




## Editorial.

One wonders whether the Association can find some means of stretching a helping hand to fellow members, especially in enabling those who are leaving K.G.S. to secure their first footing.

# The Sports, 1923.

The morning of May 23rd was very disappointing, but a delightful afternoon favoured the Sports. There was a large attendance. The entries were even larger than in the previous year, and considerable keenness marked the several events.

The Cross Country was won by the Lytham House, with the School House as runners-up. The first man home was V. Fielding, the time being 26 mins.  $1\frac{1}{2}$  secs.

The Victor Ludorum Cup was won by H. Lowe, who won the Long Jump (distance 15 ft. 3 in.), the 100 yards, the Hurdle Race, totalling 27 points; Platt, who won the Half Mile, and Quarter Mile (second), scored 23 points.

The Contest for the House Cup was keen and much more even than usual. The Lytham House was first with 60 points, The School House was second with 56, and The Fylde was a good third.

The Old Boys' Race (220 yards) was won by S. Greenhalgh, J. F. Morse being second.

# Cricket, 1923.

Judging by the results of matches, the Season was rather disappointing. Several of the members of last year's team failed to find their form, and the Eleven had not the strong backbone that we expected. However, against this there is to be noted the distinct increase of interest in Cricket throughout the School, and the fact that Cameron's batting figures are considerably better than those of the leading batsmen in previous

years. His innings of 54 not out against Hutton, 43 against Harris Institute, and 27 against the Old Boys were all very good.

The matches won were against Blackpool Secondary School (1) Harris Institute (1)—average age of each team fixed at  $15\frac{1}{2}$ ,—and the Old Boys.

# Swimming, 1923.

Excellent use was made of the opportunities for Swimming. By the end of the season 63 boys could swim at least one length of the bath, while 8 more could swim a breadth.

The School House are to be congratulated for their splendid performance. Practically every member of the House was able to swim before the end of the Season.

In awarding the House Cup, 3 points are given for each boy who can swim a length, and 1 point for each boy who can swim a breadth; there is also a Team Race, the Winners taking 30 points. The result was as follows:—

# Prize Day, 1923.

Prize Day was held on July 25th, Dr. Temple (Bishop of Manchester) presented the Prizes.

The Chairman of the Governors (the Rev. W. T. Mitton) presided over a large gathering.

He impressed upon parents how short-sighted it was to take children away from school when they were only beginning to reap the fruits of the Educational System. He knew that parents had many difficulties to face, but he appealed to them to make this sacrifice for their children. The world, he said, was seeking to prevent future wars—the remedy lay in fuller education and enlightenment.

The Headmaster (the Rev. C. Strange) in his report, said the past year had been one in which all people had been called upon to fight the effects of depression-depression of trade, and prosperity, and depression of those high hopes which filled men's minds, when victory followed struggle, and peace followed war. The war had taught us that knowledge and skill could prove victorious over physical strength, and when · the war ended a great enthusiasm for true learning seemed to pass through the land, and we appeared to be on the eve of a Renaissance. That enthusiasm had been damped through hard times and the scarcity of money, and parents found it impossible to do for their children what they had wished. At K.G.S. they had fought that depression and had won-there had been no depression in their ranks. He appealed to parents to give their children a full and generous education, in order that they might develope in body, soul and mind, and become big, full, and good men, with a broad sympathy and a big outlook on life. After touching upon examination successes and the general advancement in the standard of learning throughout the School, the report proceeded to point out that there were boys without any special aptitude or brilliance who none the less derived immense benefit from their school life. The Agricultural form, though small in numbers, was doing some very sound work, and boys, whose future would be connected with agriculture, were enabled to learn the scientific side of their calling.

The Headmaster then alluded to the School Games, which were in a very healthy state. He emphasised the importance of the lessons of loyalty and unselfishness, which were learnt on the playing field, by striving for House or

School. Recent successes by Old Boys were announced, and emphasis laid upon the important rôle played by the Old Boys' Association.

The Headmaster reminded the audience of the value to the School of their body of Governors, and said how fortunate the School was in this respect. He paid a tribute to the work done for the School by Mrs. Strange, and thanked his colleagues for their ever-ready and unfailing help. No man could wish for better or more loyal helpers. He concluded by expressing his confidence that the School was continuing true to its traditions, and its high purpose. The past was a very precious heritage. In high endeavour, in loyalty to their school spirit—in comradeship of their corporate life, the present generation was worthy of its forerunners. But they were not resting content with their achievements, they wished ever to seek and to strive, under God's guidance, for the highest and the best.

Dr. Temple said the idea of education was not, as many people thought, to teach men to earn a living, but to teach men to live. There was a vast difference between these two things, because the teaching of men to live enabled them to become true and loyal citizens. They wanted the people of this country to display more ideas of citizenship, and to realize that they had some share in the responsibility of the management of the Empire. In an extremely witty speech Dr. Temple pointed out that there were things more important to learn than historical dates and correct spelling. Education meant aiming steadily at obtaining truth in its proper balance. To realise the true meaning of words, to be able to understand language properly, was to be able to think cleanly and crisply. No parent, he concluded, could make a greater sacrifice for his country than the sacrifice that might be entailed in order to enable his children to obtain the best possible education the country could provide,

# Annual Meeting and Dinner, 1923.

The Annual Meeting of the Association was held at the School, on November 21st.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting, and the Balance Sheet for the year were read and approved.

The Committee for the ensuing year was elected, viz.:— The President, the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, Messrs. A. V. Catterall, H. Parkinson, T. V. Goodier, T. H. Maxwell, R. S. Crozier, H. C. Turner.

It was stated that the membership stood at 144, as compared with 132 last year. The question of Life Membership was revised. It was decided that two guineas should be the life membership, or continuous annual subscriptions over a period of ten years.

A hearty vote of thanks and appreciation was recorded to Mr. J. H. Rigby for his valuable services as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, and he was unanimously re-elected.

After the Meeting a representative gathering sat down to Dinner in the School Dining Hall. Included in the gathering were Mr. James Bennett, of Kirkham, in his 85th year—the oldest Old Boy, and Mr. B. Stuttard, who was a Master at the School from 1866 to 1885. Many letters expressing regret that they could not be present were read from Old Boys.

The usual Toasts were duly honoured and an excellent entertainment of humour and music was provided by Mr. R. I. Stephenson, and several of the Members who were present.



# Correspondence.

In last year's Chronicle appeared an interesting letter from Mr. Gordon C. Wilson, pressing the advantages of the School adopting Rugby, in place of Association, football. This letter calls for a reply. I am heartily in agreement with Mr. Wilson's views, and have long wished to take the step he advises. The famous Preston R.F.C.—the Preston Grasshoppers—very kindly played one of their matches, against Hoylake R.F.C., on the School Ground, on March 29th, and gave the School an opportunity of seeing the Rugby game. But the game requires to be played to be properly appreciated. The question of introduction as a School game is not as simple as it appears. It is most important that the game should be taught very carefully in its initial stages. It cannot be picked up without careful tuition. Not many of my colleagues have

played the Rugby game. I think the time has come when we can make a beginning. My idea is to retain our Association fixtures for a year or two and to play some practice games—but the whole school should have systematic instruction in the Rugby code. I hope Mr. Wilson, and other Old Boys who play Rugby, will make an effort to come over and give some help in this instruction. Apart from the merits of the two games, I feel strongly that there is very little opportunity for a boy on leaving school to continue to play football, unless he takes up the Rugby game.
