpool, has had his latest play 'Return to Bedlam,' accepted for production at the Garrick Theatre, Charing Cross Road, by the Under Thirty Theatre Group. The directors of this Group broadcast in 'In Town To-night' last week, and explained their policy of promoting plays written by authors and acted by actors who are under 30.

"Mr. Russell wrote 'Return to Bedlam' while waiting to be demobilised from the Royal Corps of Signals, in which he was commissioned.

"He was born in Blackpool and is the son of the late Mr. W. T. Russell, well known for his work as manager of the Blackpool Opera House. His mother now lives at The Bungalow, Little Eccleston.

"This is not Mr. Russell's first literary success. He has written several short stories for radio, and has himself read some of them over the air.

"He is an old boy of Kirkham Grammar School. His father was for 34 years publicity manager at the Opera House and Winter Gardens."

School Notes.

Prize Day was held on October 22nd, 1947, at Kirkham R.A.F. Cinema, when the prizes were presented by Major the Lord Stanley, M.C. The hall was filled to capacity, and the Headmaster reported a year of solid achievement and progress, in which a record number, of 16 Higher School Certificates was gained. There were over 300 boys in the School, and a Sixth Form of 42.

Speaking of the successful year, Mr. Norwood said: It is fashionable nowadays to place so much emphasis upon the manner and spirit in which our efforts are made, that the standard of achievement is somewhat neglected."

"We are too ready to search the pages of history for prime ministers, say, who at school were always the bottom of their form. It is surely a dangerous doctrine to assume that later success in life was in some mysterious manner due to the earlier failure at school."

"We must play the game at all costs, but surely we must also play to win."

Mr. Norwood said it was most encouraging to find in a school of just over 300 boys a Sixth Form of 42.

To parents, Mr. Norwood said it was a commonplace that the greater the co-operation between home and school, the greater benefit accrued to both school and boy.

It was, therefore, a considerable source of satisfaction to find an increasing number of parents had seized opportunities of attending functions during the year.

Mr. Norwood told the boys: "You have done well this last year, and the new boys this term have something to live up to."

"Let us maintain what is best in the old and add whatever it is in our power to add, so long as we belong to the family of Kirkham Grammar School."

After distributing the prizes, Lord Stanley congratulated the boys on the year's work, and adjured them to be proud of their School, a School which could boast of wellnigh 400 years' history and a tradition worthy of following and imitation. The Chairman, the Rev. A. R. Allen, M.A., invited the Rev. E. F. Stoney, M.A., to propose the vote of thanks to Lord Stanley, and Mr. T. Ward seconded. Parents and friends then went to the School for tea.

K.G.S. Dramatic Society.

The above Society presented Anstey's adaptation of "The Imaginary Invalid," by Moliere, to the present members of the School, Old Boys, parents and friends, in the School Assembly Hall, on December 14th, 16th and 17th.

The actors played their parts extremely well, and maintained the high standard of presentation at which the Society has always aimed. The atmosphere of a 17th century French house was obtained very effectively, and R. G. Bradshaw as the invalid must be singled out for an exceptionally fine performance, while A. H. Charnley, A. L. Winfield, R. Greenough, J. F. Nourse and W. E. Garlick all gave performances of note. The Stage Manager, G. Bates, and his helpers carried out their duties efficiently, and Mrs. Norwood gave very valuable help with the make-up and costumes. Mr. H. B. Wilson painted a very beautiful setting in keeping with the period. The play was under the capable direction of Messrs. G. Laughton and E. J. Williams. The costumes and wigs were supplied by W. A. Hume & Sons, Ltd., Manchester.

Thanks to the many generous donations, the Society's treasurer was able to report a balance of £27, and this, together with the balance on the previous production, has been used for purchasing more stage equipment, a strip-film projector, and a set of films on the history and development of the theatre. The latter are being shown to the Society at its weekly meetings. Play-reading has also been carried on during the Hilary and Trinity Terms.

Summer Holidays, 1947.

The end of the Summer Term at K.G.S. did not bring with it a cessation of School activities, for three separate holiday parties had been arranged, and, as Mr. Norwood said on Speech Day, nearly one-third of the School went on one or other of the holidays, and on one and the same day in August a K.G.S. boy might have been seen (a) hitch-hiking to Montreux, (b) climbing the Eiffel Tower, or (c) scrambling up the slopes of Ingleborough. Here are short accounts of each holiday:

HOLIDAY IN SWITZERLAND.

A party of 30 boys, in the charge of Messrs. Middleton and Stevenson, left Kirkham on August 4th for a holiday at Champery, in Switzerland. The 1,000-mile journey was pleasantly broken by a day's sight-seeing in London, and our destination was reached about 60 hours after our departure. Champery was an excellent centre, and provided plenty of walks, climbs, bathing and other holiday attractions. Two days were spent in longdistance excursions to the St. Bernard Hospice and the Italian border, and to Montreux. Perhaps the most novel impression the boys will retain of the holiday will be of the feeling they had when they went out with pockets full of money (Swiss) to visit shops full of all manner of goods, all unrationed: Nearly everybody bought a watch, which subsequently was to cause us a delay of two hours in getting through the English customs. The food was pre-war in quality and quantity, the accommodation was grand, the weather was perfect, and "a good time was had by all."

HOLIDAY IN PARIS.

This party consisted of 28 boys, Mr. and Mrs. Kinnear, Mr. David Norwood, and Mr. Laughton, the latter of whom knew and loved Paris well, and was guide and mentor for the party. En route the party spent a sweltering August afternoon in the London Zoo, which was afterwards voted infinitely better than the Jardin des Plantes. Apart from mislaying several of the party in the Underground, we reached Newhaven without mishap, and had a glorious crossing to battle-scarred Dieppe. All through

Normandy much war damage was noticed, but it was obvious that the French peasants had been working hard, and repairs were well advanced. Our Paris hotel was in the Latin quarter, and we had a hike of several hundred yards for our meals. Fortunately the weather behaved impeccably, save for one torrential downpour, when the Paris sewers were flooded, with the result that the fish in the Seine were poisoned. In next to no time even the youngest member of the party became a veteran on the Metro. Visits were paid to old and modern Paris, to the Louvre and to Versailles, where a whole day was spent and many blisters were contracted. Unfortunately, the food was not only unusual, but also rather poor and scarce. As sweets and cakes were beyond the reach of all save millionaires, we contented ourselves with the bewildering array of drinks in the boulevard cafes. And, of course, we came back laden with souvenirs, photographs, and, I hope, happy memories.

HOLIDAYS IN ENGLAND.

Mr. Lee arranged three tours of one week each, and provided happy holidays for 34 boys in most beautiful country. Perfect weather, marvellous scenery and good comradeship combined with the joys of adventure to make these holiday excursions truly memorable. Accommodation was arranged at Youth Hostels, and this made it possible to keep expenses very low.

On the first tour eight boys cycled 160 miles through Ribblesdale and Dentdale, staying at Slaidburn, Malham, Ingleton, Dentdale and Kendal. Great interest was taken in Malham Cove and Tarn, and at Ingleton time was found to walk round the waterfalls, climb Ingleborough, and take a look at Gaping Ghyll on the way down.

On the second tour, arranged for 14 younger boys, a pleasant week was spent on foot in the Lake District. The party stayed at Troutbeck, Ambleside, Elterwater, Hawkshead and Ambleside again. The party split up into small groups and, with pack on back and stick in hand, climbed many of the lesser fells, and reached the appointed rendezvous with the aid of maps. Boating and bathing proved very popular, but not more so than the large picnic tea-parties.

The third tour for 11 of the more seasoned cyclists was a circular tour of 180 miles in the Lake District. This party stayed at Kendal, Ambleside, Borrowdale, Patterdale and Kendal again. The climax of this tour was the long ascent from Patterdale to the Kirkstone Pass, followed, after suitable refreshment at the famous inn (1,500 feet up) by the glorious ride through the Troutbeck valley.

In conclusion, it should be pointed out that some of these boys had never been out of Lancashire before, and, needless to say, they were not only thrilled by the adventure, but also intoxicated by the scenery.
