From the Headmaster

As the mid-year approaches and the days begin to get noticeably longer we look forward to the culmination of our year's efforts. The next half-term represents the last to be uninterrupted by public examinations but it is also one that sees the busy conclusion of the winter sports programme. It is therefore a frantic period which keeps us all very much on our toes! The term will also see the conclusion of our new Drama Studio/Sports Pavilion. This new facility, which should open early in the Summer Term, will be a tremendous asset although, as always, the building and planning phases bring their difficulties. I have once again been grateful to all members of the school community, both staff and pupils for both their assistance and their patience.

This year has seen the most impressive public examination results in the school's recent history. The steady improvements over past years have already outmatched national grade inflation but this year saw our pupils excel themselves and out perform most of our local rivals in the National press league tables. At A-level, after re-marks, some 61% of grades were at A/B level with the pass rate at 97%. The performance of Vicky Biggs is celebrated further into the newsletter but I know that Mrs Airey enjoyed her visit to London to witness Vicky's receipt of the Student of the Year in English Award. The fifth form pupils also responded magnificently with no less than 50% of the grades being at A/ A*. Some twenty pupils gained a full set of A/A* grades with two achieving all grades at A*. This level of academic achievement

can strive for and it is testimony to the pupils' hard work and that of their teachers. I am not a great advocate of League Tables as they do not inform anyone of the essence of a school and how much is achieved by the pupils but it is clear that these two cohorts fulfilled their notential and deserve their accolades. No less than six pupils were successful in their Oxbridge applications which once again represents a first for Kirkham Grammar School and we are now hearing of the outcome of this year's applications where a smaller entry has also met with conspicuous success. Four current members of the Upper Sixth have been successful; Joanne Box, Matthew Gaddes Joanne Forrest & Harold Buchanan while Stuart Harrison has reapplied to Oxford and embarks on an English course in October. Such is the ferocity of the competition these days that entry into these institutions is fraught with nitfalls and all those who undertook the entry

Saturday 22 April 2006 Southern Reunion Dinner to go from strength to strength and numbers stand now at some 270 cadets one of the biggest contingents in 42 (North West) Brigade. 2005 was a very busy and highly successful year for KGS CCF.

As usual each term also provided a field day for the whole contingent. The most recent, in October, was also our Biennial Inspection from the MoD and we passed with flying colours. This was almost literally – as it was an RAF inspection and every flight in and out of RAF Linton-on-Ouse, diverted over Waddecar to salute us by dipping their wings. We received a most favourable report from the inspecting officer and are eligible for continued support from the MoD.

The usual format for the field day has been an overnight, survival exercise for a select few volunteers, followed by an action packed day of activities. These vary from initiative exercises, assault courses, shooting and orienteering. We are currently working towards another in March, which will be a more military patrols exercise at Weeton Camp and the junior cadets will go to Halton on Lune.

Our next camp will, again be in the Lake District (Adventurous Training in April) and summer camp is already booked for a return to Warcop in July. Many of our cadets are taking the opportunity and challenge of these activities, as well as the many other courses on offer from the MoD. Last year we had four cadets accepted on the Cadet Leadership Courses at the Cadet Training Centre, Frimley; two others went to the more advanced course at Nesscliffe. A girl attended HMS Bristol; a naval training ship in Portsmouth and two boys even participated in a parachuting course on Salisbury Plain!

The BTEC qualification (GNVQ) in Public Services is closely linked to the cadet activities. This is the equivalent of four GCSE passes and is available to sixth form cadets. We now have 44 senior cadets registered, with 4 full awards already achieved, (t distinction, 2 merits and 1 pass). Joanne Box being the first senior cadet to gain a distinction in the BTEC award. There have been 13 partial awards and already this term 11 cadets have completed their Individual Vocational Assignment and are well on their way to completion.

The importance of this award in indicating extra curricular skills is shown in by the fact that many universities, including Durham, value it as an indicator of character and leadership. Indeed it did contribute to the fact that one of this year's leavers gained a place at University and it is now being recognized as a very valuable add-on to academic education at KGS. As it progresses, more and more senior cadets are realizing what can be gained from participating in the cadet movement.

CYPRUS

Following an early start and six hours preparation at Manchester airport, the first operation of our visit to 1 QLR in Cyprus proved to be a great success. The inventive use of a fork and a particular magazine provided much entertainment as we checked in, as well as provoking flaming cheeks for Sgt John Gladwell. After such a good-humoured start to the trip, we arrived in the scorching Cypriot sunshine in great spirits.

During the first three days of our visit we enjoyed numerous military activities, from shooting on the range (when one of our corporals seemed to "shine" through!) and then cleaning weapons, (accompanied by the odd groan!) to first aid, section attacks and instruction in nuclear, biological and chemical warfare. We can now don respirators in a mere 9 seconds with our eyes closed but unfortunately certain members of the group persisted to wake us up each morning with

> We were also privileged to see for ourselves the tensions, which dominate the border between the Cypriot and Turk forces during a Green Line Tour by the UNFICYP. Although it is upsetting to see the ruins which remain in the buffer zone as a constant reminder of the trouble here, it was uplifting to hear the stories of the people who have continued with their lives despite such desperate surroundings and a poignant reminder of the need for armed forces across the world. We all enjoyed the chance to explore for ourselves the lively streets and shops of Nicosia after the tour and we returned to the base with considerably lighter pockets.

In addition to the above activities, we were fortunate enough to enjoy a number of water sports, from sailing and kayaking to a thrilling banana boat ride, courtesy of the instructors at Dhekelia Sailing Club and Dhekelia Water Sports Centre. These undoubtedly provided some much needed relief from the heat and we were able to soak up the sunshine in style. We also enjoyed a ferocious session of go-karting one evening, where





the males in our party displayed their competitive streaks whilst racing furiously around the largest track in Cyprus. Some of the NCOs from Anzio Coy even came along to join in the fun, competing against our officers and beating them convincingly (much to our delight)!

Our evenings were spent in the colourful surroundings of the Alexander Barracks NAAFI, playing pool, tabletennis and darts as well as enjoying the relaxing atmosphere as we watched the various plasma screen TVs, (which seemed to dominate every wall), from the comfort of the leather sofas. It was also interesting to get an insight into true army life by talking to the soldiers about their personal experiences. We were also fortunate enough to gain a valuable taste of life as an Officer during a tour of, and then brunch in, the Officers' Mess. We were impressed not only with the food but also with the display of Saddam Hussein's roulette table (no doubt an impressive find!).

After an exhausting but exhilarating week, we returned home with twenty-one NCOs and twenty passports (but let's not dwell on that), only to find that we had a mere eleven hours to wash all our kit before heading north to the slightly colder conditions of Barry Buddon for our annual summer camp, where we were surrounded by the evident jealousy of certain Officers, notably 2Lt Reeves.

SCOTLAND

When this was exceeded, all activities ceased and it was decided to transfer the entire contingent to Dundee, to a leisure centre and water park. As the temperature dropped that evening, the Survival Package was resumed and we bivvied out in Big Wood. Some cadets didn't listen to instructions and cooked in the woods or started fires and consequently discovered the delights of cleaning mess tins the next evening!

The shooting package on the ranges was continued the next day and all the cadets had a chance to fire both the cadet GP rifle and the LSW. The afternoon's instruction continued with lessons on various military skills, which would be put into practice over the next 36-hour exercise. An interesting obstacle course was revealed next morning. This involved getting very wet if you failed to cross some of the obstacles as several of our girls discovered. Later in the day, the engineers' package on the raft was another chance to test how waterproof our cadets were?

The training was very varied and intensive. Blank firing on a CQB (close quarter battle) run was very exiting, as were the Section Battle Drills. All this was building up to a big ambush exercise later that night and another night out under the stars. The evening snooze-out was



abruptly terminated as the Directing Staff awoke the sleepy KGS cadets in the very early hours, to prepare them to move out and attack the enemy in full strength. This included two other schools in the offensive force. Although down on their chinstraps, KGS cadets rallied and the adrenalin started to flow as excited soldiers enacted the realism of the exercise and fatigue seemed to disappear with the fun of the attack.

On return to camp, weapons had to be cleaned and stores tidied away. The early finish also allowed the cadets some time in the afternoon, for personal admin and packing ready for our final evening. Lt Col Scott had reserved the Sgts Mess for our presentations.

A small group were awarded silver pan scrubs for their efforts with the mess tins. Our CSMs, were given CCF ties and Dan Fryer was awarded a pen for having attended every possible CCF camp, both adventurous training and military, in his time with the cadets at KGS.

This year there were many possible recipients for the Anzac Trophy; the voting was very close, indeed. This award is for the best junior cadet, (usually a 4th year). The shared winners were Olivia Armer and James Edgar, but close contenders were Ben Blackburn, Paula Lomax and Lucinda McDade.

The 5th form cadets also performed very well and noticeable winners for best shooting were Jonathon Knowles and Luke Sanders. This summer four cadets are going to Cadet Training Centre, Frimley, to undertake a cadet leadership camp with a mixture of cadets from all over the country. Next year this group will provide some excellent junior NCOs for our cadre training.

Our L6th NCOs were very competitive in their trials for promotion. All acting sergeants were confirmed in rank and additions were made of Peter Greaves. Andy Hatch, Lucy Gregg and Will Horton. CLIMBING MOUNT KILIMANJARO

Last summer two members of the Lower Sixth, Alex Bonney and Lauren Aspden, achieved their much anticipated goal of climbing the highest free standing mountain in the world – Mount Kilimaniaro. In total the climb took six days, which included a five day ascent and a one day descent. After beginning at the Machame Gate, they changed their route and completed the ascent via the Western Breach.

Nicknamed the 'torture route, the Western Breach ascent is very steep and potentially dangerous - landslides and rock falls claim victims most years. Another danger is that turning back on the last part is impossible without proper climbing equipment

On the very first day of the climb they walked through a misty rainforest environment for seven hours before reaching the first campsite situated above cloud level. A six-hour trek on the second day up very steep terrain took Lauren and Alex to the second campsite. On day three, they walked for another seven hours to the third campsite by which time the fatigue had begun to kick in. The next day they walked just three hours across to the fourth campsite (4850m) in order to rest for the final ascent. An early night was greatly accepted by all as they were woken at 11 pm to begin the climb to the summit at midnight. After eight hours of arduous scrambling in the dark with just the aid of eight small head-torches the group made it to the crater rim. They then began the final three-hour ascent to Uhuru Peak the highest point in Africa. Numerous photos were taken of the group and their surroundings, which consisted of vast expanses of bare rock and the occasional glacier. According to professionals, due to global warming the stunning ice caps are predicted to have all melted by 2015. The descent from the summit took six hours totalling the day to seventeen hours of walking to the final campsite where dinner and a chance to rest was greatly appreciated. They then had the final days descent to help recover.

Despite a low overall success rate of summiting Mount Kilimanjaro, all twelve members of their climbing group (including Alex, Lauren, and ten of her family and friends) ventured all the way to the top with the help and expertise of their main tour guide, Jamaica


The project started on Friday 27 January with 24 pupils visiting the Manchester City Art Gallery (photos left and below) where various artists took small groups of pupils around a selection of artworks with the view to discussing and promoting the use of sketchbooks. This is an extension of the work that the third year have been doing in class since the beginning of the year.

Amongst the artist responding to art works from the gallery collection was Johnny Woodhams (photo left). To start with, our pupils weren't sure what to make of Johnny. With his shaved head and goatee beard, Johnny would make a convincing villain. But the only thing remotely nasty about him is this – he writes a mean poem. As clearly demonstrated in his poetry performance in front of the painting "At the edge of the city", painted by Scottish Artist Ken Currie. Johnny has performed under his alias, Max Seymour, in pubs and clubs around the North West, appeared on BBC Three and picked up a national poetry award along the way. Johnny writes poems that are funny and quirky, that veer from everyday reality to the utterly surreal. We are lucky to have him as our Artist in residence later this term as he responds to observations from the Pleasure Beach.

When the next Headmaster's Newsletter goes out the project should have it's own website and the pupils involved in the project should be preparing their work for two exhibitions one at the Pleasure Beach Gallery and one in the Bridgewater Gallery Manchester. So watch this space.









MUSIC



The Autumn Term is always a very full term for the KGS musicians with a varied range of concerts and official school occasions. The term started with the annual Prizegiving in Preston Guild Hall at which the Lower School Choir and the Concert Band provided excellent musical contributions. We were sorry that Mr. Andrews was unable to conduct the Concert Band at the Guild Hall, having had to relinquish his work at KGS owing to ill health, but were delighted when Mr. Paul Dalton, who is a distinguished conductor in the brass band world, took over the brass teaching in school and became the new conductor of the Concert Band.

The wealth of musical talent at KGS is very evident and is shown very clearly in the success of three of our first year pupils. Two of the Music Scholars, Jordan Chadwick (photo middle right) and Patrick Callery (photo top right), were selected to play in the National Children's Orchestra of Great Britain and the National Children's Brass Band respectively. Jordan plays the trumpet and Patrick the E flat bass. Chloe Walker (photo bottom right), having sung her way to success in the Rock FM Search for a Star competition, got through to the last 18 out of 650 entrants in the Sony BMG competition. Chloe rounded off 2005 by singing on Granada TV's Sing a Song for Christmas. Such is the degree of talent in the first year that 25 musicians from that year presented a Concert in November called A Celebration of Talent to an appreciative audience in the Old Hall.

In November three 5th form pupils put on an excellent concert of songs with acoustic guitar in the Old Hall. James Edgar, Ashley Parkinson, and Jamie Coleman performed a set of 18 songs to a packed hall, raising £130 for Teenage Cancer Trust.

The monthly Coffee Concerts have continued with an excellent concert given by the 1st and 2nd year Music Scholars being followed at the end of November by a concert given by the 5th year GCSE Music students. Four of these students had also given an earlier Coffee Concert just prior to Half Term.

The Christmas Concert was held in the last week of term and alongside items from the Choirs, Orchestra and Concert Band, a band of staff 'volunteers' was assembled to perform Leopold Mozart's Toy Symphony (photos left page) alongside the school's flute and string players. Intensive rehearsals in the preceding weeks plus hawk-like attention to the conductor ensured a most memorable and enjoyable performance. The Headmaster's virtuoso performance on the Nightingale and Dr. Luker's masterly contribution on the triangle will long be remembered.

The term closed with the Carol Service in St. Michael's Church. Once again the Choirs led the service admirably with beautiful solo contributions from Melissa McCarthy and Lucinda McDade. DRAMA the BIA Market State



From the Coup de Théâtre of the opening scene, a Titanic-esque representation of Edwardian elegance threatened by shipwreck, the audience was magically transported by KGS Drama Society to the enchanted isle that is the setting of Shakespeare's Tempest.

Magic is the dominant motif in The Tempest - the magic of Prospero, the magic of love and forgiveness, the magic of the stage - and this was emphasised in this performance from the entrance of the captivating water nymphs in Scene I. Prospero's magical majesty was played with dominating gravity by Josh Wardell, which acted as a foil to the light tenderness of the lovers, Grace Garlington as Miranda, and Tristan Brooke, Ferdinand.

In lighter mode, the inspired cloning of the clowns Trinculo and Trincula (played by the magical maestro Matthew Denham and his glamorous assistant Caroline Desborough) gave us a visual focus on magic and the circus. To complement them, Gordon Cheng's unearthly Ariel, an acrobatic airy spirit indeed, gave wonder and a sense of threat to the play. Ariel needs a strong Caliban as his earthy opposite; this role was aptly filled by Oliver Fisher, blending fear and comedy in this demanding rôle. Comedy was also provided by another cloning, mirroring that of the jesters: the drunken Stephano (Robert Loxham) along with Chermaine Hewitt as Stephanie.








"The isle is full of noises, sounds and sweet airs that give delight and hurt not." As Caliban's comment suggests, Shakespearean romance depends on harmony, and this was emphasised by the intense focus on music as an integral part of the play. The musicians, led by thrash-metal axeman Alex Miller, with vocals from Kara Williams, Sarah Dickie and Jemima Clarke, provided an aural foundation, giving another dimension to the drama, and bridging the gap between the seventeenth century and the modern day.

The packed houses on all three nights are testament to Ms Barrie's success in staging this most accessible production of a Shakespeare play: I am convinced that Mr W.S. himself would have heartily approved of this treatment that shows that Shakespeare is "Not of an age but for all time."

Director Ms Barrie, and her assistant, Mrs Walker, deserve huge congratulations on this triumphant production, as indeed do all the cast and those who worked behind the scenes: over eighty people were involved in the play, too many to list by name, but all contributed to the success of The Tempest. It is perhaps enough to echo Miranda's words: "Oh brave new world, that has such people in't": with such a wealth of talent, the future of drama at KGS is assured.














UK Mathematics Challenge
