

k.G.S. Old Boys' Association.

N the long history of Kirkham Grammar School, from 1549 to the present day, the founding of the Old Boys' Association is an outstanding event. A brief history of this movement is opportune. For many years the interest of old boys in the School has been a marked feature of the School life—but the lack of cohesion, the difficulty of getting into touch with old boys, has also long been felt, and has often led to disappointment, when old boys have, quite unavoidably, been missed in the notification of events of The Association is meant to supply this want, and to band together old boys who desire to maintain their interest in the old School. The first step was taken by announcing in the local press a Meeting of old boys at the School on November 3rd last to consider the question of forming an Association. This Meeting decided that such an Association was most desirable, and suggested the holding of an Old Boys' Dinner in the near future, at which the project could be launched. Mr. A. V. Catterall undertook the arranging of the dinner, which was held at the School on January 21st. A most successful gathering ensued, and the meeting was unanimous. Resolutions were passed:—That the Association be formed and that the annual subscription be A Committee was appointed to draw up the rules. The Head Master was elected President, and Mr. J. H. Rigby Hon. Secretary and Treasurer. Already the membership exceeds 120; but we cannot have too many members, and every member who can bring the Association to the notice of old boys is rendering a service. Long life and prosperity to the Kirkham Grammar School Old Boys' Association!

The School.

HE old School continues to increase in numbers. September saw 143, January 150, and Easter 152 boys in attendance; in each case a record. The general tone and spirit of keenness promise well for future welfare. Present boys do not forget that old boys look to them to maintain the traditions of the past.

The Governing body have taken steps to increase the accommodation, now taxed to its utmost limits. They have purchased a wooden hut of substantial make, which is to be used as a woodwork shop. The present woodwork shop is to be converted into a classroom. It is hoped to institute a special class for boys whose future is connected with the land, with a curriculum suited to their needs.

Examination successes last July showed:—Cambridge Local Examination—Seniors: 2nd Class Honours, 1; Passes, 3; Distinction, 1. Juniors: 2nd Class Honours, 3; 3rd Class Honours, 3; Passes, 13; Distinction, 1. In accordance with the regulations of the Board of Education, no candidate will in future be entered for the Junior Local Examination, but 29 boys will sit for the Cambridge Senior in July.

The football Season.

HE season has been largely occupied with team construction. Football, during the war, quite rightly had to take a back place, and the results are noticeable in many of the older players. Edwards, Hargreaves and Johnston left at Christmas, and this again caused fresh reconstruction. Summary of results;—

Colours were awarded during the season to Crozier, Thompson, G. C. Wilson, Edwards, Bamford, Hargreaves, Dewhirst, Clothier and Thornley. The hope for the future is bright. There are many younger boys full of promise, who have learnt a considerable amount of football during the season. The work of Crozier, the captain, deserves special mention. He is a goalkeeper of no mean order, and his remarkable pluck has more than once earned the admiration of his opponents.

The Old Boys' match was played on March 13th. Mr. A. Ward had got together a powerful team, which defeated the School by 10 goals to 2. The Old Boys were represented by T. Ward, F. Jolly, H. Edwards, F. Jones, J. Winchester (captain), R. Ward, T. B. Porter, W. Hudson, O. Aiken, D. Cameron and A. Aiken. After the match the teams had tea at the School. This was the first match played under the auspices of the newly-formed Association.

The War Memorial.

E desire to commemorate for all time the loyalty and sacrifice of past members of the School in the War, especially our glorious dead.

It is proposed to place in the Assembly Hall of the School a Bronze Tablet, 4ft. 9in. by 1ft. 8in., bearing the inscription:—"In proud memory of the following Old Boys and Masters of Kirkham Grammar School who fell in the Great War, 1914-1919." Underneath the names will be the words, "Faithful unto death." The present boys have undertaken to subscribe £50; they appeal to the "Old Boys" to double this sum. Subscriptions may be sent to the Headmaster or to the Hon. Secretary of the Old Boys' Association, Mr. J. H. Rigby. A speedy response will be appreciated in order that the work may be put in hand at once.

Memorial to the Nev. T. C. Walton, M.A.



MEETING of Old Boys was held last summer after the Sports, when it was decided that a Fund should be opened for the purpose of erecting some fitting tribute to the memory of the late Headmaster, the Rev. T. C. Walton, M.A.

The promoters have found great difficulty in bringing this to the notice of old boys. They, therefore, welcome the opportunity given in the pages of this chronicle. It is felt that this is a subject which will appeal very directly to the many old boys who loved and appreciated a great Headmaster, and who look back with grateful hearts to his guidance; to many others also who realise how much he did for their old School. Three local Secretaries were appointed, with one General Secretary and Treasurer :-

Any of these old boys will receive and acknowledge subscriptions.

The form of this Memorial has not been decided upon—the proposal which has found most favour is a carved oak chair, to be placed in the Assembly Hall, where the late Headmaster opened School each morning.

Present Masters.

A few biographical remarks about the present Masters may be of interest to "old boys."

The Headmaster, the Rev. C. Strange, is well known to many old boys. Educated at Uppingham and Trinity College, Oxford, he came to the School in 1906 as Classical and Games Master, and remained until the end of 1911, when he was appointed Vicar of Singleton. He enlisted in 1915, and was commissioned in 1916 to the 3rd Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. He saw two years service on the Western front, and in September, 1918, was appointed Education Officer of the 1st Division. He was in the Uppingham Running VIII., and has represented his College and Regiment on the track.

MR. W. J. SYMONDS is a Bachelor of Science of London University, L.C.P. (Hons.), and has a long experience in teaching. He came north from Bedford, and joined the School in 1917. Well over military age, he devoted himself to every work of value that came to his hand. Mr. Symonds acted as Headmaster of the School during the interregnum caused by Mr. Walton's death.

MR. G. BARTON is a Bachelor of Science of Liverpool University, with Honours in Mathematics. A native of Lancashire, he won an Open Scholarship in 1909. He came to Kirkham from Ellesmere in September, 1919. Mr. Barton saw considerable service in France with the R.F.A., and was gassed in 1916.

MR. E. J. WILLIAMS is a Bachelor of Arts of University College, Bangor, with Honours in English, and holds the Board of Education Certificate. He has had experience as English Master in Ulster and at Elmfield College, York. He served for more than three years during the War with the Hon. Artillery Company, and was on Active Service with the Regiment in Egypt, Palestine and Syria. He was torpedoed on the voyage out in the "Arcadian," and had a trying experience in the water and on the Greek island of Siphnos.

The Rev. G. S. SMITH is a Master of Arts of Cambridge University. He has had experience both in teaching and ministerial work in Barrow. He served with a combatant commisston in the R.G.A. Boxing, rowing and motor cycling are his favourite forms of sport. He rowed in his College boat at Cambridge.

Mr. L. Budden was educated at Weymouth College. He was in the Football XV. and Cricket XI. On the outbreak of War he had just passed the Final Law Examination with Honours. He joined the R.A.M.C., and spent two and a half years attached to the Serbian Army in Macedonia. He speaks with admiration of the Serbian people. After this interval Mr. Budden decided to forsake the law in favour of teaching. He is an enthusiastic lover of music and cricket.

MISS K. M. BUDDEN was educated at Bournemouth and Bedford College, London, and is one of the ladies who rendered yeoman service to Kirkham Grammar School during the War. She acted as House Mistress from 1916 to 1919, and now guides the destinies of the Junior Form.

The Memorial Window.

N January 21st there was unveiled and dedicated in the Assembly Hall of the School a Stained Glass Window to the Memory of the late Headmaster, the Rev. T. C. Walton, M.A. This consists of three panels of stained glass in the window immediately behind where the late Head-

master presided each morning. The dexter light contains the Arms of the County of Lancaster; the sinister light the Arms of Trinity College, Cambridge—Mr. Walton's old College. In the centre are the initials T. C. W. in monogram, surrounded by a wreath of laurel. Underneath runs the inscription: "In memoriam piam, Rev. Thomas Cambage Walton, M.A., Trinity College, Camb., Headmaster 1905-19." The window is the personal gift and tribute of the Governors of the School. Mrs. Walton was present at the ceremony, and many of the Governors and their friends, together with the Masters and boys of the School.

The REV. C. STRANGE spoke with feeling of the work and character of the late Headmaster, contrasting the School fourteen years ago with its status to-day. He reminded his hearers of the difficulties which Mr. Walton had had to face, and how indomitably he had triumphed over them. Backed up by a most enthusiastic and capable body of Governors, under the Chairmanship of the present Chairman, Mr. Walton worked with heart and soul, and to-day they could witness the fruits of his labours. The new School stood to-day a remarkable monument to Mr. Walton's energy and memory; but most of all he lived and would live in the hearts and lives. of those boys whom he had helped and guided. His integrity and strength of purpose, coupled with his sympathy and kindness, made him an ideal Headmaster. He himself was very proud to have served under him and to have known his friendship, and proud that his mantle had fallen upon him. He rejoiced that the Governors had so perpetuated his memory, and he thanked them in the name of the School for the gift.

The REV. W. T. MITTON, Vicar of Kirkham, and Chairman of the Governing body, unveiled and dedicated the Window, and on behalf of the Governors endorsed all that Mr. Strange had said.

E. Thompson, Captain of the School, expressed the deep love and veneration felt by the boys of the School for Mr. Walton.

The ceremony closed with the singing of a hymn.

The Old Boys' Dinner.

HE Old Boys' Dinner was held in the Dining Hall of the School on January 21st. The energetic work of the Hon. Secretary, Mr. A. V. Catterall, led to a most successful gathering, 52 gentlemen partaking of an excellent dinner.

After the loyal toast had been duly honoured,

MR. J. H. S. MATTHEWS proposed the toast of "The School, which was responded to by the Rev. C. STRANGE, the Headmaster.

Mr. W. J. Symonds proposed "The Old Boys," which was replied to by Mr. James Right, an old boy of 50 years ago, who entertained the gathering with many amusing reminiscences.

MR. B. STUTTARD, who was on the School Staff 1866-1886, proposed the toast of "Masters, Past and Present," to which MR. G. BARTON replied.

The toast, "Absent Friends," was honoured in silence.

Apologies for unavoidable absence were received from the Rev. W. T. Mitton, Colonel Jolly, Mr. E. G. Guest, Mr. A. L. Harrop, Rev. J. S. Rothwell and Mr. J. Pollitt.

A most pleasing musical programme was contributed by Messrs. W. J. Symonds, W. Lockwood, H. Parkinson, jun., A. J. Crook, A. N. Shaw and L. Budden. Messrs. J. H. S. Matthews, J. Crook and R. E. Catterall gave some excellent Lancashire stories. Mr. J. H. Rigby ably accompanied at the piano.

During the evening the formation of an Old Boys' Association was unanimously agreed upon, and a strong Committee was formed, with the Rev. Cresswell Strange as President, and Mr. J. H. Rigby as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer.

The Bouses.



BRIEF history of the House system at Kirkham Grammar School will, doubtless, be of interest to many old boys. The introduction dates back to 1905.

The School being comparatively small in numbers, two houses sufficed, designated "The Blues" and "The Reds." Boys on entering the School were placed in one of these houses, and remained there for their school life. As the School grew in size further sub-divisions became necessary. The Light Blue house was formed, and in 1918 the boarders were formed into a separate house—"The Light Reds." In September, 1919, a complete reorganisation was made, the boys being divided into houses according to the districts from which they came, while the old colours were retained.

The School House (Boarders). - Colours, Light Red.

The Lytham House (Boys from Lytham and St. Annes district).—Colours, Dark Blue.

The Blackpool House (Boys from Blackpool, Fleetwood and Poulton districts).—Colours, Light Blue.

The Fylde House (Boys from the country districts).—Colours, Dark Red.

The Kirkham House (Boys from Kirkham, Wesham and Preston district).—Colours, Orange.
