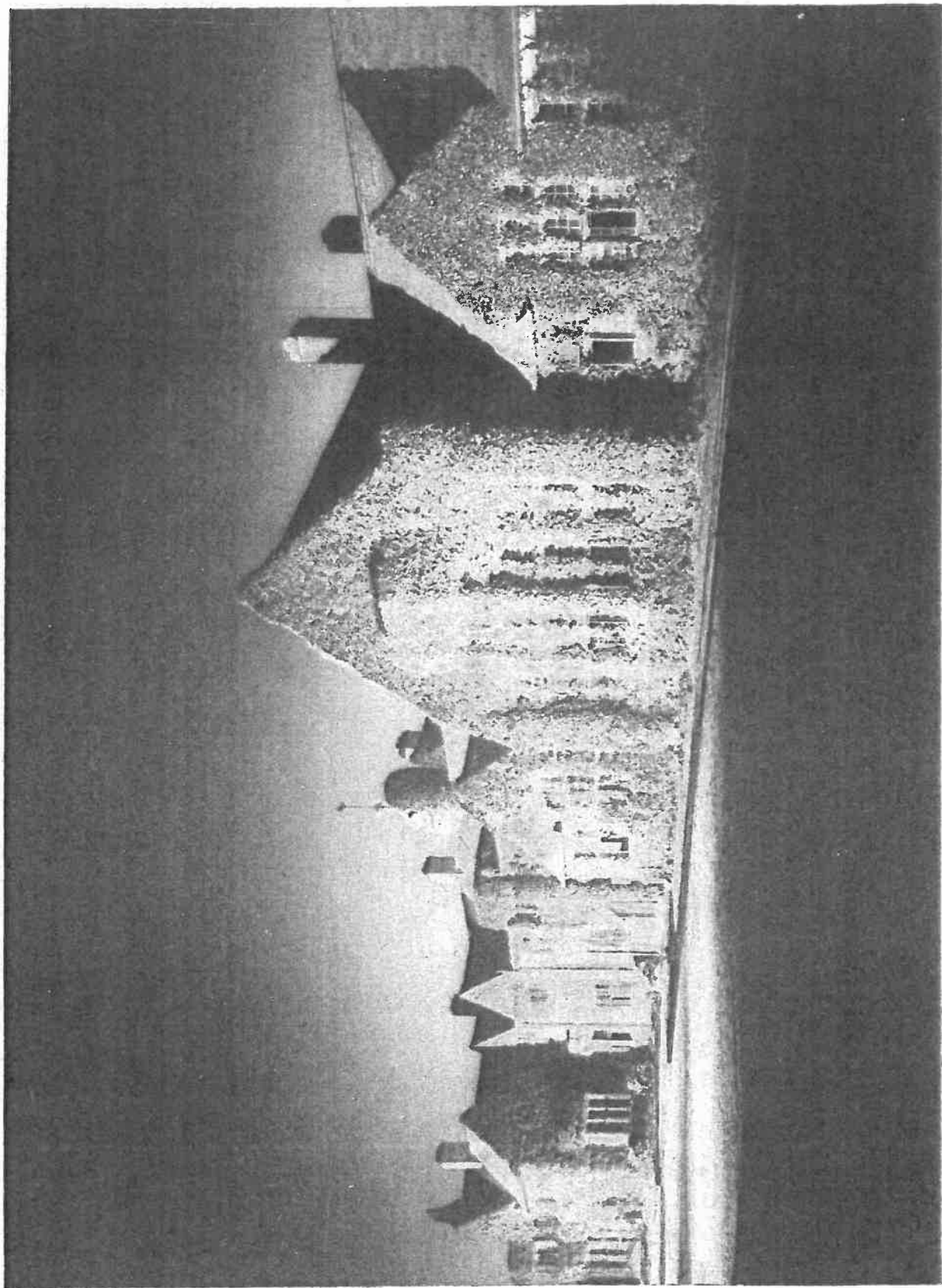

## RULES.

1. That the Association shall be known as the "KIRKHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOL OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION."

2. Membership of the Association shall be open to former students of Kirkham Grammar School, past and present masters, and also Governors of the School.

3. The Officers of the Association shall consist of President, Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Auditor, and a Committee of nine, three of whom shall retire annually and in rotation, and be eligible for re-election. The President and Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee. The President shall be the Headmaster, and the remaining Officers shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting. At any meeting of the Committee four shall form a quorum. Nominations for the Committee should be sent to the Hon. Secretary, and must reach him not less than three days before the Annual General Meeting, the consent of the nominees having first been obtained.

4. The Annual subscription shall be 5/-, payable on the 1st of November in each year. Life Membership of the Association is entitled by twenty-one payments of 5/- or the equivalent thereof. Any member three years in arrears shall be struck off the Membership Roll without notice.

5. The Annual General Meeting of members shall be held at the School in March each year, or as soon thereafter as is possible, notice of which shall be sent to each member on or before March 1st. Any member desirous of proposing a resolution at the Annual General Meeting shall give notice of his intention, together with a copy of his resolution, not later than February 1st.

6. At the Annual General Meeting an audited Statement of Accounts shall be presented by the Hon. Treasurer.

7. The privilege of attending the Association Dinner, playing for the Association teams, wearing the Association colours, etc., shall belong only to *bona fide* members of the Association.

8. The Hon. Secretary shall, within twenty-eight days of notice, convene an Extraordinary General Meeting of Members if demanded by not less than ten members.

9. Additions or amendments to the above Rules shall be authorised by an Annual General Meeting, and notice of a proposition regarding any such additions or amendments must be submitted to the Hon. Secretary twenty-eight days before the Annual General Meeting.

## The Association Year.

IF Time is regarded, as the old hymn has it, as an ever-rolling stream, there is no rational reason for celebrating anniversaries at all, unless, being a Tax Gatherer, one celebrates the feast of Saint Rapacius on April 5th. Fortunately for our enjoyment of life, man is not entirely rational, especially when inspired by the sentiments which impel him to join Old Boys' Associations. The Anniversary may be an inconsiderable moment in the passing of an epoch, but this year we have been thankful to celebrate our own four-hundredth birthday at Kirkham in ways more fully described later in this issue.

It was inspiring to meet so many Old Boys, all glad to be on familiar ground, whether they attended the Old School by the Church or the New School by the By-Pass. It was no less encouraging to meet the present generation—many of them looking very elderly by comparison with the prefects of earlier days—and to find them growing up in the old tradition. Four hundred years is a fair round figure which enables us to feel pride in our past and a certain benevolent tolerance towards the younger neighbours who surround us and even towards most of the larger Public Schools. Let us hope that the spirit of revival which was abroad in July will bring together many Old Boys who are still not members of the Association.

Reference is made elsewhere to the newly designed tie, which has been introduced this year, and the various functions are also reported. We have had to expunge from membership several Old Boys whose subscriptions had fallen many years behind, but our appeals for news have borne some fruit, and we have also found a few windfalls. We appeal to all our members to do all they can to extend the membership and stimulate interest, both in their own doings and in those of the Association and its other members. Especially do we ask for a full gathering at the General Meeting which, this year, is to be preceded by the Annual Sports and a Hot-Pot Supper.

## Quater Centenary Celebrations.

A full programme was arranged, lasting from Thursday, 21st July, to Sunday, 24th July.

THURSDAY evening saw a brilliant Concert by the School, running to 15 musical items, two humorous recitations, a brilliant rendering of "Widecombe Fair" by the Senior boys, and a remarkably fine performance of "Birds of a Feather" by the Sixth Form. This one-act play by J. O. Francis has a rare beauty, which has somehow survived its translation from the Welsh, and one will long remember R. W. Hines's "Twn Tinker" and J. J. Gardner's "Dicky Bach Dwl" for their maturity and polish.

"Widcombe Fair" was memorable for the unusual presentation by all the characters of the song, save the old grey mare, but the astonishing variety of costume and acting convulsed the audience and the final appearance of the mare—looking somehow like Low's pictures of the T.U.C.—would have surprised anybody. We must not forget our authentically Gallic and rousing essay into ornithology by Mr. Lawton, who led the entire audience in singing "La jolie Alonette."

Special mention must be made of the singing of the boys, which was a great credit to Mr. Murray. Remembering how one of the Governors was ejected in our day after certain sour notes had been traced to him, we were grateful to Mr. Murray, and congratulate him.

FRIDAY was an open day for parents and friends of the boys, and for friends and Old Boys.

This took the form of a garden party, with tea on the lawn and an impressive display of physical training in the school.

SATURDAY was combined with Founders' Day, and the K.G.S. Contingent of the Combined Cadet Force, which was formed in January, 1949, hit the "high-spot" of its short life when it paraded 4 officers and 120 cadets strong, on the morning of Saturday, 23rd July, to be inspected on the front lawn by Major the Earl of Derby, M.C.

The Contingent was accompanied by the Boy Entrants' Band of the R.A.F. (Kirkham) whilst the Station Band of the R.A.F. (Weeton) played selections for the entertainment of some 500 guests who attended in wonderful weather.

The proceedings were opened with prayers by the Rev. A. R. Allen, and then Mr. H. C. Turner formally presented to the Headmaster the new flag which has been bought and given to the school by the Old Boys' Association.

A Colour Party of Cadets hauled up the flag—a very handsome standard consisting of the K.G.S. coat-of-arms on a white background—and this was "broken" by Lord Derby.

After an Inspection and March Past the Cadets, preceded by the R.A.F. Band, marched through Kirkham to attend the Founders' Day Service.

The Service at the Parish Church was well attended, and the sermon was by the Ven. Archdeacon A. Selwyn Bean who will be remembered as Vicar of Wrea Green and as a Master during the 1914 war. The Headmaster and Mrs. Norwood entertained a party of Governors, friends and Old Boys and their ladies to lunch on the field, and a less formal lunch was taken by other guests in the Pavilion. This was followed by a cricket match between the Old Boys and the School.

Not a few of the Old Boys felt a furtive lump rising in their throats as that well-remembered voice spoke to them again.

There was lunch in the Dining Hall for Old Boys and their ladies, who were again the guests of the Headmaster and Mrs. Norwood. There was a roll-call of Old Boys in order of years and the bell to call them in was rung by the Rev. E. F. Stoney, the oldest Old Boy present.

In the afternoon there was a further Cricket Match between two teams of Old Boys. It was well attended and blessed by sunshine. Tea was again taken on the field.

At risk of appearing sententious, we must say that the entire celebrations were an inspiration. Many of the Old Boys who had not attended functions for years were there and signed the book which had been made for the occasion. The weather contributed to the affair. It was warm and sunny, and at night, when the buildings were floodlit, it seemed that most of Kirkham came to see them. Well they might. Few will remember this, even by hearsay, in the year 2049, and none can say what educational cranks will have done to our schools by then. Surely, though, the fruits of the last 400 years cannot be consumed and dissipated by legislation so long as the spirit of 1949 endures.

### **Old Boys Rugby Match.**

The Annual Rugby Match between the School and the Old Boys was played on the school field on November 19th, 1949. We arrived at the School with a team that was considered by an eminent critic to be the strongest that the Old Boys had fielded for many years. Any hopes of an easy victory were shattered when the School took the lead through a penalty goal kicked by Bartle. Hodge ran strongly on the wing to level the scores and Rigby raced through for three tries, but for many of us the high-light of the game was Montgomery's try, when he crashed through from the line-out with three school forwards clinging to him like leeches. No conversions were made and a memorable and enjoyable game finished with the score at 15—3 for the Old Boys.

### **Annual Dinner, 1949.**

The Dinner was again held at the County Hotel, Blackpool, when over eighty members were present. On this occasion only one guest was invited—namely Mr. L. P. Salisbury, who attended the School in 1880 and is better known to us all as "Lal." He made a characteristic little speech when his health was drunk, and the whole affair was on an informal footing. The toasts were in the hands of Mr. S. Middleton (The School), Mr. George Bates (The Association), Mr. D. Norwood (replying for the School), and Mr. Reg. Haworth (replying for the Association). Other speeches, which were of a reminiscent tone, came from Mr. Arnold Gaskell and Mr. B. Stevenson. In saying that he had now felt obliged to

relinquish the school games because of the years, of which his appearance shows no signs, Mr. Stevenson spoke of Mr. Crane's great ability as his successor, and felt sure that under his guidance the games would prosper. Mr. Crane was moved to reply in modest terms appropriate to the occasion.

This year, as an experiment, no entertainer was engaged, as it was felt that members would thus have more time for renewing old friendships. The Dinner was also held on a Saturday evening following the Old Boys' Rugby Match, and as the attendance was almost the same as in 1948, neither experiment was unsuccessful.

The Quater Centenary Book was passed round for signature once more as a memorial of the thirtieth year of the Association and the four-hundredth of the School.

### **The Annual Dance.**

Both in 1949 and in 1950 the Dance was held in the School early in January. By this time the Dance has become an immensely popular function which strains the capacity of the Hall. In spite of its modest price, which may account for its popularity in these days of high prices for everything else, the Dance is the Association's main source of income. There are suggestions that a more formal Dinner-Dance should also be held at the County Hotel, which has done so well for us with the last two Dinners. No decision has been reached, and any observations by members would be welcomed.

## Cricket, 1949.

The School Cricket XI has, this season, played with more zest and determination, with a consequent improvement in match results. Credit must be given to the Captain, H. H. Seed, who worked hard to achieve this end.

It proved difficult to find good opening batsmen, with the result that the side too often was extricated from difficult positions by the tail-end batsmen.

The bowling was the best feature of the team, J. J. Gardner bowling medium pace for long spells with accurate length and deceptive outswing. S. Jenkins, J. Sharples and J. Flather gave very good support. The two first named should be extremely valuable next season.

Technically the batting was rather crude, but H. H. Seed, W. B. Carr, D. W. Gibson, J. B. Roberts and J. Jenkins attacked courageously at times.

F. A. Kippax, was quite a polished wicket-keeper, but lacked verve.

The fielding was far below K.G.S. standard, lacking sureness, and worse still, showing little signs of intelligent anticipation.

We have high hopes for the future, because we think that we have excellent material in the middle and lower School, and in Mr. F. Thacker we have secured a groundsman whose careful and skilful work cannot fail to react favourably on the cricket progress of the boys.

## The New Association Tie.

Mention has been made earlier of the new tie which was decided upon this year. A number of designs were prepared, and after long discussion a design was chosen which incorporated the traditional red, blue, and gold in new shades and new dimensions. The gold stripe (one-sixteenth inch wide) comes above the red one (one-eighth inch wide), and the dark blue stripes are alternately half-inch and three-quarter inch wide.

*The West Lancashire Gazette* published the following note :  
"SCHOOL TIES.

"This column recently gave news of a new school tie for Blackpool Technical College. Today I hear of an old school tie destined to disappear soon.

For 20 years members of Kirkham Grammar School Old Boys' Association wore a dark blue tie with stripes of red and gold, but when war came supplies were quickly exhausted.

End of the war, while improving the supply position, presented another problem for it was found that the Corps of R.E.M.E. had adopted the same colours.

A gathering of old boys could, therefore, have been grossly misleading to a military visitor.

To meet the situation, a new Old Boys' tie is now in course of production incorporating the old colours but to a new design carried out by Mr. James Dandy (chairman of the Association's Publicity Committee) and approved by the executive."

The *Daily Mirror* chose to assume from this that Old Boys would not care to be taken for members of R.E.M.E. in a paragraph which gained national circulation.

D. B. Hall, writes from Uddington, Lanarkshire, as follows :

"You would be surprised that the R.E.M.E. action in swiping our model created quite a stir here in the backwoods, particularly amongst my Ex-R.E.M.E. friends who had long accused me of wrongly wearing their colours. When they had gone the sergeant continued the interrogation. "And what part of England do you come from?" asked the sergeant, of the invalid. "Lancashire," he replied. "Oh, so do I," replied the sergeant, "I live in Wrea Green, near Preston."

"I know Wrea Green well," replied the patient. "When I was a boy at Kirkham Grammar School we often ran round the Green." "Did you say Kirkham Grammar School?" roared the sergeant. "Why, I was a boy there, and in happier times I'm on the staff there."

"Take off your tin hat," cried the patient. The sergeant did so and revealed the homely features of Ernest Edwards (26-34). The R.A.F. "type" was Eric Parker (27-31).

## Letters from Old Boys.

The following letter was received by the Hon. Secretary, and permission for publication was granted by Mr. Vyvyan G. H. Hicks, of The Grove, Scarning, Dereham, Norfolk.

This look-back into the past will surely interest many members and so will excerpts of a subsequent letter and newspaper cuttings printed below.

We are very grateful indeed to Mr. Hicks for all the trouble he has taken to supply this information.

As an Old Boy of Kirkham Grammar School I send you a few lines referring to the School Tie Article in the *Daily Mirror* of the 26th July.

I spent  $4\frac{1}{2}$  years (missing the Autumn term in 1897) from January, 1895 to July, 1899 at K.G.S. My older brother got on to the School list of scholars I believe. He was "Hicks Primus," I was "Secondus" and our younger brother "Tertius."

I was interested to read that the school tie was yellow, blue and red bars, because in our time there, we had dark blue caps with about eight thin white stripes, and I believe that K.G.S. was added only when we were well established in the cricket and football teams. The ribbon round our straw hats was white and dark blue. If you care to reply, please tell me when the colours were altered. For some years I was captain of the Cricket XI, and have two of the official photos taken during those years, should you wish to see them.

You will be interested to know that we were boarders (from Norfolk) in the old school near the Church when Canon Mason was the Vicar and that splendid classical scholar (now Canon) Leverton, Head Master. Hicks 1 and 2 both appeared in the Latin Distinction list in 1898 Seniors Oxford Locals. Canon Leverton recently sent me one of his Virgil books, as he got us so fond of Latin that, although still practising as a Solicitor (after 36 years in London practice—until November, 1942) I gratuitously coach Grammar School boys for School Certificate at Latin. I could send you a few cuttings if they would not "bore you stiff," relating to our cricket and football struggles with Preston G.S., Hutton, and other schools, and although angina prevents me now playing cricket, and tennis, I umpire for the tournament of the East Dereham Youth Centre which is going on here on my three courts.

It is strange that the REME tie should have been a copy, for my dear son Lieutenant Richard Hicks got his engineering degree at Corpus, Cambridge, and went out with REME to India where he died on active service only six weeks before VJ Day, aged 22.

I should mention that long after the new K.G.S. was built, I had to go up that way and was able to make a detour and look in. What memories are recalled! Playing once or twice for Kirkham Town (as a boy) in their cricket matches also, for the Town Tennis Club in matches at either Burnley or Blackburn—I forget which, and so on, tells you how keen I was as a lad, on sport.

My daughters are equally fond of combining work and play.

I will just add that "Primus" is Rural Dean of Paddington, and "Tertius" (after many years Vicar of Ripon) is Vicar of Woodbastwick, Norfolk, while I am glad to say that I am able to take service as a Licensed Lay Reader for Norfolk—in nearly 40 Churches to the present time.

Pardon so much of the personal, and if ever you, or any of the Kirkham people are in Norfolk, this lovely spot is only a few

hundred yards out of (East) Dereham on the main road to Swaffham (Sandringham) and the Midlands, and you need not hesitate to look in, as Mrs. Hicks and I are generally here in the house or garden.

1ST SEPTEMBER—Regarding "Further information," I wrote to my older brother, "Primus," now in his 70th (and I into my 69th) year. He is an exceedingly busy "Parson" and being the Rural Dean of such a crowded part as Paddington, has little time at present, though he replied that when he retires (after 70) he might be able to send something ("a line or two") to the *Chronicle*; as he had 20 years in the Bush, etc., in Australia (being Canon of Rockhampton Cathedral) probably he could give some interesting experiences. The first thing that came into his mind as he thought back about 55 years was: "that rattling of the birch twigs (or was it a large cane) on our window so that I might get up at 5 o'clock and do a couple of hours prep. before the 7 o'clock prep. began. But the result was worth it!" I am afraid that I only got up for the 7 o'clock prep. At that time, we brothers were lodged in the street near the old school.

My brother reminds me of the loud "Well bowled, Higgs"—(not Hicks)—which came from the Groundsman, who apparently was an admirer of mine! Was he Mr. Dickinson? What has become of the "Ingredere ut proficias" over the lobby into the old school? I wonder if the burglar understood this when he came (I think it was summer term, 1899). He daubed the dining-room white cloth with chutney, filled the Head Master's mortar-board with pea-pods, and took the best books, which happened to be mine, and I was told later that he tramped so many miles before caught, that the soles had large round holes and the boots were done for. Alas! I heard nothing more about this.

"Tertius" reminds me of an amusing incident in the Parish Church during a Harvest Thanksgiving Service—(and we boarders sat just behind Dr. Court's box pew) a cat ran across the chancel chasing a mouse, which escaped—presumably claiming privilege of sanctuary! Quite a diversion! I almost forgot that my pocket money was 4d. a week. Of this I spent 3½d. regularly on ¼lb. of best Terry chocolates and the ½d. went as regularly to the Church collection—actually 2½ per cent more than tithe. Makes you think, doesn't it?

Dr. Shaw was a "sport." He really originated the School Sports in 1898 of which I happened to win the first event—throwing the cricket ball. Enclosed are some extracted cuttings, pasted in exactly 50 years ago! Dr. Shaw wrote me urging me to go to the University if I could, for he thought I might get recognition for cricket. But I had to face life instead. I cycled 30,000 miles to and from a local Solicitor's office until I went to try my luck in London. You may like to look at the separate cuttings and membership cards as to (Soccer) football, cricket, and tennis, two school photos (cricket) and two London snaps (tennis) as well as the *Daily News* cuttings. I shall be glad to have these things back, and I think you will agree that I have combined work with play.
