## Prize Day, 1940.

Prize Day was held on July 31st. The prizes were presented by the Bishop of Lancaster (the Rt. Rev. B. Pollard). The Rev. R. W. M. Holme, M.A., Chairman of the Governors, presided. The Headmaster presented his 21st Annual Report on the work and progress of the school.

The Bishop said emphasis has been laid upon the school's splendid record of physical prowess and the health and fitness, as well as the intellectual attainments of those

who attended. But there was another side of life. The great Master said the purpose of His coming was that we might have free and abounding life. We sometimes overlooked the fact that it was impossible to have it unless we remembered that life was not a single thing, but threefold. Two had been indicated: the life of the body and the life of the mind. There was also that which really constituted them as men—the life of the spirit. When we think about living our lives in this modern insane world, we must not only think of that dual life, but remember that the most important part is the life of the spirit. If they could understand the meaning of that it would be their aim to make sure that the kind of insanity which had happened twice in the world in his time did not happen again. He urged the boys to believe that every one of them could be an instrument of God's purpose for creating a better world, for which their elder brothers were giving, and would give, their lives.

## The Rev. R. W. M. Holme.

K.G.S. suffered a heavy blow by the death on March 4th of the Rev. R. W. M. Holme, M.A., Chairman of the Governors.

Mr. Holme had been a Governor of the School since 1907, and Vice-Chairman of the Governors from 1921 to 1934, and Chairman since 1934. Under his Chairmanship the great extensions to the buildings and playing fields were successfully carried out, and his name is fittingly commemorated on the foundation stone which he laid in 1937.

His interest in the school was very strong, and his pride in its success and reputation very great.

He was a member of the Old Boys' Association from its early days, and took a great interest in all the activities of K.G.S. past and present. He will long be held in grateful remembrance.

## The Rev. E. Parker.

K.G.S. suffered another heavy blow by the death on April 8th of the Rev. E. Parker, Vice-Chairman of the Governors.

Mr. Parker had been a Governor since 1934, and in 1940 was elected Vice-Chairman of the Governors. He too

was a member of the Old Boys' Association. He was most faithful in the duties of his office, and constantly showed his interest in the school and its welfare.

K.G.S. shares with the Parish of Kirkham the sad loss of a leader and friend.

# Mr. J. J. Cockshott, O.B.E.

We regret to record the death on August 7th, 1940, of Mr. J. J. Cockshott. Mr. Cockshott was in his 93rd year, and was the oldest living Old Boy of K.G.S. Two years ago we published in the *Chronicle* a photograph of Mr. Cockshott and some memories of his days at K.G.S. (1854-57).
