



HEADMASTER'S INTRODUCTION



The end of every school year seems to arrive so quickly and no sooner have we overcome the last throes of winter than we are putting pen to paper for the newsletter. The year has been another busy one with our pupils widely involved in school life. The school's largest ever intake at 11+ appear to have settled in very well and already have made their mark in many ways. Educational policy continues to develop and this year we have had to subject our fourth year students to more public examination beyond their customary science modules. This has further disrupted the term and provided more pressure for youngsters who have to look forward to another three vears of such external assessment.

I look forward optimistically to a time when the 'powers that be' recognise that there is such a thing as being over-examined. It makes one wonder how some countries in the world manage without a public examination system at all. Nonetheless we are hopeful that our students have prepared well and recent initiatives in revision practices in school have hopefully assisted in this process. So we look forward to results in August as we prepare for another hectic year.

We have no major building projects underway this summer but are undertaking a significant and much needed refurbishment of the Sixth Form Centre. A 'Bistro'-like facility named "Six Degrees" will be the centre of a completely renovated common room with 'Internet Café', new cloakroom facilities and a fully refurbished lounge area. We hope the 'coffee bar' atmosphere will be popular with the students and the presence of a staff member in the café area and varied food options will afford them greater flexibility in their lunch arrangements. We very much see our Sixth Form as the ideal stepping stone to University and feel this is an addition to our resources which help us in this goal.

Needless to say the Governors continue to review the strategic direction of the school and to plan further in the school's evolution in order to ensure that all the areas of our curriculum mirror the excellent facilities developed in recent years. The Friends' commitment to supporting us in our aspirations continues and they have recently identified support for the renewal of ICT facilities as a key area. More laptop facilities in the senior school and a refreshed ICT room in the junior school will result. Mrs Wareing and her team of Friends are an inspiration to us all, and their hard work in providing funds and entertainment for us deserves special mention. I thank all the committee members for their efforts in what has been a very hectic year.

The support of parents is very important to us in a more general sense. Our pupils benefit so much from your presence at concerts, sports fixtures, plays and other performances, and you all continue to attend in large numbers. This is such an important aspect of school life and while we continue to have to look at 'safeguarding' measures for visitors, it is important that all our parents feel welcome in school and we are continually looking at further means to improve communication with you all about school events and all school matters.

The summer term is in many ways a contrasting one whereby the first half is very pressurised with the build up to public and school examinations. As they finish and the follow up is completed we try to include more varied learning opportunities with educational visits









proliferating along with the regular sporting fixtures and adventure camps. This does mean the latter 21/2 weeks of term are frantic but I still firmly believe that while there is a change in tempo and style there remains a focus on learning and development. So much that we cannot achieve in the midst of examination preparation can be tackled - anything from the recent visit of a survivor of the Concentration Camps to speak to the third year on the Holocaust; the First and Second Year visits in Geography and History study areas and other field trips which add so much to pupils' learning. Alongside this has been the further extension of the D of E Award and the excellent opportunities afforded with the Field Day at Halton. Most local 'championships' take place in this period and we also welcome visitors from Chernobyl to school. All in all, therefore, it is a very different school within this period but one which is still focused on our key objectives albeit in a rather different and at times frantic format!

The end of a school year is always tinged with sadness as we say goodbye to a full cohort of our pupils. The current Upper Sixth have much to be proud of, not the least of which is the fact that they represent the biggest Sixth Form year in the school's history. Their broad contribution to the life of the school has been sustained and we wish them well as they move on to a new chapter in their lives. They certainly seemed to enjoy the video of their 'former selves' as eleven year old on the video we showed them in Leavers Assembly!

We also say goodbye to some valued colleagues. From the Boarding House, Mrs Heyes, our Matron departs for pastures new. She has led the medical team and overseen our boarding girls' welfare for ten years. Throughout that time I have always been confident that systems would be thoroughly applied and that the pupils' welfare would be at the forefront of any decisions. Always honest and open, Mrs Heyes has helped hundreds of boarders through their time here and assisted them in their personal development. She has always held School House close to her heart

but will now relish new challenges as her own children move on to higher education and beyond. We wish her well.

From our teaching roll we lose Mr Adam Carter who joined us only last year to teach Physics. Mr Carter's domestic arrangements have changed since he arrived, necessitating a move, but, he has even in his short time with us, added to life at KGS with both his teaching and the exciting "Rocket Club". We hope he settles well into his new life in the south of the county.

Mrs Diane Airey leaves KGS to take over a department at Casterton School in Cumbria. Her contribution to KGS over 10 years has been immense. Developing Learning Support from a small backwater to a department at the forefront of school has been one of her key achievements. So many pupils and parents have benefited from her care and concern at difficult times and she has overseen all the administration of a burgeoning area of school life. Mrs Airev has also maintained a strong contribution to the Biology Department, teaching junior lessons in a thriving department. More recently as Head of Second Year, Mrs Airey has added to her portfolio with the oversight of the pastoral care of a significant proportion of the school. Many owe her a great deal and we wish her well in her new challenge in Cumbria.

Twenty years is a significant portion of one's life and Mrs Ainsworth has spent that period teaching French at KGS. Firm but fair, Mrs Ainsworth has always striven for high standards and battled to ensure the teaching of languages has a thorough grounding. Mrs Ainsworth has seen significant changes in the teaching of Modern Languages over these years and has taken them all with equanimity and very much in her stride. She has travelled significant distances each day to fulfil her role and will no doubt enjoy retirement particularly in avoiding the commuting involved in work. We wish Mrs Ainsworth a long and happy retirement.

for the first time in twenty six years. Mrs Taylor joined KGS in 1984 to teach PE and leaves as a Senior Manager and the architect of the school's highly regarded pastoral system. 





to the Morgan and Jaguar Factories

The Design and Technology GCSE and some Lower Sixth students went on a trip to the Jaguar and Morgan Factory on 21 April 2010. We had to be at school for 6:45 am in the morning for an extremely long coach journey to each factory. The Morgan factory is in Malvern, and the Jaguar factory is in Whitley. As there were so many of us, and we had to get both of the factories done in one day, we were split up into two groups, one group on each coach. At the Morgan Factory, we watched a DVD on the history of Morgan and its origins. Morgan has been kept in the families for just over 100 years, with just around 120 people working in the factory, which isn't a lot of people when all the cars are handmade. We had a tour around the factory and we saw how different parts of the car got made and then added onto the finished car; we also learnt some facts about the cars, like how it takes at least one year for the car to arrive to you, after ordering it. As we were there, we got to look at some finished cars, which were pretty snazzy.

After visiting the Morgan Factory, we then made our way over to the Jaguar factory whilst eating our lunch on the coach. Jaguar and Morgan are two completely different factories the Jaguar factory is huge, with robots making cars and producing over 1500 cars a day; Morgan is a relatively small factory which makes hand-made cars and produces about 25 cars each week.

At Jaguar, we had a tour guide taking us around and showing us how the different robots work and were programmed, and the process the cars go through to get the car in its finished state. At Jaguar, there are people that work there who have to do the dirty work that robots can't do, but as you can imagine they have to work extremely hard and quick. We also saw the new Jaguar that is coming out in May, the Jaguar XJ, which is where they are producing them at the moment.

After our tour of the factory, we went into an office-type room at Jaguar, where we learnt about the prototypes, and then we were put to the test when we had to build our own car out of Lego.

I think that all the students on the trip really enjoyed it and I would advise anybody who gets a chance to go on a similar trip to take the opportunity, because you learn and see a lot more than you would expect!

Since the last Headmaster's Newsletter, the DoE participants have been very busy working towards the different components of their Awards, as always the record books are a delight to read and demonstrate an amazing array of activities.

We undertook one expedition during the Easter break, which was certainly a challenging experience for both the participants and the staff:

DoE Expedition to the North Lakes Easter 2010

Four staff and 32 pupils set off for the Northern Lakes at the start of the Easter break to carry out a DoE expedition and once again adventure found us. When we arrived at our campsite at Braithwaite near Keswick the omens were not good. Snow still gripped to the higher fells, many of the bridges in the area had collapsed from the floods that had ravaged the area before Christmas and a strong cold wind blew in rain from the North. That said we all got stuck in and before long the tents and the all important cup of tea announced we had arrived and settled in. The day after was a training day for the Bronze groups who travelled from Bassenthwaite lake into Keswick. This was a gentle introduction to map-reading and navigating as a team and all they had was a light sprinkling of rain to contend with. The Silver groups began their expedition and were dispatched to Buttermere via the Newlands fells and had a much harder day. Once on the fells the combination of strong winds, heavy rain, and thick mists meant they arrived at Buttermere very wet and very tired. The next day the weather turned most foul. With torrential rain and strong winds from the north and a forecast for the rain to turn to sleet then snow we quickly changed the planned routes to make the day safer. Our planned campsites had become swamps and many of the paths next to rivers and streams or across bridges were dangerous as the shear amount of water flooded adjacent banks and roads. We ended the third day somewhat apprehensive of what would come next. We all had a very early start on the fourth day. This was because the rain had indeed turned to snow and the combination of strong winds and heavy snow caused a number of tents to be crushed by the growing weight of drifting snow. The staff tent as ever did not

survive the night. It was clear that it was time for us to leave and once again the composure and maturity of our pupils was a revelation. Despite the snow, the winds, the lack of sleep or breakfast they all got stuck in and within an hour we had packed up and set off back to school. Once again adventure found us and all our pupils will not forget the experience.

Mr Callister has three more expeditions planned over the coming months, including a Gold expedition in August, with twelve students taking on the challenge of navigating round the Welsh mountains. 


SOUTHERN REUNION DINNER



On two days, a total of over 100 pupils walked the two or so miles up Swilla Glen to view Pecca Falls, Hollybush Spout and the spectacular Thornton Force. We then crossed the stepping stones and moved on to the caves.

The expert guides showed us around White Scar Caves, entertaining the pupils with tales of witches' fingers and the devil's tongue. A wonderful day was had by all.

Zoo Lectures on Animal Classification

The Lower Sixth Biologists visited Blackpool Zoo as part of their Unit 2, AS studies. The zoo collection of confiscated animal furs served as examples of human influence on population diversity, the tiger being used as a case study. All the Lower Sixth Biologists worked competitively to complete their observation booklet on Classification, particularly Jon Evans who raced around the zoo trying to collect the most information so he could win the 'cuddly toy' prize. Jonny Davies practised his wildlife photography skills with close ups of gorillas and monkeys and even snapping 'zoo' seagulls! The feeding-time displays were also popular entertainment, with the newly established penguin colony getting the most attention.





Biology Field Trip

Brilliant sunshine and long balmy evenings led to a content field study group. Spending many hours outside collecting data was enjoyable and productive. The investigations on algal productivity in Malham Tarn and Dog's Mercury distribution in the Beech woodland gave an insight into the type of work covered in A2 Biology.

The mark, release, recapture method of estimating population size was attempted by using Longworth traps which catch mice and voles without harming them. Although the first night yielded no captives, on the second night Ben and Catherine had the very unusual result of 2 mice in the same trap. The mice must have been close together when they entered the tunnel into the trap before the trap door closed.

Using fishing nets to sample freshwater invertebrate populations was probably the most popular activity. We identified an amazing number of different species in Gordale beck although some accidental mixing of carnivores and herbivores in the holding tray may have affected the population numbers!

BPW Public Speaking Competition




























WORLD BOOK DAY





Every pupil was given a 'goody bag' containing books, stationery and other items, as well as a Certificate of Attendance.


CARNEGIE AWARD

The Carnegie Medal in Literature was established in the UK in 1936 in honour of Scottish philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. It is awarded to an outstanding book for children and young adult readers. Eight books were on this year's shortlist and our judging took place on 21 June, three days before the official result was announced. Over ice creams in the French Café seventeen pupils debated the merits of each book and the scores were added up. The final result was a win, for the second successive year, for Patrick Ness. His book "The Ask and the Answer" is the second in a trilogy and his first book was voted the winner by all the shadowing groups taking part last year; our group were very disappointed when it was not chosen by the official judges. This year's official winner were:

The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman (CLIP Carnegie Medal 2010) Harry & Hopper by Freya Blackwood (CLIP Kate Greenaway Medal 2010)























This year's A2 Theatre Studies production was aptly named Hotel dell'Arte. The group drew on the historical roots of comedy, the Commedia dell'Arte. These were highly trained troupes of actors who travelled first in Italy and then around Europe. All the stock characters were well known to their audiences, a bit like our familiarity with soap stars or celebrities. The skill of the actors was how funny they made their characters.

The A2 group all adopted two Commedia characters, one high status and one low status and put them into the comic melting pot of a wedding reception. Stephanie de Carpentier's nose is worth a mention. He was aggressive and chicken-like in his movements with a huge hooked nose; Steph really made good use of this information in her outstanding characterisation. Alice Whitehead's nose is also based in theatrical history. Alice played a Zanni or servant character. In traditional Commedia many of the characters wore masks which highlighted their personality; with a Zanni the longer the nose, the more stupid the servant. Alice successfully adapted this tradition by distilling it into just a nose rather than a whole face mask.



Throughout the week a range of activities were undertaken by everyone, even the hotel staff







We've all heard of the Magnificent Seven and the Fantastic Four, but how many of us know how the Savvy Six might impact on our lives? Young people from KGS investigated the lifestyles of characters such as Tania the single mum, Finley the student and Maya the university graduate, learning how to identify illegal money lenders and avoid getting into their clutches, and understanding safe borrowing options such as Credit Unions.

All of this is part of a financial literacy resource developed by Trading Standards and partnering with Barclays, which is ensuring that over 9000 young people get to attend workshops across the North of England. The initiative aims to bring fun and interactive learning to 16-25 year olds, helping them to overcome the hurdles faced by many young people when they begin to engage with the financial sector.

Jim Potts, Lancashire's Chief Trading Standards Officer, said: "At Trading Standards a large proportion of the complaints we receive relate to credit agreements. What is clear is that many of those consumers would have made different choices if they'd had more information and knowledge about what products were on the market. This is why it is so important that Trading Standards are active in the community, educating young people about the safe choices available."

Rachel Herbinson, Barclays' Community Investment Manager for the North West said: "We all know that money management can be a very dry subject but this resource is something that is fun and exciting and to see the way young people engage with each other is absolutely fantastic."


