From the Headmaster




Another exciting year is well underway at Kirkham Grammar School with a number of new developments completed and further improvements to facilities announced. The Lawrence House Pavilion now overlooks the All Weather Surface and provides an elevated view for parents. The building also houses an outstanding Drama Studio where our thespians practice their excellent performances as displayed in 'Romeo and Juliet' in November. The opening ceremony saw Richard Rhodes, JP, BA, open the building officially and nearly 100 guests enjoy performances by the drama group and our hockey players. Unfortunately, Tupele Dorgu was unable to join us as planned as her engagements at Coronation Street proved too great on this day. Added to this we have seen a full refurbishment of the Boys Boarding House providing superb facilities within comfortable study bedrooms. This development continues apace with the Governors announcement that we will be building a new twelve classroom block commencing in May 2007. This existing facility will have full ICT multimedia teaching aids and replace the last of our temporary buildings. To complement the new Pavilion the school is also to lay a new All Weather pitch allowing the highest quality surface for our sporting activities.

School is not all about new facilities, however, and we remain as busy as ever. I hope that parents have enjoyed the music concerts and drama productions this year and certainly the fact that a full house attended 'Romeo and Juliet' (photo top right) for three nights suggests this was the case. Our recent visit by a military helicopter provided a real focus for the Cadet Force and our sporting activities have continued a full programme. I am particularly pleased to see our swimmers doing so well; once again we have over forty girls representing Lancashire this year in hockey and our rugby players continue to put out eleven teams each week against some of the best schools in the country.

Recently we have learnt that our GCSE results (photo above, KGS GCSE students celebrate) in 2006 put us at the top of the local league tables for Preston and the Fylde. The recent Government initiative to ensure English and Mathematics are taken into account within the statistics has shown the real picture for many schools. The fact that our pupils achieved 100% pass rates in both ensures the success of our pupils is reflected properly in these tables rather than being usurped by schools that choose options that are more readily achieved. Clearly league tables do not really do more than give a very superficial view of a school and it is dangerous to give too much credence to these statistics. Yet it is pleasing to see that in academic terms our pupils are gaining results that are receiving an increasingly high profile and this is one aspect of the balance within our school that I am sure we can all applaud.



The year has seen the usual arrivals and some departures. In September we welcomed Mr Douglas Lloyd who joined the Mathematics Department having taught previously in the North East. Mr Lloyd has already involved himself in the CCF and various clubs and societies. We have also seen a number of new arrivals on the support staff who have already made an impact around school. In ICT, Mr Martin Kitchen is supporting Miss Knight while Mr Graham Eccles is assisting in the DT Department. Many visitors have recently commented on the positive impact our new groundstaff have made. Mr Ian Holme and Mr Edward Griffin have settled in well and fought hard to keep our pitches playable amidst recent awful weather. Also around the campus, Mr Russell Curtis has busied himself and enhanced our caretaking provision. In the realms of administration, Mrs Claire Dunn has made an immediate impression with her quiet efficiency. We certainly hope all our new arrivals will be very happy at KGS.



While it is always nice to welcome new colleagues it is equally sad to say farewell to long serving members of staff. This term we say goodbye to Mrs Ann Coulburn (photo bottom right) who has worked in the Boarding House for no less than 22 years. As a school which is very proud of its family ethos it is never easy to say goodbye to valued colleagues but we wish Mrs Coulburn well for her retirement.



This year has been an exciting one thus far and I am personally looking forward to the moment when we drive bulldozers through the Wareing buildings. The provision of a new suite of classrooms will further transform the learning environment and provide us with an outstanding set of teaching facilities. Further evidence indeed of our desire to continue moving the school forward.



Pavilion Opening

The Lawrence House Pavilion incorporating the Katie Caine Studio and the Friends' Lounge was officially opened by Mr R D W Rhodes, Chairman of the Lawrence House Trust on 31 January 2007. The unveiling ceremony took place in the Old Hall and Mrs Sandra Tomlinson, Trustee of the Katie Caine Trust and Mrs Lorraine Wareing, Chair of the Friends of Kirkham Grammar School also presented plaques to mark the occasion. Around 100 guests joined Mr Simon Fulford-Brown, the Chairman of Governors, and the Headmaster to watch the drama students perform a short production and then viewed the superb new facilities which are available to students and community partners.

The development programme continues with the start of the next phase of the Classroom Development which is due to start in the Spring.

Passion about Fashion

A talented trio of students from the school's Debating Society have won the Kirkham and Rural Fylde round of the Business and Professional Women's public speaking competition.

Grace Garlington, the main speaker, supported by Chair Caitlin McMillan and Expresser of Thanks Corin Heney, delivered a passionate speech on the ethical issues arising from the fashion industry. Describing herself as a "young campaigner", she attacked the preconception that young people are obsessed with clothes and designer goods by showing what the cost of fashion really is, and explaining how large companies exploit the poorest people in the world in the name of "maximising profits".

Grace's bravura performance was a powerful plea to the audience to consider the consequences of their own buying habits. As consumers, she argued, we have a moral responsibility to make ethical and informed choices: if we can convince Big Business that we care more for the welfare of those who produce the goods we buy than saving a few pence, then the future of those less fortunate than ourselves will be much brighter.

Grace, Caitlin and Corin now progress to the regional round of the competition. Their verve, conviction and passion will make them formidable opponents!



Life continues to be busy, with visits from classes across almost all year groups and pupils researching a variety of topics, ranging from medieval history to space exploration!



Two former 1st XV players, Richard Wigglesworth and Warren Spragg, (photo top right playing for the OKAs) battled at Edgley Park, home of Sale Sharks in the home leg of the Heinekin Cup matches between Sale Sharks and Calvisano (Italian RUFC). The game saw some thrilling rugby where Sale scored freely in the last 15 minutes as their fitness kicked in; both players played good rugby.

Warren, a former Sale winger, said: "It was nice to come back and play where I started out. We lost it a bit in the last 10 minutes but I thought we put on a good show against one of the best teams in Europe."

Within the last month both players have received national call ups. Warren, now playing for Calvisano in Italy, was called up to play on the left wing for Italy against Canada in November. Warren qualifies for Italy through an Italian born grandmother. He played for England Schools 18 Group (photo above, left next to Richard Wigglesworth) while at KGS and then England U21s. He moved to Calvisano from Orrell this season.

Richard was recently picked for the England Saxon team after putting in some first class performances for Sale. Coach Jim Mallinder announced his 23 man England Saxons training squad ahead of the match against Italy A.

Another former 1st XV player, Pat Sanderson (Worcester Warriors No 8) captained the England tour to Australia and played for England in the recent series of matches last Autumn.

Old War Birds

We had two old war birds drop into the school to visit the Combined Cadet Force. The first was Freddy Hudson, an Old Boy of KGS, who was on hand to present a signed copy of his book "Loyal to the End", along with the original manuscript, to the school Archives and Library.


It is 40 years since the last call up for National Service but Freddy remembers his time only too well. Freddy Hudson was called up for National Service in the late 1950s, a few days after getting married, which meant he didn't get to see his wife for two years. The link with the school was recently rekindled when Feddy attended a book signing at Silverdell's book shop, Kirkham. A small "Guard of Honour" of senior NCOs, consisting of RSM Natalie Roberts and CSM Jonathan Knowles, were on hand to "get some in".

Mr Hudson's adventures with the Loyal, North Lancashire Regiment took him deep into the jungles of Malaya. During the period 1957 until 1959 he fought against Communist terrorists and served as a section commander. Now his experiences have been recorded in his book,

Mr Hudson, 70, said the idea for the book came to him after a visit to Fulwood Barracks. He took his younger brother to the barracks and found a photo of himself and the lads in Malaya. He found that he could name most of the lads and it was at that point that it was suggested to him that he should write a book about his time in the Army. The book covers his full service from his enlistment to his return home. Although he didn't wish to join up with the army afterwards, he believes National Service should be brought back. He said: "My age group was brought up in a totally different era that people could not envisage nowadays - we grew up with nothing. National Service taught people to respect authority, take on responsibility and help them to grow up."

His first return visit to his old school in over 50 years was on the same afternoon cadet Flight Sergeant Will Bruton had organised a visit of a unique Vietnam War helicopter, a Huey, owned and flown by local businessman Phil Connolly.

After inspecting the cadets Freddy, along with the contingent of over 300 cadets and staff, waited expectantly for the distinct sound of the only British flying Huey UH-1H.





As reported in the annual School Magazine, (The Kirkhamian) our busy year has continued throughout the Autumn Term. After the two very successful summer camps, I would like to congratulate Natalie Roberts on her appointment as our first ever female, cadet RSM. CSMs Rachel Bird and Jonathan Knowles ably assist her. In the RAF, Flt Sgt Phil Hingley has been appointed to lead the section. I wish them all good luck in their positions and thank them, in anticipation, for all their hard work.

Numbers in the contingent continue to remain high, as another 30+ Lower Sixth NCOs have chosen to stay on, with 24 of them opting to take the GNVQ BTEC award. Our success can be seen in the fact that in the new September intake into the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, a former KGS senior NCO started her officer training. Ashley Gregory successfully completed her degree at Leeds where she continued with the UOTC. She hopes to join the Royal Artillery and, indeed, was an Army Scholar whilst at school. Ashley joins Nick Bridges, due to complete RMA soon and Warren Marginson, who shared his Officer Training course with a William Wales! This means that as of last September there was a former pupil of KGS in each of the three courses at Sandhurst – a claim, I am sure, few schools can make.

The biggest event of the Autumn Term is always the Inspection. This year we invited the new RAF Careers Liaison Officer and he was very impressed with the performance of all cadets and NCOs. We were blessed with fine weather, for a change, and several of the hardier, junior cadets enjoyed the survival aspect of the night exercise.

Half term saw both Mr Miller and Mr Reeves attend the Cadet Training Centre, Frimley, to complete their advanced training. I congratulate them both on their promotions to Captain. I also must thank Lt Knight for all her hard work in organising our Regimental Dinner. Last year's was so successful that it was decided to repeat the event for the current Sixth Form NCOs. We will dine them out on 10th March. We also welcome the experience and assistance of Sgt Devaney, formerly Duke of Wellington's Regiment, as another SSI. He will assist WO2 Savage with stores, admin and training.

We are currently working on planning and numbers for our 2007 Adventurous Training in the Lake District and also our March Field Day. As well as this, several of the L6th NCOs who manage to attend a General Studies lesson for their BTEC award, are very close to completing their qualification within the first year. Nationally, this qualification is becoming far more recognised as more people complete. At KGS we currently have 45 NCOs registered, 12 have been given a full award, (4 Distinctions, 5 Merits and 3 passes). We even had 28 partial awards from students who left recently. With more time we do hope to increase this success rate, so that NCOs can leave the cadets with a qualification, which is now recognised by many of the top universities as the equivalent of four GCSE passes.

Up up and away for the NW Air Ambulance



Thousands of yellow balloons were released across Lancashire, to raise money for the North West Air Ambulance. Balloons were released simultaneously at schools across the county including Kirkham where our third year let off over 110 balloons (see photos). The idea was to raise awareness of how much money the helicopter needs, to enable it to run every year. They say running costs are about £1.3 million.

Greek Club

The Greek Club has been meeting weekly since Summer Term 2006. The purpose of the club is to offer pupils a taste of Ancient Greek language and culture to complement other subjects, especially Latin, which are available on the curriculum. Young Engineers

It has been another busy term for the Kirkham Grammar School Young Engineers Club. In September we welcomed over 20 first year pupils to the club who are busy building 'Jitterbug' robots as an introduction to electronics and computer control. The first years are being assisted in the construction of these robots by the new officers of the club Oliver Evans, Rowan Leech and Stuart Spencer.

On Saturday 25 November an exhibition event was held at the Technology Innovation Centre in Birmingham to demonstrate the Schools & Colleges Micromouse Competition to a wider audience. Vincent Grumme's mouse 'Trumpermobile' claimed a very impressive 3rd place in both the Formula 3 and Formula 1 categories. This summer the Schools & Colleges Micromouse competition will be held at the same time as the full UK Micromouse competition at the TIC in Birmingham on Saturday 30 June.

Three of the longest serving members of the club, Peter Armstrong, Joe Douglass, and Oliver Youngman have once again made it through to the National Finals of the Young Engineers Royal Navy Challenge to be held at the HMS Sultan in Gosport on 29 March 2007. The team is busy finalising their design for craft which must travel underwater and then deploy an amphibious vehicle to recover items from an island.

The Young Engineers Club is also looking forward to the 2007 Rotary Technology Competition to be held on 2 March and will be entering teams into all three age categories.



Handicraft Club

The Handicraft Club started in September 2006. It meets every Friday lunch-time and has become a pleasant way to start to relax as the weekend approaches. The idea is that we, pupils and staff, can share our skills and learn new ones. The day was entirely practical with Juliet taking us through a huge number of exercises relating to 'Romeo and Juliet', 'Much Ado About Nothing', and 'The Comedy of Errors'. Memorable moments were Mrs Walker and Mrs Jones as leering builders, Ms Barrie, Mrs O'Flaherty and Mr Sampey as brittle ballet dancers and Mrs Fyson as a capricious dictator surrounded by a throng of simpering advisers. A firm favourite was the creation of a bustling street scene for the opening of 'Romeo and Juliet' which allowed for the development of a myriad of cameo characters including Ms Barrie as robotic street theatre, Mr Sampey as artist and Mrs Fyson as Mercutio on the way to the Masked Ball. 
World Champion Angler

Lisa Isles has been a member of the England Youth Fly-fishing Team for the past four years and in September 2005 she qualified for the England Youth Fly-fishing World Team. She travelled to the Czech Republic for the World Championships last year and gained the title of Female World Champion. Additionally, in September of 2005, she also took part in the European Grayling Championships. This was purely a senior competition and the whole point of entering the competition was clearly to see how good she really was. Lisa was Captain of the England 'B' Team, otherwise known as the "Red Spiders". Overall she was top England Rod, and her team finished in 7th place overall. This required a huge amount of dedication and motivation to go to sleep at around 2 am after tying flies for several hours and after getting back from the river and getting up at 4 am several times. Lisa also qualified for the World Championships in 2006 and travelled to Portugal in the A team, where she retained her World Champion U19 Female title. Lisa is now Captain of the A team and her next event is in the USA later on in the year. Lisa has also done a PADI Open Water Diving Course and is now a qualified diver.

MUSIC




VOICE of an Angel






CLOTHES SHOW LIVE



Veronica's story begins in a world of hate





'Romeo and Juliet' is one of Shakespeare's best-known and best-loved plays. The audience of KGS found it compelling to witness the working out of the inexorable fate of these "star cross'd lovers" by the multi-sensory approach that has characterised Ms Barrie's (Director of Drama) productions. The triumphant opening, a stylised representation of riot and discord, set the tone for the main theme of the play, that of the clash between order and chaos: the carefully-choreographed dance-like movements of the cast showed the underlying violence that permeates the play.

Music was an integral part of the production: the contrasting colours of the Montague and Capulet livery were echoed by the contrasting musical styles, from Prodigy to Prokofiev. Sarah Dickie's astonishing vocal range counterpointed the stage action, and all the musicians - Kris Monaghan, Tom Anstiss, Lucy Fielding and the String Group - were an essential part of the play's success. Of course, the play hinges on the two main characters. Charlotte Jackson as Juliet fully justified Romeo's adoration: "What light from yonder window breaks? It is the east, and Juliet is the sun." Charlotte combined the vulnerability and playfulness of a girl not yet fourteen with the strength of will of one prepared to break from her family's prejudices for the sake of love. Her partner, Tristan Brooke, complemented her with a performance combining the physicality and passion necessary for the "Beautiful tyrant! fiend angelical!" who can both love Juliet and kill Tybalt and Paris.

Among Ms Barrie's bold directorial decisions was the choice to have Tybalt played by a female. Charlotte Baker's acting and tumbling skills alone could have justified this original casting move; however, in the context of the production the female "Prince of Cats" underlined the depth of violence throughout Veronese society - the chaos respects neither class nor gender. Matthew Edgar made the role of Mercutio, the man who even jests in death, his own, whilst Cerys Buck deserves special mention as the Nurse, a favourite character part that she carried off with spirited and earthy aplomb. However, the success of any performance depends on more than the individual stars, and with a cast of over fifty, this was certainly an ensemble triumph, and all deserve congratulation, as of course do those behind the scenes. Without the stage crew, led by Gordon Cheng, and the other helpers and supporters, no play would be possible: lack of limelight does not lead to lack of appreciation.



Ms Barrie and Mrs Walker (Assistant Director) deserve hearty congratulation for this most impressive, involving and exciting production. Its success can perhaps be measured by the enthusiasm of the cast and supporters, and also, of course, by the audience's response. The reception of the first night led to such an outcry for tickets that sixty more seats had to be provided in the school's Multi Purpose Hall for the second and last performances. The shocking arrival of the supposed corpse of Juliet on her bier would have stilled even the most restless house; and the fateful denouement left more than one member "with his own tears made drunk".

"For never was a story of more woe



It will be difficult for Ms Barrie and her talented team to top the success of this year's performance: but we have every confidence that she will do so, and await the next production in eager anticipation!

These tours are part of the school's overall commitment to sports tours as recently the girls junior squad returned from a hockey tour to Holland, whilst most recently the U14 boys toured Wales.

Forty three Kirkham girls and five members of staff returned from a most successful hockey tour to Holland. The playing highlight perhaps was at Meerssen Hockey Club where the girls' matches were played under floodlights with crowds of spectators watching. It was a great experience for all the players, and each team rose to the challenge winning their matches by numerous goals.

After a hectic playing schedule the tour party headed down to Disneyland, Paris for two days of rest and recuperation (and lots of roller-coaster rides) before heading back home.




