

Editorial.

Cricket, 1925.

The Cricket Season of 1925 has been a memorable one. Favoured by a long spell of brilliant weather, with the playing pitch and out-field in first-rate condition, the batting of the 1st and 2nd XI's reached a higher standard than ever before. W. Atkinson's average of 29.8 for 15 innings is worthy of special mention.

The 1st XI., apart from some unaccountable lapses towards the end of the season, proved to be a match-winning combination, strong in all departments of the game.

Before the commencement of the season four concrete pitches were laid down in the field for net practice. These were in use daily by the whole School, and have proved a great boon. Much promise both in batting and bowling is being shown by some of the junior members of the School, and there is material for a good school XI. for many years to come.

Full colours were regained by Swarbrick and Atkinson, and were awarded to Miller.

XX Caps were awarded to Ashurst, Benson, Hudson, White, F. Stansfield, D. Robinson (regained from 1924), Pollard, Midgley, Rawstron, Durant, Fenton, Procter, and J. Harrison.

Of inter-school matches, the best were two closely contested games with Blackpool Secondary School, who had an unusually strong XI.

The match at Blackpool was won by K.G.S. mainly owing to an excellent innings of 54 by Atkinson, and some fine bowling by Swarbrick (8 for 33), backed up by smart fielding.

The return match at Kirkham was won by Blackpool after a very keen struggle,

Hutton G.S., Arnold House and Preston G.S., were all beaten once; Hutton and Arnold House winning the return matches on their own ground. The fixture against Preston at Kirkham was unfortunately cancelled.

The match against Lancaster R.G.S. 2nd XI. was lost after a good fight against the clock to save the game; Preston Catholic College won both their matches. Four club matches were played, Preston C.C. 3rd XI. being defeated twice, and Wrea Green once, while the match against the Old Boys resulted in a draw greatly in favour of the School.

Rugby Football, 1925=26.

The past season is one on which we can look back with great satisfaction. The progress made in the general knowledge and understanding of the game since its initiation in 1924 is really remarkable, and this year's XV have reached a standard which we feel to have been higher than any of the School football teams since 1908.

Particular praise should be given to the forwards who, though usually outweighted, proved themselves the masters of nearly all the packs they met. Miller was a particularly good scrummager, and Rawstron a splendid all-round forward.

The two halves, Popplewell and White, were the most brilliant players in the team, and were of course the mainspring of the attack, and had the three-quarters possessed a little more pace, it is probable that three of the defeats could have been converted into victories. Ashurst was an extremely reliable and clever full-back.

The Second XV. proved to be a remarkably good side towards the end of the season, and the prospects for the coming winter are excellent.

Both the Senior and Junior House Football Competitions produced some finely fought games. The School House, mainly owing to their superior packs, were Cock House in both competitions, the runners up being Blackpool House (senior) and Kirkham House (junior).

"Honour" Caps were awarded to White (captain), Popplewell, Rawstron, Miller, and Ashurst.

These were given by the Headmaster, Messrs. G. Barton, E. Hartley, and R. H. Penney.

Prize Day, 1925.

Prize Day was held on June 29th. Mr. P. E. Meadon, Director of Education for Lancashire, presented the prizes.

The Chairman of the Governors (the Rev. W. T. Mitton) who presided, paid a tribute to the Headmaster and the Staff, and congratulated the School on the success of the year's work. He urged the importance of boys in such schools as Kirkham Grammar School, considering the question of going out to settle in the Dominions of the Empire. He thought the idea needed encouraging, and it ought to be realised that schools could help.

The Headmaster (the Rev. C. Strange) in his report said that the School could claim progress all along the line in spite of the shadow of economic depression which gripped the whole country. This depression was felt in the homes of the boys and reacted upon school life. He paid a tribute to the spirit of the boys and the untiring work of the staff, and said that the standard of scholarship had been well maintained. The studies ranged from the very lowest rung of the Secondary School ladder to advanced post matriculation There were 150 boys in the School, a slight increase on the figures of a year ago. The examination results were better than anything the School had previously achieved. Turning from the intellectual to the physical development, the Headmaster drew attention to the great improvement that had been effected by the re-organisation of the system of drill. A Gymnasium was the only thing lacking to the physical training. The introduction of Rugby Football had been entirely beneficial—the particular qualities which the game calls for making it peculiarly a game for British boys. The quality of cricket had greatly improved; the mowing of the whole playing field and the provision of practice pitches had brought the cricket of the School on to a different level. All this was of great value; their object was not to produce expert footballers and cricketers, but they believed that if in addition to a liberal education a boy learned to play cricket and football as these games should be played, then he was likely to make a sound man and a good citizen.

The health of the School had been good, and the Headmaster testified to how much the health and comfort of the School was due to the unfailing attention which Mrs. Strange gave to the domestic side of K.G.S.

The Old Boys' Association, thanks to the energy of the Hon. Secretary, Mr. J. H. Rigby, continued to gather strength, and was of no small value to the School.

Reference was made to the severe loss the School had suffered by the death of three governors—the Rev. C. Fullerton Smith, Mr. W. Bradley, and Mr. A. V. Catterall.

After referring to the boys who were leaving, and expressing his appreciation of the assistance he received from the Governors, the Headmaster concluded: "And so one more chapter of life closes in that great book of K.G.S. which goes back nigh 400 years; and my thoughts turn to that fine sentence in our founder's prayer: 'We thank Thee for the lives and examples of all who have served Thee here.' The main purpose that we seek to hold before us in our school life is service. We strive to instil into our boys the spirit of service, that each man's true purpose under God is to serve his generation. If we have achieved ought, then let us say with all sincerity: 'Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory.'"

Mr. Meadon referring to the ancient history of the School, said it was doing its work before Shakespeare went to London, before the days of Drake and the Spanish Armada. Its work had gone on from generation to generation, the result of the self-sacrifice, thought and effort of those who founded it in the days before there was any kind of Government aid. Its Governors through the generations had served it faithfully with their time and

labour. The boys who were receiving prizes that day had worthily upheld the School tradition. If he were selecting a prize he would give it to the boy who had done his best for the School. The boy who did that would find his work a tremendous joy, and he would take out of the School more than anyone else. Plato many years ago said that every man had a gift. There were gifts that Plato described as golden, silver and brass. Education consisted in finding out what one's individual gift was, and developing it to the utmost for oneself and the community in general.

The Rev. R. W. M. Holme (Vice-Chairman of the Governors) moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Meadon, referred to the suggestion of a prize (for the boy who had done his best for the School) and said he would be glad to give such a prize during whatever time he was associated with Kirkham Grammar School.

Annual Meeting and Dinner, 1925.

The Sixth Annual Meeting of the Association was held at the School on December 2nd.

The President paid a tribute to the memory of Mr. A. V. Catterall, of Kirkham, and Mr. John Whittaker, of Fleetwood, both of whom were Old Boys and members of the Association, the former being also a Governor of the School. The members present stood in silence.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting, and the Balance Sheet, showing a balance of £32 7s. $3\frac{1}{2}$ d., were read and approved.

It was stated by the Secretary that the membership of the Association stood at 168, as compared with 151 the previous year, and there were 27 life members, compared with 16. Apologies for absence were read from Mr. B. Stuttard, a former Master; Mr. W. Munro (Kilmarnock), Mr. A. Silvester (New Zealand), Mr. H. Parkinson (Kirkham), and the Rev. R. W. M. Holme (Vicar of Weeton and Vice-chairman of the Governors).

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to Mr. J. H. Rigby for his valuable services as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer of the Association, and he was unanimously re-elected. The existing committee was re-elected, viz., The President, the Hon. Sec. and Treasurer, Messrs. H. Parkinson, T. V. Goodier, T. H. Maxwell, Junr., R. S. Crozier, H. C. Turner, and Messrs. H. F. Tomlinson, and G. C. Wilson were added.

A discussion followed on the question of a badge for the Association. This was referred to the Committee for consideration.

The question of the Association extending a helping hand to any old boy who had fallen on bad times was raised. The President, the Hon. Sec. and Treasurer, and the Rev. W. J. Symonds were empowered to act where necessary. The question of members assisting boys leaving K.G.S. to obtain employment was also discussed.

After the meeting a large and representative gathering sat down to Dinner in the School Assembly Hall. The usual toasts were duly honoured. Mr. Livingston Eccles, of Manchester, proved an excellent entertainer, and added to the enjoyment of a convivial evening.

It was impossible to play the usual football match—Past v. Present—owing to the frozen state of the ground.

Whist Drive.

Sports, 1926.

The 27th Annual Sports was held on Wednesday, May 26th.

The weather conditions were most favourable, and consequently the attendance was much greater than it has been during the last few years.

The several events of the day were well contested, the competition both for the House Cup, and for the Victor Ludorum, being exceptionally keen.

The Cross Country Race was run off during the Spring term. Durant was first home in the senior event, and J. F. Coleman in the junior. The Lytham House won both events.

The House Cup for the Sports was won by the Lytham House with 82 points, the runners-up being the Blackpool House with 79 points.


