#### From the Headmaster

At the end of another term one is left breathless after such a busy period crammed with public examinations and the usual array of activities in which our pupils participate with such enthusiasm. In my position I would like to be there to witness them all but such is the breadth of what has gone on I am left sampling only a fraction of the term's events. As this Newsletter is now bi-annual we have also included the latter half of the Spring Term to attempt to give a balanced record of our school over the past weeks. I hope you find the Newsletter interesting and additionally that it provides our pupils with a lasting keepsake of their days at school.

Each day this term I have tried to keep an eye on the progress of our new Performing Arts Studio and Pavilion (picture far right). We understand it will be completed by the end of term, a little later than anticipated but fully operational in September. I believe this will enhance the work of both our Theatre Studies and Games Departments. For those used to cowering on the touchlines at hockey matches I also hope it will provide a refuge and the prospect of a hot drink!

Having secured external Trust funding to move forward with the Pavilion the Governors have now announced the refurbishment of the boys boarding house which will be underway at the beginning of the holiday and completed by September. New washroom facilities, study bedroom accommodation and redecoration will provide a much enhanced living space for our boarders who are very much at the core of the school community.

We are also underway with planning for the next phase of our classroom development, enabling us to dispense with the Wareing buildings. Although still in the process of planning this will mark an exciting threshold in the school's development. Such commitment to the school's future has been the hallmark of the Governors work over recent years and I am grateful for their hard work and dedication to the school.

Such is the nature of the activities undertaken during this period it is impossible to report on all aspects of school life but I do hope this magazine gives insight into many of the different aspects. The varied achievements of our Climbers, Cadets, Musicians, Artists. Sportsmen and Women. Thespians and Young Enterprise group has brought a great deal of pleasure and excitement and I can only commend the enthusiasm of all concerned. Of particular note was the outstanding success of the Young Enterprise team. After two tense finals of the competition they gave us a hatful of trophies and a good deal of excitement. The team and their guides deserve great credit

for the hard work that went into the year. To generate such a degree of teamwork over a sustained period was a real achievement and deserved the success gained.

The Easter holidays even provided a glimpse of the variety of commitment made by staff and pupils. A successful Duke of Edinburgh award expedition braved the weather in the Lake District while our skiers enjoyed the snow in Les Deux Alpes. The U15 rugby squad sampled some culture in Venice during their tour to Italy alongside our fifth formers polishing up their German in Tubingen on their annual exchange. Even beyond this the CCF enjoyed a highly successful Adventure Training week. In all 250 pupils ventured away on school organised trips led by twenty five staff in all. Such opportunities do so much to engender the independence and sense of responsibility in our youngsters and I am thrilled that we are able to continue with such a programme in the face of increasing bureaucracy.

Most recently we have seen continued success on the sports field. After the outstanding success on the Sevens circuit in March with the 1st Sevens reaching the Quarter Finals in the National Schools Sevens and our girls victories in the Cheadle hockey tournament, there was always a danger of anti climax this term. Not to be as our athletes have excelled themselves in the English Schools Tournament and Fylde championships. Equally the Tennis teams have progressed well in the County Tournaments and our cricketers continue to progress, including now regular B team fixtures. As always the commitment of the pupils knows no bounds and I must thank all the parents who have done so much to support them in all they do.

The end of the school year always brings the departure of some valued colleagues although this year there are relatively few changes. We do, however, say goodbye to Mr Warren who has taught chemistry during Miss Heathcote's maternity leave and created such an excellent impression in all that he has done both within the classroom and in his contributions to DoE and beyond. Additionally, we also say thank you once again to Mrs Fletcher and Mr Noble who have returned to the school after retirement to take over teaching groups once

again this year. It has been so nice to see them in school once again and I hope that they will continue to assist us in the future when the cry for help arises! Their contribution has been so important this year.

Within the support staff we have said our farewells recently to Mrs Hayton, School Secretary, who has moved on to spend more time with her grandchild. Mrs Hayton will be known to many through her contribution to school over 12 years both in terms of administrative support, contribution to the RAF contingent and a hugely significant role with the Old Kirkhamian Association which have all been invaluable. In a re-enactment of a recent real-life Royal Navy operation involving HMS Westminster, teams had to design, build and remotely control a model craft that could both disable a fleeing 'drug running' vessel and collect packages of 'drugs' from the surface of the water.

Teams had to make a five-minute presentation of their design to senior Royal Navy officers and were also judged on the quality of their final design, teamwork and corporate ID. Joe and Oliver's craft successfully completed the challenge, but unfortunately in a time outside of the prize winners.



This year's task required students to design and build an automatic flashing beacon using basic tools and materials. This level of success was also repeated by the Lower Sixth team of William Bruton, John Kings, Paul Taylor and Phillip Hingley who won the Advanced category of the competition for the second year running. Unfortunately our intermediate team of Joe Douglass, Oliver Youngman, Peter Armstrong and Daniel Casson narrowly missed out on the honours in the Intermediate category of the competition.


























In May the world was gripped by the exploits of professor Langdon as he unravelled the secrets in Dan Brown's "The Da Vinci Code". Pupils at KGS and Fulwood High School and Arts College have done a bit of code cracking themselves. 
The project started on Friday 27 January with 50+ pupils and staff visiting the Manchester City Art Gallery where various artists took small groups of pupils around a selection of artworks with a view to discussing and promoting the use of sketchbooks. Amongst the artist responding to art works from the gallery collection was Johnny Woodhams. To start with, our pupils were not sure what to make of Johnny. With his shaved head and goatee beard, Johnny would make a convincing villain in "The Da Vinci Code". But the only thing remotely nasty about him is - he writes a mean poem, as clearly demonstrated in his poetry performance in front of the painting "At the edge of





In March the pupils and artists visited Blackpool Pleasure Beach and spent the day sketching, photographing and of course going on the rides. From the work gathered they then set about further developing their images using various media back at school with the school's art teachers. Over the last few weeks both schools have had the added bonus of having an Artist in Residence working on this "Coasters" project. These artists have been working alongside not only the year 9 pupils but all age groups unravelling the working methods of the artist. KGS residencies initially included Johnny Woodhams, poet / performance / photographer for one week and Pat Mountford, painter who has been heavily involved with The Booth Centre, a drop-in and activity centre for homeless people in Manchester and the Christies Hospice. In June the artists Liz Noble and Harriet Clarke spent two weeks making photographs both digitally and by pin hole cameras which our pupils found most inspiring. The project continues next term so watch this space.

#### Part 1 the Geographers.....

At our last site a keen geographer discovered an Ox-bow lake, which was christened Darlington's Ox-bow lake, Mr Harrison will be proud to show future pupils such an impressive find.

The following day we were off to Eboracum or York, as we know it today. We learnt a huge amount of historical human geography while visiting Fairfax House, Clifford's Tower and York Museum, which proved useful for our exam. We then headed back to Scarborough to test out the local 'cuisine' – mussels and of course ice cream. We were quite impressed with the discovery of a 'one foot ice-cream!'

The penultimate day, and what better to start the day off by getting up at 5.00am to see the sunrise, a truly spectacular sight! With Mr Harrison's eager athletic ability, we were soon walking around the Scarborough coastline, learning about coastal landforms. I am sure that we would all agree that the highlight of this day was when Mr Harrison competed, and won, against a pupil three times, twice running up slopes leading to the beach and once at Connect 4, triumphant moment for Mr Harrison. Later in the evening, after having such a wonderful time on the trip, we all chipped in to treat the teachers to a well deserved nightcap.

On the last day, nobody wanted to leave after having such an enjoyable time. Nevertheless we had one final stop off at York Minster, which was magnificent to say the least. This took our artwork on to a new dimension

On the second day this new "Virtue" style became apparent when we started drawing with twigs and mud, in fact anything we could make marks with. Ink and wax became our new best friends and the castle our enemy (picture below). Blacks, whites and as much energy as we could throw at the page, gone were the days of detailed sketches.

The third day entailed a coastal adventure (top picture) as we joined the geographers on their coastal survey as we all journeyed south of Scarborough towards Bridlington stopping at various locations once again attacking our sketchbooks. The day was rounded off with a good old fish and chip dinner back at Scarborough.

On the final day we went to York, where it poured with rain, never the less we were still able to get a few quick sketches of the Cathedral and buy some wonderful chocolates from a quaint little chocolate shop. A visit to the local art gallery was also squeezed in

We certainly adapted to the sunny seaside resort of Scarborough lifestyle eating ice-creams and bags of candy floss everyday which we have to say were delicious. Everyone really enjoyed the trip and most of our artwork has changed dramatically under the influence of "John Virtue". # "Blue Remembered Hills"

Originally shown on TV, Dennis Potter's deceptively simple tale relates the activities of seven West Country seven-year-olds on a summer afternoon during the Second World War, in a wood, a field and a barn.

The children (played by our KGS fourth year GCSE students) play, fight, fantasize and swagger, their aggressions, fears, hostilities and rivalries a microcosm of adult interaction. Easy-going Willie tags along as burly Peter bullies stuttering Raymond and is challenged by fair-minded John. Plain Audrey is overshadowed by pretty Angela and takes out her angry frustrations on the boys. All of them gang up on the terrified 'Donald Duck' who, abused by his mother and ridicled by his peers, plays his own, dangerous game.

There are particular difficulties facing the GCSE actor in the performance of the roles of children. Our would-be thespians had to re-learn the constant near gymnastics of seven year olds and had to research World War II in terms of costume and attitudes. Their research took them over to the Junior School where they observed playtime and through improvisation recreated their own childhood memories. Thank you to all the performers and especially Enigma for their contribution to the school's music events. We wish them the best of luck in their future.



This achievement meant that the Preston Harriers' runner went on to compete in the National Cross Country finals at Nottingham where he finished a creditable 70th in a field of 320 runners.

At Intermediate Girls' level the Victrix Ludorum title was so keenly contested that it was shared by Lizzie Woodburn, 80m hurdles winner, and Fiona Gardner, 100m and 200m winner, who gained the same overall points. Wasim Riley (picture bottom far left) Lancashire Long Jump Champion 2005 won the Intermediate Boys by coming first in the 100m, 200m, 400m and Long Jump.

The Senior Girls was won by Lancashire County and North Regional Development Squad Hockey player Jess Morris, a "first class sprinter" winning the 100m, 200m, hurdles and long jump. The Senior Boys events were extremely competitive with 1st XV winger Des Bowden (picture above right) taking the accolade by winning the 100m, 200m and shot.

In an exciting event Millfield proved worthy winners, victorious in all their matches. The event proved a great success once again and our girls gained greatly from the experience.

On the rugby field Sevens dominated the latter days of the Spring Term. The 1st VII excelled themselves in reaching the Quarter-Finals of the National Schools Sevens (picture bottom left) with fine victories over Oakham and Durham School after winning their group. Ultimately weariness took its toll in the defeat by Warwick but it nontheless represented an outstanding achievement.

This term has seen a busy athletics programme and some great success by our teams. Both boys and girls qualified for the English Schools Regional finals. The boys competed in the 'A' final in Manchester while the girls attended the 'B' final in Blackpool. As a consequence a number of KGS athletes also competed in the Lancashire School Championships at Wigan and achieved outstanding results. KGS emerged with three Lancashire Champions (picture right): Mel Smith (Senior Girls 100m Hurdles), Sarah Hatch (Inter Girls Discus) and Christopher Travis (Junior Boys Triple Jump). More recently the boys were victorious in a strong field in the Vose Cup in Lancaster defeating Lancaster Royal Grammar School, Morecambe and Arnold at U15 level and coming a close second in the U13 event. This proved a fitting preliminary to the Fylde Schools Championships where the boys won every age group! Victorious at U12, U13, U14 and U15 they performed to a very high standard on the day. In the girls event we were creditable runners up in three age groups. The girls have had an excellent season with no less than seven fixtures at all levels and victories in most of those.

On the tennis court we have seen regular Saturday fixtures for the girls and some fine individual performances. The boys U13 squad also managed to reach the County Semi-Final while the girls await the outcome of their draw.

On the cricket field it has been nice to see our B teams competing in the local league thus extending the opportunities for cricketers to get involved. A young 1st XI (picture top right) has had mixed fixtures but have grown in stature and performed well against the MCC. The U12 XI have now reached the quarter final of the County Cup, another noteable achievement.
